RAILROAD TRUST.

Removed Consolidation of Four
Trans-Continental Lines.

Strikers Gaining Strength on the
Brooklyn Metropolitan Roads.

Kidnappers at Nogales Relieved Arizona
of Four Tough Characters.

DESTRUCTIVE CLOUD-BURST IN TEXAS.

New York, July 20.—The Herald says:
A deal is under way involving a combina-
tion of at least four prominent railroads,
and perhaps two or three more, making
a complete trunk line from the Atlantic
to the Pacific. The scheme involves the
merging of several properties in which
Kuhn, Loeb & Co., K. A. Harriman and
Spencer & Co. are interested, and exert
controlling influence. Among these
properties are the Union Pacific, Illinois
Central, Chicago & Alton, Chicago Ter-
minal Transfer company, Oregon Short
Line, Oregon Railway & Navigation
company and Baltimore & Ohio. It is
asserted in some quarters that the Great
Northern will come in, but this is con-
sidered doubtful. This combination will
bring about a revolution in traffic alli-
ances. The Union Pacific is the key-
stone.

The Vanderbilt line are represented on the
board of directors of the Union Pacific,
but were not aware until a few weeks
ago what was going on. The Northwest-
ern directors hurriedly considered the
advisability of extending the Fremont
branch to Ogden to connect with the
Central Pacific and cut off from the
Union Pacific. The Northwestern will
find no road to turn to for Pacific coast
business that does not parallel it a con-
siderable of the distance.

MEXICAN KIDNAPERS.

They Are Taken Back to Mexico and Tried
and Shot.

Tucson, A. T., July 20.—A Nogales
special to the Star says that the grand jury
has discovered that four Mexicans have
been kidnapped at Nogales, with the
consent of two officials of Santa Cruz
county, and handed over to the Mexican
authorities without due process of the
law. They were summarily tried and
shot by the Mexican authorities. The
effort to indict District Attorney Harlow
on the outrage, failed. It is alleged that
the Mexicans kidnapped were hard cases.

BROOKLYN STRIKE.

Strikers Said to Be Gaining Strength and
Are Confident of a Victory.

New York, July 20.—The strike in
Brooklyn up to 10 o'clock this morning
has resulted in no important changes.
Motormen and conductors are unwilling
to run to the suburbs unless accompanied
by police. The police are becoming weary
of the continued strain. Police wires
have been cut in several places. Not
withstanding the claim of officials that
on the various lines their cars are run-
ning on schedule time, General Master
Workman Parsons declares that the strike
is practically won. He said that 1,500
men are out and more are going out
hourly. He denounced as untrue the
statement of President Ireland, of the
Metropolitan Street Railway company,
that the company had no objection to its
employees belonging to any organization
and declared that men who had been
discharged on flimsy excuses because they
joined the Surface Railroad Employees
association.

The company will not, President Ro-
scoe says, reinstate any of the old men.

CLOUD BURST.

Destructive Flood in the Panhandle Coun-
ties of Texas.

Dallas, Tex., July 20.—A report from
Dallas north of Dallas, states that a cloud
burst occurred with disastrous results
much track on the Colorado and South-
ern railway has been swept away and the
bridges across Little Red river and the
Pecos river are gone. Both these rivers
and tributaries are roaring torrents. The
property loss is very heavy, but nothing
has been learned of the fate of the peo-
ple of the inundated section, which em-
braces portions of Childress, Cottle, Har-
euan, Wilbarger, Hall, Henley, Donley
and Collingsworth counties.

ALGER RETIRES NEXT MONTH.

Chicago, July 20.—It is certain that
unless the bimetallicists secure the recog-
nition they demand from the demo-
cratic national committee at this after-
noon's meeting they will form a new
national committee. They claim to have
two-thirds of the national committee and
said there will be a formal declaration of
their favor by the national committee as
soon as they present their demand that
they be allowed to co-operate in the next
national campaign with the national
committee.

W. J. Bryan to-day made a proposition
to the waiting democratic factions of
Illinois that the meeting to-night be
placed under the control of the demo-
cratic national committee. They would
relinquish him from the dilemma in which
he is now placed of taking sides in the
Illinois row. The Albiged people have
agreed to refer the matter to the national
committee.

Shortly before noon the Albiged people
made a decided change of base regarding
P. J. Devlin, when Wm. J. Strong, a close
friend and adviser of Albiged, announced
at the latter did not propose to stand
fall by Devlin. This was accepted by the
Harrison people as a sure indication that
the Harrison people were trimming their
sails to the wind and that the Albiged
people were trimming their sails in order
that his dismissal might not compromise
them to any serious extent.

