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## HEARING ON STATEHOOD

Delegates From the Territories Made a Splendid Showing in Their Statehood Arguments.

### PATTERSON'S SARCASM

The Colorado Senator Criticizes President Roosevelt's Position Upon the Panama Question.

Washington, Jan. 20.—It has been practically determined to drop all the amendments to the Panama treaty. Assurances have been received that Panama concedes the treaty to be interpreted as the amendments provide regarding the harbors, sanitation and the limitation of the cities of Panama and Colon.

Hearing on Statehood Closed.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The territories of New Mexico and Arizona have closed their hearings before the House committee on territories, and the statements of the witnesses are now being printed. Oklahoma will begin her hearings this week. Three or four days will be lost, because of the contest of 1/2's seat in the House which Delegate McGuire has on hand.

Both Delegate Rodey and Delegate Wilson are said to have made the best statements for their respective territory that have heretofore been made in any Congress.

As soon as they are printed, they will be distributed on the floor of the House to members of Congress and to Senators, to the chief newspaper editors, and numbers of them will be sent home to the territories.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The House today resumed consideration of the pure food bill, proceeding with the reading of the bill for purposes of amendment under the five minute rule.

Washington, Jan. 20.—In the Senate today Senator Cullom presented a number of petitions for the service of a pension bill saying that he has received such petitions from every G. A. R. Post in Illinois, and hoped that it would have the attention of the Senate. He said he did not know, what it would cost to give a pension to every man who had served in the civil war but Senator Gallinger volunteered the opinion that the amount would be forty or fifty millions the first year. Patterson then continued his address on the Panama Canal question. He entered into the discussion for the purpose of showing that the President's claim that his course in Panama was in line with the policies preceding his administrations, was unfounded.

Referring to the President's declaration that what he had done in Panama had been done as a mandate of civilization Patterson quoted with approval the statement by Spooner to the effect that this is a new phrase, adding, "It was a new phrase and the man who coined it must have been in a state of mental exaltation at the time as others had been on other occasions. Mohamet, Joseph Smith and Dowle have moved in such exalted spheres that they imagined themselves as very vice-regents of the Almighty and may be the President moved in the same sphere."

## HALLETT WITHOUT JURISDICTION

The United States District Court at Denver Thus Decides in the Parker Case.

Denver, Jan. 20.—Judge Moses Hallett in the United States District Court today, after consideration of the Sherman Parker habeas corpus suit against the military authorities of Colorado, announced that his court is without jurisdiction in the matter. Parker is the union miner of Cripple Creek who was held in the military bull pen without warrant.

In his opinion Hallett said that in times of turbulence and when there was a probability of violence, discretion may be exercised by the authorities in holding prisoners without bail. There was nothing to show, he said, that justice would be interrupted in Teller County.

It rests with the district authorities to determine who shall have the right to refuse to grant bail to prisoners. Continuing he said, "The Governor as the executive of the state is authorized and required to enforce law and if in so doing he finds it necessary to call out the militia and to use the power of the state, he should do so. The matter of how a state should enforce the law is not for the federal government to state. The people of the state are to be congratulated in having a Governor who will enforce the law. The court will not interfere with him in the execution of his duties."

## NO DANGER OF WAR IN PANAMA

Columbian Soldiers Suffering From Ill Health and Lack of Supplies Leave the Border.

Panama, Jan. 20.—Strong indications that there will be no war between Panama and Colombia have been observed by Bishop Junguito, who has just returned from Cartagena and Barranquilla. The bishop declares that many of the soldiers who went to the front along the Panama border have returned in ill health. There are no facilities for getting supplies and great suffering prevails among the soldiers. No further advance of the Colombian army is reported.

## MOTHER MURDERS HER SON

Headless Body of Child Found On the Floor By Horrified Father.

Paterson, N. J. Jan. 20.—Mrs. Arthur Oswald was arrested today on the charge of murdering her six year old son. On returning home the woman's husband was horrified to see the headless body of his son lying on the floor. Nearby lay the body of a pet dog also beheaded. Oswald found his wife in bed singing softly to a baby in her arms. The woman did not recognize her husband or seem to understand what he said to her.

## A STRIKE IS DECLARED

Hack Drivers of St. Louis Want Increase in Wages and Union Recognition.

St. Louis, Jan. 20.—Pursuant to an order from the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, 800 hack and carriage drivers went on a strike today to enforce the demands for an increase in wages and the recognition of the union.

## NEGLIGENT BUILDING INSPECTORS

The Blame for the Iroquois Disaster Laid at Their Door By a Witness.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Edwin R. Price, manager of Mr. Bluebeard, Jr., at the Iroquois inquest today showed up the work of the Chicago building inspectors in a bad light, compared with the inspectors of other cities. He said that he frequently had seen inspectors examining the exits of other places during the progress of a performance but never at the Iroquois.

## TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

A Synopsis of the Night Dispatches of the Associated Press.

John Alexander Dowle will sail tomorrow for Australia.

An epidemic of typhoid fever has broken out at Leadville.

The French naval collier Vienne and its entire crew have been lost at sea.

Kid Carter of Brooklyn at Boston, last night, knocked out Joseph Choyinski of Chicago, in the first round after two minutes of fighting.

In Bostick's animal circus at Boston yesterday, Mme. Borelli, known as the queen of the jaguars, was attacked and badly bitten by several jaguars.

Professor Picetel at Berlin announced last evening that after exhaustive experiments he has established that fish will remain alive in water as cold as 45 degrees below zero.

Federal Premier Alfred Deakin of Australia, yesterday warned the authorities of Pretoria, South Africa, against the grave peril of admitting Chinese labor into the Transvaal.

The report of Attorney General Boudin of France is favorable to Dreyfus and recommends revision of his case. The decision of the court, however, will not be handed down for several weeks yet.

## COURT HOUSE BURNED

Building and Records Entirely Destroyed—Loss \$100,000.

Brighton, Colorado, Jan. 20.—Adams County court house was burned to the ground early this morning. It was thought to be incendiary. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000 which includes the value of the building and the cost of duplicating the records which were entirely destroyed.

## APPEAL TO UNCLE SAM

Dominican Minister of Foreign Affairs Reported on His Way to Arrange Protectorate.

### TROOPS ON THE MARCH

Government Soldiers Advancing Toward San Domingo the Rebel Stronghold.

St. Thomas, D. W. I., Jan. 20.—It is reported here that the Dominican minister of foreign affairs has left San Domingo for Washington to attempt to make arrangements with the United States to establish a protectorate over the republic of Santo Domingo. Bombardments of the capital continue by the forces of Jimenez.

Important Battle Predicted.

Puerto Plata, San Domingo, Jan. 20.—Seven hundred government soldiers are on the march to San Domingo, the rebel stronghold. It is believed that this battle will be the most important in the Jimenez revolution. Details of the recapture of Puerto Plata, a few days ago by the government forces, show that the commander of an American vessel in the harbor practically managed the battle and that the fighting zone, demarked by the commanders of the United States and British warships, was accepted by the contending forces.

## NEW MEXICO HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Annual Election of Officers—Fruit Exhibit at St. Louis Urged—Interesting Discussion.

The New Mexico Horticultural Society held its annual meeting Monday evening, January 18, at the residence of Dr. W. S. Harroun, the eminent promulgator. Apart from the routine business there was an interesting discussion on the best methods of irrigating orchards and especially as to the conservation of water and economy in its use, during seasons of scarcity and in localities where the supply is limited. Another subject of importance which was discussed was the increasing prevalence of insect pests and the best methods of destroying them or counteraction of their ravages.

Some fears were expressed as to the sufficiency of the water supply this year, in consequence of the dry winter; but a strong desire was manifested for the holding of a territorial fruit exhibition this year and regret was expressed that the fair had been interrupted for two years.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:  
Resolved, That a full display of the horticultural products of New Mexico at the St. Louis Exposition is of great importance to the Territory and a failure to adequately represent our forest growing industry on that occasion will be a misfortune difficult to repair. We therefore urge the commissioners to obtain as good a display as possible of late winter apples and dried fruits to be on exhibition at the opening of the World's Fair and that a succession of shipments of selected specimens be made throughout the summer and fall in order to impress on visitors the superiority in size, color and quality of the fruits of New Mexico."

The subject of "Fruits Which Are Failures in New Mexico," and the "Plague of Locusts and How to Prevent It" were suggested as topics for the next meeting.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Hon. L. B. Prince; vice presidents, Dr. W. S. Harroun, R. E. Twitchell and Arthur Boyle; secretary, Miss Eugenia Manderfield. Executive committee with the officers: Grant Riverberg, W. R. Price, W. J. McPherson. The selection of county vice president was deferred until the next meeting.

## INSANE ASYLUM ANNEX

Plans Show a Number of Improvements for the Comfort of the Inmates.

A number of extensive improvements at the territorial insane asylum at Las Vegas have been decided upon by the board of trustees. The plans of the proposed annex show a two story structure of brick with brown stone facings. It will be 168 feet in length and 48 feet wide, having 26 rooms for patients on each floor, besides baths, closets, sewing and work rooms and attendants' rooms. The wards will be separated by a corridor fourteen feet wide, and each room will be ventilated by means of room gauges. A large sun room, facing the east, will be a feature of the building. The annex can be built at a comparatively small cost and will be commodious and handsome. Work will be pushed on the building as soon as the contracts are let.

