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## BLIZZARD IN THE EAST

An Intense Cold, Driving Snow and High Winds Prevailing East of the Mississippi.

## NEW YORK IN DARKNESS

A Drop in Temperature of More Than Thirty Degrees in Twenty-Four Hours.

New York, Dec. 26.—A heavy fall of snow accompanied by high winds began early today. So thick were the snow flakes during the morning that darkness almost like night prevailed in the downtown streets. Snow was wet and heavy at first, but later took on the semblance of a blizzard.

Thirty Below and a Piercing Wind. St. Paul, Dec. 26.—Sixteen degrees below zero was the record at the weather bureau today. At Winnipeg, Manitoba, the mercury went down to 30 degrees below, but is now rising and warmer weather is in sight in the northwest. The cold here is accompanied by a piercing wind.

Strikes All of New York State. New York, Dec. 26.—The storm is general throughout the state.

A Drop of Forty-three Degrees. Lafayette, Ind., Dec. 26.—From 35 degrees above yesterday noon the temperature dropped today to 8 below zero the coldest in two years. The Wash-bash River is frozen over and much damage resulted from high winds.

Fifteen Below Zero. La Crosse, Wis., Dec. 26.—A drop in temperature of 30 degrees in 24 hours occurred here and today the government thermometer registered 15 below. A penetrating north wind made it the most disagreeable day of the winter.

Cold in Missouri. Kansas City, Dec. 26.—The temperature in western Missouri today averaged five degrees above with a strong wind blowing. In Kansas and Oklahoma, mild weather prevailed, the temperature ranging from five degrees above zero in eastern Kansas to 36 above at the Colorado state line.

Eight Below in Chicago. Chicago, Dec. 26.—The crest of a cold wave eastward, reached Chicago today. The minimum temperature here was eight below zero. Trains as a result of the cold, generally were unable to maintain schedule time.

Zero Weather in Iowa and Nebraska. Omaha, Dec. 26.—Zero weather prevailed over the greater portion of Nebraska and western Iowa at 7 this morning. The mercury began to rise later with the prospects of warmer weather.

Boston Blizzard Stricken. Boston, Dec. 26.—A heavy northwest snowstorm began here today. A strong wind driving in from the sea contributed to conditions resembling a blizzard.

Railway Traffic Delayed. Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 26.—The first real blizzard of the winter reported from various points in Ohio, prevailed last night and today. Railway traffic was delayed owing to a heavy snow storm.

## KRAZ WILL GO BACK.

His Extradition Has Been Conceded By President Diaz of Mexico.

City of Mexico, Dec. 26.—President Diaz, acting upon the request of the American ambassador and upon hearing evidence submitted in the case, has conceded to the United States authorities the extradition of Charles Kratz, former member of the St. Louis city council, wanted in that city on the charge of bribery in connection with the street car franchise legislation.

## REQUISITION FOR ROSS.

He is Wanted in Colorado for a Dynamite Outrage in Connection With Sun and Moon Mine.

Phoenix, Dec. 26.—Requisition papers issued by the Governor of Colorado have been presented to Acting Governor Stoddard asking for the custody of Stanley Ross, alias Ross Sanborn, now in jail at Tombstone. Ross is wanted for alleged participation in an outrage perpetrated at the Sun and Moon mine at Idaho Springs, Colorado.

## OFFICIAL MATTERS.

Notary Public Appointed. Acting Governor J. W. Reynolds has appointed the following notary public: E. H. Salazar, Las Vegas, San Miguel County.

New Bank for Albuquerque. The comptroller of the currency has approved an application for the establishment of a new national bank in Albuquerque with a paid up capital of \$100,000. The bank is to be known as the State National Bank.

## MAIL SERVICE ON THE SANTA FE CENTRAL

Will Commence January 18—Closed Pouches for Kennedy, Moriarty, Estancia and Torrance.

Postmaster Paul A. F. Walter has received the following official notice of the establishment of railway mail service on the Santa Fe Central Railway:

"Railroad mail service is authorized by the postmaster general on route No. 167,018 from Santa Fe, New Mexico, by intermediate postoffices, to Torrance, New Mexico, from January 18, 1904, by the Santa Fe Central Railway Company. The railway company will provide for the receipt and delivery of the mails at your office."

A number of rules are laid down in this official circular regarding the delivery of the mails from the postoffices to the stations along the line. Evidently it is not intended to establish a railway mail clerk service, but merely to carry the mail in closed pouches, for the postoffices at Kennedy, Moriarty, Estancia and Torrance. However, postoffices should be established at Willard, Progreso, Hagan and other points along the line and railway clerks put on the trains so that mail for tributary points such as Pinos Wells, Golden, San Pedro, Escobosa, Chilili, Tajique, Torreón, Manzano, Eastview, Mountainair, and Palma can be handled with greater dispatch as at present.

