## TRANSVAAL'S REPLY.

To the Last British Note, Received By Chamberlain.

Is Said to Be "Truculent, Loquacious and Blatant."

President Kruger Stands Firm and Refuses to Bend the Knee.

EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF THE RAAD.

London, Sept. 14.—The Transvaal reply to the last note of the British secretary of state for colonies, Chamberlain, has been received, but its nature is not yet known. It was regarded as significant of the nature of the Transvaal's attitude towards the British. The note was communicated to the commander in chief, Field Marshal Lord Wolseley, who immediately summoned general Sir George Stewart, White, V. C., former quartermaster general and the prospective commander of the British forces at Natal.

Sept. 14.—At this hour the South African continue most cordially regarding the tenor of President Kruger's answer to Mr. Chamberlain. The morning paper in the second edition, prints a special dispatch from Pretoria, stating that the capital of Natal, saying the reply is "truculent, loquacious and blatant."

The Manchester Guardian's correspondent at Cape Town telegraphs that the outlook is gloomy. Cape Town papers take a more hopeful view of the situation, basing their belief on the probable acceptance by President Kruger of the franchise in the Transvaal, as suggested in Chamberlain's latest dispatch. But they admit it is impossible to learn or forecast Kruger's attitude toward the ultimatum of Great Britain, which, after all, is still the main issue.

EXTRAORDINARY SESSION CALLED. Bloemfontein, Orange Free State, Sept. 14.—Members of the Raad, of Orange Free State, have been notified to be ready for an extraordinary session at a moment's notice. The Burgers of Orange Free State, at a meeting just held, passed a resolution to stand shoulder to shoulder with Transvaal in case of hostilities.

London, Sept. 14.—The consul general of the South African republic, Montague White, said today: "I have good authority for believing that the Transvaal reply will be unsatisfactory to the British government."

The news received by Chamberlain today, it is now said, was probably information regarding the nature of the boer reply. The text of the reply will probably not be received for several days.

INTEREST VAGUED OUT.

In the Most Advertised Conference in Chicago on Tuesday.

Chicago, Sept. 14.—The second day's session of the trust conference opened with William Wirt Howe of New Orleans. In the chair and a falling off in the attendance both of delegates and spectators.

Chairman Howe put before the house a resolution introduced by F. C. Farr, of Missouri, for the appointment of a committee on resolutions. He called for a committee of fifteen to be selected by Chairman Howe. To this committee all resolutions, according to Farr, were to be referred without reading or debate. The motion developed an undercurrent of strife between factions for and against the trusts.

Various speakers vigorously argued that the resolution should be amended to allow appointments to the committee to be made by the delegates themselves, one committee from each state. The amendment, in regard to the matter of appointment, was carried by a standing vote of 99 to 14.

McKinley Will Not Meddle.

Washington, Sept. 14.—Notwithstanding the suggestion of Bourke Cockran, President McKinley has no intention of interfering in the Transvaal dispute.

FATAL COLLISION.

Several People Killed on Southern Pacific at Haverfield, Cal. Bakersfield, Cal., Sept. 14.—A north bound passenger train on the Southern Pacific railroad ran into the rear end of the Porterville accommodation train at Haverfield, about twenty miles north of here, last night. Mrs. Maggie Moore, of Los Angeles, her mother, and Mrs. Lattie were killed. Engineer Wright and Fireman Keller were seriously injured. The wreck was said to be due to the carelessness of the Porterville train crew, which permitted their train to occupy the main line, when the passenger train from the south was due.

A Train Derailed.

Harlem, Mont., Sept. 14.—A passenger train of the Great Northern railway was derailed yesterday four miles west of here. The injured are: Mail clerk Tannan; Fireman McDermott; Engineer Jones; Harry Lund; John Fleming; Tom Matthews and Sheriff Tom Clary.

FIRE ON THE PARAGUA.

Washington, Sept. 14.—The following dispatch has been received at the navy department: "Manila, Sept. 14.—Davidson, commanding the Paragua, reports a sharp engagement at Balenoa. The vessel was struck many times by rifle shots, but there were no casualties. The Paragua silenced the insurgents' fire in twenty minutes, range from 400 to 800 yards. The occasion captured the Filipino schooner, which Davidson destroyed. Blazman is in the province of Maabao."

Floods in Europe.

