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STATUE TO HARRISON

Joint Resolution Adopted in Senate Authorizing Its Erection in Indianapolis.

APPROPRIATION BILL

The Legislative, Executive and Judicial Measures Being Considered in Lower House.

Washington, Jan. 12.—At the beginning of today's session, the Senate adopted a joint resolution authorizing the erection of a statue to the late President Benjamin Harrison near the new postoffice building at Indianapolis. The statue is to be erected by the Benjamin Harrison Memorial Association.

Bacon's motion to refer the resolution to the committee on foreign relations was followed by one from Lodge to lay the motion on the table. The latter brought a number of Senators to the floor including Bacon, Daniels and Teller. The latter said that an attempt to dismiss so important a matter in such a summary manner was unheard of. The adoption of the Lodge motion would cut off debate entirely.

Bacon introduced a resolution authorizing the President to negotiate a treaty with Colombia looking to an amicable adjustment of the differences growing out of the secession of Panama. He addressed the Senate on the subject.

Senate Committee Report on Alaska.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Senator Beveridge from the committee on territories, introduced in the Senate today the report of the sub-committee consisting of Dillingham, Burnham, Nelson and Patterson, which visited Alaska during the last summer and made a thorough investigation of existing conditions, resources and legislative needs of the territory. As a result, the inquiries committee has made many recommendations to Congress.

Most unfortunate of all the existing faulty conditions in Alaska the report says, are the poor transportation facilities. A great obligation rests on the United States to adopt a system of wagon roads for the relief of miners there. The action of the Dominion government in the region of the Klondike, has been in marked contrast to the inaction of the United States in American territory. The report says that so many and varying are the abuses practiced under the mining laws that a number of amendments are recommended, the most important of which is that a certain amount of assessment work be required on each mining claim staked out as a prerequisite to the right to have the claim recorded.

It also recommends the increase of the yearly amount of assessment work and that no person be allowed to hold more than one mining claim on the same creek, except by purchase. The report recommends that an additional judicial district be provided for. It says that the general opinion of all classes in Alaska is that the territory should have delegates to Congress, but no recommendation was made by the committee. Because of the fact that the whites in Alaska do not exceed 20,000 in number, the establishment of a territorial government for Alaska is discontinued.

Merchants' Association Resolutions.
New York, Jan. 12.—The Merchants' Association of New York City has adopted resolutions endorsing the national irrigation act and advocating the repeal of the desert land act, the commutation clause of the homestead act and the timber and stone act.

Philippine Bond Issue Accepted.
Washington, Jan. 12.—The war department today accepted the proposal of Harvey Fiske and Sons of New York, representing Fiske & Robinson and the National City Bank of New York, for the entire \$7,000,000 bond issue of the Philippine government on account of the purchase of the Friar lands, at \$107,577.

Democratic National Committee.
Washington, Jan. 12.—The Democratic national committee met in executive session at the Shoreham Hotel today for the purpose of deciding on the time and place for holding the next Democratic National convention. It was called to order by Chairman Jones of Arkansas.

Considering Appropriation Bill.
Washington, Jan. 12.—In committee of the whole today the House began the consideration of the legislative executive and judicial appropriation bill. Bingham, of Pennsylvania, from the appropriations committee, explained the features.

TO PREVENT SMALLPOX BECOMING EPIDEMIC.

Lockport, New York, Jan. 12.—The board of health has ordered all local public meeting places closed and the public library to cease issuing books in order to guard against any epidemic of smallpox or other contagious diseases prevalent in various places in Niagara and adjoining counties.

LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION

Members in Session at Portland Welcomed by Governor Chamberlain of Oregon.

Portland, Oregon, Jan. 12.—The members of the National Livestock and National Wool Growers' Associations met in joint session in the Baker theater this morning. Nearly a thousand members of the two organizations, including some of the most prominent sheep and cattle raisers of the United States are in attendance. Governor Chamberlain welcomed the visitors on behalf of Oregon. At the close of the Governor's address, Mayor Williams extended a welcome on behalf of the city of Portland.

Colonel F. L. Wilson of Texas, responded to the address of welcome on behalf of the National Livestock Association and Senator F. E. Warren of Wyoming for the Wool Growers'.

The appearance of President Springer on the platform to deliver the annual address was the signal for general and prolonged applause.

JURY SECURED TO TRY MACHEN

District Attorney Beach Made the Opening Statement—Defense Waives Privilege.

Washington, Jan. 12.—A jury was secured today in the trial of August W. Machen and others, on charge of conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the sale of letter box fasteners.

District Attorney Beach made the opening statement but counsel for the defendants waived that privilege. Adjournment was taken to permit opposing counsel to agree in reference to the examination of certain evidence in possession of both.