## WILL SAVE \$7,000.

The Cheyenne Postoffice Case is Considered Practically Closed.

Washington, Dec. 26.—Following a long conference today with Senator Warren, of Wyoming, regarding the latter's interest in the building leased by the government for the postoffice at Cheyenne, Wyoming. Postmaster General Payne intimated that the case was closed. He said that the investigation showed that the lease made with the Senator's agent for the building now in use would save the government \$7,000 if the ten year contract was allowed to run its course. However, he said, at the completion of the new government building in Cheyenne, which would be about July next, the postoffice would be moved there.

## THOUSAND DOLLARS REWARD

A Diabolical Scheme to Wreck Trains on the Panhandle Railroad.

Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 26.—General Superintendent Ralph Peters of the Panhandle Railroad has offered a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the persons who attempted to wreck the trains and the bridge at Ellis Station on the Muskingum River. Several attempts have been made to cause a wreck by stretching wire cables across the track so anchored that they would pull down the bridge. The purpose is not understood by the railroad officials.

## PRESIDENT OF THE ROCK ISLAND

L. F. Loree Will on New Year Succeed William B. Leeds.

New York, Dec. 26.—L. F. Loree, president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad will on January 1, become president of the Rock Island Company, succeeding William B. Leeds. The choice was made at a recent meeting of the directors when Leeds tendered his resignation.

## CO-OPERATIVE BAKERY SACKED

Military Bakers May Take Place of Strikers in Paris—Bread Shortage Feared.

Paris, Dec. 26.—A band of 50 striking bakers sacked the co-operative bakery during the night. There were several minor strike demonstrations. The military breadmakers have been ordered to be in readiness to take the place of the strikers in case there is a shortage in the public bread supply.

## STEAMER SUNK.

The Dewey Rams the Kiowa in Boston Harbor—All Aboard the Kiowa Rescued.

Boston, Dec. 26.—The Clyde steamer Kiowa, inward bound from Jacksonville, Florida, was rammed and sunk by the steamer Admiral Dewey of the United States Fruit Company in Boston Harbor. All aboard the Kiowa, numbering 30 persons, were rescued by a tug.

## REVOLUTION WITHIN REVOLUTION IN SAN DOMINGO

It Almost Looks as if Uncle Sam Will Have to Interfere to End the Turmoil and Bloodshed on the Island of Hayti.

New York, Dec. 26.—The Clyde Line steamer New York arrived today from San Domingo. The passengers said that the whole country is in a turmoil of riot, anarchy and revolution within revolution. All communication between ports, they said, was suspended and all telegraph wires down.

At Puerto Plata the home of Morales the people were his ardent supporters until he went to San Domingo City when a strong Jimenez party developed. It was said that Morales would send war vessels to bombard the town and put down the revolt.

## Marching on San Domingo.

Washington, Dec. 26.—United States Minister Lowell reports to the state department under yesterday's date from San Domingo, confirming the cable announcement that the town of Macoris has pronounced in favor of Jimenez and adds that troops from that place under the insurgent flag are marching on the city of San Domingo. A great many arrests are being made in the capital but otherwise everything is quiet.

## WM. FRASER MAKES REPLY

In Suit of Lanning vs. Fraser Mountain Copper Company—Denies Allegations in Complaint—Asks for Protection of His Rights.

In the District Court of the First Judicial District for the County of Santa Fe, suit was brought today by the Pueblo of Laguna vs. George Hill, Howard, et al., to recover principal and interest on a note for \$200 given to Toribio Kowurio on October 4, 1897, and which is now the property of the pueblo.

Process was issued today out of the District Court of the First Judicial District for the County of Taos in the case of William L. McClure, trustee, vs. Juan Santistevan et al., for William Fraser, beneficiary, to foreclose a mortgage given by Juan Santistevan upon his residence, store building and lands at Taos. The complainant prays that the assignee be required to pay off the mortgage as alternative relief.

William Fraser, one of the defendants has prepared answer to the complaint of John E. Lanning, receiver of the Monmouth Trust and Safe Deposit Company of Asbury Park, New Jersey, in the suit involving the Fraser Mountain Copper Company. The answer is very long, covering 39 typewritten pages. It denies the allegations of fraud and collusion between A. C. Twining, former president of the Fraser Mountain Copper Company and William Fraser, in the procurement of loans from the Trust Company and in the sales of stock, and it shows that at the time the said loans were made, Twining was indebted to Fraser upon the escrow agreement for the sale of the mines affected and that since the time these loans were made not one dollar has been paid to Fraser on the escrow agreement. Mr. Fraser asks that the complaint be dismissed as to him and that the escrow agreement be declared void and of no effect for failure to comply with the terms of the agreement, and alternatively he asks that he be given a prior and superior lien upon the property involved for the purchase price unpaid. The answer of Mr. Fraser shows upon its face that the charges made in certain New York newspapers that the Fraser Mountain Copper Company went into the hands of a receiver because it was a "snide" concern with no ores to justify its operations is unfounded, and on the contrary shows that the property is very valuable and if it has been wrecked, which is denied, that condition resulted from doings at the eastern end of the enterprise and not on the New Mexico end, as to which, however, he disclaims any knowledge.