Berlin, Sept. 14.—Floods are causing widespread damage in southern Germany and Austria. The northern part of Zwettau is inundated. Owing to the undermining of the railway bridge over the Isen, between Muehlhof and Rohrbach.

NATIONAL EXPORT EXPOSITION.

A few days ago the executive committee of the Fair association held a meeting and decided to add another interesting attraction to the big fair which will open in this city next Tuesday. The committee had in view Prof. Gentry and his famous company of educated dogs and ponies, some 275 in number, including two baby elephants, and one of the finest brass bands in the country. A telegram was sent to the professor, and an answer received that his agent, S. S. Primrose, was on his way to Albuquerque. Mr. Primrose reached the city last night, and this morning called on the president of the Fair association and the chairman of the executive committee. Arrangements were entered into, and this company of educated beasts will be here on Friday (arriving day) Sept. 22. The company will take part in the carnival masquerade parade.

FAIR NOTES.

Several booth spaces on the Midway were sold this morning, but there are still some money-making space left. The carnival ball will take place at the Army on Friday evening, Sept. 22. Tickets are now on sale at the store of O. A. Mason & Co.

A. D. Johnson has placed an Aerometer windmill exhibit on Gold avenue, opposite the Midway Plaisance and will show several parties of this fine mill.

The booth of the Cover Medical company at Gold avenue and Third street is being much admired. The concert performers, who will manipulate during the night for the company, arrived last night.

Booths are being erected on Second street by J. L. Bell & Co., Geo. C. Galtney & Co., Lamb's fish market, F. G. Pratt & Co., and Delaney's "Candy Kitchen." Several others will also be started this week.

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## ORDERED HOME.

Philippine Commission Called Back By the President.

The Tartar Allowed to Clear on British Suggestion.

Charges Against Dr. Bedloe, Consul to China, Proved Groundless.

TWO ADMIRALS TO BE RELIEVED.

Manila, Sept. 14.—Col. Charles Denby and Prof. Dean Worcester, members of the Philippine commission, received instructions from President McKinley to return as soon as possible. They will embark on the Empress of India, which sails from Hong Kong September 25. The commissioners expected to spend some months working on the establishment of a municipal government.

DR. BEDLOE INNOCENT.

Was the Victim of Impostion to the Chinese Fraud Scandal. Washington, Sept. 14.—As a result of the investigation of charges against Dr. Edward Bedloe, the United States consul at Canton, it is stated that he will either be ordered back to Canton or be given another position in the consular service. It was said that he was said to be a state department official that the consul was the victim of an interpreter who was a Chinaman.

RELIEF FOR REAR ADMIRALS.

Remey Will Succeed Watson-Schley to Command in South Atlantic. Washington, Sept. 14.—When Secretary Long returns to Washington he is expected to issue an order for the relief of Rear Admirals Watson and Howison from the command of the Asiatic and South Atlantic stations respectively. It seems settled that Remey will succeed Watson in a couple of months. Schley may be assigned to the South Atlantic station.

ALLOWED TO CLEAR.

British Authorities Show Friendliness in the Tartar Affair. Washington, Sept. 14.—Clearance papers have been allowed the Tartar at Hong Kong. The information came in a dispatch to Adjutant General Corbin this morning from Colonel Metcalf, commanding the Twentieth Kansas, who added that the troops were aboard the transport. It is supposed that the clearance papers were allowed upon the suggestion of the British foreign office to the British consul at Hong Kong, that it would be unwise to interfere with the American transports. The dispatch from Colonel Metcalf, in reply to the one sent yesterday, states that the Tartar was not overcrowded and the food was as good as on the other transports leaving Manila. He said the trouble arose among the discharged regular soldiers returning on the ship.

NOW is an excellent time for President Loubet of France to get to the front with a solution of the Dreyfus problem. A full and complete pardon for the prisoner would fill a long-felt want, and would probably save a heap of trouble in the future.

LEUTENANT PERRY's latest "dash for the pole" accomplished little beyond the loss of seven teeth, sustained by the lieutenant himself. Perry, however, shows a disposition to sacrifice the other three in another effort to reach the mysterious regions of the Arctic.

THE conjugal consideration and domesticity of ex-President Harrison, as described in a dispatch from Paris, where Mr. Harrison is staying with Mrs. Harrison and the baby, are not at all unusual in men whose second wives are younger than their first ones.

THE reception to be given to Admiral Dewey on his arrival at New York is to cost about a quarter of a million dollars, while the fund to build him a house has reached only \$20,000, or thereabout. This is a striking disparity, and it illustrates one phase of human nature.

