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## EUROPEANS LEAVE COREA

A Massacre of Foreigners is Apprehended at the Seaports of the Hermit Kingdom.

## JAPANESE IN DISGUISE

Every Steamer From Japan Brings Them By the Score and Russia Naturally Objects.

Tokio, Feb. 4.—The Japanese commercial agent at Vladivostok was notified on Wednesday by the command of the Russian garrison that he might at any time in accordance with orders from St. Petersburg have to proclaim a state of siege. Consequently he desired the agent to make preparations for the eventual departure of Japanese residents. Those wishing to remain shall be ordered to Habarovsk. Japanese official reports confirm marked military activity in Manchuria. Houses have been prepared at Liau Yang and at other places for the accommodation of Russian soldiers. Troops are steadily moving in the direction of Yalu, the Chinese residents of Ying Chou are preparing to fight.

Ministers in Council.  
Tokio, Feb. 4.—Another cabinet meeting took place this morning. The ministers will meet again this afternoon when the Emperor will be present.

Russian Fleet Leaves Port Arthur.  
London, Feb. 4.—The government has been informed that the Russian fleet has left Port Arthur. Its destination is not known. It has been repeatedly reported by the authorities at Peking that in the event of China abandoning Manchuria, the powers would be compelled to safeguard their respective interests in the remaining provinces.

Manchuria once abandoned the revolutionists will raise a revolt at Kwang Tung to expel the Manchus. The Dowager Empress is said to be wavering between the Russian offer of protection and the promises of other powers to support China against aggression. The predominant party is making active preparations to resist Russia and has ordered the enlistment of half a million new troops and the massing of the regiments in the north. The court meanwhile continues preparations for a flight to Sian Fu.

Great Britain Remonstrated With Russia.

London, Feb. 4.—In the House of Commons today, John Morley announced his intention to introduce a fiscal amendment on February 8 to his address in reply to a speech from the throne even if the Premier is absent. Several questions were put with the object of eliciting information regarding the far Eastern situation but without result. Earl Percy, the under secretary of the foreign office, declared that in view of the present state of negotiations between Russia and Japan it would be manifestly improper to make observations on the situation.

He added that the British government had made frequent representations to Russia regarding her delay in evacuating Manchuria.

Massacres Feared.  
St. Petersburg, Feb. 4.—Advices received here from Corea say that the feeling of panic is general there. Depression prevails at all seaports where the massacre of foreigners is apprehended. Europeans are preparing to send their families to Shanghai. Every steamer from Japan conveys many Japanese officers and soldiers disguised and their presence in such numbers is regarded by the Russians as being a secret occupation of Corea. Sixty doctors left St. Petersburg the last few days for Harbin, Manchuria. Will Endeavor to Land at Chemulpo.

London, Feb. 4.—A dispatch to the Central News Agency from Seoul, Corea, says that about 6,000 Russian troops have sailed from Port Arthur and will endeavor to land at Chemulpo the port of Seoul tomorrow.

Hop of Peace Abandoned.  
London, Feb. 4.—A dispatch to Reuters' telegram from Tokio says:

The general impression here is that all hope of peace is gone. The elder statesmen held a conference at which the Emperor was present. It is believed that a mighty decision was reached.

## PRESIDENT ORDONEZ STICKS

The Revolutionists Are Not Advancing on Montevideo, the Uruguayan Capital.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 4.—There is no truth in the reported flight of President Ordonez of Uruguay. Advices from Montevideo say that the city is quiet and that President Ordonez recently made a tour of the city and suburbs to reassure the people. It is denied that the revolutionists are advancing on Montevideo.

## THE WATER SITUATION

Manager Fritchman in Reply to Adjutant General Whiteman's Interview on the Alleged Water Famine in Santa Fe.

The following interview with Adjutant General W. H. Whiteman of this city appeared in Wednesday's issue of the Albuquerque Journal:

"There is absolutely no water in the reservoir, the Rio de Santa Fe is frozen up tight and there is no likelihood of any more water coming into the reservoir until spring. Many of the people are going to the river and chopping ice and taking it home and melting it. The condition is really serious, and something must be done at once or the town will have to depend on what few wells there are in the city limits for water.