## SKELETON UNEARTHED

A Gruesome Find Made By Workmen at the Renehan Cottage.

Laborers at work grading the grounds surrounding the new Renehan residence on upper Palace Avenue, yesterday uncovered the skeleton of what appears to be a nine or ten year old child. The skeleton was five feet under ground, on the east side of what is known as the Old Brewery. There are no marks about the skeleton to identify it and by all appearances it must have been buried many years ago.

## WATER RIGHTS ON THE NAMBE

95 Persons Want Re-opening of Case to Determine Such—Claims to Be Destitute.

Antonio Jose Romero and a number of other residents in the Nambé River Valley are in Santa Fe today seeking legal advice.

These persons were deprived practically of their alleged water rights in the Nambé River by a recent decree of court and as a result 95 persons, men, women and children, are claimed to be in destitute circumstances. They are endeavoring to find a way by which their alleged interests may be readjusted because they feel that certain important features of their case were inadvertently omitted from the testimony which, if they had been presented would have put a different face upon the situation.

## KILLED BY A HORSE.

A Ten Year Old Boy at Santa Rita Meets an Awful Death.

A distressing accident occurred at Santa Rita, Grant County, attended with fatal results. The victim was a little miner's boy named Miguel Galvan. It was about 9 o'clock in the morning when the little fellow, at the command of his father, rode a horse to the trough in front of the Santa Rita Store Company building for water. He guided the animal by means of a rope around its neck. When he got to the trough the boy got off, at the same time wrapping the end of the rope around his left arm in order more securely to hold the horse. There were a number of horses and vehicles about the trough and the one in charge of the boy became frightened and started to run. Young Galvan did not possess sufficient strength to stop his progress and was soon thrown from his feet, being dragged along on the ground. This tended further to alarm the animal which tore down the public road, not stopping until Ernest's saloon was reached, a distance of about half a mile. The rope was so securely fastened about the boy's arm that he was dragged all of the way.

As soon as the horse stopped, bystanders picked up the bruised body, when it was found that life was almost extinct. Young Galvan lived about five minutes and then breathed his last. His head had been terribly bruised and cut by coming in contact with the stones and rough ground, and death resulted from these injuries.

Justice of the Peace Howe empaneled a coroner's jury, a verdict of accidental death being rendered.

Galvan was about ten years of age, and was well liked about the camp. The horse was not regarded as a vicious animal and had never been known to do any harm.

## FIRE IN MARIETTA, OHIO.

First National Bank Destroyed—Loss \$115,000—Caused by a Gas Explosion.

Marietta, Ohio, Dec. 26.—The finest business block in Marietta, that of the First National Bank, was today destroyed by fire which started from a gas explosion. The loss was \$115,000.

## CITY OF VICTOR SCARED

A Terrific Explosion Occurred in the Victor Mine Last Night—Cause Not Known.

Victor, Dec. 26.—A terrific explosion last night near the Portland mine, in the northern limits of the city, frightened the residents of that vicinity, though no serious damage resulted. The home of John Heber was damaged by flying rocks. The cause of the explosion is not known.

## JAPAN ON ITS METTLE

The Mikado's Empire Will Assert Its Predominant Position in Corea.

## SEOUL-FUSAN RAILWAY

Russia, Too, is Not Looking on Idly But is Sending Picked Recruits to the Front.

London, Dec. 26.—The Tokio correspondent of the Times cables that the Japanese government will shortly take steps to assert and consolidate the position of Japan in Corea. Preliminary to this action was an extraordinary meeting of the cabinet yesterday at which it was decided to guarantee the issue of ten million yen debentures for the purpose of completing the Seoul-Fusan Railway.

Looks Warlike. Moscow, Dec. 26.—The volunteer transport fleet is on its way to Port Arthur from Odessa with over 2,000 picked recruits. The transport also carries several Black Sea naval officers, 50 naval gunners and engine room artificers.

Japan Buying Warships. London, Dec. 26.—Japan is negotiating for the purchase of two Chilean warships. It is now only a matter of price. The negotiations with the other South American governments for the purchase of warships are also in progress. The Japanese minister to Great Britain said to the representative of the Associated Press that his government wanted more ships as a precautionary measure.