## FRANCE WILL NOT AID RUSSIA

The Russo-Franco Alliance Does Not Cover the Complications in the Far East.

### RUSSIA MUCH MEEKER

Attacks Upon Japan in the Press Have Ceased and It Looks Like Peace.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 20.—The attacks upon Japan in the Russian press are ceasing. Newspapers print prominently reports to the effect that the acute phase is passing and continue to assert that mediation is unnecessary. Baron Von Mannlicher Passes Away.

Berlin, Jan. 20.—Baron Von Mannlicher, inventor of the Mannlicher rifle, is dead.

Russia's Answer Delayed.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 20.—The first exchange of views between the foreign office, Viceroy Alexieff and Baron de Rosen, the Russian minister to Japan, on the Japanese reply has not resulted in a definite decision. Consequently Russia's answer probably will be delayed a little longer than anticipated.

France Declines to Aid Russia.

Berlin, Jan. 20.—The German government has become privy to the fact that France declines to give Russia any assurances of armed help should war be the outcome of the far Eastern differences, even should Great Britain aid Japan. France maintains that the Russo-French alliance is quite separate from the question now pending. It is believed that this resolution will deeply affect not only the situation between Russia and Japan but the Franco-Russian alliance.

## TAOS COUNTY CONDITIONS.

Cattle and Sheep Doing Well So Far, Although Water Very Scarce—Shoshone Property to Be Worked.

Gherson Gusdorf, a well known citizen of Taos County, spent yesterday in the Capital on business. To a New Mexican representative in the lobby of the Palace Hotel he said: "Cattle and sheep in Taos County are in very good condition, despite the dry weather. The weather has been mild, feed has been plentiful and this accounts for this very gratifying state of affairs."

"We have had but little snow, only about one-tenth of our usual snow fall. I have been buying and selling sheep in Taos and Rio Arriba Counties and have just finished the season's business having within the past few months shipped 40,000 head at an average price of \$1.40 per head out of Taos and eastern Rio Arriba Counties. The spring clip of wool is not yet ready and so far there are no buyers for it in that section. I think it will be in May and June. Whether we will receive as good prices as we did last year is problematical."

"Business is good in general in the town of Taos and in fact throughout the county and merchants report to have had a good year. New settlers are coming into the county in small numbers and the town of Taos is improving nicely. The Shoshone mine which has been worked for years by Alexander Gusdorf, the Taos merchant and myself, but which has been idle for some months will commence operations soon again. The company which consists of Colorado Springs capitalists, Alexander Gusdorf and myself, is now in progress of organization by C. D. Welmer, an expert mining man and a resident of Taos and when its organization is completed, active work on the property will be the rule. The mineral property carries gold and copper and we believe we have a good thing of it. It is situated twenty-one miles from Taos and two miles from the Fraser Mountain Copper Company's mines."

"As a former citizen of Santa Fe I am very glad to see the many evidences of improvement and advancement in the good old town for which I have a very great liking. I am always glad to spend a few days on a vacation here."

## SUES FOR \$5,000 DAMAGES.

C. W. Moore Feels Grievous Over Alleged Illegal Imprisonment for a Board Bill.

A case was filed in the court of the First Judicial District for Santa Fe County today by A. J. Abbott, attorney, entitled C. W. Moore vs. John V. Conway, Santiago Baca and Manuel Otero y Martinez. The plaintiff sues for \$5,000 damages on account of alleged unlawful and illegal imprisonment at the hands of the defendants on the tenth day of December, 1903. The plaintiff states that the reason of the said imprisonment was because he would not pay one of the defendants, Conway, the sum of \$37.50 on account of the board of one F. J. Curry.

## TOP NOTCH IN COTTON MARKET

Highest Prices Since the War Are Recorded and Great Excitement Prevails.

New York, Jan. 20.—Cotton prices surpassed all previous records since war times again today, when March sold at 14.48, May at 14.14 and July at 14.61. Further advances were marked by considerable activity and excitement.

Advance in Wheat.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Just before the close of trading here the wheat score was a clean advance of over two cents per bushel over the final figures yesterday.

## FRASER MOUNTAIN COPPER COMPANY

It is Not in as Bad Shape as First Reported—Inventory Amounts to \$300,000.

In the District Court for Taos County an order was entered yesterday granting Frank Staplin, receiver of the Fraser Mountain Copper Company, the right to sell certain personal property to pay certain expenses of the receivership. Another order was entered authorizing the receiver to pay a balance due on freight on a carload of copper matte that he had shipped to the smelter where it was sold. Of the sum received for this, part is to be paid out for the freight charges while the balance is to go toward expenses of the receivership.