"In early fall the water company released what water they had stored and cleaned out the reservoir, and since that time but little has run in. All water motors have ceased running and many of the public houses have had their supply shut off and water for all except domestic use is denied the citizens of the town. For the past several months the water has been shut off for one or two days at a time. The question is what can be done. If Santa Fe should have a serious conflagration the town would burn, as there is not enough pressure in the pipes to furnish even partial protection."

W. H. Fritchman, manager of the Santa Fe Water and Light Company when spoken to concerning the above, said to a New Mexican representative: "It is true that the abundant water supply in the reservoir was let out last November in order to have the reservoir thoroughly cleaned, as it was plain that the water had become foul. This was done in anticipation of the usual snow fall in December and January which had it come, would have been instrumental in again filling the reservoir. As, however, the past three months have been very dry and as no snow whatever has fallen during those months, it has been impracticable to get water into the reservoir. However, at no time during these three months has the water supply been shut off entirely for any one day. It is true the water was shut off between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. at times in order to allow a larger supply to accumulate for the nights. During the cold spell this last week the water in the Santa Fe River a few miles from the town, froze and therefore the current coming to town was greatly reduced, during that time. This has been obviated now as the ice is thawing out on account of the warmer weather and a fair amount of water is coming down the stream; of course, this is not nearly as large as it would be had there been the usual amount of snow fall in the mountains east of town. No one has chopped ice in the river and taken it home in order to get water. The water meters have not been shut off, as you well know, that the water meter in the New Mexican Printing Company's office has been running when needed all this time. The situation here is not worse and no better than it is in most of the other towns and sections of the Territory. This condition of affairs is to be attributed to the extreme dry fall and winter. We are now tapping and conducting to the main pipes the water from several permanent springs in the mountains and are daily increasing the supply of good water for all purposes for the city. We are also figuring on using the seepage and underflow in the upper portion of the Santa Fe River bed and may shortly utilize this by wells and pumping stations. The water situation here is not what I would like to see it, but as said above this town is no worse off than are the other towns and cities situated in the mountainous regions and even in the valleys of some of the large rivers like the Chama and Rio Grande."

Range Cattle to Be Exhibited.  
Washington, Feb. 4.—David R. Francis, president of Louisiana Purchase Exposition, who is in Washington, announced today that all doubts concerning the exhibit of western range cattle at the exposition could be dispelled.

There will be an exhibit in spite of the fact that the managers of the exposition more closely in touch with cattle exhibits have given it out that no attention will be paid to western cattle, it being alleged that the fine breeds were not prevalent enough for an exhibit.

Mr. Francis held a conference with Messrs. Grubb and Carlyle of Colorado this morning, and assured them that at least \$12,000 in premiums will be offered for suitable exhibits of cattle are sent from the west. The Colorado Cattle and Stock Growers' Association is planning to hold a cattle show in Denver to select the Colorado cattle that will be sent to the exposition.

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## THE TRIAL OF EDWARD BUTLER

The Defense Is Making a Strong Effort to Prove an Alibi for the St. Louis Boodler.

Fulton, Feb. 4.—James Cronin, a justice of the peace at St. Louis, formerly a member of the House of Delegates was the first witness today in the trial of Edward Butler. He corroborated the testimony of the four witnesses for the defense who yesterday testified that Butler was not present at the House of Delegates on the night of the passage of the bill, contradicting the testimony given by other delegates for the state yesterday. At the request of Attorney Folk the court adjourned until afternoon to enable the prosecution to secure the attendance of other members of the House who were not of the combine.

The defense closed with the testimony of James J. McDermott who asserted that Tamblin said to him at the jail: "I intend to get Butler into this thing if he don't get me out of jail." Tamblin was a confessed member of the House combine who testified for the prosecution.

Their testimony will be used to refute Butler's and that of other witnesses who are trying to prove an alibi for him.

## A DENIAL BY ARCHBISHOP FARLEY

New York, Feb. 4.—Archbishop Farley of New York called today for Rome. He denied that he intended to represent to the Pope that the banishment of women from church choirs would work a great hardship in this country.

## SIX HOTELS CLOSED.

Mayor of New York Ordered Alterations Made in the Interest of the Public Safety.

New York, Feb. 4.—Mayor McClelland today ordered the closing of six theaters in this city until alterations for safety have been made.

## TILLMAN HEARD AGAIN

The Inquiry Into the Nature of Recess Appointments as It Affects Collector Grum.

