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TUCUMCARI GROWING

New \$8,000 Schoolhouse About Completed—Electric Light for the Town.

SETTLERS COMING IN

Plenty of Cattle and Sheep—Satisfactory Wool Crop—Raising of Feed Stuffs.

"Tucumcari is the coming town of New Mexico in the central eastern section of the Territory."

This was the optimistic view taken of the future of the seat of Quay County, by M. C. Machem, of Tucumcari, who was yesterday admitted to the bar of the Territory of New Mexico.

"Tucumcari is building up very rapidly," continued Mr. Machem, "and although not yet a year old has a population of about 1,200. Numbers of people are coming into the new town, and purchasing property in the townsite. Work has already been begun on two handsome stone buildings, consisting of storerooms and dwellings, on the site of the recent fire.

"The new stone and brick school house which was erected at a cost of \$8,000 is about ready for occupancy, and would be a credit to a community many times the size of Tucumcari. The Tucumcari Electric Light and Water Company has finished stringing its wires, and will furnish light to the residents of the town some time during the present month. The building of water works by the same company is only a matter of time. The Dawson Railroad is putting in a round house there.

"Business at Tucumcari has been exceedingly good all during the fall and early winter, as a matter of fact the business conditions are somewhat of a surprise to the most sanguine. Many people are coming into Quay County and taking up homesteads.

"The settlers who planted crops of Kaffir corn, Milo maize and other forage crops got good returns, and demonstrated that this section of the Territory is well adapted to this particular kind of agriculture.

"There are lots of cattle and sheep in Quay County, and the sheep men particularly are in fine shape, owing to there being a strong wool market during the past season, at good prices. So long as the sheep men continue to get big prices for their wool, the shipments of sheep and lambs on the hoof, will be necessarily small, as there is more profit in the wool than in the mutton.

"The Choctaw Railroad will commence construction work from Amarillo, Texas, to Tucumcari, February 1. Seventy-five per cent of the grading has already been completed, and all the bridge timbers are on the ground. Part of the road from Amarillo west has already been built.

"There is a great deal of good land still open in the vicinity of Tucumcari and in Quay County for settlement, with good, shallow water to be had at a depth of from 10 to 60 feet. Tucumcari and in fact the whole of that section of Quay County is the ideal spot for settlers, as the town now has two railroads, the Rock Island system and the Dawson Railroad, and with the completion of the Choctaw, will boast of as good transportation facilities, as any town in the Territory."

SHORT \$160,000.

The Defalcations of Cashier J. E. Marcell at Highland, Amount to That Enormous Sum.

St. Joseph, Mo., Jan. 8.—The latest revelations of the defalcations in the bank of Highland, Kansas, by Cashier J. E. Marcell show an aggregate loss of over \$160,000. Of this \$67,000 is on account of the deposits made for the most part by farmers of Doniphan County, Kansas. Marcell has been removed to the county jail at Troy under a heavy guard to prevent possible injury.

COAL MINERS RIOT.

The Strike in the Meyersdale Field, Pennsylvania, Has Reached a Critical Stage.

Meyersdale, Pa., Jan. 8.—The strike in the Meyersdale field reached a critical stage, two riots having occurred as the result of placing non-union men in the strikers' places at Garret. The situation is serious and a grave outbreak is looked for.

SMALLPOX IN OTERO COUNTY.

According to the Silver Lining published at Cloudercroft, there are a number of cases of smallpox in the eastern part of Otero County. The paper says that no effort is being made to quarantine those cases or to prevent the spread of the disease.

TERRITORIAL SUPREME COURT

The Insurance Cases Were Argued and Submitted Today—Carmichael vs. Eberle Remanded to the District Court

Cases Nos. 957 to 965, of the Palatine Insurance Company, the Atlas Assurance Company, the North British and Mercantile Insurance Company, The National Fire Insurance Company, the London and Lancashire Fire Insurance Company, the Continental Fire Insurance Company, the American Central Insurance Company, the Springfield Fire and Marine Insurance Company, the Oriental Insurance Company, plaintiffs in error, vs. the Santa Fe Mercantile Company, defendant in error, from the District Court for San Miguel County, were argued and submitted today.