Troops Sent to Corea. Paris, Dec. 26.—It was learned in authoritative quarters today that Japan is about to send a large military force to Corea for the purpose of restoring and maintaining order at the disturbed ports. The departure of this force is imminent. It will probably consist of a division of 15,000 men. Japan has been assured that Russia will not consider the sending of troops to Corea an unfriendly act or a casus belli. It is anticipated that the departure of the troops will revive the war rumors.

Uncle Sam Interested. Washington, Dec. 26.—Rear Admiral Stirling, temporarily in command of the Asiatic station, cables the departure of the gunboat Vicksburg today, from Shanghai for Chemulpo, Corea, where it has been ordered at the instance of the American minister at Seoul. The local riots at Chemulpo recently endangered American life and property and the dispatch of a warship was thought necessary. As the marine guard of the Vicksburg does not exceed half a dozen men, Stirling has been instructed to send a company of marines from the Philippines. It is said that they will not be landed until American interests are further threatened.

## FIRE AT ISLETA.

Postoffice and Store Entirely Consumed.—Loss Between \$7,000 and \$10,000.

The postoffice and general store at the Isleta pueblo was completely destroyed by fire on Thursday night. The total loss including the postoffice paraphernalia and records is estimated as between \$7,000 and \$10,000, part of which is covered by insurance. The Indians are supposed to have started the fire. They disliked Mr. Sias the postmaster, and merchant, and were much opposed to the establishment of a store on the reservation by Americans.

## DEATH OF MRS. KENDALL.

At Cerrillos Thursday Evening—Heart Failure Was the Cause.

Mrs. A. L. Kendall, wife of Hon. A. L. Kendall postmaster at Cerrillos died Thursday evening about 5 o'clock of heart disease at her home in that town. She was 63 years of age and was highly respected and liked by a large circle of friends in this city and in Cerrillos where she and her husband have resided for about 24 years. The remains will be brought to this city this evening for interment.

## NOT AFFECTED BY STRIKE.

The Mines on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Are All Running.

Meyersdale, Pa., Dec. 26.—There is not a mine that was running on the Somerset and Cambria branch of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad before the strike order went into effect that is not working now. These places had no organizations.

## THE ACTION OF THE PRESIDENT IN PANAMA MATTERS SUPPORTED BY THE PEOPLE.

A brigade of Colombian troops has established a permanent camp at the mouth of the Atrato River on the frontier between the Republic of Colombia and what is now the Republic of Panama. This camp has been established and that a hostile one toward the new commonwealth. The Atrato is navigable for small boats for 140 miles from the Gulf of Darien. Holding the mouth of it, General Ortiz may mask his real movement up the river to a point from which his troops may march over the mountains to the valley of the river flowing westward into Darien Harbor of San Miguel Bay. San Miguel Bay cuts into the southern coast of Panama about 100 miles east of the city of Panama. At the head of the bay is San Miguel Harbor, an inlet extending westward eight miles, and Darien Harbor, extending eastward sixteen miles. Both these are broad, deep channels and into Darien Harbor comes down a river from the Darien Mountains, the boundary line between Panama and Colombia.

These two inlets into San Miguel Bay and the rivers emptying into them have been surveyed by American engineers because the inlets were selected as the southern terminus of an isthmian canal on the Caledonian route. The plan was to cut through the divide just south of Caledonian Bay, on the north coast of Panama, to the valley of the Laro River, only a few miles distant, and proceed down that to Darien Harbor.

Once across the mountains, General Ortiz would be only a week's march from Darien Harbor, and with the plains to the north open to him. Therefore, the American marines in Panama have been ordered to San Miguel Bay, or Darien Harbor, where any Colombian column coming from the north or the east may be intercepted.

In view of all this and despite the pacific assertions made by General Reyes, Colombia's special envoy now in Washington, it is but the part of prudence and military wisdom to have a sufficient naval force supported by some thousands of marines on land ready to check any advance the Colombian troops may make towards Panama territory as the United States is bound by treaty and by the best interests of all concerned to defend and preserve the independence of the new Republic of Panama, which has also been recognized by it and by about all the great powers of Europe. The President's course in directing that a sufficient force of marines be placed at strategic points along the frontier between Colombia and the new Republic of Panama and along the Panama Railroad is therefore demanded by the circumstances and meets with the approval of at least five-sixths of the people of this country. The President is acting upon the principle that prevention is better than cure and that the fact of the presence of United States troops at proper points in the new Republic to defend it against hostile invasion will likely be sufficient to stop any proposed movement by Colombian troops and will preserve the status quo until the new Republic of Panama has its government fully organized and is better able to defend its territory and its governmental rights.