RE-ELECTED U. S. SENATOR

Hanna Receives 86 Votes in House and 29 in the Ohio State Senate.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 12.—The House and Senate voted separately today for United States Senator, the House casting 86 for Hanna, 21 for Clark, democrat, of Cleveland, two Republicans and one Democrat being absent. In the Senate Hanna received 29 and Clark four votes.

ONE DAY IN JAIL.

And Fine of \$10,000, Imposed on Ex-Congressman Edmund H. Driggs of Brooklyn.

New York, Jan. 12.—Ex-Congressman Edmund H. Driggs of Brooklyn, was today sentenced to imprisonment for a day in jail and to a fine of \$10,000. Driggs was convicted of accepting money while Congressman-elect for securing a government contract for the purchase of automatic cashiers from the Brandt Dent Company for the post-office department. There will be no appeal.

CONSIDERING LABOR TROUBLES IN COLORADO.

Denver, Jan. 12.—The Colorado State Federation of Labor in a special session to consider labor troubles in the state, today adopted resolutions urging the immediate passage by the United States Senate, of a resolution of Senator Patterson, directing the Senate Judiciary committee to investigate labor conditions in Colorado. It declares that organized labor in Colorado courts an investigation.

SUN AND MOON CASES BEING ARGUED.

Georgetown, Colorado, Jan. 12.—Attorney Sabin opened the argument for the state in the Sun and Moon dynamiting case today. He dwelt on the charge of conspiracy which declared that it had been shown from fact that a close associate of the defendants was killed in an explosion that destroyed the transformer house of the mine.

MAJOR GENERAL SUMNER TO ASSUME COMMAND.

A dispatch from Omaha, Nebraska, says that Major General Samuel S. Sumner, with his aides, has started for Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, where he will on January 15, assume command of the military division of the southwest, with headquarters in that city.

\$100,000 BLAZE AT TRINIDAD.

A fire which started in the basement of the Fowler Furniture Company's storeroom in Trinidad, resulted in a \$100,000 blaze, the Masonic and Bloom blocks being a total loss. The fire was caused by the overturning of a lamp.

JAPAN'S REPLY IN A FEW DAYS

Good Reason for Believing That It Is so Worded as to Prevent an Immediate Rupture—Negotiations Looking to a Pacific Settlement May Continue.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 12.—Japan's reply is expected in two or three days, according to reliable information received here and there is good reason for believing that the reply will be so worded as to prevent an immediate rupture, leaving both governments in a position to continue negotiations looking to a pacific settlement.

Final Conference Begins.
Tokio, Jan. 12.—The final conference before the throne to decide upon the response to Russia, began at 2 this afternoon. It was attended by all the members of the cabinet, five of the elder statesmen Admirals Ito and Ijima and General Kodama. Previous to the conference, Admiral Yamamoto, representing Premier Katsura who is indisposed, had a private audience with the Emperor. Foreign Minister Komura and Marquis Ito also conferred privately. The formal conference before the throne was of a long duration and the result is unknown.

It is said, however, that the response which was drafted yesterday was approved and it will soon be delivered to the Russian minister. This answer of Japan is regarded as the final step in the negotiations. Public interest in the outcome is at fever heat and developments are anxiously awaited.

Selecting Temporary Camps.

Port Arthur, Jan. 12.—It is reported here that owing to the threatening news received from Corea, the commanding officer of the Seventh Russian brigade has gone to the Yalu River to select temporary camps and to effect the concentration of troops.

Powers to Have Full Rights.

Washington, Jan. 12.—The following announcement has been posted at the state department: "The Russian ambassador called yesterday upon the secretary of state and conveyed to him the assurance of his government that the Russian authorities would place no obstacles in the way of the full enjoyment by the powers having treaties with China of all rights and privileges guaranteed by such treaties in Manchuria."

Russian Troops En Route.

Pekin, Jan. 12.—Authentic information has been received by the legations here that two divisions of Russian troops are coming by the Siberian Railroad.

ISTHMIAN POLICY.

No Preparations for War With Colombia Are Being Made, Announces Secretary Root.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Shortly after the cabinet meeting today Secretary Root issued a statement regarding the Isthmian policy of the administration. No preparations for war with Colombia are being made it says and no inauguration of hostilities is contemplated.

The existence of a state of war between the two countries is also denied. The President and the secretary of state cannot believe the statement continues, that the authorities at Bogota can be so blinded by passion and prejudice as to declare war against the United States and even if this "ruthless step" should be taken this government would not respond in haste.

The Colombian government is held responsible for events on the Isthmus and the intimation that the United States committed a wrong is refuted.

CIVIL WAR TEAMSTERS WANT A \$10 PENSION.

Clarksburg, West Virginia, Jan. 12.—The organization of the teamsters of the civil war will send a petition to Congress asking for the passage of a law allowing all teamsters on the payroll during the war to receive a pension of not less than \$10 monthly. Petitions from similar organizations throughout the country are also to be presented.