These cases arose out of the collection of insurance on the stock of the Santa Fe Mercantile Company at Santa Fe, which burned out last August two years ago. The cases had been taken to San Miguel County on a change of venue.

Attorney T. B. Catron presented the mandate of the Supreme Court of the United States in the case of William Carmichael vs. Francisco X. Eberle, directing the court to remand the case to the District Court for a new trial. An order to that effect was entered. The case is a writ of error from Socorro County.

SAN DOMINGO'S LITTLE FRAY

The Government Forces Have Recaptured the Town of San Pedro de Macoris.

AGAIN AN OPEN PORT

News Favorable to the Government Received from the Interior of the Turbulent Little Republic.

San Domingo, Santo Domingo, Jan. 8.—The town of San Pedro de Macoris has been recaptured by the government forces and again declared an open port. The insurgents' troops in the suburbs of this city today sent a message to the authorities, proposing to compromise on honorable terms. The messenger was arrested and the proposition not answered. The news received from the interior was apparently more favorable to the government.

RAN ASHORE IN FOG.

The Steamer Priscilla Stranded on the Lime Rock Light House Near Newport.

Newport, R. I., Jan. 8.—During a thick fog today the Fall River line steamer, Priscilla, ran ashore on the Lime Rock light house bar here. The passengers were taken off by a Jamestown steamer. Assistance was sent from here and the Priscilla was floated. The accident was attributed to the dense fog.

REMOVED FROM OFFICE.

The board of county commissioners of Quay County has removed J. W. Pearson as justice of the peace at Tucumcari for malfeasance in office.

SITUATION IS VERY GRAVE

Japan May Break Off All Negotiations With Russians Regarding Manchuria and Corea.

BRITAIN GETTING READY

Warlike Preparations Are Unabated While Russia is Obviously Playing for Time.

London, Jan. 8.—The text of the Russian reply to Japan's last note has been received at the Japanese legation here. At the legation the opinion is held that the reply is utterly opposed in the main to Japanese contentions and it is thought that negotiations will be broken off. Minister Hayashi said to a representative of the Associated Press. "After reading the reply, all I can say is my hope for a peaceful settlement is growing less and less. Conditions are very grave."

Still Hope.

London, Jan. 8.—A special dispatch from Tokyo under today's date, after recording the arrival of the Russian reply adds: "Diplomacy has not said its last word and there are still hopes that hostilities may be averted. From the Russian legation it is announced that negotiations will continue."

Getting Ready.

Hong Kong, Jan. 8.—A detachment of 250 men of the Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire regiments forming part of the garrison here has suddenly been warned to be in readiness for active service. The destination of the troops has not been divulged.

It is presumed that they are going to Peking or Seoul.

England Preparing for Emergencies.

London, Jan. 8.—A British home fleet left Portland today for the Spanish coast after coaling to full capacity. The fleet will thus be in readiness to replace the channel squadron in the event of the latter being required to fill up the vacancies in the Mediterranean squadron, should the vessels be ordered thence to the far East.

WILL IGNORE INJUNCTIONS

Military Officers at Cripple Creek Refuse to Accept Service of Court Papers.

Cripple Creek, Jan. 8.—Commander Verdeckburg and other military officers held another "council of war" as they term their conferences, this morning and decided to ignore the injunction issued by District Judge Seeds, restraining the militia from sending out of camp any members of the Western Federation of Miners. The military officers have refused to accept the service of any papers from the District Court. After a close "council of war" Major Thomas E. McClelland with a squad of soldiers started out from headquarters to make arrests under Verdeckburg's vagrancy order which required all the strikers to obtain employment or leave the district before January 7. All placards, posted by officers of the miners' union, advising the members not to abandon their homes have been torn down by the soldiers. Charles H. Reimer, a representative of the Ryan Whitney syndicate interests in the Portland Gold Mining Company who was arrested by military authorities on Wednesday, has been released by order of Verdeckburg. No criminal charge was made against Reimer and Verdeckburg apologized to him for his arrest which he said was made without authority from him in his absence from the district.

DIETRICH WINS OUT.

The Nebraska Senator Found Not Guilty of Bribery and Other Charges.