Some hard headed people who are not at all troubled with sentiment are advocating the abolishment of the free distribution of garden and vegetable seeds by Congressmen. These men evidently want to make it harder for Congressional candidates in future elections, as if some of them had not a rugged enough road already. The movement will not amount to much as the recipients of these seeds and there are hundreds of thousands of them, are much like the rest of mankind and do not care to give up getting something for nothing.

Senator Reed Smoot is not at all pleased with the attentions a good many of the women of the country are forcing upon him. He is a modest and unassuming man and would like to be left alone.

## EQUALLY APPLICABLE TO NEW MEXICO REPUBLICANS.

Leading Republicans of Illinois are to have an annual dinner on January 27th next. This affair is called in that state a "love feast" and while it is not an official gathering, Republican party interests and policies are discussed thereat and harmony and unity among factions and leaders are generally brought about. It is a good custom which has in times past proved of much benefit and great good to the Republicans of Illinois and it might with similar results be followed in New Mexico where it is apparent more harmony and stronger unity in the Republican party, that is among the leaders, are very necessary and greatly demanded. The rank and file of the party in this Territory is all right, but in high places there is a disposition or there exist some discords which are inimical to the success and best interests of the party and of the Territory. The Inter-Ocean in commenting upon this proposed "love feast" makes some points which ought to appeal very strongly to New Mexico Republican leaders, as they apply with the same force which they possess in Illinois. The Inter-Ocean says:

"The customary conference of Illinois Republicans known as the 'love feast' will be held at Springfield on January 27. As its name implies, the 'love feast' is a meeting at which Republicans get together, not to decide contests, but for friendly counsel and to feel the touch of elbows all along the line.

"The 'love feast' is expected to sound the keynote of the next campaign. It will be able to sound a keynote by which the great Republican chorus of Illinois can be inspired to victorious harmony only if those who essay to set the tune clearly realize what party harmony is and what it is not.

"Party harmony cannot be established by bowing to leadership whose inspiration is from outside the Republican ranks. Only the votes of Republicans can elect Republican candidates. Other votes may help to the victory, but they do not secure it. No candidate weak with Republicans, no matter how strong elsewhere, can gain a Republican victory.

"Nor can harmony be established by endeavoring to turn the majority of the party into the paths preferred by the minority. For the majority to yield to the minority as to either principles or men is not harmony, but discord and defeat. Men will follow leaders far, but no majority knowing itself to be such ever did or ever will follow leaders in surrender to a minority.

"The only way in which harmony can be established and Republican success made sure is by frank and complete acceptance on the part of all Republicans of the fundamental principle of majority rule, and of the inalienable right of the majority to rule until it shall be indisputably proved to be no longer a majority.

"If the 'love feast' shall sound the keynote of majority rule within the party with such clearness and vigor that those who now question it shall cease to do so it will have done the party and the state the best service it can perform, for it will have established real Republican harmony."

A Colombian army which is said to be in the field against the Republic of Panama is evidently of very secretive habits and is keeping its whereabouts very quiet. It is following the example of those great and redoubtable Spanish fleets which according to the New York yellow journals sailed from Spanish ports during the Spanish-American war every day to bombard and destroy the principal sea coast cities of this country.

The mileage of Senators and members of the House of Representatives to the Congress amounts to about \$190,000 for each session although many of these honorable gentlemen, indeed, a great majority of them, travel on passes. In giving free transportation to these representatives of the free and sovereign people, the railroad companies evidently know which side their bread is buttered on.

The outlook for New Mexico in 1904 is very good indeed. There is just one dark cloud upon the horizon and that is the fear that there will be but little snow fall during the coming three months on the mountains and plains of this Territory. Should this unhappily be the case the stock interests of New Mexico, and they are great and constantly growing, will suffer materially.

And now they want another world's fair in New York City in 1909. These fairs are a good thing providing the cities where they are held, bear the expense, but this thing of calling upon the United States treasury to help these expositions along is not exactly pleasing to the people of the country at large, who have to pay the bills finally.

A pointer for the New Mexico boodlers. An official recently arrested at Honolulu charged with embezzlement makes his defense by saying that his mind is a blank and he remembers not what he did. This shows that Hawaiian boodlers need no pointer from this continent, not even from St. Louis, where they have the science of boodling down to the finest point.

**MINES AND MILLS.**

**Reduction Plant for Burro Mountains.**

A 60-ton smelter to be in operation by March 1, is now assured. Three wagon loads of lumber that will be used in the construction of the building for the plant have left Silver City, the exact location to be determined by Benjamin Johnson, the owner of the prospective plant. The machinery for the smelter has already been ordered and will be on the ground January 20. It consists of a boiler, engine and other auxiliary machinery, together with a 48 inch, 60 ton copper furnace. The furnace is of the same pattern and size as those used in the recently destroyed plant of the Silver City Reduction Works. The smelter will be under the control and ownership of Mr. Johnson, who has such faith in the district and its ability to keep a 60 ton smelter running full capacity, that he is investing his own money in the enterprise. Walter Clayton, who has had years of experience in the smelting business, has been secured by Mr. Johnson, as his superintendent.