FLOODS AT MANILA.

Over Three Feet of Solid Water Fell
There This Month.

Washington, July 20.—The following
was received at the war department:
Manila, July 20.—Storms still prevail-
ing and barometer rising, indicating im-
proving weather conditions. The average
rainfall in July for several years has
been 14 1/2 inches, and for the twenty days
of July now closed 41 inches. The coun-
try is flooded. Troops on the outskirts
suffered from lines of communication
to be cut some distance but not serious.
No material increase of sickness report-
ed. Telegraphic communication is main-
tained to San Fernando, Baguio and nearly
all other points. Unable yet to clear re-
turning transports. OTIS.

ALGER'S RESIGNATION.

Copy of His Letter to the President and
the Senate.

Washington, July 20.—Following is
Secretary Alger's letter of resignation and
the president's reply to it:
"July 19, 1899.—Sir: I beg to tender
you my resignation of the office of secre-
tary of war, to take effect at such time in
the future as you may decide that the af-
fairs of this department will permit. In
terminating my official connection with
your administration I wish for your con-
tinuous health and highest measure of
success in carrying out the great work
entrusted to you. I have the honor to
very respectfully, your obedient servant,
"R. A. ALGER."

The president replied as follows:
Executive Mansion, July 20, 1899.
Hon. R. A. Alger, Secretary of War.
Your resignation of the office of secre-
tary of war, under date of July 19, is ac-
cepted. I take effect the first of August,
1899. In thus severing the official rela-
tion which has continued for more than
two years, I desire to thank you for the
faithful service you have rendered the
country at a most exacting period and
wish you a long and happy life. With
assurances of high regard and esteem, I
am, yours sincerely,
WILLIAM MCKINLEY.

ALGER TO RETIRE.

The Unpopular War Secretary to Retire
Next Monday.

Washington, July 20.—Secretary Alger
will leave the war department over to
Assistant Secretary McKeljohn on Mon-
day next, having to-day received a tele-
gram from the latter at New London,
Conn., stating that he would arrive in
Washington on Saturday night. When
asked if he would press his senatorial
campaign the secretary replied: "I can-
not tell you."

ALGER'S SUCCESSOR.

Washington, July 20.—The main topic
here to-day is the choice of a successor to
Secretary Alger. Many names are men-
tioned, but it can be stated with author-
ity that the president has made no selec-
tion.

Secretary of War.

Washington, July 20.—The belief is
growing in well-informed circles
that Kibbi Root, of New York, will be
tendered the secretaryship of war.

DEWEY AT TRIESTE.

The Admiral Will Remain in Austria Two
Weeks.

Trieste, July 20.—The United States
cruiser Olympia, with Admiral Dewey on
board arrived here this morning.

Admiral Dewey's secretary said that
the passage of the Olympia from Port
Said was a pleasant one. The Olympia
will remain here about two weeks.
Dewey's health is perfect. He intends
to visit Vienna. Upon arrival here the
Olympia fired a salute which was re-
turned from the fort and four Austrian
and one French war ship. Dewey received
visits from the port authorities. The
foreign consuls were received by the
admiral on board the Olympia during the
forenoon.

DEMOCRAT COMMITTEE.

Thirty-two States Represented at
the Chicago Meeting.

No Concessions Will Be Made in the
Alaskan Dispute.

Ten Thousand Delegates at National Ep-
worth League Convention.

EXHIBIT AT PARIS EXPOSITION.

Chicago, July 20.—The democratic na-
tional committee went into session at
ten minutes past noon with thirty-two
states represented by national commit-
teemen or by proxies.

Vice Chairman Stone called the meet-
ing to order.

Bryan was present as proxy for D. J.
Campbell, of Kansas, and J. W. Wood,
South Dakota. Ex-governor Albiged,
who held the proxy of Committeeman
White, Washington, sent word that
while he preferred not to attend meet-
ings, he would be turned over to William J.
Abbott, New York. The committee re-
moved press representative Devlin, and
then adjourned at 3:30 without transac-
ting other important business.

The paternity of the meeting to-night
was definitely settled before the meeting
of the committee. It will be under the
auspices of the Albiged people, and not-
withstanding the opposition of the Har-
rison people Mr. Bryan will speak.

ALASKAN BOUNDARY.