Omaha, Jan. 8.—When the United States circuit court convened today, Judge Vandever handed down a decision sustaining the demurrer interposed by the counsel for United States Senator Dietrich. The demurrer was made to the introduction of evidence on the ground that Dietrich was not actually a member of the Senate when the alleged bribe took place.

The effect of this decision is that a man is not an actual member of Congress from the time of his election until he shall have taken the oath at the bar of the House to which he is elected and that he is not amenable to the law as a member of Congress and officer of the United States. Judge Vandever instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty of the charges of bribery, etc. The district attorney immediately entered nolle in the indictments recently returned against both Dietrich and Jacob Fisher, postmaster at Hastings, Nebraska, in connection with whose appointment the charges of bribery were the outgrowth and they were released from custody today.

WITHDRAW OR FIGHT

The United States is Gathering a Fleet of Warships at Colon.

WILL GO TO CARTAGENA

It is Thought on the Isthmus That Colombia is Prepared to Keep Up Its Bluff

Panama, Jan. 8.—A fleet of warships is assembling at Colon presumably for the purpose of making a hostile demonstration against Colombia. The authorities will insist upon the withdrawal of the Colombian army now lined up across the border on this side of the Atrato River. Naval officers feel certain that it is the intention to compel Colombia either to withdraw her troops or to fight.

All the warships due at Colon before Tuesday, prepared to start immediately for Titumati or Cartagena. It is believed in Colon that the Colombians are ready to fight.

FORT MARCY RESERVATION

To Be Disposed of for the Benefit of the Public School System of This City, Mayor Sparks so Says—Proclamation of Donation Ready.

Mayor I. Sparks returned last evening from a six weeks' visit to Boston, New York and Washington. He spent about two weeks in the latter city in the interest of the transfer of the Fort Marcy Military Reservation to this city.

Upon being seen by a representative of the New Mexican, Mr. Sparks stated that upon the arrival of Governor Otero in Washington a consultation was had between the Governor, Delegate Rodey, himself and Captain George Curry, who was also then in the national capital. Governor Otero withdrew his opposition to the plan to donate the reservation to the city government, which should transfer it to the city board of education for such disposition as would best serve the interests of the public schools and the residents of the city. This having been accomplished, the matter was laid before the secretary of the interior and the President. After due consideration the outcome was that by a proclamation the property was donated by the United States to the city of Santa Fe for disposition by the city board of education for the benefit of the public schools of the city. A proclamation to this effect was drawn and sent to the President from the department of the interior Monday last. Mr. Sparks is of the opinion that it has been signed, returned to the department of the interior from the executive office and it is liable to reach here through the regular channels and the land office, at an early date. He has no opinion as yet to express upon the question of what disposition should be made by the city board of education of the lands contained within the reservation.

As to business conditions Mr. Sparks says that legitimate business seems prosperous and plentiful in the cities he has visited. He believes from his conversation with many people and Republicans whom he has met on his trip that Mr. Roosevelt will surely be nominated as the Republican candidate for the presidency in June next at Chicago.

SUN AND MOON CASE.

The Court Adjourned Until Next Monday When New Arguments Will Be Heard.

Georgetown, Colo., Jan. 8.—The prosecution in the trial of the fifteen union miners charged with complicity to destroy the Sun and Moon mine property at Idaho Springs completed its case today and the defense announced that it would introduce no testimony. The court adjourned until next Monday when the arguments will be heard.

Georgetown, Jan. 8.—The motion of the defendant's attorney that the jury return a verdict of acquittal because there was no evidence of a conspiracy, followed by one for the discharge of prisoners because no crime had been proved against them were denied by the court. Before the cases were taken up this morning, District Attorney Thurman nolle the cases against Pat O'Brien and Edward Carter and they were released from custody.

TO OFFER MEDIATION

A Texas Democrat Wants the United States to Call Russia and Japan to Time—Congressional Opinions.

Senate.

Washington, Jan. 8.—When the Senate met today, Scott of West Virginia, offered a joint resolution providing for the investigation of the Darien Canal route. He said that such a water way would be only 30 miles long and the route had never been carefully investigated by engineers. He said although he always believed in a sea level waterway, he hesitated to press the matter because he might be accused of an effort to delay and hinder the construction of the canal, but such was not his purpose. He asked for an early report upon the resolution.