SIX MINERS KILLED IN COLLIERY EXPLOSION.

Nelson, B. C., Jan. 12.—In a colliery explosion at Michael, six miners were killed and two seriously wounded. Relief parties were overcome by the gas and had to be brought out of the mine for air. Nothing is known of the cause of the accident. The dead are: R. D. Roberts, William McAllister, Jack Pale, W. A. King, Burnett Dean and Tom Evans.

NOTICEABLE INCREASE IN WOOL DEMAND.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 12.—There is a noticeable increased demand this week in the wool market although manufacturers hesitated at any marked advance. Many mills have recently taken in large supplies of wools. The tone of the market is firm. In the market for fleece wools firm conditions prevail. The supply is moderate.

MEETS INSTANT DEATH NEAR SILVER CITY.

Silver City, Jan. 12.—Jay Hiller, 20 years old, met instant death in the concentrator at San Kirk yesterday. He was working in the upper part when he slipped and fell. He struck on a piece of machinery and sustained a fractured skull.

SUPREME COURT.

Three Cases Were Heard This Morning, and Arguments Submitted. Cases Reset.

The territorial Supreme Court was in session this morning, but took an adjournment at noon until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Case No. 1017. Roman Rodriguez, plaintiff in error versus the Territory of New Mexico, the defendant in error, error to District Court of Bernalillo County. Motion to quash writ of error and case proper argued and submitted to the court.

Case No. 1021. James M. Cunningham, trustee, et al., plaintiffs in error, versus Charles Springer, et al., defendants in error, error to District Court of San Miguel County. Reset for hearing January 22.

Case No. 1037. Jose S. Esquivel, appellee, versus Francisco S. Chavez, appellant, appeal from District Court of San Miguel County. Reset for hearing January 20.

At yesterday afternoon session in case No. 1008, John Pearson, et al., plaintiffs in error, versus James Gillen, defendants in error, error to District Court of Colfax County, motion to dismiss writ of error by plaintiffs in error, and motion of defendants in error to affirm the judgment of the lower court and for 10 per cent damages. Both were argued and submitted to the court.

BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

Members Are Going to the Bottom in All Cases That Are Brought Up Before Them.

The territorial board of equalization reconvened in the office of Traveling Auditor C. V. Safford, in the capitol building at 10 o'clock this morning, with President James S. Duncan in the chair, and all of the members of the board present. The board is going into things deep, before taking official action.

The board has heard the representatives of the Santa Fe Pacific, affecting taxation in Bernalillo, Valencia, McKinley and San Juan County; the Colorado Southern, Union and Colfax Counties and the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad, in Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Taos Counties.

CONVICT ESCAPES.

James Smith, No. 1701, Takes French Leave While at Work on the New Bridge.

At 8 o'clock this morning, four convicts from the New Mexico penitentiary were assigned to help out Contractor Walter Sharp on the work on the new Don Gaspar Avenue bridge. Two were drivers, and the other two helpers. An hour later, James Smith, No. 1701, had made good his escape.

The matter was immediately reported to Superintendent H. O. Bursum, who dispatched the hounds to the scene of the escape, in charge of Deputy Sheriff Charles Closson of Santa Fe County. Smith was received at the penitentiary last October from Bernalillo County, under a four years' sentence for burglary.

The following description of the fugitive is furnished by the penitentiary authorities: American, 24 years of age, weight 140 pounds, height five feet and six and three quarters inches, eyes brown, hair light, complexion light, size of foot 8, teeth good, beard none, body marks, tattooed right forearm, woman's bust, cross flag left forearm, United States flag, cross, Savior, etc., two inch scar inside of left knee, one inch scar back of head, scar right back of head, scar on left side of head over left forehead, two inches in length, one and one-half inches from hair line, crest shaped, low forehead, and looks downward. Occupation miner.

DEATH OF DR. KENNON

Passed Quietly Away at Grants' Pass, Oregon, on Saturday, January 2.

SKETCH OF HIS LIFE

For Many Years Deceased Was a Resident of This City and of Grant County.

The Daily New Mexican today received news of the death of Dr. Lewis C. Kennon at Grants' Pass, Oregon, on January 2, at 2:25 a. m. A letter from his son, Dr. Lewis C. Kennon, of Stockton, California, encloses an autobiographical sketch which the New Mexican republishes in all its quaintness and touching simplicity. Dr. Kennon is well remembered in New Mexico, especially by old timers and his love for the Land of Sunshine is reflected in the following short sketch:

My Dear Son—I have penned these memoranda which after my death I want you to have some typed copies made. It will only be three or four pages. Have a copy sent to the Santa Fe New Mexican and the two Silver City papers, the Enterprise and Silver City Independent, for publication for the reason, that my old friends have expressed a desire for some items of my life. It is not from vanity, but the wish to please old friends who have always been kind and loving. These notes are just as meager and barren as they could be, compatible with being understood.

