GENERAL MILES' LETTER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.  
Hon. Miguel A. Otero, Governor of New Mexico,  
Santa Fe, N. M.  
Sir:—In reply to your letter of the 7th  
instant, I have the honor to state that I  
have already recommended that the troops  
of the Ninth Cavalry, now stationed at  
Fort Wingate, N. M., be ordered to make  
a practice march to Albuquerque and  
return. No doubt the necessary orders  
will be issued in time for the troops to  
arrive before the opening of the fair. Very

GENERAL CORBIN'S LETTER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.  
Hon. Miguel A. Otero, Governor of New Mexico,  
Santa Fe, N. M.  
Sir:—In referring to your letter of July  
25th, expressing the desire of the  
authorities and management of the Ter-  
ritorial Fair to be held at Albuquerque,  
September 19 to 23d next, that the  
troops stationed at Fort Wingate be per-  
mitted to visit Albuquerque during that  
week, I have the honor to inform you  
that instructions have been sent to the  
department commander, directing that  
the troops at Fort Wingate make a prac-  
tice march to Albuquerque so as to en-  
able them to be in the city during the  
period in question. Very respectfully,

CAPTAIN FULLER NOTIFIED.

Capt. A. M. Fuller, one of the first  
western army officers in this part of the  
country, is the commandant at Fort  
Wingate. The president of the fair as-  
sociation, on receiving a former letter  
from Governor Otero, informed the cap-  
tain of the contents of the letters of  
General Miles and Adjutant General  
Corbin, and a message from Fort Win-  
gate, received unofficially this morning,  
gives the fair association the information  
that Capt. Fuller and his sub-officers,  
with the members of the garrison San  
Juan hill fighters, the famous 9th  
cavalry, are now preparing themselves to  
make the march to Albuquerque during  
the week in accordance with Gen. Miles'  
order. The captain will shape the march  
so as to reach Albuquerque Sunday or  
Monday before the beginning of the fair,  
which will open on September 19 and  
continue for five days.

SHORT PARAGRAPHS.

The contract for the reproduction of  
the "Battle of Manila" was mailed last  
night, and it is a settled fact that this  
grand naval battle will be seen here  
during the fair.

Fox and Freelon, who secured the  
contract for the building of the grand  
stand, and the Midway Plaisance, have  
started this morning, and will have  
everything in tip-top condition by fair  
time.

Governor Miguel A. Otero writes that  
he will be compelled to visit Chicago on  
or about September 10 or 12, and would  
therefore be unable to be present on the  
opening day of the forthcoming great  
New Mexico fair.

A M. Case, who is the proprietor of a  
steam ferry-boat, had held forth in  
El Paso the past month, came in from  
the south last night, and will arrive to  
locate for some time to come in this city.  
He is to-day in consultation with fair  
association officials about securing space  
during fair week.

The Pecon Valley & Northeastern  
railway, in a letter to the president of  
the association, says: "It is our desire  
to extend to you a warm welcome, and  
as offered by other roads. In this case,  
I will authorize and publish rate of one  
fare for the round trip." This accord  
is a great boon to the fair from the Pecon Val-  
ley country.

Hon. Pedro Perea, delegate to congress,  
took a great interest in securing the  
troops at Fort Wingate to visit Albuquer-  
que for the fair. He writes wishing the  
fair great success, enclosing a copy of  
Adjutant General Corbin's letter in re-  
gard to the troops at Fort Wingate  
marching overland to the city for the fair.

## DREYFUS TRIAL.

The Celebrated Case Drags  
Along Very Slowly.

Big Trust Formed to Operate Depart-  
ment Stores.

Railroad Employee at Waldo Station  
Fatally Injured.

FUGITIVE JACKSON KNOCKED OUT.

Reunited, Aug. 24.—When the Dreyfus  
trial opened to-day, Colonel J. J. Jousset,  
president of the court, ordered the evi-  
dence given by M. Penot, friend of the  
late Colonel Sandherr, chief of the intel-  
ligence department, read. It was to be  
to the effect that Colonel Sandherr said  
that the Dreyfus family offered him  
150,000 francs on condition that he would  
clear Dreyfus.

M. Demange, for the defense, disposed  
of the allegation by reading the actual  
note written on the subject by Colonel  
Sandherr, thereby proving that the Col-  
onel's remarks had been distorted. "We  
are convinced of the innocence of our  
brother and will spend our entire force  
to discover the truth."

M. Linoise, a former official of the gov-  
ernment, testified in favor of Dreyfus,  
contradicting what M. Linoise had said  
yesterday regarding the alleged intimacy  
of Dreyfus with a German attaché at the  
house of M. Bodein, a mutual friend.

Colonel Maurel, president of the Dreyfus  
court martial in 1894, was called. When  
Labori finally disposed of him he left  
the platform with the scared look of a  
man awakened from a nightmare. The  
counsel had drawn from the colonel a  
confession that the secret dossier was  
communicated to the judges of the court  
martial in 1894 by Colonel J. J. Jousset.