Frank Staplin, the receiver, yesterday filed a complete and exhaustive inventory of the Fraser Mountain Copper Company, showing that the sums raised by the sale of stock and through other means had been expended for the development of the magnificent mining property and the erection of mills and other buildings. The inventory approximates \$300,000. The principal items of the inventory are as follows:

Mill building, including concentrating and crushing plant, machine shops and smelting plant; hotel building and furniture, dining room, kitchen and store; saloon, two blacksmith shops, office, store room, assay office, five bunk houses, eleven cabins, water pipe building, barber shop, three stables, tower tunnel house, tram house, old stamp mill building, a lot of cord wood, telephone and electric light line, two water power pipe lines, charcoal ovens, tramway, gravity and flat with equipment, and air pipe lines.

All this property is estimated to have cost about \$295,000. Everything is in good repair and ready for use. That there are immense amounts of low grade copper ores carrying some gold is fully established by the workings of veins and leads in the shafts and tunnels, by reports of experienced mining engineers and by many assays. The debts upon the property at this time according to the best information this paper can obtain are as follows: John S. Lanning, receiver of the Monmouth Loan and Trust Company, about \$35,000; the First National Bank of Santa Fe, about \$10,000; William Fraser about \$15,000; the Wheeler estate about \$27,000, and about \$10,000 floating indebtedness. Were the stockholders to pay off these debts which in the gross amount to a little less than \$100,000, the property could be operated and be made productive.

## SAN JUAN COUNTY RAILROAD PROJECT

Michigan Capitalists Are Running a Survey From Durango to El Paso.

The Denver Post is authority for the following new San Juan County Railroad project: A railway surveying party that had been working for several months south of Durango toward the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, left Durango this week, after finishing its work. It has been settled, so the report says, that a road will be built south this year, and that plans have been perfected for the location of a town on the San Juan River, in the heart of the big coal area of northern New Mexico.

Capitalists of Ishpeming, Michigan, prominent officials of the Oliver Iron Company, have a corps of surveyors now at work on the proposed railroad from Durango to El Paso, Texas.

It is estimated that the road can be built at a cost of \$8,000,000. It will run across the Chaco Mesa as far as Cabelon, from which point it will follow the Puerco to where it connects with the Rio Grande River.

Durango has offered a substantial bonus and the road is said to be a certainty. The principal object of the projectors is to develop the fine coal deposits of San Juan County and to furnish means to transport the coal to El Paso as a distributing point to the great mining districts of Arizona, New Mexico and Sonora, Mexico.

## NEW MEXICO LUMBER MILLS

The White Pine of This Territory Declared to Equal That of Michigan.

### MILLIONS ARE INVESTED

Many Miles of Timber Railroads—Big Plant at Alamogordo and at Albuquerque.

Although large forests in New Mexico have been cut down for timber, especially in the Catskill region, Colfax County, on the Tierra Amarilla grant in Rio Arriba County, and at other points, and many millions of acres of merchantable timber are included in forest reserves, yet there are still vast tracts of good timber in Rio Arriba, Valencia, McKinley, Otero and other counties. The lumber industry in New Mexico is an important one, employing many men and representing an investment of several million dollars, not only in mills, machinery and timber lands but also in railroads, such as the Sacramento Mountain Railway, the Catskill branch of the Colorado & Southern, the Tierra Amarilla Railroad, the New Mexico & Southwestern Railroad, now under construction, and the timber line from Thoreau into the Mitchell tract, just being completed.

The New Mexico pine is declared by expert lumbermen to be as nearly the equal of the Michigan white pine as any timber in America, and in view of the rapid disappearance of the white pine forests of the Great Lake regions, the industry in this Territory is found to grow in importance with every year. The Territory is the owner of vast tracts of heavily timbered lands, the value of which has increased rapidly during the past year. The growth of the lumber industry threatens no danger of the wiping out of the forests, since the finest timber lands in the Territory are protected within the government forest reserves.

A writer in one of the Denver Sunday papers says: "At Alamogordo, in eastern New Mexico, the Sacramento Mountain Lumber Company is employing several hundred men in its two big saw mills and box factory. To reach the pine forests which cover the peaks of the Sacramento Mountains, the company has built the Sacramento Mountain Railroad connecting with the El Paso & Northeastern at Alamogordo. This eighteen miles of railroad is one of the most picturesque and difficult feats of railroad engineering in the west. With an average grade of four and one-half per cent it is still necessary to use two switchbacks to reach the summit of the range. The forests in the Sacramentos are practically as limitless as are those in western New Mexico."

"The American Lumber Company is composed of Chicago and Detroit capitalists and lumber manufacturers and has a capital of \$8,000,000. Its mills in Albuquerque are turning out the finished product at the rate of 100,000 feet for every 24 hours' run. The mill, which made the first run in October last, is said by experts to be the most modern and complete plant of its kind in the United States. The company controls more than 300,000 acres of land in Valencia and McKinley Counties in the western part of the Territory, on which stands timber estimated at 2,000,000,000 feet. A box factory will soon be built to use the waste product of the mill. The company has built eighteen miles of standard gauge railroad into its forests, connecting with the Santa Fe Pacific at Thoreau, 60 miles west of Albuquerque, and two trains of 30 cars of logs each are hauled into Albuquerque every 24 hours to keep the big plant going."