House.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Representative Slayden, Democrat, from Texas, introduced a resolution in the House today requesting the President to tender his good offices or the mediation of the United States to Russia and Japan with relation to their present dispute and to remind them in accordance with The Hague peace convention that a permanent court of arbitration is open to them. It points out the fact that such a reminder could not be construed as an unfriendly act but on the contrary the duty devolves upon the United States as signatory to the peace convention to take such a step.

A bill making available the sum of \$250,000 to meet the emergency growing out of the ravages of the Mexican boll weevil was passed.

Burleson of Texas, urged the importance of the passage of the bill to the cotton growing sections. The House then went into a committee of the whole to consider pension bills.

Military Promotion.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The President today sent to the Senate a number of nominations of officers promoted in the army including the following: Major General Adna R. Chaffee to be lieutenant general, vice Young to be retired from active service. The promotion of Chaffee advances to the office of major general, Brigadier Generals Kobbe, Sanger, Bates, Randolph and Gillespie. A number of colonels are promoted to be brigadier generals.

Uncle Sam Neutral.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The far eastern situation was discussed at a cabinet meeting today, special consideration being given to the movement of the Asiatic squadron which it is desired shall be so shaped as to emphasize the absolute neutrality of this country in the event of hostilities between Russia and Japan. After the meeting it was announced that orders would be cabled Rear Admiral Evans upon his arrival at Guam tomorrow, to proceed thence to Subig Bay, it being desired that the American navy shall observe "good sea manners" by not going to Japanese or Russian waters now.

An Ultimatum.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The navy department today received the following cablegram from Commander Dillingham of the cruiser Detroit dated Puerto Plata, San Domingo, January 8: "Morales' gunboats delivered the ultimatum and threatened the bombardment of Puerto Plata after 24 hours' notice. With the concurrence of Captain Robinson, the English cruiser Pallas made such representations for both sides that they have agreed, one not to bombard and the other not to fire on the gunboats. All fighting will be confined to the land side of the town in future. United States interests are secure. Small parties of marines have landed at Sosua, and at Consulate in Puerto Plata."

TYPHOID IN MONTREAL.

One Thousand Cases Are Reported in That City and Its Surroundings.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—There are approximately 1,000 cases of typhoid fever in Montreal and in the half dozen smaller municipalities which join it on three sides. Fresh cases are being reported constantly despite the efforts of health officers to check the disease. Householders are being urged to boil the drinking water and to make inquiries as to the condition of the dairies.

NEW MEXICO-Texas BORDER

An Attempt to Rob This Territory of Over Two Hundred Square Miles.

ERRONEOUS SURVEY

It Places the Texas Boundary Two Miles Too Far to the West.

The question of the Texas-New Mexico boundary which Texas is bringing to the front by a bill introduced at the last session of Congress by Representative Stephens, the object of the measure being to rob New Mexico of a strip of land over two miles wide on its eastern border, is ably discussed in the following letter to Delegate B. S. Rodey, which sets forth not only the injustice but also the falsity of the Texas claim.

To the Hon. Bernard S. Rodey, Delegate in Congress, Washington, D. C.

In reference to H. R. No. 10, Fifty-eighth Congress, first session, introduced by Representative Stephens of Texas, on November 9, 1903, I desire respectfully to call your attention to the following:

First—To the organic act establishing the Territory of New Mexico, approved September 30, 1850, where it is provided that the boundary line, between Texas and New Mexico, shall be the meridian 103 degrees west from Greenwich, and that the state of Texas, shall cede to the United States, all her claim to the Territory, exterior to that meridian and that in the consideration of her so doing the United States shall pay to the state of Texas, the sum of \$10,000,000.

Second—That Texas has received from the United States, the whole of the said sum.

Third—That according to the survey, known as Chaney's survey of 1881, the Clark survey of 1859-60 was found to be two miles and 35 chains west of the true 103d meridian; see bulletin 194, Geological Survey, pages 28 and 29, that according to Levi S. Peston's survey in 1890, the Clark survey was found to be, two miles and 14 chains west of the true 103d meridian.