**Gold Production of Arizona and New Mexico.**

The production of gold from the mines of Arizona and New Mexico is on the increase and will continue to grow. The vast gold producing possibilities of the two territories which have lain dormant for years are demanding the attention of the miner and investor alike, as well as in the markets where large investments are made in mineral properties. The remarkable surface showing of the yellow metal in certain sections makes the two territories second only to Colorado.

**Future of Copper.**

It is a question of only a short time when the supply of copper will become a very serious question. The stocks on hand are being rapidly depleted. The production is not keeping pace with the demand. The result will be high priced copper unless more mines are opened throughout New Mexico, Arizona and the southwest, or greater ore bodies are discovered in the properties now producing. An increase in the price of copper, however, would have the effect of keeping a number of mines in operation that do not find it profitable to continue development at the present price.

**No End of Rich Strikes.**

There seems to be no end to the strikes in the American mine at Terrazas, Mexico, owned by the Torreon smelter. A new one was made recently running high in copper. The output of the mine is now 50 tons a day.

**Mining Notes.**

Robert Ward of Fairview, Sierra County, while at work on the Julius Wild mine, stepped from a level into the main shaft falling 50 feet. His right arm was broken above the elbow and his chin cut.

Professor F. C. Lincoln of the New Mexico School of Mines, has been working for some time on a new method of zinc assay, and is securing some very interesting results. These will be incorporated in a paper which he will read at the annual meeting of the New Mexico Academy of Science, which convenes in Santa Fe during the holidays.

The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company has temporarily suspended all operations at Fierro, Grant County, on account of the closing down of the Pueblo plants of the company, due to the coal miners' strike in southern Colorado. Many men have been thrown out of employment, but it is promised that work will resume as soon as conditions in Colorado adjust themselves.

J. S. Lenox of Roswell, who is interested in the Mescalero Mining Company, on Eagle Creek, states that the company proposes to do considerable work on its property during the winter and spring, and hopes to have a reduction plant on the ground to handle the ore before the daisies grow again. Mr. Lenox expects to see considerable activity in the mining regions of Lincoln County during the coming year.

J. M. Moad with the help of Douglas Putnam is developing the lone. It is a first class property.

John Conley who is in partnership with A. D. Hawk, who owns the Highland Chief is showing two assays from the property that run \$25.61 and \$68.29. Mr. Gardner was the assayer.

## FARMERS ARE PROSPEROUS

This is Conclusively Shown in  
Seventh Annual Report of  
Secretary of Agriculture.

## PRODUCTION LARGE

Distribution of Seeds, Alfalfa Raising and Forest Extension Treated Extensively.

In his seventh annual report Secretary James Wilson of the department of agriculture devotes considerable space to the educational requirements of agricultural research, and adds that the department has been extending its work in all parts of the country during the past year, wherever the producers from the soil most need help.

The most active efforts have been directed to the stamping out of the foot and mouth disease in four of the New England states, in studying the cotton boll-weevil in Texas, and demonstrating the growing of cotton successfully in spite of the presence of this pest.

Encouraging progress has been made in all the lines of research with which the department is charged.

## Our Surplus Production.

Continuing the report says: "Out of their continued abundance, during the past year, the farmers of the nation have contributed food and raw materials for manufacturers to hundreds of millions of people in foreign countries, besides sustaining 80,000,000 at home."

"A survey of half a century discovers the remarkable character of the movement in which the farmers of this country have become the chief purveyors of the world.  
"In 1851 our shipments of farm products were valued at \$147,000,000, while half a century later, in 1901, they amounted to \$952,000,000, an increase of \$805,000,000, or about 550 per cent. The farmers' export trade for the decade in 1851-1860 amounted to \$1,896,000,000, and in the following decade, in spite of the transfer of multitudes of men from productive to destructive life, the total was \$2,431,000,000. In the decade after that, the export trade doubled and amounted to \$4,864,000,000. In the next decade the amount grew to \$5,740,000,000, and the total for the decade of 1891-1900 was \$7,032,000,000, or an average of over \$703,000,000 a year. Subsequent to the last named period this trade has gone on increasing and reached its highest amount in 1901 with exports valued at \$952,000,000. The export trade in farm products for 1903 was valued at over \$878,000,000, and amount second only to that of 1901."

