ROTTEN EGGS IN POLITICS COME HIGH.

There are many funny phases of politics in the Solid South. The one recorded in the following editorial from the New York Evening Sun is very interesting and worthy of perusal. It proves that eggs, especially rotten one, are held at a very high price there and further shows rather conclusively that railroad companies are bound by law to protect passengers at their stations or in their cars as much as possible from injury and insult. The Sun says as follows:

"The Supreme Court of North Carolina has just decided that it costs \$300 to throw a bad egg at a candidate for office if the egg hits him—no reduction for a dozen or more. Mr. Henry F. Seawell is the lucky man. His bill for the unsalable eggs is \$4,500—that is to say, he has recovered judgment in that amount against a railroad company whose employees pelted him on the station platform. In 1900 Mr. Seawell was the Populist candidate for Governor in North Carolina and visited the town of Shelby as a substitute for Senator Marion Butler, who was killed for a speech. Mr. Seawell did very well; in fact, his remarks about the methods of the Democratic party in North Carolina were so frank and scathing that some of the Democrats present tried to break up the meeting. Mr. Seawell shook his fist at them, and called them rowdies. He finished his speech with proud defiance and made haste to shake the dust of Shelby from his feet.

"Mr. Seawell was followed to the railroad station by a crowd of political opponents, who commented freely on his attire, which consisted of a high silk hat, a black frock coat, a white vest, doekin trousers and patent leather shoes. The Populist candidate for Governor, although a fanatical free silver man, carried a gold-headed cane which was a thing of beauty. He was not molested until he reached the station. Fortunately for the orator, the train was not due. Swinging his cane, he began a promenade up and down the platform, with a fine assumption of indifference to the taunts and billingsgate of the Democracy of Shelby. It was not content to hurl words at him. They were not strong enough. As the Populist turned gracefully on his heel a discarded cold-storage egg struck the lapel of his coat and burst on his manly bosom. Before he could protest or escape, another hit him amidships; a third spoiled the sheen of his hat, and before the bombardment ceased Mr. Seawell's fine raiment was yellow with age and he was unfit for human society. Witnesses counted fifteen palpable hits, and while it was no joking matter for the Populist candidate for Governor at the time, they were quite enough for the railroad company, on whose premises the Shelby Democrats thus recorded their opinion of Mr. Seawell as a public man. The candidate had detected several railroad men in the act of making a target and he brought suit against the company. In the Superior Court he obtained a judgment, and it has now been affirmed by the Supreme Court, which consists of Democrats. The Supreme Court in its opinion intimated that \$300 an egg was not high under the circumstances."

Dispatches are being sent out from Washington telling the dear people of New Mexico and Arizona what a good thing combined statehood for them would be, what a great state they would have and so on and so forth. This will not have the desired effect, however. The people of this Territory and of Arizona understand the situation very well and certainly have a better and more correct knowledge of it than have the members of the senatorial cabal in Washington, who are trying to make the people give up their just rights. This kind of trickery is too thin and too flimsy to work.

In addition to Senator Burton, Kansas now has another sensation. The skeleton of an animal with two sets of horns has just been found in the Sunflower State. Anything to keep before the public.

OVERSTOCKING THE PUBLIC RANGE.

The question of the use of the public range in the western states and territories by cattle raisers and sheep growers is becoming grave and important and must soon be considered by the federal government. In many parts of the west there exists overstocking of ranges. This is bad for all concerned, the public as well as the owners of stock. The matter of leasing was discussed some time ago and was dropped as impracticable. It is now proposed to put the public range and its uses under federal supervision. The Denver Republican in discussing the subject says that live stock growers throughout the range region are seriously considering the problem presented by overstocking the range, and especially by the conflicts which from time to time occur between sheep men and cattle growers.

Several years ago it was suggested that the solution lay in leasing parts of the range to owners of sheep or cattle. But to this strong objection was made, especially by owners of small flocks or herds. The latter feared that under any kind of leasing system they would be placed at a disadvantage, and that in a short time the entire range would be absorbed by a few powerful companies or associations.