## THE MERCHANT MARINE

Representative Morrell Introduces Two Bills to Help It Along and Made a Special Today

Washington, Feb. 4.—The House resumed the consideration of the diplomatic and consular appropriation bill today. The general debate, which was limited to four hours, was begun by Mr. Morrell of Pennsylvania.

Two bills for the development of the American merchant marine have been introduced by Mr. Morrell. One relates to government supplies and the other to general commerce. Mr. Hamlin of Missouri, made an answer to J. Adam Bede's invitation to join the Republican party and "make it unanimous." He prefaced his political speech by declaring that when the Democrats got control of the government as they would at the next election Bede would be the first to join the Democratic party.

Senate.  
Washington, Feb. 4.—Senator Tillman's resolutions making inquiry of the secretary of the treasury concerning the appointment of D. Crum as collector of the port of Charleston, South Carolina and directing the Senate committee on judiciary to make inquiry as to what constitutes a recess appointment to office was taken up today. At suggestion of Senator Hale one of Senator Tillman's resolutions was amended so as to instruct the judiciary committee to report to the Senate what constitutes a recess of the Senate and what the powers of the limitations of the executive are, in making such appointments.

The diplomatic and consular appropriation bill passed the House without an amendment.

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## JUDGE LEWIS IN EARNEST

Nothing Will Be Permitted to Interfere With the Taking Up of the Vindicator Case.

## THE CONSPIRACY TRIAL

It Will Begin on February 16 and in the Meanwhile Bonds of Leaders Are Reduced.

Cripple Creek, Colorado, Feb. 4.—Judge Lewis has reduced the amount of bonds required of the miners' union leaders who were held prisoners by the military authorities while the district was under martial law and they have been released. Their trial on the charge of conspiracy to wreck a train will begin on February 16.

Judge Lewis has said that the Vindicator mine explosion will be taken up immediately after the train wrecking cases have been disposed of and nothing will be permitted to interfere with these trials.

RELEASE UNION LEAD . . . . .  
When Charles G. Kennison, president of union No. 40, was released from jail today he was met at the jail door by 50 of his friends and escorted to the miners' union hall where an informal reception was tendered him, more than 200 men shaking his hand and congratulating him.

In the District Court today the case against George E. Kyner, editor and proprietor of the Victor Record and his reporters and Montype operators was called. Each defendant pleaded not guilty to the charge of criminal libel preferred by Frank Vaneecke and Tom Scanlon, members of the militia, who were referred to in the Record on September 29 as ex-convicts. A jury is being impaneled.

## ARIZONA REPUBLICANS

Will Hold Their Convention at Tucson March 8—185 Delegates—Solid Against Combined Statehood.

The Republican Territorial Convention of Arizona will be held at Tucson on March 8. The basis for representation for this convention will be one delegate for every 50 Republican votes cast for the delegate at the last congressional election. This will give the convention 185 delegates. From the present outlook, the Republicans of Arizona stand solidly for Roosevelt and there is every indication now that the delegation will go to Chicago instructed for Roosevelt. This is great activity among the Democrats and much work is being done in favor of the nomination for the presidency of Congressman W. R. Hearst of New York City. The statehood question is the principal issue in the territory. A mass meeting has been held in every county of Arizona declaring against joint statehood.

## WHOLESALE INDICTMENTS.

Express Agents and Liquor Dealers Charged With Shipping Whiskey Into Prohibition Counties.

Washington, Feb. 4.—Wholesale indictments by the federal jury of express agents and liquor dealers, who have been shipping liquor into prohibition states, are imminent, as the result of a movement started by John W. Yerkes, commissioner of revenue in Washington. For years practically every company in this part of the southwest has acted as the agency for liquor companies selling liquor in the prohibition counties of Kansas and Texas. To avoid the law the whiskey was sent in sealed packages addressed to fictitious names and sold to agents for "express charges."

Three Kansas City liquor dealers were indicted by the federal grand jury sitting in Wichita, Kansas, and the indictments were sent to the office of the United States district attorney here for service.

## CORBETT WILL MEET DAVE SULLIVAN

The Mill Will Come Off Before Yosemite Club at San Francisco—A \$2,500 Forfeit Put Up.

San Francisco, Feb. 4.—Young Corbett has signed articles to meet Dave Sullivan on the last day of the month before the Yosemite Club of this city. Corbett was matched to meet Jimmy Britt on March 15. Hearing of Corbett's action, Britt, however, declared the first match would not go through. Britt posted a \$2,500 forfeit and the agreement does not prohibit Corbett from making a second match before March 15.