Maurel's declaration that he only read  
one of the documents, which had no ef-  
fect upon him, as his mind was already  
made up, was nullified by his subsequent  
declaration that this one document suf-  
ficed to convince him.

Another Big Trust.  
New York, Aug. 24.—The Herald says:  
Arrangements are maturing for the or-  
ganization of a \$50,000,000 dry goods  
corporation to control and operate dry  
goods and department stores throughout  
the country. A mercantile re-organization  
company has been incorporated at  
Trenton, N. J., as a preliminary to cre-  
ating the big corporation. It is proposed  
to buy retail stores in cities having a  
population of 20,000 or more. The com-  
pany expects to control 500 to 1,000  
stores throughout the country.

Another Big Trust.  
New York, Aug. 24.—The Times says:  
The Union Steel and Chain company,  
organized three months ago under the  
laws of Delaware, is reaching out in  
every direction to control as far as pos-  
sible the blast furnaces, Bessemer con-  
verters, open hearths, rolling mills and  
foundries of the country. The company has  
a capital stock of \$60,000,000. It is  
proposed to buy retail stores in cities  
having a population of 20,000 or more. The  
company expects to control 500 to 1,000  
stores throughout the country.

He Recognizes the Sovereignty  
of United States.

Gen. Miles Praises Activity of New  
Secretary of War.

Texas Officials Inflict Torture on Mexi-  
can Prisoners.

BRITISH TROOPS SAIL FOR AFRICA.

New York, Aug. 24.—The Manila cor-  
respondent of the Herald, describing the  
agreement with the sultan of Sulu says:  
"The sultan agreed to all the American  
terms proposed, and recognized the abso-  
lute sovereignty of the United States. An  
important element of the treaty gives  
Americans the right to purchase land  
within all parts of the Spanish formerly  
occupied and reserves the right to open  
others at our discretion."  
The sultan collects no revenues but  
will receive an annual salary, maintain-  
ing law and order.

General of the Army Speaks Well of Sec-  
retary of War.  
New York, Aug. 24.—General Miles said  
to the Philadelphia correspondent of the  
Tribune:  
"The secretary of war is a man of busi-  
ness. As a result of different conditions  
already exist. The interests of the country  
demanded vigorous prosecution of the  
war in the Philippines and now they  
will have it. I know nothing about a  
change of commanders on the island.  
General Otis is a fine officer. That has  
been demonstrated by the splendid  
morale of the army, its health and effi-  
ciency."

Dewey Reception.  
Admiral Sampson Will Meet Him in New  
York Harbor.  
New York, Aug. 24.—Rear Admiral  
Sampson's fleet will not meet Admiral  
Dewey when he comes with the Olympia  
to be the guest of New York and the na-  
tion. Instead, the admiral will come  
into port unattended. Then Rear Admiral  
Sampson, going from his anchored ship  
to the Olympia, will extend to Ad-  
miral Dewey a welcome on behalf of the  
navy department and to pay his own re-  
spects. Sampson did not approve of the  
committee's plan provided that the war-  
ships should go to sea and escort the  
Olympia in.

Looks Like War.  
Southampton, England, Aug. 24.—The  
British steamer Arcturion, loaded with  
troops, is expected to arrive here to-  
day with thirty officers and 700 men  
of various regiments bound for Cape  
Town.

Troops for Africa.  
Gibraltar, Aug. 24.—The Manchester  
regiment numbering one thousand men  
sailed for Cape Town.

TORTURED PRISONERS.  
Barbarous Act of Officers of a Texas  
County.  
Austin, Texas, Aug. 24.—Recent tor-  
ture inflicted on six Mexican prisoners  
confined in the Hidalgo county jail by  
officers of that county, in an effort to  
extract confessions, has become an inter-  
national affair. Four prisoners claim to  
be citizens of Mexico. They have ap-  
pealed to President Diaz for aid. The  
appeal was referred to the Mexican am-  
bassador at Washington. The latter has  
taken the matter in hand. Gov. Sawyer  
has information that the parties are citi-  
zens of Texas with possibly one excep-  
tion.

Contract With Short Improvement Co.

The directors of the Albuquerque Land and Irrigation company have let the contract for the construction of the low line canal to the Short Improvement company, of Pueblo, Colo.

Readers of THE CITIZEN will remember, when the bids were opened in this city some months ago, that this company's bid, of something less than \$200,000 for the whole work, was the lowest and that the directors at that time notified its representative that the bid was accepted and that the contract would be signed as soon as the case, then pending in the court, was settled.

Judge Merle's decision, rendered a few weeks ago, ended the legal controversy, so nothing remained but the signing of the contract, which has now been done.

The company's traveling representative is in Oklahoma at the present time, and as soon as he returns from there, he will be sent here and the work commenced, and pushed to a speedy termination.