AGUINALDO has done considerable running since Uncle Sam's boys got after him. But the running he will have to do to keep out of their clutches when the campaign opens this fall will be, in comparison to his former sprinting, as the progress of a stage coach to that of a lightning express train.

SUGGESTIONS that the United States has a deep, dark design to gobble up South American countries would be absurd if it were not for the fact that the prejudices of people in those countries are easily aroused, and it may cause us annoyance and hinder commercial development before such bogy man stories are thoroughly exploded.

THE library committee of a Methodist Sunday school in this country has, after due deliberation, placed the works of Mr. Rudyard Kipling on the index expurgatorius because of "their own words and their own language." The action of this obscure board has been taken most seriously in London and a warm controversy is now raging on the subject, "Is Kipling Profane?"

GOVERNOR TANNER of Illinois has been writing "confidential" letters that are as certain to come out as a cork to rise to the water's top. He has recommended that purchases be made for state institutions from certain houses in Chicago which he believes are friendly to his aspirations, and the Chicago Record publishes photographic facsimiles of the letters.

SUPERINTENDENT HURON. H. O. Huron, who was appointed superintendent of the New Mexico penitentiary by Governor Otero, is proving one of the best of territorial officials. The New Mexican, speaking editorially, says:

The New Mexican predicted that Hon. H. O. Huron would be able to render a good account of his stewardship to the people as superintendent of the penitentiary and would show good business management. Already matters at the institution have been given a better turn in a financial way. Notwithstanding many added improvements, including a modern brick machine, with a capacity of 60,000 per day, the first of the present month found a surplus of over \$12,000 on hand, although only a part of the appropriation have yet been placed to the credit of the penitentiary. Never before in the history of the prison has there been a surplus at the beginning of September. It is already evident that at the end of the fiscal year there will be a handsome unexpended balance, which has not happened in any other year. Nor has this showing been made by reason of a decrease of improvements for the outlay in this respect has been unusually large, and instead of expending funds for makeshift and cheap

work, the improvements made are of a substantial character intended for all time and called for an outlay that will prove most economical in the long run. As to the discipline at the prison, it is very clear that this is excellent. The prisoners as a rule are well-behaved, and their work is satisfactory under the system now in use. The "dark cell" and stringing up men by the thumbs have been abolished, and putting prisoners on bread and water diet is not practiced as a mode of punishment. Punishment of all kinds, such as denying indulgence, is not enforced other than necessary, and the management believes prisoners are sent to the penitentiary for restraint and the purpose of reform rather than for prosecution.

Fatal Fall of Floor. ## VALUABLE STATISTICS.

The Indebtedness and Assessed Valuation of Territorial Counties.

CRIPPLED SANTA FE COUNTY.

After much labor, and after much urging of county officials, Governor Otero has at last succeeded in procuring correct data of the indebtedness of the several counties in this territory. This data is very valuable, and is published here with in addition to giving also the assessed valuation of the territory for the year 1898.

The new county of Otero, at this date, has no indebtedness. It was organized on April 1 last, and therefore its assessment of taxab property cannot be given for 1898. The assessed valuation of the county for 1898 is \$203,841.24. The new county of McKinley will be organized July 1, 1900.

This table will be included in the governor's report to the secretary of the interior for the present year, detailing the conditions, resources, advancement, progress and of the territory. The table is highly interesting. It is believed that under the Duncan revenue law, the taxable property of the territory for the present year—1899—will be larger than it was in 1898, although in some of the counties the assessment has been reduced, as in Santa Fe, San Miguel and one or two others, but it has been augmented by very nice figures in several other counties.

As will be seen by this table, the county of Santa Fe is in very bad shape, says the New Mexican, and it behooves the county authorities and the property owners and taxpayers to act promptly and quickly toward the territory, and adjustment and a reduction of the vast debt now crushing it.

# EDISON'S MINE

**He Talks of What He Will Do in New Mexico.**

**WATER IS NOT NEEDED.**

Thomas A. Edison, "the Wizard," proposes to work wonders from the sands and dirt of New Mexico, according to the following special dispatch from New York published in the St. Louis Republic:

New York, Sept. 12.—Hidden in the waste lands of the southwest are tons upon tons of gold. Up to the present time this gold has had no value to man. Mines could not be worked in that region without water, and the cost of getting a dollar's worth of gold from this land by former methods would have exceeded the value of the gold itself.