## SUCCESS AT FORT BAYARD

Treatment of Tuberculosis at That Military Sanitarium—Outdoor Life, Diet, Exercise Insisted Upon.

Dr. E. D. Fink, formerly stationed at Fort Bayard, where he performed the surgical operations, conducted the physical examinations and treated many cases of consumption, has given out the following interesting account of the life and successful treatment of patients at this military sanitarium for the cure of tuberculosis.

Fort Bayard was originally a military post, but about five years ago it was abandoned as a military station and was then turned into a hospital for the sole treatment of tuberculosis and is at the present time attracting a great deal of attention in that direction.

"There are at present about 270 patients who are soldiers, sailors and members of the United States Marine Corps. As soon as it is found that any one has tuberculosis in one of the above branches of the service, he is sent to Fort Bayard to be treated for the disease.

"Every patient on the day on which he is admitted is given a thorough physical examination and a diagram is drawn of the diseased portion of his lungs. He is then sent to the hospital for a few days to determine whether or not he is able to live in quarters and not directly under the care of a surgeon. Such cases are called "ambulant" and are given the freedom of the post but are not allowed to go into the quarters during the day if the weather is pleasant.

"The life that is led by the patients is one of great regularity. They go to bed at 9 p. m. and get up at 5:30 in the morning, taking breakfast at 8 o'clock. From 6 until 12 they are required to be on the porches or in the sun. Being sent to bed at 1 p. m. in tents they are obliged to leave the flaps up and remain perfectly quiet for three hours. They then put on their clothes and wander about on the reservation.

"They take dinner at 6 p. m. and until bed time they are in the reading and billiard rooms. The diet is of a wholesome and nutritious character; milk and eggs forming the major portion. To prevent any bolting of food the patients are required to stay in the mess hall at least twenty minutes.

"The temperature of all 'ambulant' patients is taken twice a day and if found to be above 99 degrees they are at once put to bed in the hospital and required to remain there for several days or until the temperature becomes normal. It is found that those in the first stages of the disease will run a temperature if allowed too much exercise. Perfect rest and quiet in bed is the surest means of reducing it.

"Horseback riding is forbidden as a great number have had hemorrhages while so indulging. Each patient has a thorough examination every two months and a chart made so that it is possible to tell the exact degree of improvement in each individual case. Weights are taken once a week and if the patient is found to be losing he is put to bed or confined to the porch of the hospital; during this time he is on a special diet.

"The number of cases treated during the year ending July 1, 1903, were 506. The number of cases improved were 281. Those improved showed a decrease in the lung tissues involved; those in which the disease had simply become arrested were classed as unimproved.

"The secret of the great success achieved at Fort Bayard lies in New Mexico's unexcelled climate, the fact that the fort is a military institution, that the patients are compelled to obey all instructions and in the fact that repeated examinations are made in each case renders it easy to determine what is necessary in each instance.

"The hospital is at present being rebuilt, cold storage and electric light plants are being installed and a laboratory costing \$5,000 is being added and equipped with everything known to science. Solariums are being erected where patients will be required to take sun baths and in fact everything now used in the treatment of tuberculosis will be added for the cure and comfort of all of those entitled to be admitted to this institution."

Annapolis, Md., Feb. 4.—In the Maryland legislature today Isadore Rayner of Baltimore, nominated last night by a joint Democratic caucus, receiving the unanimous vote of the Democratic majority, was elected United States Senator to succeed L. E. McComas.

## MURDERED FOR MONEY

Another Killing Mystery Added to Those Which Are Being Investigated in Chaves County.

## Y. RUBIO THE VICTIM

Shot in the Head and Then Robbed of His Valuables—Body Found After Ten Days.

A dispatch from Roswell says that the body of a man was found on Thursday of last week in the Eighteen Mile Draw about 20 miles southwest of the city. The Roswell authorities were not notified until Tuesday, the news being brought by a party of men who were en route from Hope. The man was identified as Ygnacio Rubio, the son of a prosperous Lincoln County rancher. The deceased had been shot in the left arm and in the back of the head, the last bullet coming out of his mouth. The man had been dead at least ten days when found. Robbery was the cause of the crime as Rubio's pockets had been turned inside out and all valuables taken out of them.