Practically all attempts to adopt a leasing system have been abandoned, but still the fact remains that the range is overcrowded and that there is danger in some localities of its destruction.

This has suggested in turn that a plan be devised for direct control of the range by government officials. Just how this would be done is more or less uncertain as yet, but it seems that control of some kind is essential.

There is no question that the government would be entirely justified in stepping in and exercising its authority to prevent that overstocking which has already worked much injury in some places. The range belongs to the public; but all public interests are under control of the government, and when it appears that injudicious use may work an injury it is proper for the government to assert its authority. It is improbable that much objection would be made by livestock men to the exercise of such control, provided it were done under conditions that would protect all men in their rights. This is a matter of detail to be worked out after it has been determined that the authorities in Washington should step in.

DON'T GIVE UP THE FIGHT.

No man can truly foretell what will happen in the second session of the Fifty-eighth Congress nor what the Fifty-ninth Congress will do. The actions of these legislative bodies will depend vastly upon the outcome of this year's elections. It is therefore not a sensible political move to assume that there is no chance for the passage of a bill during the second session of the Fifty-eighth Congress granting single statehood to New Mexico and Arizona. If the people of this Territory were to give good Republican majorities on election day in November, and if the voters of Arizona were to do likewise this would certainly change the situation. This can and will be done by proper, energetic and efficient work. To give up now to combined statehood would be entirely premature and would be to undo absolutely the work done for these many years for single statehood for New Mexico. Five-sixths of the people of this Territory and nine-tenths of the people of Arizona do not propose to adopt this course. This is not final, but is certainly the situation at this time.

The National Republican Editorial Association which met in Washington last week by unanimous and rising vote endorsed President Roosevelt for nomination as the Republican standard bearer in this year's campaign. Charles S. Francis, editor of the Troy, New York, Times, offered the resolution. The association also pledged its best efforts and those of its individual members towards that object. Pointers like this show that the Roosevelt strength is constantly increasing.

With cotton hovering in the vicinity of fifteen and sixteen cents per pound cotton growing should certainly prove profitable in the southern part of the Territory. The New Mexican, therefore, is gratified to notice that cotton planting on a fair scale is to be inaugurated in Eddy County during the coming season. An acreage which will produce between 1,500 and 2,000 bales is to be planted. The result will be watched with great interest.

Taking into consideration such fearful catastrophes as the recent Iroquois theater fire and great loss of life, and Sunday's and yesterday's gigantic destruction of property by the flames in Baltimore, it does seem no matter what one may say, that "there is a destiny that shapes our ends."

Senator Foraker's bill to amend the federal anti-trust laws may not have been introduced for the benefit of the trusts, but many people believe this to be the case, nevertheless. The Senator, however, says in due course of time he will convince the people that his trust measure is all right. Hope so.

The chairman of the Democratic National Committee, former Senator James K. Jones calls the Democratic Governor of Arkansas a "disgraceful creature." Seems to know him.

Mr. Bryan may have been improved considerably by his European trip, but the Cleveland faction of the Democratic party evidently does not think so.



RAILROAD SHOPS TO BE REBUILT





Santa Fe, N. M., Feb. 8, 1904.

The past fall and winter in New Mexico have been the driest experienced for many years. During the past winter the snowfall has been very light over the plains country, and usually evaporated almost as soon as fallen. In the mountains the fall also has been very light, and but little of that has found its way to the streams, which carry far less water than is usual at this season. Unless heavy snow comes between now and spring in the mountains the water supply will be very short at the opening of the spring season.

At the end of January there was practically no snow lying on the ground in the valleys or on the plains, and in the mountains at the headwaters of the Canadian, Pecos and the streams tributary to the Rio Grande, there was about an average of from three to twenty inches above an altitude of 12,000 feet. Even at the higher altitudes the south side was generally bare. In the southern and southwestern mountains the fall also has been much less than usual. On the highest mountains at the headwaters of the Gila, Mimbres and San Francisco Rivers there was three to twelve inches on the northern sides, while in the valleys there was practically none. The most favored locality in the Territory is the extreme northeast, where a heavy snow fell on January 30.