An autobiography of 49 or 50 type pages could be easily expanded, but there is no use in it—simply vanity. I am one of the very oldest of the American citizens of New Mexico, for I have not given up my citizenship though absent two years. I love her, her rocks and sand, better than the gold and gems of other lands, and I love her brown people because they have ever been kind and good to me; dormant they may be, but as Argyle's heart moved to the Tartan, mine ever goes out to the brown land and brown men of Mexico, my beloved.

Well, I came in the bone and gristle of youth, and leave in the shadow of departing day. All that time I have loved New Mexico. For the future all America is for the young alone, and I, I am very old, and very tired.

Now my dear son, I send you these memoranda for the papers; they can cut them up as they please. I know many people would like to hear of me in this way and I make this as a last request, to you, my dear son.

Grant's Pass, Josephine County, Oregon.

Dr. Lewis Kennon was born in Augusta, Georgia, on the 12th of January, 1829. He was educated partly in Augusta, and partly in Virginia. In 1853 he came to New Mexico where he became post surgeon at Albuquerque, then the headquarters of a department commanded by General Garland, where he was on duty for two years and a half, being relieved by Surgeon De Leon.

During his service here he was with the first exploring expedition into the Gran Quivira country about which there was much myth dating back from the time of Coronado. This expedition consisted of three companies of the First Dragoons and a Howitzer battery under Carleton. He was also in pursuit and punishment of Mesquero sheep robbers, and in an expedition against the Mesqueros, then numbering 700 fighting men, under captain (afterwards General Ewell.) This consisted of six companies of cavalry and one of infantry. They struck the Indians on the Penasco River and had a severe fight lasting nearly an entire day. Here several of the cavalry were killed and one officer, Captain Stanton, First Dragoons. The Indians precipitated the attack at night.

On his return, he was ordered with troops to that strip of Arizona, then just purchased by Gadsden. Here he remained for two years, doing continuous service against the Indians. The Apaches then literally swarmed over Arizona and New Mexico. From there he was ordered to join an expedition under Canby against the Navahos who believed themselves invincible. This expedition was in the field for a year, continuously in the saddle; about a thousand men strong, and it inflicted the first serious punishment upon that proud and rich tribe.

At the end of the war, came the news of the attack on Fort Sumpter and a number of officers quit—among them Dr. Kennon. He was a union man, but did not go into the army.

After two years abroad, he settled in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and practiced assiduously his profession there for seventeen years.

In 1875, Mrs. Kennon's health broke down and he moved to Silver City in Grant County, then first attracting notice. For twenty-eight years he lived and practiced his calling there. When Victorio first broke out, the doctor went with the troops that followed. Continued on Page Eight.

FUNERAL OF MRS SHOCK

Remains Temporarily Interred in the Fairview Cemetery This Afternoon.

The funeral services over the remains of the late Mrs. George W. Shock were held this afternoon at the family residence, the Rev. W. R. Dye, rector of the Church of the Holy Faith, the Rev. W. A. Cooper, pastor of St. John's M. E. Church, and the Rev. W. Hayes Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church officiating. The remains were temporarily interred in a hermetically sealed grave in Fairview Cemetery.

The pall bearers were Colonel George W. Knaebel, Adolph J. Fischer, W. J. McPherson, Grant Ribenburg, F. P. Crichton and Henry F. Stephens. Dudrow and Montenie were the funeral directors.

RUSSIAN AND JAPANESE LAND FORCES.

There may be no war between Russia and Japan on the Korean question at this time; sooner or later, however, in the very nature of things it must come, and Korea is destined to become either a part of the dominion of the White Czar or a province of the Mikado of Japan. It is said that Russia is unable at this time to float a war loan of 125,000,000 rubles and if that is the case, actual fighting will be put off until the Russian treasury is stronger and until the number of Russian soldiers in Manchuria is greater than at present. At this time while the comparative "sea power" of Russia and Japan in Oriental waters is the most obvious and urgent of the military questions raised by the rumors of war, the comparative strength of the land forces is not less important, says the New York Times. To seize and hold Korea, to the exclusion of the other power, must be the object of each if a conflict comes. Apparently such a seizure could not be made, nor even the landing of a considerable force, neither party being China, without a great sea fight which shall sink the historical "battle of the Yalu" into insignificance. The Russian aim must be to bring off this conflict at a point where Russia may derive the greatest assistance from the railway and the Japanese to deprive her of that advantage. The landing of a strong body once effected, the war must be continued on land if it is not to go by default.