Thomas A. Edison, however, comes to the front now with an electric apparatus which promises to clear up the problem of how to get this valuable ore from the sands of New Mexico and other southwestern states and territories. Mr. Edison, to-day of his invention, Mr. Edison said:

"This certainly is the biggest thing I ever invented, this process of extracting gold from sand. Near Santa Fe, N. M., there is a region of 100 square miles containing gold worth \$300,000,000; that would have remained there had this process not been discovered."

"That gold will now be taken out and added to the world's supply. There are large gold deposits elsewhere that this process also will make available."

"I am the patentee of the process, but my only interest in the corporation, which is to work the gold out of the sand, which is called the 'Edison Company,' is my employment as an expert to go to New Mexico with the machinery, and to superintend the plant. We shall begin work almost at once."

"At the start we shall produce \$100,000 worth of gold every day. There is \$300,000,000 worth of it there. The electric machinery will take it directly from the sand. There will be no transportation of the ore. We shall handle it all on the spot and merely ship the pure gold."

"My process has solved the problem of gold mining without the use of water. It has been tested and found to fulfill all requirements. The gold ore in some places is not more than three feet below the surface, and it extends downward in some localities for 100 feet before bed rock is found."

Mr. Edison has done little for two years beside perfecting his gold extractor. So secretly did the work proceed that no information concerning what he was doing leaked out until Mr. Edison announced the completion of his work. Mr. Edison's system of gold extraction by electricity is somewhat similar to that which he uses at Edison, N. J., in getting iron from the slag in some localities. It is in the handling of the gold powder that this process consists, although in erecting the plant larger ore crushers are required. There are three sets of magnets—twelve inch, eight inch and four inch—the crushed ore falls in front of each kind of magnet. The gold ore goes through receptacles provided for them. When it has passed through the entire process the resulting material carries a percentage of the gold.

Mr. Edison declared today that this is his greatest piece of work since he came before the public notice.

# HISTORY OF THE PALLIUM.

Modification of the Roman Toga Signifying Distinction.

Archbishop P. Bourgade left last evening on a confirmation tour which will include the following parishes: Galisteo, Pecos, Haton, Tiptonville, Ocala, Las Vegas and East Las Vegas. He will return to Santa Fe in time for the pallium ceremony October 4.

Bishop Matz, of Denver, has consented to take part in the pallium ceremony, and will probably be selected to confer the pallium upon Archbishop Bourgade, says the New Mexican.

The history of the pallium, though somewhat obscure, is most interesting. It originally was the Roman toga, which, especially during the latter days of the Roman empire, became a symbol of high official and even of imperial dignity. As the liturgical vestments were not entirely adopted during the early centuries of the church, from the garments worn by philosophers, teachers or magistrates, it was natural that the cloak worn at that time should be adopted by those high in authority should have been adopted by the church to distinguish the chief members of the hierarchy.

The earliest mention of the time under which many modifications as to its size and shape. In its present form it is a narrow circular band of cloth woven of white lamb's wool and worn on the shoulders by the pope, patriarchs and archbishops. Two pieces of like material and with depend from it on the breast and back of the wearer, are worked on the crosses of black silk into which are inserted gold pins.

Much importance is naturally attached to the pallium, which testifies to the grand idea or which designate dignity, office and rank. It is an outward sign of spiritual loyalty on the part of the prelate invested with it to the see of Peter, and of high dignity to which he has been raised, and a reminder of grave responsibilities which the office entails.

The pallium is worn on the shoulders by the pope, patriarchs and archbishops on the eve of the feast of Saints Peter and Paul, laid on the tomb of the prince of apostles, and sent to the patriarch or archbishops who have been newly appointed to rule dioceses throughout the church.

This sacred ornament thus taken from the tomb of St. Peter, and sent by his ecclesiastical successor to more than 100 archbishops, is the recipient to the center of Catholic unity, and the symbol of pontifical power in its fullest, for when invested with it, a patriarch or archbishop acquires the plenitude of that jurisdiction which is the prerogative of the pope, and which the laws of the church direct he should possess and exercise. This vestment of white wool worn on the shoulders is the emblem of the good shepherd, who, after having found the lost sheep, carries it back to the fold.

The last time the pallium was conferred, was upon Archbishop Louis Chapelle, October 17, 1895.