"In addition to these two big corporations numerous smaller companies are now working in New Mexico. Small plants are being established along the Denver & Rio Grande in the northern counties, and several small mills are running along the Santa Fe Pacific line, while everything now points to further increase in the industry during the present year."

## SUPREME COURT.

James S. Williams of Estancia Admitted to the Bar—Two Cases Submitted.

Chief Justice W. J. Mills and Associate Justices John R. McFie, Frank W. Parker, B. S. Baker and W. H. Pope were on the bench this morning when the territorial Supreme Court opened. Case No. 1037, Jose S. Esquivel, appellee, vs. Francisco S. Chavez, appellant, was argued and submitted this forenoon. The case is an appeal from the District Court of San Miguel County.

Case No. 1033, James B. Orman, plaintiff in error, vs. James L. Van Arsdell, et al., defendants in error, was submitted on briefs. The writ of error is from the District Court of Santa Fe County.

On yesterday James S. Williams of Estancia, was admitted to the bar.

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## MORE NEW MEXICO RAILROAD PROJECTS.

Even before the first zephyrs of spring are blowing the railroad projectors are abroad in New Mexico. The latest arrivals are Michigan capitalists who speak of building a railroad from Durango, Colorado, to El Paso, via the Las Animas, San Juan and Puerco Valleys. Of course, between talking about a railroad project and building a railroad, there lies the expenditure of a good deal of money, but San Juan County offers such opportunities for railroad projects as well as railroad building that it does seem certain that northwestern New Mexico will soon have railroad facilities, the equal of those of northeastern, southeastern or southwestern New Mexico. The project of spending \$8,000,000 to build a railroad from Durango to El Paso or to Clifton sounds rather ambitious, although not altogether impracticable. Yet, the New Mexican believes that San Juan County's first railroad will either be a spur of the Denver & Rio Grande from some point between Durango and Chama, or a branch line of the Santa Fe & Pacific from somewhere between Gallup and Thoreau. It would be just as feasible to build from Durango to Santa Fe as from Durango to El Paso, and certainly several million dollars cheaper. The same object would be attained, for here connection would be made with three railroad systems that would offer every facility for taking the products of northwestern New Mexico to the great markets of the neighboring states.

## A HINT TO NEW MEXICO FARMERS

The city of El Paso consumes monthly \$30,000 worth of dairy produce, and from \$60,000 to \$100,000 worth of vegetable and poultry products that should be raised in the Mesilla Valley but which are imported from distant parts of Texas, Kansas or California. El Paso is a good but not the only market for New Mexico produce. It is a wonder, therefore, that instead of confining themselves to raising chile and corn, more New Mexico farmers do not engage in truck, poultry or dairy farming. During the season, El Paso alone would take a thousand boxes a day of New Mexico strawberries and there is certainly more profit in selling strawberries at fifteen to twenty-five cents a box than there is in selling corn at fifty cents a bushel. As soon as more of New Mexico farmers cultivate their farms intensively and make the most of their irrigated garden patches, so soon New Mexico will be much more prosperous than it is today.

The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says that "Missouri Republicans are hopeful." This is good as far as it goes. What they really ought to do is to carry their state next November. Considering the one sided, unjust, unfair, and nefarious election laws which govern election methods in that large state, it will be very hard for them to attain success. Under election boards appointed by the Democratic governor, stupendous election frauds are committed and the honest voters have no redress and no rights which election boards or the Democratic state machinery have to respect or do respect. This is the way they do it in the sovereign state of Missouri. Comparing the elections in New Mexico with those for instance, in the state of Missouri, the former are as pure and as white as the newly fallen snow. It is a credit to this Territory that election frauds are few and far between. Still statehood is denied the people of New Mexico, because, forsooth, "they are not fitted to govern themselves."

Edward Atkinson, anti-imperialist of Boston now comes to the front with the statement that he possesses absolute proof that the battleship Maine was exploded from the inside and not by a torpedo from the outside. This man Atkinson evidently has wheels in his head. That is about the most charitable construction to be put on his antics.

It is said that Senator Dietrich of Nebraska, is satisfied with the court's decision in his case and will not seek a vindication at the polls. That is really nice of him, saves much trouble and expense.

New Mexico at this time would give a good deal for a heavy fall of snow. So far this year there has been a great deficiency in the snow fall and this is likely to prove of serious consequence during the coming summer.