## TORNADO STRIKES RENO.

Wan Hoo Hotel Collapsed and Large Stone Building Torn From Foundations.

Reno, Nevada, Feb. 4.—A tornado struck east Reno this morning at 6:45 cutting a swath through the town. A large stone building 22 feet high was torn from its foundations and its walls crushed together in a mass of broken timbers. The Wan Hoo Hotel was lifted up and blown eastward, and collapsed in utter ruin. Many other structures were damaged. No injuries are reported.

## IMPOSSIBLE TO SECURE JURY

For the Trial of Chauncey Dewey and Two Cowboys Charged With Killing the Berry Family.

Norton, Kansas, Feb. 4.—The belief is expressed that it will be impossible to obtain a jury in this county for the trial of Chauncey Dewey and his two cowboys charged with the murder of the Berry family.

## THE MICHIGAN BLIZZARD.

It Spent Its Force After Delaying Traffic on the Railroads and the Weather is Moderating.

Grand Rapids, Feb. 4.—The blizzard that played havoc with railroad traffic in western Michigan, during the last 24 hours, has ceased and the weather is moderating.

## HAVE QUIT WORK.

On Account of Reduction in Wages 900 Workers of American Can Company Go on Strike.

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Nine hundred workers at the Norton branch of the American Can Company quit work today because of a 10 per cent cut in wages.

## OFFICIAL MATTERS

Hearing on Requisition Papers From the State of Colorado.

In the matter of the requisition papers from the Governor of Colorado to Governor M. A. Otero in the case of Aramando Trujillo of Lumberton, Rio Arriba County, charged with embezzlement in the state of Colorado, Governor Otero, being absent, a hearing was had this morning before Solicitor General E. L. Bartlett upon the law and the facts. The proceedings were taken down and together with the affidavits were filed and held for the action of the Governor. Each side was given one week from today in which to file briefs upon the law in the case. The state of Colorado was represented by Charles R. Johnson of Durango, A. R. Molette of Pagosa Springs and J. H. Christ of Lumberton represented Trujillo in resisting the requisition.

Certified Articles of Incorporation.  
The following certified articles of incorporation were filed today in the office of the territorial secretary: The Santa Fe Mining and Reduction Company of Arizona, principal places of business Phoenix, Arizona, and Chicago, Illinois. The incorporators and directors are William W. Ingersoll, J. C. Ingersoll, R. G. Ingersoll, J. Witham Norton and Joseph M. Manley. The company is incorporated for 50 years and is organized for the purpose of mining, dealing in real estate, manufacturing and mercantile business. The company is incorporated for \$500,000, divided into 500,000 shares of the par value of \$1 each. Santa Fe was designated as the principal place of business in New Mexico and William W. Ingersoll as New Mexico agent.

## A SUGGESTION TO THE NEW MEXICO BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION.

The indications are that the rush of visitors to the St. Louis World's Fair during the coming summer and fall will be very great and that many of the visitors from the east will have time and means to come farther west and spend a week or longer in the Rocky Mountain states and territories. The New Mexican board of managers of the St. Louis Exposition should try to procure low rates and stop-over privileges to induce a portion of these tourists to visit the Sunshine Territory. This can be accomplished in a great measure and if a few thousand of these people can be brought to New Mexico during the coming summer and fall even for a few days, it will mean a great advertisement and do the Territory much good. A similar plan has been already broached in Colorado and they are at work in that state in that direction. The following editorial upon this matter from the Colorado Springs Gazette is in point, timely and applies with still stronger force to New Mexico:

"A commendable effort is being made by various public bodies of the state to secure reduced rates to Colorado from the exposition city during the World's Fair season.

"Without doubt the usual low rate from the east to the Rocky Mountain region will be granted, and this year it is understood that a stop over of ten days or two weeks at St. Louis will be permitted. What is needed and what ought to be urged upon the railroads and passenger associations is a low rate from St. Louis to Colorado and return.

"This will be very useful and is absolutely necessary to supplement the advertising work which is to be done at the fair in behalf of this Rocky Mountain country. When people have been induced to turn their attention to Colorado, reduced railroad rates ought to be in vogue to make it profitable and possible for them to come west. It is quite likely that many people will be undecided about the matter until they conclude their sojourn in St. Louis. If then they are given cheap rates undoubtedly hundreds and thousands of them will be glad to leave the heat and bustle of the fair for a sojourn of a few weeks in Colorado. This is a matter of vital importance in the consideration of next summer's tourist business."