Reports show that up to the present time stock has watered very well; the drought being offset, in a great measure, by the absence of severe weather.

The following remarks are extracted from the reports of correspondents:

Gila Watershed.
 Cliff—Thomas F. Meagher, Jr.—Snow on the ground considerably less in the mountains than at this time last year. Silver City—R. C. McClure.—A good snowfall the night of February 5.

Canadian Watershed.
 Aurora—J. C. Lucero—The driest winter experienced in a 25 years' residence here. Elizabethtown—George E. Beebe—Less snow and the mildest winter ever known here. Rayado—Sofia R. Abreu—The driest winter on record here. Folsom—J. M. Martinez.—Cattle and sheep have wintered finely in this section. Have had little water but plenty of grass. A good snow on the 30th of January. Good prospects for spring. Miera—Francisco Miera—Very dry, and no snow to date since last June. Chacon—E. M. Lucero—Scarcely any snow during the winter, the weather being dry and windy. Cleveland—Daniel Cassidy—Ranges very dry; nearly all streams frozen over. Driest winter in past 23 years. Halls Peak—F. E. Franklin—Has been very dry. Two or three light snows; heaviest about two inches in valleys and about four in the mountains. Mora—Z. D. Longuevan—Only two very light snows this winter, and these disappeared almost as soon as fallen. Ocate—N. Well—Very cold

but no snow. So far stock is in good condition.

Pecos Watershed.
 Fulton—F. W. Shuckhart—Light fall of snow on the 25th, but it is nearly all gone. Glorieta—R. J. Ewing—No snow except above altitude of about 12,000 feet, where there is from 4 to 5 inches on the north side. Mineral Hill—A. G. Adams—So far no snow to speak of this winter. Tecolote—Simon Lopez—About 12 inches in the mountains recently which is of the greatest benefit to sheepmen.

Sacramento Mountains.
 Elk—Bernard Cleve—High winds and dry weather. White Oaks—John A. Brown—About an inch and a half on the 25th of January, and about an inch on the 26th, but it soon went off, excepting on north sides. La Luz—Ernest S. Swift—Only about a quarter inch of snow this winter—about ten days ago—and this was the only moisture since last September. Mescalero—James A. Carroll—Very dry winter; snowfall light to date. Tularosa—John A. Shryock—Very light snowfall in the mountains, and only one light one in the valley. Very dry and cold for this part of the country.

San Juan Watershed.
 Cedar Hill—F. W. Sharp—Driest winter for years; roads are as dusty as in September. La Plata—Ella Earle—Very dry; no rain or snow in months. Rosa—B. A. Candelario—Only about an inch of snow all winter.
Rio Grande Watershed.
 Park View—Edward J. Nills—Driest winter for years. Ojo Caliente—Antonio Joseph—No snow in the mountains.

GENERAL WOOD APPRECIATES THE COMPLIMENT

After his escape he burglarized the ranch house of T. M. Spence, who lives near Alamogordo, taking a rope, a blanket, a Winchester rifle belonging to John Hobson and a cartridge belt belonging to William Pellman. He was overtaken by Deputy Sheriff James Green but was not captured until he made a dash of five miles with Green in hot pursuit. He was again landed in jail on Thursday night of last week.

STRIKE IN THE CHICAGO UNION STOCK YARDS.
Chicago, Feb. 9.—Four hundred members of the stable employes union at the Union Stock Yards went on a strike today because their demands for an increase in wages were refused.

MYSTERIOUS DEATH

Unknown Man Picked Up Near Railroad Track in Unconscious Condition—Died at Watrous.

An unknown man died at Watrous last week under peculiar circumstances. When first seen in Watrous he stepped from a north bound freight train to get something to eat. Nothing further was heard or seen of him until he was brought back to Watrous from Shoemaker in an unconscious condition. It seems that he had stepped off the train at Shoemaker and had acted queerly for a couple of days, after which he was picked up near the railroad tracks in a dying condition and sent to Watrous where he died.