The managers of the Chicago street railways have at last concluded that honesty is the best policy. They had to pay so much to the members of the city council on the "side" that they are now offering to pay into the city treasury the sum of \$800,000 per annum outright in order to be let alone.

The Democratic city boodlers of St. Louis are hot under the collar at the London National Review because that paper declared its belief that Philadelphia was the most corrupt city on earth. The St. Louis boodlers are emphatically of the opinion that that English paper does not know what it is talking about.

It is the ambition of the Emperor of Russia to be known as a monarch of peace. This is probably the principal reason why Russia wants to take Manchuria and Korea without having to fight for them. The Jewish massacres at Kishineff and other Russian towns may also be ascribed to the peaceful proclivities of Czar Nicholas.

It does not hurt New Mexico a bit to be held up as a friend of good roads. The construction of the Scenic Route between Santa Fe and Las Vegas helps to put the Territory in the front rank of progressive commonwealths. Even ambitious Ohio must come to New Mexico to take lessons in the art of building fine roads.

New Mexico's lumbering interests represent an investment of \$20,000,000. Almost one hundred miles of railroad are being operated in the Territory to haul logs to the mills, and while it does not appear so upon the assessment rolls, yet, the timber lands of New Mexico, owned by corporations and individuals, are worth as much as the total taxable assessment returns of the Territory.

Senator Hanna within the last four weeks has sent out several thousand letters in answer to inquiries announcing to his friends that he is not a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination. The Senator did the right thing in this instance and right here it is well to remark that he does the right thing pretty much right along. Senator Hanna is all right.

There is naught to say against the ambition of Roswell to have a weather bureau of its own. The Pecos Valley, is for all practical purposes so far removed from the rest of the Territory that it is naturally ambitious to be self-sufficient in every possible direction. However, railroad connection with Santa Fe would benefit the Pearl of the Pecos more than any other movement or project that has yet been broached for the town's benefit.

The Governor of Mississippi objects to educating the colored man. He would rather have the greater half of the population of his state steeped in the grossest ignorance than to encourage the ambition of the negro for educational, industrial and social equality. Governor James K. Vardaman might have been a shining light in the feudal ages but in the present enlightened day in a progressive and enlightened republic he is certainly out of place. Poor Mississippi!

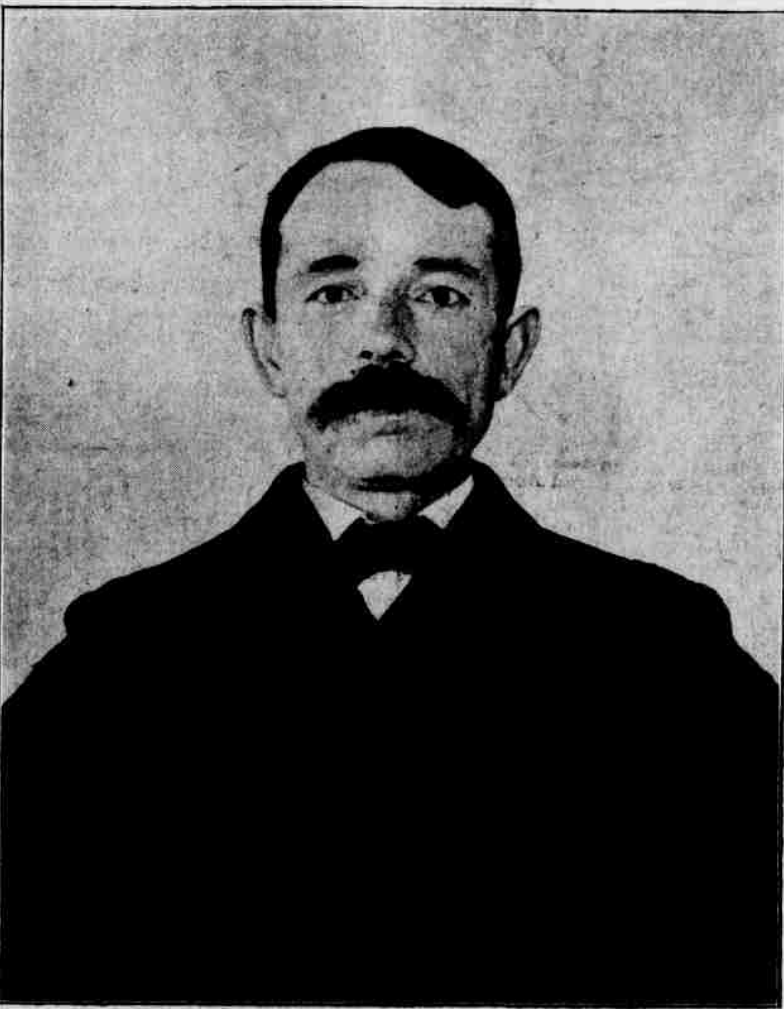

LEOPOLDO SANCHEZ.  
Treasurer of Leonard Wood County.