Fourth—That the survey made by Author D. Kidder in matter of the establishment of the true 100th meridian with Red River, further shows and confirms the fact that the Clark survey is approximately two miles west of the true 103d meridian.

Fifth—That but few of the monuments marking the line surveyed by Clark in 1859-60 can be now certainly located.

Sixth—That the allegation in the said H. R. No. 10, that the Clark survey, has been approved by the United States, and the legislature of the state of Texas, and confirmed by the surveyors of the state of Texas, is clearly an error; in so far as least as the United States is concerned. This alleged act of confirmation is found in chapter 542, act of Fifty-third Congress, second session, and reference thereto, shows that the said act is a general appropriation measure, and that the words, "is hereby confirmed," appended to the said act, have no logical connection, and could under no construction be construed as to mean an intended confirmation of the Clark survey; that the said words are a meaningless addenda or else were appended surreptitiously for the purpose of aiding a possible confirmatory construction and approval of the Clark survey.

Seventh—A joint resolution based upon this alleged confirmation act, was enacted by the Texas legislature in March, 1891; an examination of this joint resolution, leaves the examiner to believe, that the whole matter was concerted and done for a purpose.

Eighth—That even if the Congress of the United States has been tricked into a confirmation of the Clark survey, it is not thereby bound; that having paid a consideration for the release of her claim of lands lying west of the true 103d meridian, Texas can not justly retain that consideration and at the same time retain the land.

Ninth—That the only way in which justice may be done in the matter is to provide for and to have the true 103d meridian established, surveyed, and monumented as the boundary line.

STATEHOOD HEARINGS CLOSED.

A Washington dispatch says: The House committee on territories concluded its hearings of arguments on statehood for New Mexico on Wednesday. Delegate Rodey made the closing argument, a strong presentation of the Territory's claims for admission as a state.

Arguments commenced yesterday on behalf of the Arizona bill, and the hearings will be continued next week, when the Oklahoma and Indian Territory bills will be considered. Advocates of statehood expect early and favorable action by the House committee and by the House itself.

A DECISION THAT IS RIGHT.

A case involving the legality of an ordinance of the city of Denver prohibiting the use of wine rooms by women has just been decided by the Supreme Court of the United States and that in the right way. In this Territory a law has been in effect for many years, prohibiting the use of saloons and wine rooms by women and not even allowing the playing of music and of singing by them in such establishments. This is working well and in New Mexico there are no concert halls with female attendants. In Denver, quite a hard fight has been waged upon the same lines for years and the ordinance, the legality of which has just been affirmed by the U. S. Supreme Court, was partly the outcome of the fight. The Denver News in commenting upon this fact says that in May, 1901, an effort was made to prove in the courts that the regulation of the city of Denver forbidding the maintenance of wine rooms for women in connection with saloons was illegal. The case has gone through the courts and has at last been decided by the Supreme Court of the United States. The decision throws out the case against the fire and police board of Denver, giving as its decision that there was nothing to invalidate the law forbidding such wine rooms.

The decision was to be expected, but that it has come in the way the best public sentiment of the community desired is cause for satisfaction.

The plea made at the time was that the law was an infringement upon the rights of women whose privileges, especially where enfranchised, should not be arbitrarily curtailed.

Personal rights represent social gains achieved in the interests of society as well as of the individual. A claim of rights as privileges which run counter to social well being should have little recognition in the laws of the land.

Society has found it difficult to deal with the questions that are involved in the saloons themselves. It has recognized the need that they be hedged about with various restrictions. Among these—in America, at least—it has been judged necessary, by well-nigh universal consent, to restrict women from frequenting the places in which liquor is sold.

The evils which would spring from the removal of this restriction are apparent. Society has a right to protect itself from the vicious results of such degradation as must spring from the wine room if it should become an established part of city life.

That women possess the full functions of citizenship in Colorado has no bearing on the matter. Freedom for neither man nor woman should involve such license in custom or association as would tend to vitiate the moral fiber of society.

Public sentiment in this city upon the disposition of the Fort Marcy Military Reservation is firmly united on the question that after segregation of the necessary lots for a high school building, a ward school, a city hall and streets, the remainder should be sold after due notice to the highest bidder and the proceeds used for the construction of the new school houses needed. This subject is of the greatest importance to the people of this city and the New Mexican will keep it in the public view until it is properly disposed of.