No Territory to Be Conceded to Canada by
the Boundary Commission.

Chicago, July 20.—A Tribune special
from Washington says: Senator Fair-
banks of the joint high commission had
a conference with President McKinley
and Secretary Hay on the Alaskan bound-
ary dispute. The senator reports that
from personal observation he is firmly
convinced that the contention of this
government is correct.

It is said that this government will not
yield a foot of the territory, and unless
the British government agrees upon a
modus vivendi on the subject, the govern-
ment offered there will be no meeting of
the joint high commission on August 2.

Epworth League Convention.

Indianapolis, July 20.—The attendance
at the fourth biennial international con-
vention of the Epworth League, which
opened here to-day, will be in the neigh-
borhood of 10,000 to 12,000 according to
reliable estimates. The California dele-
gates are working hard for the 1901 conven-
tion. Minneapolis also has entered the contest
for the next convention.

Paris Exposition.

Washington, July 20.—Commissioner
General Peck, of the Paris exposition had
a consultation with the president to-day,
in the course of which he explained the
plans for the government exhibition at
the great fair, which received the presi-
dent's hearty approval.

Representatives of the commission are
to select exhibits from the various de-
partments of the government and heads
of the department are to be instructed to
turn over whatever may be selected. It
will be the purpose of the commission to
make an especially fine showing in the
exhibition of naval war, and agricultural
departments.

COMMISSIONER DAVIS TALKS.

And gives an instructive and inspiring lecture to Albuquerque.

John A. Davis, the industrial commissioner of the Santa Fe, was in the city yesterday afternoon at the Commercial club. He was very pronounced in expressing the conviction that no other state or territory in the union at present offers such splendid opportunities for investment of capital as New Mexico. He is quoted as saying:

"It is not lack of resources that is crippling New Mexico. It is absolutely impossible to get reliable information of the kind that is most needed, whether mine, manufacture or agriculture be the subject under consideration. For instance, I have been traveling through the territory with Mr. Weinrich, representative of the American Best Sugar company, who is seeking for a position in which to build a 3,000-ton factory. Nowhere has data been available regarding the amount of land under cultivation, the exact nature of the soil, etc. When it comes to minerals, the situation is little better. I could send men here with lanterns to investigate and tell them that there was in hearty accord with their ideas, and the Santa Fe company would second their work at once."

"It is an organized effort to place the resources of the territory before the world that you need. Colorado and California cannot be criticized in this respect. Southern Arizona is fairly organized, but in New Mexico the condition could not be worse, and I can't say much of the importance of getting to work at once."

Mr. Davis was very outspoken in his criticism of the people of Albuquerque for not standing together as one man, and said:

ON WATCH FOR DISEASED SHEEP.

When it comes to a matter requiring united action Las Vegas is to be commended. It has been in the past, in saying that Albuquerque should be the largest city in the southwest. It should become in a few years a really great city. It has the opportunity, but people have not the enterprise; but they must act of one accord. Albuquerque, not Las Vegas, is the natural stopping place for transcontinental travel. The Santa Fe wants to make use of it as such. Nothing can be more to the city than the movement now on foot that will insure good hotels. The railroad station and building an attractive little park contiguous to building a depot hotel, but as well as that, the people as soon as you are ready for them, and can accommodate and entertain them. Nothing is more beneficial to a city than a proper league, embracing inhabitants of all grades. I can tell the minute I step off at the depot whether the people of the town have the right kind of organization at work or not. Tell your people that their interest is our interest, and that every step taken by them in the advertisement and upbuilding of their pretty, fortunately situated city will be seconded by me."

ON WATCH FOR DISEASED SHEEP.

Rigid Quarantine Against Twelve States and Territories by Colorado.

Preparations are already being made by the inspector stationed along the New Mexican border to prevent the spread of sheep from those states which are brought over the Colorado line every fall to be fattened for market. Scab cannot spread except by contact, but several cases have been discovered in the state recently and the disease has been stamped out wherever discovered.

State Veterinarian Book says that scab, lumpy, lime and water used as a wash is the best remedy for the disease. The inspectors in charge of the sheep quarantine will use this remedy.

Said Dr. Book yesterday: "The sheep from Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, California, Nevada, Utah, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma—especially of New Mexico—are feared."

"The quarantine regulations which will be strictly followed and enforced as to every sheep sent over the line during the rush this fall are very well defined. They go so far as to provide for general disinfection of cars."—Denver Republican, July 14.