## MORE LIGHT SHOULD BE HAD UPON THIS CASE.

The San Marcial Bee in a recent issue contained the following rather interesting item:

"Of the \$18,000 paid over to the county by Abner Abeyta's bondsmen, \$1,500 were donated by Chairman Greenwald to one of his Democratic lawyer friends without any adequate return. This amount went into the pocket of Attorney H. B. Ferguson for nothing more than drawing up the indictment against Abner Abeyta for the embezzlement of county funds. Then Mr. Abeyta's attorney, H. M. Dougherty, readily discovered that the indictment was faulty, with the prospect of no further attempt being made to convict the ex-county treasurer for his official shortcomings."

A little more explanation of this case would be rather interesting, not only to the people of Socorro County, but to those of the Territory as well. Paying \$1,500 for the drafting of an indictment against a defaulting county official is rather a high price. What is there to this case anyway?

Clarke of Arkansas is away ahead of his party, but abreast of modern times and the opinions of a vast majority of the people of the United States on the Panama Canal question and the course of the administration thereon. In the Senate on Tuesday last, he strongly and earnestly, in an able speech of two hours duration, approved the position of the President and of the administration in the question and stated that he would vote for the ratification of the treaty. Had the Democratic party more prominent men of the stamp of Senator Clarke in its ranks and in the Congress of the United States, it would have a much better chance for success at the polls this year.

The people of New Mexico want to govern themselves, but they have no desire to govern Arizona. This is very clear and newspaper bunkum and editorial rhapsody cannot change the situation and indeed, do not change it. This paper has been a consistent and strong advocate for single statehood for New Mexico for 40 years and does not propose to give up the fight at this time. If the proposition of single statehood is to be beaten, let it be so, after a manly and strenuous fight. No giving in now. There is no doubt in the minds of those well posted that this opinion is held by five-sixths of the people of the Territory, especially by Republicans. Let the good fight go on.

Congressman W. R. Hearst, Democratic candidate for the presidency, thinks that Judge Parker is a very good judge and should remain on the bench in New York. The judge is of the opinion that Mr. Hearst will make an ideal Congressman and should remain in his present position for some years to come. The views of these two eminent gentlemen are acceptable to the people of the country, who do not at all wish to see them advanced in national politics.

Reports come from Atlanta, Georgia, that the Republican party in that state has been split wide open. Generally speaking, people didn't know that there was any such thing as a Republican party in that state. The election returns do not show its existence. But then right here it should be remembered that the election returns of the southern states are very much doctored.

The Santa Fe Railway should build a new and commodious brick depot in this city. Such structure should be on Montezuma Avenue and nearer to town. It would increase business for the road and prove a desirable improvement on the south side of the river. The cost would be money well and wisely spent.

Between the upper mill stone of the city council and nether mill stone of the city board of education, the Fort Marcy Reservation donation is likely to be ground very fine and probably too fine for the good of this city. It is not at all a gratifying state of affairs that exists in this matter.

The constitution of the new state of Panama seems to be all right. It contains an article providing that in case of trouble, the United States may interfere for the protection of the people. This is very nice indeed, and will save Panama much money for the support of an army and navy.

The report that within a short time 10,000 Colombian troops will be dispatched to the Isthmus of Panama to overcome the new republic is important if true. But as the chances are ninety-nine to one that it is not true, it need not worry any one to any alarming extent.

The United States is selling a good deal of flour and much canned beef to Russia and Japan for the use of their armies and navies. Come one, come all and Uncle Sam will treat you fairly. He has plenty of flour and beef to sell and will not over charge you.

The anti-imperialists claim that there is a serious anti-Roosevelt movement in the country. Outside of themselves, no one has been able to discover this movement, however. It seems to be suffering from paralysis.

The Washington Post remarks: "One peculiarity of our laws is that the technicalities all seem to be on the side of the accused." That's right and that is what legal technicalities are for.

From the far East comes the news that China is waking up. High time. The Chinese Empire has been asleep for about six thousand years.