"The consumption of cotton in this country is now greater than that of any other country, and yet the cotton planters of the south not only supplied this market last year, but exported a surplus of 3,569,000,000 pounds, valued at \$317,000,000, or for every working day in the year about 12,000,000,000 pounds, worth more than \$1,000,000.  
"Represented in value, the exports of grain and grain products had about two-thirds of the importance of cotton in the last fiscal year, the value of the export being more than \$221,000,000. From 46,000,000 acres of wheat there was a surplus for foreign markets amounting to 114,000,000 bushels and 20,000,000 barrels of flour, amounts that together represent 204,000,000 bushels of wheat."

"Third in importance are the exports of meats and meat products, with a grand total of \$178,000,000 to which may be added \$35,000,000 for live animals. Quantities that are beyond the grasp of the mine represent the exports of meats and their products. The pounds of beef were 385,000,000; of pork, 551,000,000; of lamb, 491,000,000; and of oleo oil, 126,000,000."

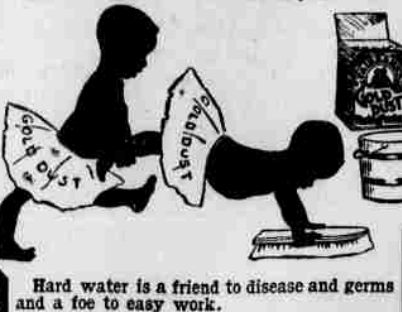
"The foregoing figures, it should be borne in mind, do not stand for the total production of the farms, but for the surplus production after the wants of the people at home have been satisfied."

**Magnitude of Production.**  
"The height to which farm production has risen to supply the demands of domestic and foreign consumption should not be overlooked. Taking the range of recent years, there is the product of wheat, 600,000,000 to 750,000,000 bushels, worth to the farmer from \$350,000,000 to \$450,000,000. On more than 90,000,000 acres grow 2,000,000,000 to 2,500,000,000 bushels of corn, with a value which ran up to more than \$1,000,000,000 on the farm in 1902.  
"The oat crop now reaches close to 1,000,000,000 bushels, with a value of \$300,000,000; the barley crop overruns 100,000,000 bushels, worth \$50,000,000, and the rice crop in 1902 amounted to 390,000,000 pounds.  
"One of the most valuable three of all farm crops is that of hay, aggregating about 50,000,000 to 60,000,000 tons, worth \$450,000,000 to \$550,000,000; ranging between 200,000,000 and 300,000,000 bushels in the potato crop.  
"The acreage of the cotton crop has displayed a tendency to increase considerably during the last few years, and in 1903 was about 29,000,000 acres; the number of bales produced in recent years ranges from 10,000,000 to 11,000,000, while the value of the entire crop on the plantations has gone as high as \$511,000,000 for the crop of 1900, or, if the seed is included, \$530,000,000."

"Tobacco is another crop of expanding proportions, and the prospect now is that within a few years ten figures will be required to represent the annual production. This crop has now

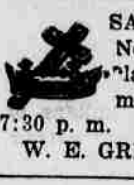

climbed close to 900,000,000 pounds, valued at \$60,000,000.

"Only some of the principal farm products have been mentioned, but these are sufficient to indicate, in conjunction with information concerning the less important products, that the value of all farm products not fed to live stock for 1903 considerably exceeded their value in the census crop year 1899, when it was \$3,742,000,000.

Bureau of Animal Industry.  
"A marked distinction between our country and all others is the more generous nutrition of our people. Our domestic animals contribute to this result, and furnish a large percentage of our exports. This has been brought about by abundance of comparatively cheap grass and grain rather than through superior knowledge of breeding and feeding. We have developed a track horse, a lard hog, and but little else.

"The Bureau of Animal Industry has given standing in interstate and foreign commerce to our animals and their products, and is battling successfully with diseases and disabilities originating at home and abroad. It is considering the wisdom of undertaking systematic co-operation with the state experiment stations in the production of types of animals suited to our varying latitudes and conditions, in order that more economy may be observed in production.

Distribution of Seeds.  
"As set forth in my last report, a number of changes have been made in the securing and distributing of seed for Congressional purposes. Instead of contracting for all the seed and having it put up by one firm, the department has purchased the seed and arranged for the putting of it up by contract. This is a great improvement over the old method, as it practically removes all opportunities for difficulties which have been encountered in the past in the matter of substituting inferior seeds for those called for, giving short weights, etc. With the enormous amount of seed that has to be purchased in the Congressional distribution, it is impossible to make provision in advance for everything that will be required. If seed were a fixed commodity it would not be difficult to make specific contracts for the delivery of particular quantities at particular times. So much, however, depends upon weather and other conditions that it can never be determined until the harvests are all over as to what seed can and what can not be obtained. For this reason it is not practicable, nor is it desirable, that the department should endeavor to secure its seed by the ordinary contract system. Inferior seed can so easily be substituted for good that the department must devote special attention to this phase of the subject in order that nothing but the best may go out.