Leopoldo Sanchez was born in Alameda, Bernalillo County, January 16, 1864. In early youth his parents removed to the Pecos River section. He was reared on a stock ranch and is intimately acquainted with everything necessary to the successful raising of cattle and sheep. He attended school at the Jesuit College at Las Vegas and received a good education. He is the owner of a fine ranch at Casaus in Leonard Wood County. Hard work, close attention to business and thorough knowledge of the stock raising industry have made him wealthy and independent. He is married and the father of seven children. In politics, he is a Democrat and one of the leaders of his party in his section. In 1902 he was elected treasurer and ex-officio collector of Guadalupe County by a very handsome majority. He is a competent and courteous official and very popular. He is one of the leading citizens of the county and identified with its advancement and progress.

The forecast for Thursday is probably fair with colder weather in the south portion.

The postal receipts of the Las Vegas postoffice for the calendar year 1903, were \$13,113.13, an increase of \$3,000 compared with the year preceding and due to the consolidation of the Las Vegas and East Las Vegas postoffices. For the present fiscal year, the receipts of the office will exceed \$14,000. ## A TOWNSITE AT BROMIDE

The Camp Shows Every Sign of Soon Attaining a Self Sustaining Position.

### OLDEST MINE JUMPED

The Tusas Peak Mining Company Will Build a Mill to Handle Its Ores.

Special to the New Mexican.

Bromide Mining District, Rio Arriba County, Jan. 19—Considered in its entirety, the year 1903, has been a very satisfactory and successful season in the Bromide mining district, of Rio Arriba County, in this Territory. A great deal of development work has been done much needed machinery installed, and by the opening up at depth of numerous and valuable bodies of ore, the permanence and value of the mines demonstrated beyond doubt. It was the expectation that concentrating mills would certainly be built on Las Tusas Creek last season, but the widespread and almost unparalleled dullness of the stock markets, caused this to be postponed. As the future of the camp lies in its great low grade copper-gold deposits and economical methods of working them, mills are a necessity and will be built as soon as circumstances permit, for several properties have ore in great quantities blocked out, ready for stopping, which will yield good profits if treated near to the mines, while heavy freight charges make it impossible to ship any but the very highest grades of ores to the nearest available smelters at Pueblo and Salida for treatment.

#### A Mill for the Tampa.

It is announced on the best authority that the Tusas Peak Mining Company, owning and operating the Tampa mine, will build a mill to handle its ores the coming spring, as the returns from several car loads of ore which were shipped this summer were such as to demonstrate positively that the ore can be treated by local mills and leave a large margin of profit over and above all expenses of mining, milling and shipping of concentrates.

At the present writing, the Tampa shaft is 270 feet deep and is being carried deeper. Many stringers from the vein are being cut in the shaft and it is expected when cross-cutting is run from the 300 foot level to the vein, that the ore bodies will be found to be even larger than was the case at the 200 level. It is the intention of the Tampa management to continue sinking indefinitely, and at every 100 feet of depth to run cross-cuts to the vein, and drifts on it, so creating immense ore reserves. With the building of the mill, this mine will surely be an epoch maker among New Mexico mines and return large profits.

#### The War Eagle.

In the same vicinity, near Tusas Peak, are other properties which are considered equally as good and which it is believed will prove excellent mines, with further development. Among these are the War Eagle, owned by the Mexican King Gold and Copper Mining Company. A shaft was sunk to the intersection with the vein at the depth of 80 feet, and from there an incline follows the vein to the depth of 124 feet. The vein averages 24 inches in width continuously, and is a true contact between a gabbro-diorite and a syenite. The vein matter proper consists of soft schistose gouge matter, forming the salvage between the walls and averages in gold from eight to twenty dollars to the ton. In addition, copper sulphides occur in irregular bodies throughout the syenite in the vicinity of the contact. It was the intention to continue this incline to the 200 foot depth at least, but while sinking, an underground body of water flowing over 150 gallons per hour was struck, which necessitated the abandonment of further work until steam machinery and a pump can be installed. The rock being extremely hard, and expensive to work by hand, an air compressor and machine drills will also be put in. This machinery will be placed in position in the early spring, and the development carried to greater depths, as it is the intention of the company to make the War Eagle the main working shaft, equipping it with heavy machinery and at a suitable depth, to cross-cut to the Butterfly claim, and in doing so, cross the Philadelphia lode, which will be found between them. On the Butterfly claim, a 30 foot shaft shows a large body of low grade copper sulphide ore, and on the Philadelphia, which ends on both the War Eagle and Butterfly, a short tunnel was recently completed which opened up 26 feet of ore which averaged from four to ten dollars throughout. Although low grade, this ore can be concentrated to advantage, for the values are entirely contained in copper and iron pyrites, while the gangue is a form of quartzite, with a much lighter specific gravity than the pyrites. With these three claims opened and worked from the one main shaft, they will make a large and profitable producer, as there are now proved to exist large bodies of easily concentrated ore, for the treatment of which every facility exists, including water and fuel in abundance.