## MINES AND MILLS.

The demand for ores containing uranium has increased materially of late, because of the fact that these ores are radio-active minerals. Uranium ores are in color a shade of light green or yellow and dark brown and black. They are not reduced when heated with carbonate of soda. There are three more important of the uranium minerals, viz: Uraninite or pitch blende, this mineral having come into much prominence because from it has been extracted that most wonderful of all the elements, radium. There is an increasing demand for uranium in the manufacture of ferro-uranium alloys and also for uses in salts of the metal. In 1902 the production of uranium ores amounted to about 800 tons, and most of which was shipped abroad for treatment. The important uranium ores are uraninite or pitch blende, uranum oxide. This mineral occurs in crystals also massive. In color it is grayish, brownish and velvet black streak, a specific gravity, very high, 9.2, and in hardness is 5.5, therefore a knife blade can make no scratch. It occurs in Connecticut in half a dozen localities, but sparingly. In Colorado near Central City it has been found in connection with other uranium minerals and it is said that in 1872 a mine in Central City produced several tons of the mineral that sold in England at \$1.50 per pound, and when first mined was regarded as of no value. Bohemia has supplied for years the larger part of uraninite mined in the world. Torbernite is another uranium mineral, occurs in square tablets thinly foliated and usually is found attached in thin, small layers to surface rock. In color it is grass green and pearly luster. Its hardness is 2-2.5 and specific gravity 3.6. It is a uranium copper phosphate. One of the chief means of identifying this mineral is in its square, tabular form of crystal, bright green usually in color. It occurs with other uranium and with silver and tin ores. Cornwall produces the most of this mineral and Bohemia follows. In the United States it has been found in South Dakota, Colorado, Utah and North Carolina. Autunite is very similar to torbernite and frequently occurs with it, but in bright citron color crystals. It is an uranium calcium phosphate. Gravity 3.3. It is found mainly in France and in the United States chiefly in South Dakota and North Carolina.

Three processes of separating the zinc from the iron ore are at present in use in southwestern Wisconsin. The Mineral Point works, of Mineral Point, Wisconsin, the property of the New Jersey Zinc Company, is one of the few plants in the country where what is known as the "contact process" of manufacturing sulphuric acid is employed. This process minimizes the cost of the acid and allows the use of mixed ore. The fumes were formerly confined in lead-lined rooms, about 20 cubic feet of space being required per pound of sulphur burned per hour. By the new process these chambers are discarded, and other improvements have been made. The result is that the Mineral Point works are now able to treat a grade of ore that they formerly refused to buy. The roasting process, which is the second means of separation in use, is one that has lately been widely applied in Colorado. It consists of roasting the ore until the iron becomes magnetic and then picking it out with magnets. The third process, which was likewise developed in Colorado, is an application of the principles of static electricity to the concentration of ores. The direct effect is the opposite of that produced by the magnets in the roasting process, for the electricity repels the zinc instead of magnetizing the iron, but the process results, in both cases, in the separation of the minerals in the ore. The electrical method is simpler and cheaper. The expense of roasting the ore, which amounts to about one dollar per ton, is saved. In addition to the zinc blende, an iron sulphide is also obtained, which is sold to the manufacturers of sulphuric acid, so that the process thus affords a valuable by-product.

G. W. Delano, Franklin Warner, W. L. Dusenberry and H. S. Farley, last week examined the cement placer gold fields of the Interstate Placer Mining Company at Golden, southern Santa Fe County. Several men are at work sinking shafts to bedrock to test the gold values of the cement from grass roots to bedrock. If the cement proves rich enough extensive works are to be erected. Several men are opening new ground at the San Lazarus near Golden. A cyanide mill is to be erected. Fair wages are being made by the placer diggers near Golden who recover the gold by dry washing. T. P. White is working his gold ore properties near Golden and the Argo Mining Company has a force of men employed on the Hazelton group. A lead has been uncovered on the 400 foot level. The contractor in the old copper mine still keeps a force of men running a turnmill under a contract with the Santa Fe Gold and Copper Company.

The Las Vegas Optic says: "The new coal mine in Gallinas Canon opens up well. Several men are at work and a diamond drill is being employed."

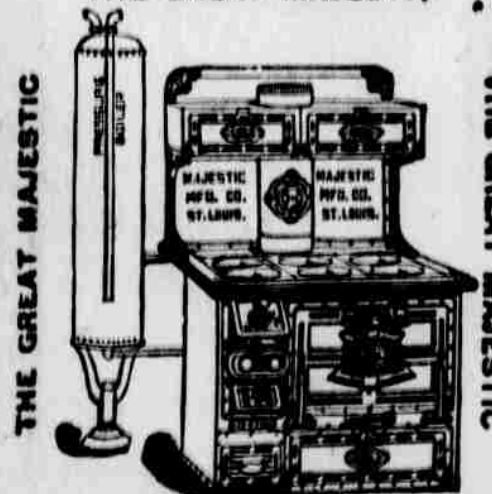

The train from the south was an hour late this noon, owing to the fact that ties are being unloaded between Lamy and Santa Fe.

