PANIC STRICKEN.

Death of President of Santo Domingo May Cause Revolution.

Peace Congress Closing up the Business of the Meeting.

Brickmakers' Strike in Chicago Likely to Cause a General Strike.

FOUR NEGROES HANGED AT BALTIMORE.

Cape Haytien, July 28.—The funeral of President Henrion took place at 5 o'clock last evening in Santiago la Cabeleros. The population was panic stricken, but there was no disorder. A report has been received here that the government of the Dominican Republic has been overthrown.

The news of the death of the president was hardly credited by the people generally until last evening, when an official confirmation was received. There was great rejoicing among the Dominican exiles, many of whom live around Cape Haytien. Those exiles who were driven out of their country by Henrion are preparing to arm and enter Santo Domingo, where they expect their chief, Don Juan Isidoro Jimenez, to join them.

HISTORY OF THE ASSASSIN.

New York, July 28.—The Times says: Ramon Caceres, the murderer of President Henrion, of Santo Domingo, is about 25 years of age and connected with one of the richest families in the republic. He is a graduate of the Reims Polytechnic Institute, of Troy, N. Y. While residing in Troy he married Little, the wealthy adopted daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Hakes. Caceres converted his wife's property into cash. He often said that as soon as opportunity offered he would go to Santo Domingo and inaugurate a revolution. He started on his mission a few weeks ago, leaving Mrs. Caceres here. Friends of Caceres are confident that he took precautions to insure his escape.

TO PROTECT AMERICANS.

Washington, July 28.—A naval vessel is to be sent immediately to Santo Domingo on request of Secretary Hay. The Maclaine now at San Juan, Porto Rico, only a day's run from Santo Domingo, will proceed to that island. This is a measure of precaution rather than of necessity at present, for Minister Powell has not suggested any such action.

CHICAGO STRIKE.

Brickmakers' Strike May Cause a General Walkout in Building Circles.

Chicago, July 28.—Officials of organized labor state that the brickmakers' strike is likely to precipitate a general walkout in the city. Committees from the brickmakers' alliance to-day invaded buildings in various stages of construction and where non-union brick was being used ordered the men to cease work. The brickmakers demand not only an increase of wages but recognition of the Brickmakers' union. Employers against whom the movement is directed profess a stolid front of indifference. What success the strikers will have in their efforts to call out other branches of the building trades will not be determined until the various unions hold meetings to consider the matter.

Death of Army Surgeon.

Washington, July 28.—Surgeon General Sternberg has received the following from Major O'Reilly, at Havana: "Acting Assistant Surgeon John V. Hamilton died at Matanzas on the 26th of uremia chronic nephritis."

Surgeon Hamilton was appointed from

Durant, Miss., and has been in service one year.

PEACE CONGRESS.

Delegates Ready to Sign Final Acts of the Conference.

The Hague, July 28.—The committee charged with drafting the final acts of the conference met this morning with all of the principal delegates in attendance. An impossibility was admitted of arriving at an immediate understanding in regard to the form in which the powers not signing the convention might adhere to the decisions of the conference. The committee decided to accept the proposal of M. Bourgeois, of the French delegation, that this question be left to be settled by subsequent negotiations and the arbitration convention remain open pending the settlement of the form of adhesion. The plenary committee met this afternoon for final acceptance of the arbitration convention with preamble. The signatures will be appended to-morrow.

OFFICIAL REPORT.

Details of the Capture of the City of Calamba.

Cable Being Laid at Manila to Follow Advance of Army.

American Physicians Have Conquered Yellow Fever in Cuba.

APPEAL FOR DEWEY FUND.

Washington, July 28.—The war department this morning received the first official report of the capture of Calamba, in the following cablegram from General Otis: "Hall, with 1,000 men, captured Calamba, an important strategic position on Laguna de Bay, yesterday, driving out 300 insurgents. The command was composed of portions of the Fourth cavalry, Twenty-first infantry and Washington volunteers, transported in launches and caissons, a gunboat accompanying. Casualties: Privates Charles Glosopp, Fourth, and McHenry, Company H, Twenty-first regiment, killed. Corporal Thomas Tietjen, Company G, Fourth, mortally wounded. Privates Michael Sheridan, Herbert Tracey, Napoleon White, Company K, Twenty-first regiment, seriously wounded. Privates Hinds and Plummer, Company G, and Sanson, Company C, Fourth, mortally wounded. Private H. C. Cristie and Hollister, Company H, and Ashland, Company C, Twenty-first regiment, slightly wounded. Insurgent casualties unknown. Forty Spanish prisoners were released. A Spanish gunboat in good condition, long sought for in the bay, was captured. This town directed the objective movement of Lawton when he captured Santa Cruz and launched in April, but he was unable to reach the town by boat on account of the shoal water."

Laying Cable From Manila.

Manila, July 28.—In compliance with an order received from Madrid, the Spanish transport Alva will proceed from Manila immediately to the Caroline Islands in order to re-embark the garrison and inhabitants of those islands. There is great interest in the first attempt of a cable boat to follow the movements of the army. The boat left Taguay, near Taguay, at the north end of Laguna de Bay, this morning after making connection with the land wire, and successfully laid eighteen miles of cable. It is expected the cable boat will reach Calamba to-night.

Yellow Fever Conquered.

Washington, July 28.—The war department has received the following from General Brooke at Havana regarding the yellow fever situation: General Wood reports on the 26th that no more cases are reported among the troops or government employees. The sanitary conditions are excellent. Intensely hot weather. I think it safe to consider the present epidemic over.

Dewey Fund.

Washington, July 28.—The Dewey home fund committee has issued an appeal for additional contributions. The fund will be closed before the arrival of Dewey in September. The amount now in sight is only \$21,700.

Enlistment of Volunteers for Service in the Philippine War.

Troops Have Stopped Outrages in the City of Cleveland.

Island of Hawaii Enveloped in Smoke From Volcanic Eruption.

SAMOA IN A DISTURBED CONDITION.

Enlistment for the Thirty-fourth Volunteer Infantry goes on steadily at the local office. Several applicants put down their names to-day. Some Albuquerque boys anxious to see the world are willing to eat Uncle Sam's rations and wear the uniform of the great republic, and they will be given a chance. Mr. Max Luna, will return to-night and he will no doubt have matters considerably to recommend his quota. Reports from Fort Logan state that the Thirty-fourth is filling up rapidly, as are all of the new regiments all over the country.

W. J. Brodie and P. M. Colas, two of

the recruits, will be sent to Fort Logan this evening. The other recruits will undoubtedly get away for Fort Logan tomorrow night, and W. C. Simpson has promised to write an occasional letter to THE CITIZEN giving all the news about camp life and fighting the Filipinos.