Lincoln County Republicans propose to push one of their number for selection as a delegate to the National Republican Convention from this Territory. They think that they are entitled to such recognition and will make a fight to obtain it. That is right; let them make the proper kind of a fight and they may succeed.

From Las Vegas comes the report that extensive deposits of radium have been discovered at the head of the Sapello River in San Miguel County. Radium is said to be worth something like \$175,000 an ounce and if this report should be true, the find will prove a great thing all around.

THE SENATE SHOULD HURRY.

The dilatory conduct of the Senate in approving the Panama Canal treaty is very annoying to the people who are practically unanimous for speedy and favorable action thereon. Every moment's delay is encouraging to the Colombians and is being used by them in preparing for war on the United States—their friends in the Senate are playing into their hands and embarrassing their own government. The very same traitorous tactics were used by the same men during the pendency of the Spanish treaty until Aguinaldo was encouraged to attack the American troops at Manila, thus causing much bloodshed, all of which would have been saved if his hands had not been upheld by Senators Hoar, Gorman and others. The flimsy assertions made by this Senatorial clique to the effect that the administration connived at and encouraged the revolution on the Isthmus are so summarily disposed of by the President in his recent message as not to leave his enemies an inch to stand on. He says:

"I hesitate to refer to the injurious insinuations that have been made of complicity by this government in the revolutionary movement in Panama. They are as destitute of foundation as of propriety. The only excuse for my mentioning them is the fear lest unthinking persons might mistake acquiescence for silence of mere self respect. I think it proper to say therefore that no one connected with the government had any part in preparing, inciting or encouraging the late revolution on the Isthmus of Panama and that save from the reports from our military and naval officers no one connected with this government had any previous knowledge of the revolution except such as is accessible to any person of ordinary intelligence who read the newspapers and kept up a current acquaintance with public affairs."

It is impossible for any man to use stronger or more emphatic language but it is not expected to have the least effect on the pestilent cabal of obstructionists who are, unhappily, able to delay and (if they can) defeat the treaty. A few days ago the New Mexican pointed out the great financial benefits that must accrue to the southern states by the construction of the canal and it is pleasing to see that the people of the south are preparing for the coming increase of their trade. Coming events connected with the Panama Canal are casting their shadows before. The New Orleans board of trade has given its endorsement to a project to build a line of steamships to pass through the canal and trade with the western countries of South America and with Asia. The plan is to build a fleet of large, swift, modern vessels, to interest the entire Mississippi Valley in the project, to raise \$5,000,000 for the work and to get the Governors of the states in the valley, the mayors of the cities and all its commercial bodies to take a hand in the scheme by way of subscribing for the stock or receiving subscriptions.

How it is possible for Gorman, Morgan and Tillman, et al., to oppose the demands of their own people is beyond comprehension. It is but a repetition of the old maxim, "Whom the gods wish to destroy they first make mad." These demagogues are surely mad and there is not even method in their madness. But the south can rely on patriotism and good sense of this administration to push on over their enemies and construct the canal in spite of all their efforts to the contrary. The people of the country are getting very restless at the delay and the Senate should not lose a moment in approving the treaty and thus convincing the Colombians that they have nothing to expect from the United States. They had their chance and threw it away. In greedily grasping at the shadow they lost the substance.

The Mad Mullah in Somaliland is becoming civilized. A recent cablegram from London announces that "the Mad Mullah is showing a disposition to treat."

A dispatch from Boston says that Richard Olney will accept the Democratic nomination for the presidency this year if tendered him. Who would have thought it?

Japan and Russia are still talking of diplomacy, but nevertheless are getting ready to "slug" each other. It will be a brief but interesting slug-fight match when it occurs.

It is said that Judge Parker, one of the candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination, has not a single bitter political enemy. If this is true he must be a man of rather mediocre abilities.

The Carnegie steel company has made quite a cut in the wages of its employees. This does not seem to indicate that Mr. Carnegie is ready to carry out his intention of dying a poor man.