#### The Continental.

Adjoining the property of the Mexican King Company, is that of the Cunningham Gulch Mining Company, which latter is being developed by a

shaft on the Philadelphia No. 2 claim, just across the canon from the War Eagle and the Tampa is unique, inasmuch as it is the only silver-lead property in the district. It has been developed by means of a 50 foot shaft, and much cross-cutting and drifting. The ore is for the most part galena, assaying from 20 to 40 per cent lead, with silver up to 50 ounces to the ton. This shaft is also very wet and extensive development has been postponed until machinery shall be installed. Just southeast of the Continental and extending to the lines of the Tampa, is the Cold Spring claim, a comparatively unknown property, but on which it is claimed the Tampa vein has been traced and which is being demonstrated by means of a shaft, now being sunk just outside the Tampa line. The vein appears to be in a granite fissure and carries exceptionally good values.

The St. Michael's Group.

An 80 horse power boiler, with a large steam hoist and pump were placed on the St. Michael's group last winter and the property was worked until the middle of summer, sinking the shaft to a depth of 130 feet and running a drift on the vein. The workings are in good ore, but financial difficulties caused a shut down, although it is generally expected that work will be resumed there on a large scale in the early spring. The Strawberry, owned by the New Mexico Gold and Copper Mining Company, has been working almost steadily since July, and will continue to work until the 300 foot cross-cut from the 100 foot level in the Strawberry shaft to the "sugar quartz" dike is completed.

The Bromide Jumped.

The old Bromide mine was jumped by J. C. Hutchison and J. P. Rinker on the morning of January 1, they claiming technical errors in the patent records concerning the claim. What the result will be, other than prolonged litigation, is difficult to determine. Eliminating the equity of the case entirely, it is the hope of the entire camp that in future something will be done towards reopening this mine. It is the oldest mine in the camp, having been discovered and worked at a profit long before this district was organized, yet by reason of differences among the owners, was closed down a number of years ago. Since then, the mine has been robbed to the water level by "midnight leasers" and below water level almost ruined by leasers who neglected everything in their eagerness to break out all the ore possible at the least expense; so, as it now stands, it will require practically entire new workings to reopen the ore bodies. The mine is an admittedly rich one and properly equipped with machinery and operated as a mine should be, will yield annual profits amounting to thousands.

A NEW TOWN SITE.

In the general expectation of a boom, to come in the spring, there have been made many filings of small holding claims in and near Tres Piedras, the railroad point for this district, and a townsite has also been platted in the district itself by the New Mexico Gold and Copper Mining Company, which is now being surveyed by Charles M. Taylor a local mining engineer. The situation of this townsite, called "Bromide," is very advantageous, lying near to the center of the district and within two miles of all the principal mines. The Bromide District never has, and we hope never will be a "boom" camp, and to one who has looked into the matter, it seems strange how capital rushes so eagerly to invest in all manner of wildcat camps, such as are so often foisted on the public by professional boomers, aided by unscrupulous railroad officials and newspapers of a certain class; while camps such as Bromide, where the value and permanence of the mineral deposits are proven by thousands of feet of development, receive little or no public attention and meet with all manner of obstacles in raising money enough to properly equip the mines with needed machinery, or to build mills to realize on its ores.

By its proven worth, the Bromide District has weathered the copper panic and has been little injured by the past year's financial troubles, and it now bids fair to be speedily in a self sustaining position, for before the close of 1904, mills will certainly be built and they will show the value of the mines by the profits in their output.

St. Vrain Company, et al., of Mora, on a promissory note. Shaw & Company, grocers at Raton, filed an assignment in favor of their creditors. The assets amount to \$17,950.

Joseph E. Merryman, one of the promoters of the electric railway at Las Vegas, died at St. Louis this week at the age of 32 years.

The Castaneda Hotel at Las Vegas is to be enlarged and a second story is to be added to the depot. The railroad office will be moved from the Castaneda to the depot when these improvements are completed.

The Fraternal Union at Las Vegas, installed its officers last evening.

The Businessmen's Association on Monday evening elected the following directors: John H. York, James A. Dick, Max Nordhaus, C. H. Spordler, Jacob Stern, C. E. Boucher, R. J. Taupert, O. G. Schaefer and Isaac Davis.

Dr. W. D. Rexford of Winstead, Connecticut, who came to Las Vegas, two years ago, died last Saturday. He had also spent some time at Deming and at Santa Rosa. The remains were sent to his Connecticut home yesterday.