The Ladies Aid Society of the Presbyterian Church will meet tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the home of Mrs. David Knapp.

The trains from the east were several hours late last evening. The Denver & Rio Grande train was also an hour late last evening.

Frank Toner of Denver, has accepted a position as stenographer and bookkeeper in the office of the Sunmount Tent City and commenced work today.

Work was started this morning on the construction of a vitrified brick sidewalk in front of J. S. Candelario's Old Curio Store on San Francisco Street.

A proposed meeting of the Roosevelt Club announced for tonight, has been postponed on account of a misunderstanding regarding the place of meeting. Notice of future meetings will be given.

The parents of the insane man, Ben Trimblin, who is confined in the jail at Albuquerque, are too poor to take care of him. It is probable that he will become a ward of the Territory and be removed to the asylum at Las Vegas.

The amount of mail delivered and collected by the letter carriers is much heavier than had been anticipated at first. It is quite convenient to the public to be relieved of going or sending to the postoffice to mail letters or to get mail.

### RESERVOIR SITE.

White Rock Canon, West of Santa Fe, Admirably Adapted for Such a Purpose.

Several years ago a company of Boston capitalists, seeking investments in the southwest and believing in the future of irrigated farms in New Mexico, came to this Territory and with engineers, made a careful search up and down the Rio Grande for the best site to build a great irrigation reservoir in which to store the flood waters of spring and summer. Their engineers were the best in the United States and after weeks of careful surveying and inspection in which they traveled the length of the great valley in New Mexico, they selected the White Rock Canon, 20 miles west of Santa Fe, as the best site in New Mexico for the storage reservoir they had in mind and which was almost as large as those now under construction by the government in Arizona and California. The company undertook to carry out a million dollars proposition with thousands and of course it failed. The funds were exhausted, even before construction had begun and the project was allowed to die, but the surveys remained and they show this site to be the best, or at least the equal of any of the sites, which the government engineers of the reclamation service have pronounced feasible within the past few months. The government engineers, too, have inspected the White Rock Canon casually lately and have found it adapted for reservoir purposes. It is considered one of the places in New Mexico where a storage reservoir will ultimately be built, but it is far from being first on the list. It is shown that a more favorable site for a storage reservoir could not be found and that the dam at White Rock would irrigate hundreds and thousands of acres of the richest land in the world. It is pointed out that the dam at White Rock would bring all the great mesa east of Albuquerque under irrigation, turning that vast stretch of country into a garden and the value to the valley south of Cochiti would be incalculable. It would make that whole section of the valley and the uplands that surround it, one of the great farming sections of the west.

The matter has been brought before the Albuquerque Commercial Club which has determined to take it up at once, using all its efforts in securing some consideration of the White Rock site immediately.

## STEAM HEAT AT INDIAN SCHOOL

Plant to Be Installed as Soon as Necessary Material Arrives. Cost \$12,000.

St. John & Barnes of Colorado Springs, who have been awarded the contract, for the erection of a high pressure steam heating plant at the United States Indian Industrial School, the contract price being \$12,000, and the time allowed for completing the plant being 90 days, commenced work on the plant yesterday. A boiler room 34 feet by 52 feet will be built 100 feet from the main building to contain two boilers of 85 horse power each. The material for the heating apparatus, radiators, pipes, boilers, etc., has been shipped from Chicago and is expected to arrive in the course of a few days. The brick for the boiler building will be purchased from local dealers. Twelve men will be employed on the work for at least two and a half months. The plant will heat the following buildings: Main building, including boys' and girls' dormitory and office, school house, shop or trades building, employees' building and hospital, covering 10,000 feet of radiation.

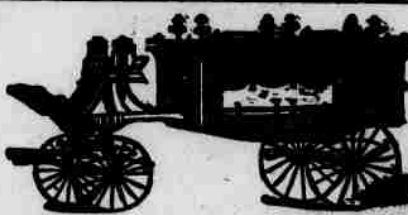