The Republicans of Colfax County have a favorite son whom they are pushing for selection as one of the delegates from New Mexico to the National Republican Convention. If not, why not? It would do the Republican party a great deal of good to recognize the claims of the party in the northeastern part of the Territory.

A lottery scheme under the protection and auspices of the Republic of Cuba will soon be in full operation. The Cubans are inveterate gamblers and the government proposes to have some revenue out of their gambling propensities. From a moral standpoint this is bad, but then morality does not as yet cut much figure in Cuban affairs.

ALFALFA IN NEW MEXICO

Department of Agriculture Continues to Deem it the Best Fodder Plant.

The department of agriculture continues to deem alfalfa the best fodder plant for New Mexico. The much talked of berseem plant which some enthusiasts claimed would supplant alfalfa is not adapted to the New Mexico climate as the following letter to Delegate B. S. Rodey from the bureau of plant industry, demonstrates:

Washington, Dec. 28, 1903.
Hon. B. S. Rodey, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.
Sir—Your letter of December 22, 1903, enclosing a request from Mr. A. J. King of Alamogordo, New Mexico, for berseem seed is at hand.

It is very unfortunate that the Saturday Evening Post published the article referred to by Mr. King in his letter as it is very misleading and has caused a great deal of correspondence. This variety of clover is adapted for winter cultivation in countries where there is no frost and is very largely used for this purpose in the Nile Valley, Egypt, and may be useful for this purpose in the extreme southern part of this country, where experiments will be undertaken the coming year under the immediate supervision of the department. Experiments will be made next spring in parts of Oregon and Washington where berseem may make a satisfactory growth before the dry season sets in. There is no possibility that it will prove of value as a winter crop in New Mexico as there is no part of the Territory free from frost, and as the plant will not withstand summer heat, even though there is an abundance of water for irrigation, it will not do as a summer crop. Under these circumstances I do not think it advisable to furnish Mr. King with any of the seed, as we have only a limited supply which will all be needed in experimental work in places where there is hope of success.

There seems to be very little probability that any other plant will be found equal to alfalfa for cultivation as a fodder crop in the greater part of the southwestern country as this is a perennial and furnishes a very large amount of forage for many years. Berseem, on the contrary is an annual clover requiring reseeding every year.

MINES AND MILLS.

Exceedingly rich ore is being taken at present out of the Owl in Gold Gulch. A grab sample taken last week assayed 6,000 ounces of gold to the ton.

On the Thompson and Copp lease a good strike is also reported. The sinking of the other shafts to a greater depth drained the Hamilton shaft and an examination of the old stope revealed the fact that only a portion of the rich ore had been removed therefrom, two veins showing the whole length of the stope, about 40-foot, and also in the face of the drift.

Says the Silver City Independent: "J. L. Schofield, the well known mining man, has resigned his position with the C. C. C. Company of Cananea, Mexico, and accepted one with Messrs. Thompson & Copp. He timbered the Texas shaft here a few years ago, having come from the Black Hills, South Dakota, for the purpose and is one of the most expert miners and timbering men in the Territory.

The St. Louis Gold Gulch Mining Company has rich ore in sight. Messrs. Gibson, Stewart and Whitehill visited the Gulch on Saturday. It is understood that they have acquired the concentrator property and are going to re-fit it and have it running at an early date.

There was not much claim jumping at Gold Gulch on New Year's night. As a precaution nearly every claim owner spent the night on his claim.

The concentrator at Santa Rita which had been shut down for repairs resumed on New Year's day and is now running a double shift.

The new dryer for the Paywood mill at Jose on the west side of Cook's Peak in Luna County, is being placed in the mill.

15 FOOT STREAK SULPHIDE ORE

Struck By the Santa Fe Mining and Reduction Company in Santa Fe District.

The Santa Fe Mining and Reduction Company has struck a fifteen foot streak of sulphide ore at the breast of the tunnel, at 109 feet at its mile four and one-half miles northeast of the plaza. The water is coming in so strong that work in the tunnel had to be suspended, and the men are now engaged in drilling the tunnel.

The directors of the company will arrive in the Capital City within ten days to make a personal investigation for the purpose of ascertaining the amount of pumping capacity necessary to take care of the water, so that a shaft can be sunk on the lead to explore it as to its value at a depth.