On paper the regular Japanese army numbers something less than 150,000, on the peace establishment the Russian army nearly ten times as many. But the Japanese figures are "net." That is to say, the whole strength of the army is available for a war with Russia on the Asiatic coast of the Pacific. How much of the Russian army is so available? On the first of June, 1900, the Russian troops in north Asia were estimated at 2,500 officers, 100,000 men, 15,000 horses, and 170 field guns, of which 60,000 men and 120 guns were in the department of the Amur. Before the end of that year they had been reinforced by 20,000 men. By the end of 1901, thanks to reinforcements from European Russia and from north and central Asia, M. Witte estimated the troops ready for service in eastern Asia at 220,000 men. For the intervening two years, although the Russian war office has been able to keep its secrets better than would be possible in a more modern country, the reports of all travelers and observers on the spot concur that a steady stream of troops has been making its way eastward. The estimate of 350,000 men which has been published is doubtless extravagant. But it does seem quite possible that Russia may have a quarter of a million of men in condition to be brought to bear upon the Japanese forces within a few weeks after the commencement of hostilities. Evidently such a number would involve tremendous problems of transport and subsistence, problems which the Russian staff can scarcely have the means to solve. But it seems to be quite clear that Russia could assemble more men in Manchuria than Japan could collect there to meet her. With Korea the case would be different. The Japanese facilities for occupying the peninsula are so superior to the Russian that one would expect the Japanese to show a numerical advantage at the point of contact.

In some respects the kingdom of Spain is much better off than are many other governments. It has no foreign policy at present and it wants none.

The Republic of Mexico is progressing right along. It will be put upon a gold standard soon and has also just agreed to a treaty of extradition with this country under the provisions of which boudlers will no longer find refuge there.

SOUTHERN LEGISLATURES ON THE PANAMA CANAL TREATY.

Southern sentiment regarding the Panama Canal treaty is well illustrated by the fact that legislatures south of Mason and Dixon's line are beginning to instruct the United States Senators from their states to cast their votes for the ratification of the treaty. Mississippi has already done so and the Denver Republican says that the fact that the Mississippi legislature has instructed the Senators from that state to vote for the Panama Canal treaty is an indication of the state of public sentiment in the south on this question. It suggests that sufficient Democratic votes will be secured to insure ratification.

The south wants the Panama Canal built, and it would seem that the people of that section are willing to accept the results of the revolution in Panama as accomplished facts which cannot be ignored or set aside. The revolution has accomplished its work. Whether justly or unjustly achieved, Panama has secured its independence, and it is today a sovereign state capable of negotiating and entering into treaties. This great fact stands out clearly above all the objections that may be made, and it cannot be changed or done away with by any action the Senate may take concerning the treaty.

In itself the treaty is all that the United States can ask, and it is evident that this is fully recognized by the legislature of Mississippi. The face of the nation is turned toward the future and the achievement of the great work contemplated by this treaty, and it cannot now turn back. It cannot undo the work of the Panama revolution. The Republic of Panama has acquired international rights which the United States is as much bound to recognize as it is to recognize the rights of Colombia or any other sovereign state. The Senators from Mississippi are, in substance, instructed to recognize this by accepting the treaty which the new republic has offered.

It is probable that all the Republican members of the Senate will vote in favor of ratification. In that event it will require only five Democratic votes to give the requisite two-thirds majority. If two are secured from Mississippi in consequence of the instructions sent by the legislature of that state it is probable that with little difficulty the remaining three votes needed will be obtained.

There is no doubt that in the past Russia has evinced friendship for this country, but how about the future?

The crown prince of Germany wants to marry an American singer. The fellow has evidently more sense than people gave him credit for.

Spain is becoming quite friendly to Uncle Sam. Spanish newspapers have advised the Colombians that they cannot give Uncle Sam a licking.

Missouri lawyers are very sore at their Democratic Supreme Court. Since the latter has gone into the business of freeing boudlers, law business in that state has fallen off a good deal.

The St. Louis Globe Democrat advises Missourians to get rid of the present reputation of their state. That will be a hard job. No other state wants it and the chances are that poor old Missouri will have to keep it.

It can safely be asserted that the Armenian uprisings in Russian Caucasus and the depredations of the Huaneese pirates in Manchuria are not worrying the Japanese government any.

The investigations into the Iroquois theater horror are proving conclusively that the house was a veritable death trap and that this was known to the owners and managers. Any and everything to make money seems to be the "go" in the Windy City.

Representative Sereno Payne of New York, is serene in the belief that President Roosevelt will have no difficulty in carrying New York in this year's election. The Republicans all over the country truly hope that Mr. Payne's belief is well founded.

Considering the number of Russian war ships and troops in the Yellow Sea and in Manchuria, Russia evidently is very much opposed to the "open door" in that section or perhaps all these ships and soldiers are there in order to do honor to those who may enter the "open door."

It is understood that a strong delegation of Arizonans is soon to go to Washington to work for statehood. The people of Arizona have plenty of money and time to spare and therefore will make another strong effort in that direction. This is highly commendable and timely. What will New Mexico do about its case?

