## SUCCESSFUL REVOLT.

San Domingo Insurrection Gaining on Every Side.

Trial of Dreyfus Conducted in Secret Sessions.

Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, From Philippine Islands.

ENGLISH PARLIAMENT.

Cape Haytien, Hayti, Aug. 9.—General Francisco Liriano, sent from General Cristóbal to the Dominican government to attack General Ramon Pacheco at Dejebe, headquarters of the revolutionists, was abandoned when he arrived in front of the enemy by his troops, who, without firing a shot, deserted and entered the camp of General Pacheco. Advance posts of the latter are at Las Aguas. The revolutionists are masters of the fort across the river Yaque, cutting off communication between General Cristóbal and the interior. The forces of Jimenez, leader of the revolution, are being augmented every day. News from every part of the Dominican republic are favorable to him.

Trial of Dreyfus.  
Rennes, Aug. 4.—This secret session of the Dreyfus court martial today lasted from 6:30 to 11:15. General Chambrin nearly completed his part of the examination. He will be heard to-morrow about a couple of hours and then M. Paléologue, of the foreign office, will take up the task which it is understood will be completed on Friday. A public session therefore will take place on Saturday. The dossier consists of about 400 documents, of which fifty were disposed of yesterday.

Senator Beveridge Returns.  
Victoria, B. C., Aug. 9.—Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, returned by Empress City to-day from Manila, accompanied by Mrs. Beveridge and two leading residents of the Philippine colony of Americans, Dr. J. J. Donnell and R. D. Wood, each of whom have made Manila his home for more than a quarter of a century. "You may say," Senator Beveridge replied to questions "that I absolutely decline to express any opinion at the present time as to General Otis, the future of the Philippines or anything else."

Prices of the Metal Raised by Missouri Association.  
Joplin, Mo., Aug. 9.—The citizens of the Missouri-Kansas Miners Association's fight against the smelters for higher prices for zinc was reached today when the association announced that it had made the prices on all grades of zinc ore for the next six months. This means prices for about \$50,000,000 of zinc ore. Hereafter the schedule prices have been made weekly. Since the association organized the price of ore has almost doubled. The schedule for the ensuing half year makes the price for ore running 63 per cent metal \$46 per ton and for every one per cent metal \$1 less for the ton. The zinc ore of the district generally runs 60 and 65 per cent metal. It is predicted that high grade zinc ore will go to \$50 within a month.

Hurricane at St. Croix.  
St. Thomas, D. W. I., Aug. 9.—A hurricane swept over the island of St. Croix Monday night. Lowest barometer 29.12. Much damage was done, but no deaths have as yet been reported. The force of the storm was also experienced at St. Thomas, but the damage done was very slight. Negro huts were the chief sufferers. The enormous sea, however, did damage to wharves, but there is no loss of life. St. Kitts and Anguilla islands are believed to have suffered but communication with these islands is temporarily interrupted.

Yellow Fever.  
Washington, Aug. 9.—Surgeon Viceroy were Surgeon General Wyman of the hospital service, from Soldiers Home, Hampton, Va., as follows: No change—everything favorable. Nearly all in tests that can be moved. Disinfection of buildings are being pushed along by Surgeon Von Ertel.

Wrecked a Car.  
Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 9.—A Big Consolidated street car was wrecked by explosives at 3 o'clock this morning on the Wade Park avenue line near Cactus Drive, a loosely stop adjoining Wade Park. No one was injured.

Severe Cyclone.  
Washington, Aug. 9.—Glensford, signal officer at San Juan, Porto Rico, reports that a severe cyclone swept over that city and that several persons were killed and much property destroyed.

Destructive Storm.  
Washington, Aug. 9.—The following cablegram has been received at the state department: Ponta Pitre, Guadeloupe, Aug. 8.—Secretary of State, Washington. A serious hurricane suddenly commenced at 10 o'clock yesterday morning and blew severely until night. The roof of the consulate was blown off. Personal property a total loss. A great number of small boats were lost. The damage to city is great. No details from the country, wires are down.

Trying to Form a Confederacy.  
Rio de Janeiro, Aug. 9.—In spite of denials on the subject, it is said that President Beca, of the Argentine republic, who is now here as the guest of Brazil, is desirous of negotiating an alliance between Argentina, Brazil and Chili against the United States. The presidents of these three republics will be at Buenos Ayres next month.

Striking on the Sun.  
New York, Aug. 9.—Farrell, an official of Typographical union No. 6, accompanied by A. J. Bertram, Thomas J. Lucas, Wm. H. Columbine and Max Langbart, former stereotypes on the Sun, appeared before Magistrate Brann, in police court, today, and asked for warrants for Business Manager Padlock, of the Sun, and several private detectives on the charge of assault. The stereotypes said they went to work on Monday night and decided to stop work last night. In the room in which they quit they allege there were several private detectives who hustled them into the elevator and on reaching the lower floor were kicked and beaten by them. Lucas said two of his teeth were knocked out; Columbine was beaten on head and face and Langbart had a bruise on his head. The magistrate refused the warrants but said he would issue summonses. Two were issued, one for Padlock and the other for John Lee.

## DRIVE THE ENEMY.

Philippine Army Driven Five Miles by Gen. McArthur.

How Steamer Saturnus Was Destroyed by Filipinos.

Anti-Bryan Democrats of the State of New York Hold Convention.

STEAMER SUNK—CREW SAVED.

Washington, Aug. 9.—General Otis has sent the following cablegram: Manila, Aug. 9.—General MacArthur with 4,000 men attacked the insurgent army, six thousand strong, concentrated around San Fernando at 5:15 this morning. At 10 o'clock a. m. had driven it five miles in the direction of Angeles. Casualties few. The attack was ordered for the seventh instant, but rain did not permit the movement. The railway from Angeles north is badly washed by unprecedented floods the last six weeks, beyond the ability of the insurgents to repair.

GOLD DEMOCRATS.  
New York Democrats Do Not Favor Free Silver.

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 8.—A meeting of Chicago platform democrats of New York state was called to order here at 11:30 to-day with fifty delegates in attendance. A fight was precipitated on the floor. The anti-trust and anti-imperialism factions were on one side and the ultra-free silver faction on the other. Samuel O'Dell, of Auburn, and Austin Wheelock, of Geneva, led the fight for the anti-trust people. Thomas W. Cantwell, of Albany, and Jay W. Forrest, of Niagara, led the silver side.

Steamer Sunk.  
Victoria, B. C., Aug. 9.—The steamer Munohaki Maru foundered on Barred Islands on the 21st of July, and sank after the crew got off in the life boats. One boat, with thirteen of the crew, was picked up by the steamer Klukikat. Another boat, containing the second officer and seven men, was towed into Moja by a coaster of the Blue Funnel line, July 24. It is not known how many were in the two missing boats.

How It Was Captured and Burned by Philippine Insurgents.  
Manila, Aug. 9.—The steamer Saturnus of the Compagnia Maritima, coasting under the American flag, was discovered August 2 by the United States gunboat Pampanga, beached at San Fernando under the insurgent trenches. The steamer was taken by an armed band of the crew and the passengers taken off. The cargo consisting of merchandise and \$100,000 in specie has been sacked. Several attempts to tow the Saturnus off were unsuccessful. The Pampanga then left San Fernando in search of further assistance, whereupon the insurgents returned and set fire to the vessel. The United States gunboat Yorktown arrived here yesterday after bombarding San Fernando. The Saturnus was reported still smoldering and the steamer was a total wreck.
