THE crop of New Orleans molasses this year will be very small, probably only half a normal output. Eastern merchants are looking for the highest prices known in years.

The government seems to be impressed with the belief that war is inevitable in the Transvaal, and our consul at Pretoria has been instructed to protect American residents of the republic.

All signs point to war in the Transvaal. The war, if it comes, will probably be short but bloody. The Boers are desperate, and the British have too large a stake to permit any sacrifice now.

The clock at the houses of parliament is the largest in the world. The dial is thirty-two feet in diameter. The pendulum is fifteen feet long. The hour bell is eight feet high and nine feet in diameter and weighs nearly ten tons. The hammer alone weighs more than 400 pounds.

During the month of July the largest pig iron tonnage in the history of the United States was produced. The American Manufacturer and Iron World, of Pittsburgh, says: "In gross tons the estimated weekly output was 250,000 tons on August 1, as against 226,575 tons for the month previous, which shows an increase of 23,425 tons in weekly tonnage."

THE Baltimore American completed the other day its one hundred and twenty sixth year, and presented to each of its readers a fac simile of its first issue, which bore date of August 20, 1773. The original title, however, was the Maryland Journal and Boston Advertiser. It purported to give the "freshest ad- vices," and its latest English news was dated June 16.

According to the official statistics, the State of Massachusetts last year supported entirely 16,825 paupers and partially supported 73,072. Of the latter 28,400 were under 10 years of age, 41,574 had fixed residences in towns and cities, 10,875 had fixed residences in the country, and 10,314 had no fixed residence. In addition to these 232,646 persons were reported as vagrants.

EVERY year the treasurer of the United States is called upon to redeem millions of bank notes which have become badly worn as the result of constant handling. During the fiscal year recently closed Treasurer Roberts gave new bills in exchange for old to the amount of \$200,000,000, breaking the record of the last six years. This is an indication that, with the return of prosperity, money is in free circulation.

ADVISES from Moscow, indicate that the Russian government gives weight to the reported alliance between China and Japan. It has been an open secret that negotiations of vital importance have been in progress for some time between the eastern powers and their continental neighbors. The safety of Japan and her supremacy in the east depends upon her preservation of the integrity of the Chinese empire.

At the close of the war of the rebellion the United States had less than 50,000 miles of railway, and the whole world had only 90,000. At the time of the World's fair in 1893, the railroad mileage in the United States was 171,804. The railways of the world at the time measured 360,000 miles. The United States has now a rail road mileage of 163,776, or six times as much as any other country on earth.

In the early part of next month a commercial congress of the nations is to be held in Philadelphia, and if one may judge from the zeal with which the invitations have been accepted by foreign governments the gathering for the discussion of commercial subjects will be a most notable one. Over thirty foreign governments and 130 chambers of commerce have already indicated the acceptance of the invitation.

In good times it is said that there are many more marriages than the average. A lot of old maid in New Jersey have organized to avert the possibility of their marrying, and rigid rules and strict penalties are proposed for members who offend even so far as being seen in the company of a man. They want to abolish utterly coquette and marriage. These old maids will be about as successful in stopping the practice of marriage as the democrats will be to stem the tide of republican propriety.

THE government receipts from all sources last month amounted to almost \$50,000,000 and they were \$4,500,000 in excess of the expenditures. Nearly that much was received from the sale of the old custom house site in New York, so that the ordinary revenue just about equalled the expenses. The August receipts this year were \$7,000,000 greater and the expenditures \$11,000,000 less than a year ago. Almost the entire decrease in the expenditures was an account of the war department.

THE trade of the United States with Germany is growing steadily, notwithstanding the discriminations of Germany against certain American products. The trade of the fiscal year just closed was larger than ever before. The exports from the United States were in value \$155,732,273, an increase of \$732,206 over the preceding year. But the imports from Germany increased \$14,745,367, reaching a total of \$84,242,745. The balance in favor of the United States was \$71,529,476 against \$85,312,991 in the previous year.

The report made by Gen. Fitzhugh Lee upon Cuban affairs in his district is a most interesting document. He was called upon to make recommendations, and the first suggestion is that a census be taken. This the government has al-

ready not about doing. The most important feature of the report is the strong recommendation that after the census, the organization of an independent government be proceeded with.

INSURANCE IN MEXICO.
The New Mexican makes the timely assertion that the foreigner who is seeking to have a third insurance area of land in the territory, in Juarez county, with drawn from settlement raises apprehensions that the very heart of the public domain may be taken and New Mexico greatly impoverished now and for all time. If the forest reserve policy be carried to the extent its advocates favor, then the generous donation of the general government for the benefit of territorial institutions may be materially effected.

If the lands that are now marketable at the price fixed by the legislature are withdrawn from selection by the land commission, and only areas unsuitable at present left, then the act of congress will be practically nullified so far as its intentions are concerned. The policy intended by congress to build up the territory and improve its institutions will be set aside to a grave extent.

RETURNS to the department of agriculture show that the number of cattle other than milch cows in the country at the close of 1898 was nearly 3,000,000 smaller than a year before. This decline in the total number was accompanied by a rise in value of more than \$20,000,000. These figures alone would seem to give some ground for the advance in the price of meat.

The increase of pension payments reported by Commissioner Evans amounts to \$649,000 for the current fiscal year. At the same time there is a net decrease in the roll of pensioners of 3,180, the gross decrease being 43,186, of which 34,245 names were dropped by reason of death.

The Mauser rifle seems to be the fashionable military arm. Since the Spanish and the Philippine wars showed its good qualities the Boers have ordered it for their defensive army and now the Guatemalans are wheeling into line.

North Pole Mysteries.
The return of an Arctic explorer clears up many mysteries, who says that much new land was discovered in Weddell sea, and open water was seen far to the south. This shows that the great wall of ice reported by early explorers was a myth. Arctic explorers are not the only ones who meet with deception. Bro. Clayton tells us that the holdup in Watrous last week (when a saloon was entered by two masked men and all present robbed) is supposed to have been done by two tramps who had been in town the day before. They rode out of town on horses picked up for the purpose and turned them loose as soon as they got out of town. One of the horses was found next morning just above the bridge, the tramps no doubt taking the first freight train. This is the opinion of the best informed men in town. They only got \$15 or \$20 and one watch for their trouble.

THE HORTICULTURAL FAIR.

An Extensive List of Premiums for Exhibitors.
As Santa Fe is a part of New Mexico and as the CITIZEN considers the Horticultural fair a territorial institution, it is with pleasure this paper to-day reproduces the following article from the New Mexican and urges the good people of Albuquerque to attend the Horticultural fair:

The premium list just published for the third annual fair, to be held the first week in October, is very full and well arranged. Besides the classes of fruits it contains those of vegetables, flowers and preserves, introduced last year, and the new one of horticultural photographs, now first introduced.

The premiums cover collections and also all the best known varieties, and are in number as follows: Apples, 135; crab apples, 11; pears, 85; peaches, 57; plums, 43; apricots, 13; cherries, 10; quinces, 17; grapes, 75; nuts, 19; miscellaneous fruits, 45; preserves, dried fruits, 95; vegetables, 65; flowers, 38; photographs, 25.

The total amount in each premium offered is \$719. As the fruit crop is a large one in Santa Fe, and the fair is a good thing to send their very best specimens in order to have an exhibition creditable to the territory. New localities like the Fresno valley, where country and the San Juan region, especially, should take advantage of this opportunity to bring their horticultural products prominently before the country.