History may not repeat itself, but it will be remembered that Mr. Bryan urged the ratification of the Spanish-American treaty and thereafter called it bad names in his political campaigns. He may not do the same thing in the case of the pending Panama Canal treaty, but the chances are that he will.

It may be paradoxical, but nevertheless it is a fact that under the Republican administrations since 1896 the solid south has prospered more, and is in better financial and material condition than it has been ever since the government commenced to do business. A Republican administration is a good thing for the entire country regardless of state lines and political divisions.

As usual, the New Mexican is just about right."

The territorial board of equalization, under the new assessment laws passed by the Thirty-fifth Legislative Assembly has it in its power by judicious and efficient inspection and action to increase the value of property returned for taxation to a just and proper degree. Every county in the Territory should be treated alike and assessment rates should be equalized properly and fairly as much as possible. In the very nature of things there must and always will be some inequalities in assessment and tax matters, but a better state of affairs can be brought about by the board if it chooses, as under the law its powers are ample.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

Of the Board of County Commissioners of Santa Fe County.

A meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, was held at the court house in the city of Santa Fe on the tenth day of October, 1903.

Present: Messrs. A. L. Kendall, chairman; Arthur Seligman, Nicolas Quintana, Commissioners; Celso Lopez, clerk.

The following proceedings were had, to-wit:

The following resolution was introduced by Commissioner Arthur Seligman:

Whereas, It is for the best interests of the county of Santa Fe that its indebtedness incurred in aid of railroad construction be compromised and adjusted and that the same be refunded under and pursuant to an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico, entitled, "An act to provide for the refunding of certain county indebtedness," approved March 18, 1903.

Now, therefore, Resolved, That this Board of County Commissioners of the County of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, hereby requests the refunding commission, constituted under said act, consisting of the Honorable Governor, Secretary and Treasurer of the Territory of New Mexico, to make an arrangement and compromise of the said indebtedness and to issue refunding bonds in exchange for such indebtedness pursuant to the terms and provisions of the said act approved March 18, 1903, such indebtedness to be compromised being the following, to-wit:

Funding bonds of the county of Santa Fe dated September 29, 1891, maturing August 1, 1921, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, amount of issue two hundred and sixty-two thousand dollars, consisting of two hundred and sixty-two bonds of one thousand dollars each numbered from one to two hundred and sixty-two, both inclusive, together with the past due and unpaid coupons thereof matured up to and including the first day of August, 1903, and interest on such past due and unpaid coupons from the date of their maturity to the date of their payment or other adjustment, such bonds having been issued by the county of Santa Fe in exchange for and in the refunding of an issue of bonds to the amount of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars issued by said county in aid of the construction of the New Mexican and Southern Pacific Railroad and in exchange for and in the refunding of a judgment and interest thereon on the past due and unpaid coupons of said last mentioned issue. Said funding bonds were validated and confirmed by the act of the Congress of the United States of January, 1897.

2. Funding bonds of the county of Santa Fe dated March 1, 1892, maturing March 1, 1922, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, amount of issue one hundred and seventy-eight thousand six hundred dollars, consisting of one hundred and seventy-seven bonds of one thousand dollars each, numbered from No. 328 to No. 499 both inclusive and No. 503 to 507 both inclusive, and of sixteen bonds of one hundred dollars each numbered 500, 501 and 502 and 508 to No. 520 both inclusive, together with the past due and unpaid coupons thereof up to and including the first day of September, 1903, and together with interest on such past due and unpaid coupons from the date of their maturity to the date of their payment or other adjustment, such bonds having been issued by the county of Santa Fe in exchange for and in the refunding of an issue of bonds to the amount of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, issued by the said county in aid of the construction of the Texas, Santa Fe & Northern Railroad. Said funding bonds were validated and confirmed by the act of the Congress of the United States of January, 1897, to the amount of one hundred and seventy-two thousand five hundred dollars.

3. Two judgments rendered by the District Court of the County of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, in favor of Bird S. Coler and Elverson R. Chapman and against the said county of Santa Fe on the 24th day of September, 1900; one for the sum of seventy-four thousand three hundred and fifty-eight dollars and seventeen cents, and the other for the sum of sixty thousand nine hundred and twenty-six dollars and two cents; both of said judgments bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum from the date of their rendition to the date of their payment or other adjustment and both of said judgments having been rendered for past due and unpaid coupons of the funding bonds issued September 29th, 1891, and March 1st, 1892, as mentioned in clauses one and two of this description in aid of railroad construction as above set forth.

4. A judgment rendered in the District Court for the county of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, in favor of the firm of Moore and Schley and against the said county of Santa Fe on the 8th day of March, 1902, for the sum of nine thousand four hundred sixty-eight dollars and eighty-eight cents, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of its rendition to the date of its payment or other adjustment; said judgment having been rendered for past due and unpaid coupons and the interest thereon of the funding bonds of said county, dated March 1st 1892, mentioned and described in clause two of this description, in aid of railroad construction as above set forth.