The Ohio group is being worked by what is known as the open cut system. An open cut 20 feet deep is being driven against a quartz lead, which will expose several thousand tons of gold bearing quartz. This large lead

has been referred to before in the New Mexican, and gains value in depth. A vein seven foot in width at the surface, assayed \$22.60 in gold, clear across the vein. Several parties from the east are going out to see the lead within the next two weeks.

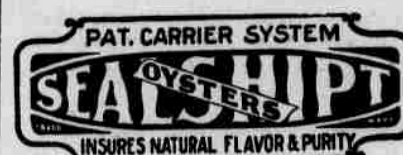

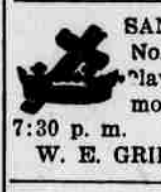

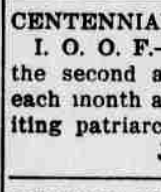

JOHN DOUGHERTY DIES AT CONVICT CAMP

While Serving Sentence of One Year for Jail Breaking—Had an Honorable Discharge from Army.

John Dougherty, sentenced to one year's imprisonment from Bernalillo County for breaking jail last spring, died from an internal hemorrhage at the camp of convicts at work on the Scenic Route Road on the Dalton Divide yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. The remains of the deceased were brought to the penitentiary and given burial in the penitentiary burying plot today. Dougherty had served a term of five years in the Fourth United States Cavalry and had an honorable discharge from the army. He served in the Philippine Islands and was actively engaged in campaigning against the insurgents. He was present at the fight in which Major General W. H. Lawton was killed.

It seems that after his discharge, he landed in Albuquerque where he got in some slight trouble and at the time of the jail break there, last spring, he was one of those charged with participation therein. While in the Philippine Islands he had contracted dysentery, which never left him. He was sent to the convicts' camp under the impression that out door life and air would benefit his malady. While undergoing sentence he was well behaved and received quite an allowance of good time.

AZTEC SPRINGS.

Ex-Governor L. B. Prince is Having an Analysis Made of Its Water.

A gallon of the water from the Aztec spring near the Scenic Route Road, east of Santa Fe, was sent today by Hon. L. B. Prince to the Agricultural College at Mesilla Park for analysis. In 1885, an analysis was made by Chief Chemist F. W. Clarke of the United States Geological Survey, and the result showed a valuable combination of salts of calcium, magnesium and sodium, and that the water contained enough carbonic acid to retain the carbonates in solution as bicarbonates. For some years the water was bottled quite extensively, until a difficulty as to the title to the springs put an end to the business. The new analysis for the Agricultural College will be looked for with much interest.

SNOW PREDICTED.

It is Much Needed All Over the Territory But Especially in the Northern parts.

The maximum temperature in the sun yesterday was 64 degrees; in the shade 39 degrees, the minimum was 13 degrees, while at 6 o'clock this morning the temperature was 22 degrees or seven degrees higher than yesterday. Partly cloudy weather is predicted for tonight and rain or snow accompanied by colder weather for tomorrow. The snowfall bulletin issued by the Colorado section of the climate and crop service of the weather bureau holds forth little encouragement for northern New Mexico. Of the snow fall thus far in the Rio Grande water shed it says: "For the time of the year it is the least in the last 24 years, none whatever on the southern slopes and but little on the northern slopes."

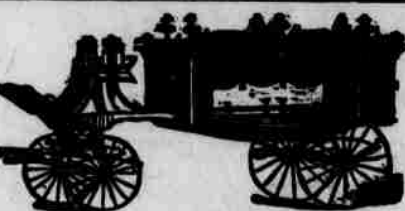

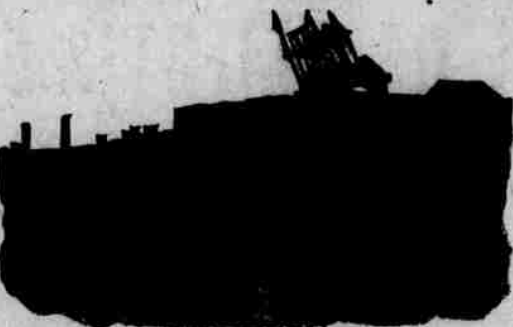