Alfalfa.  
"The Turkestan alfalfa seed secured by our agent in Asia was distributed through the active co-operation of members of Congress. This distribution was made in such a way that it would result in a supply of home-grown seed being available in the future, so that we may avoid the expense and uncertainty attending the importation of the seed. Reports received up to date indicate that many of the plantings made have been successful, and there is reason to hope that this valuable variety has been permanently introduced into the United States.

"Of especial importance will be the introduction of an alfalfa adapted to the alkali parts of our arid southwest. Work on this problem has been pushed forward during the year. The seed secured by our explorer in Algeria, as well as some sent by our representative from Turkestan, has been planted under the personal supervision of the department experts. There is reason to believe that this introduction will be successful, in which case it will be possible to reclaim large areas of land in the southwest that are now too alkaline for alfalfa.

Range Investigations.  
"Fifty-eight square miles of typical range land near Tucson, Arizona, have been put under fence during the year. Careful studies are being carried forward on this area, with a view to determining the result of protecting the new exhausted range from the depredations of stock. In the state of Washington we have demonstrated that the mountain ranges may be restocked with grasses by using seed. Our investigations have also shown that the ranges in that section may be so handled as to largely increase their productive capacity; but in order to do this it is believed to be demonstrated that it is necessary for those who graze stock upon the ranges to control a definite area of range land. Bureau of Forestry and Forest Extension.

"The object for which the Bureau of Forestry exists is first of all to secure the highest permanent usefulness of the forests in the present and future interests of the country. Among our great industries, the lumber industry now stands fourth in importance.

"Lumbering of the forests now standing must go on to supply immediate needs. This has made it necessary to find how to make conservative lumbering profitable, and the great danger has been that the rising price and growing scarcity of lumber would not of themselves bring this about until none but inferior forests should be left on which to practice forest management. "Plans for tree planting were made

for 68 applicants in 29 states. These plans, which involved the examination of 40,557 acres of land, were made in accordance with the co-operative plan inaugurated by the Bureau. Most of the plans were for farm wood lots of not more than 10 to 20 acres, but there were several notable exceptions. A plan was prepared for 108 acres on the Presidio Military Reservation of San Francisco. Planting plans were prepared for the grounds of the state institutions of North Dakota, at the request of Governor White. Other plans were prepared for farmers in the prairie regions along the Fort Worth and Denver City Railroad at the request of that company, and more than 600,000 trees were set out."

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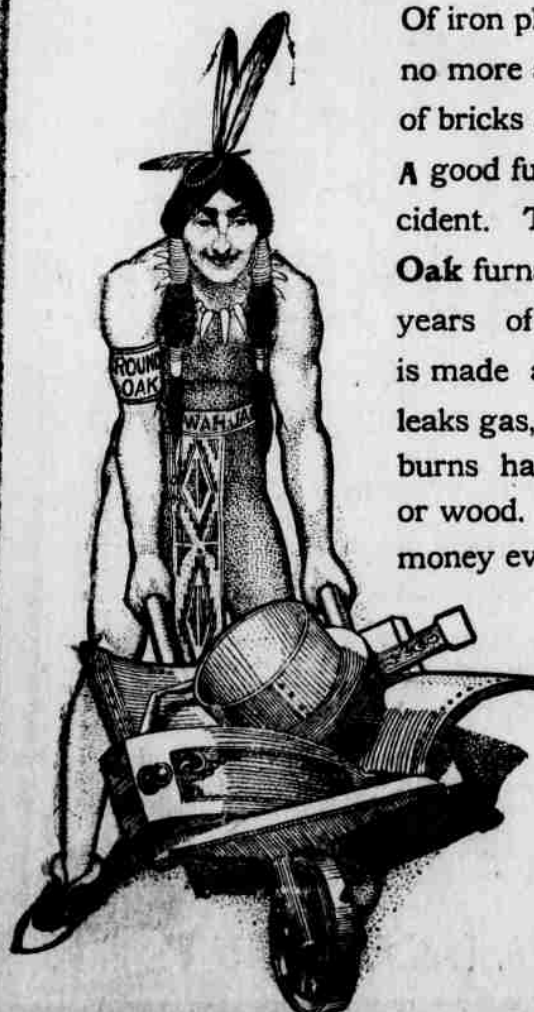

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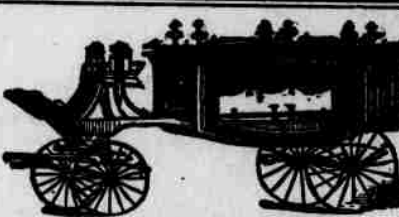