Further Resolved, That as a large number of the holders of the said in-

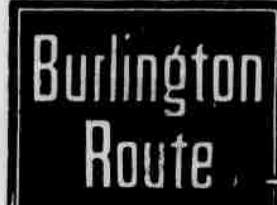

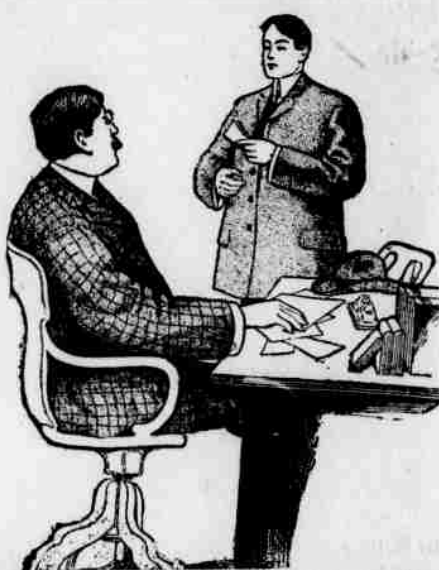

debtedness have signified their willingness to consent and agree to the compromise and refunding of such indebtedness and to receive therefor and in lieu thereof bonds issued under said act approved March 18, 1903, for a sum equal to sixty per centum of the principal of the bonds, the principal of the coupons and interest on the coupons, representing such indebtedness and of the judgments and of the interest thereon, now, therefore, said refunding commission is hereby requested to compromise and refund the said indebtedness at the said rate of sixty per centum.

Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the said refunding commission.

The foregoing resolutions being put to a vote, received the following vote, to-wit:

Ayes, Messrs. A. L. Kendall, Arthur Seligman and Nicolas Quintana.

Noes, None.

Whereupon said resolutions were declared unanimously adopted.

The following resolution was presented and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, the valid bonded indebtedness of Santa Fe County now issued and outstanding is in excess of twenty (20) per centum of the taxable property of such county according to the last general assessed valuation thereof, and in excess of fifteen per centum of the taxable property of such county according to the assessed valuation of said county for the year 1900, such debt now being about \$1,000,000, and the assessed valuation of 1900 being \$1,720,170, and the last general assessed valuation for the year 1903 being \$2,040,517 of which debt the sum and amount of about \$650,000 is for railroad aid bonds, their coupons outstanding and interest thereon and for judgments obtained in the District Court of Santa Fe County thereon and for interest upon the same. And about \$350,000 of said bonded debt is for refunding and current expense bonds of said county, past due and unpaid coupons thereon and interest upon the same and for judgments recovered thereon together with interest thereon, and

Whereas, The Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico by its act approved March 18th, 1901, published as chapter 41 of the session laws of that year, and its act approved March 18th, 1903, published as chapter 95 of the session laws of that year, authorized and empowered the boards of county commissioners of the several counties in the Territory to compromise, adjust and refund their bonded and other indebtedness and to compromise and adjust the rate of interest thereon not to exceed four per cent per annum, and

Whereas, said board of county commissioners have under such power and authority conferred upon them, a compromise and adjustment pending on all of said legal bonded indebtedness of said county, together with the past due and unpaid interest coupons, the interest on such coupons and all judgments recovered for past due coupons and the interest thereon with the owners and holders of such indebtedness at the rate of sixty (60) per cent of such outstanding obligations of said county by which it is mutually agreed by and between the owners and holders of such indebtedness and the said board of county commissioners that the said owners and holders of such indebtedness will receive the refunding bonds of said county due in forty (40) years after their date, dated the first day of September, 1903, bearing interest payable semi-annually on the first days of March, and September, at the rate of three (3) per cent per annum for all such indebtedness not issued in aid of railroad construction.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the board of county commissioners of Santa Fe County, that in the judgment of this board such compromise and adjustment are of sufficient benefit to the county to warrant such exchange and surrender of the existing indebtedness and it hereby enters into a contract with the owners and holders of all of the indebtedness hereinbefore mentioned with the exception of bonds, coupons and judgments with interest thereon issued or incurred in aid of railroad construction whereby said board of county commissioners agrees, promises and pledges the credit of the county of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico, to pay the amount of the said indebtedness so mutually agreed to be paid and compromised and as evidence of this resolution and contract under the powers conferred upon it by law does hereby authorize the issuance of bonds of said county to be issued in exchange for the indebtedness above mentioned with the exception of bonds issued in aid of railroad construction to the amount of said indebtedness tendered in exchange for said bonds, such bonds shall be known and styled general county refunding bonds of the county of Santa Fe, Territory of New Mexico. They shall be dated the first day of September in the year 1903. Shall be in denominations of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars or multiples thereof, shall be signed by the chairman of the board of county commissioners, and the clerk of the probate court, and signed and registered by the county treasurer, and the coupons shall have the lithographed fac-simile signature of the county treasurer. They shall be numbered consecutively in each denomination, shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness, forty (40) years after their date with the option to the county to pay them at any time after twenty-five (25) years from their date. They shall bear interest payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September, at the rate of three (3) per cent per annum evidenced by interest coupons thereto attached—the principal and interest to be payable at the First National Bank in the city and state of New York. Such bonds and coupons shall be substantially in the following form, to-wit:

GENERAL COUNTY REFUNDING BONDS.

Know all men, by these presents, that the County of Santa Fe, in the Territory of New Mexico for value received is indebted to and hereby promises to pay the bearer hereof one thousand (\$1,000) dollars in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness, forty (40) years after date hereof with interest thereon in like gold coin of the United States, at the rate of three (3) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of March and September in each year upon presentation and surrender of the coupons hereto attached, as they severally become due; both principal and interest of this bond being payable at the First National Bank in the city and state of New York. This bond is payable at the option of said county at any time after twenty-five (25) years, from its date.

This bond is issued under, pursuant to, and in conformity with an act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico entitled "An Act to enable counties to compromise and refund their bonded indebtedness," approved March 18th, 1901, and published as chapter 41 of the session laws of that year, and also another act of the Legislative Assembly of said Territory, entitled "An Act to enable counties to compromise and adjust their bonded and other indebtedness," approved March 18, 1903, and published as chapter 95 of the session laws of that year and for the purpose of refunding and in exchange for valid outstanding indebtedness of said Santa Fe County as in said acts provided.

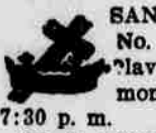

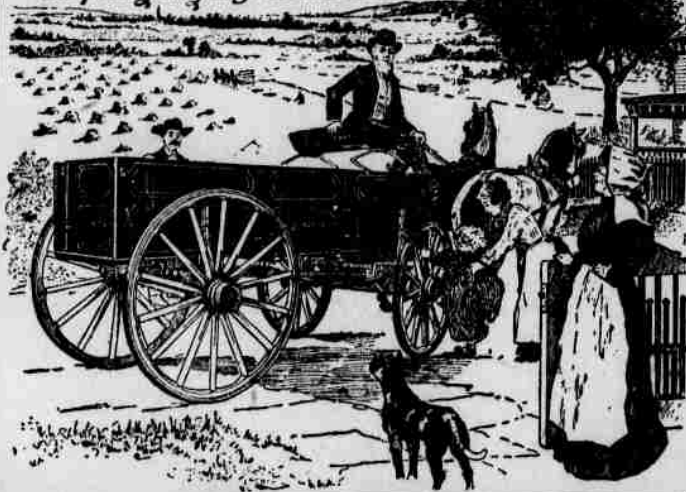

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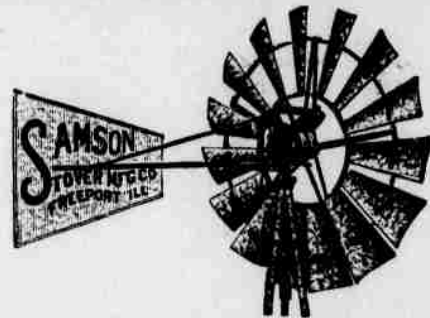

that remarkable chief for a year or more. He was in many skirmishes and one rather serious affair on the Las Animas River, in which from bad leadership the troops (Ninth Cavalry) were badly handled. A number of men were killed and wounded and the pack train lost. This in commemoration of the commandante has always been known by the volunteer company in the fight (some 40 men) as "Beyer's Run."

In 1901, Dr. Kennon's health having in the meantime broken down, he went to Oregon and California where three of his children reside.

During all these years, Dr. Kennon was an assiduous student of the ethnology and anthropology of the Indian and mixed races around him. He had a sympathy for the Indian, but was hopeless of his preservation ad integro.

Dr. Kennon was instrumental in bringing about the first medical legislation and was president of the board for many years from its origination. (Refers to territorial medical board of New Mexico.—Ed.)

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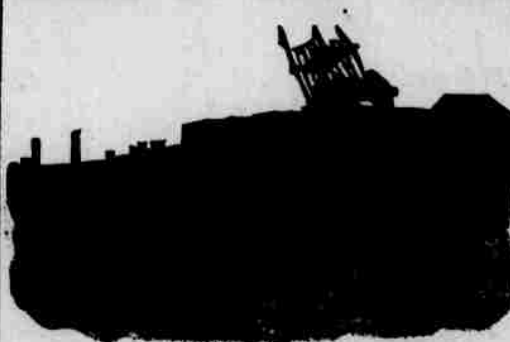
