ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. — JULY 7, 1929

A new national bank is being established at Roswell, the best town in the Pecos valley.

The teachers of San Miguel county are holding a successful normal institute at Las Vegas.

During the past fiscal year 1,429 vessels of 230,757 tons, gross, were built in the United States.

During the past week 3,444 enlisted men and fifty-nine officers have left San Francisco for Manila.

The Kansas City papers say that the best peach in that market came from the Mesilla valley, New Mexico.

The democrats of this city are urging Mayor O. N. Marron to make the race for congressional delegate next year.

The republican delegation from New Mexico to the next national republican convention will favor the renomination of President McKinley.

The national republican convention should be held at Denver, Colorado. It might help bring that state back into the republican column.

The territorial fair officials are holding meetings every evening and are arranging a first class program of sports for the September exposition.

The interior department is emphatic in opposition to sheep grazing on the government forest reservations. The contention is that sheep are destructive to the young forest growth.

The copper mines of New Mexico should be fully developed. The increased price of the metal should cause the development of the copper properties at San Pedro and on the upper Pecos.

The aggregate receipts from customs in Cuba for the past fourteen weeks are \$3,495,814. The receipts for the week ending June 17, were \$335,391, and exceeded those of any previous week by \$10,064.

There were fewer business failures in the past six months than in the corresponding period of any one of the past 17 years, and the liabilities are smaller than in the same periods of any year since 1881.

The July disbursements of interest and dividends, according to the record kept by the New York Stockholder, amounts to \$5,244,000, compared with \$5,842,200 a year ago, and \$7,373,000 four years ago.

The New York Herald has taken a poll of the senators in congress on the question of seating Matthew S. Quay, appointed by Governor Stone, and it finds that 33 will vote to seat Quay, 31 will vote no, 15 are non-committal and 7 can not be reached.

This country's exports of cotton goods to China have increased from 35,000,000 yards in 1925 to over 200,000,000 yards in the fiscal year that has just ended. This country produces about 80 per cent of all the cotton used in the world, and about 70 per cent of the crop is exported raw, to be converted into fabrics by the factories of Europe.

It is shown in a recent statement from the German government that the value of United States exports to Germany increased by \$42,000,000 over that of the exports for the previous year, while imports to this country from Germany diminished by \$17,000,000. The actual excess of trade in favor of the United States was \$131,138,000. Five years ago the balance was in favor of Germany.

In sixty-two cities the following casualties occurred in celebrating the Fourth of July: The number of killed reported is three; injured 1,074. Fire losses due to fireworks, \$149,105. Of the injured, 627 were hurt by cannon firecrackers, 113 by toy cannons, sixty by powder explosion, fifty-nine by sky rockets, 143 by guns and revolvers and fifteen by stray bullets.

JAMES A. KATTE, of Marinette, Wis., 87 years old, who is said to be a veteran of four wars, has announced his intention of riding from his home on a bicycle to the national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held in Philadelphia in September next. He will start this week, and expects to cover the total distance of 1,300 miles at the rate of thirty-five miles a day.

ALBUQUERQUE MINE.
 The output of the Albemarle mine at Cochiti probably exceeds that of every other gold producer in the territory, says the New Mexican, and when the larger mill shall be completed it will rank high among mining properties of the west. The mill handles about 130 tons of ore daily now, but with the additional facilities the output will be doubled. With an ore body sixty feet in thickness, there is plenty of material to keep the plant busy. The contemplated improvements on this mine in the way of an electric plant operated at Madrid, thirty-five miles distant, the mill changes and the water system, will cost \$250,000. That is a pretty stiff expenditure for a new mine, but as the ore pays the bill, the expenditure is justifiable. It is the development of this mine and others that is going to give the camp a railway at an early date. Then look out for Cochiti!

A COMPARISON.
 A comparison of the fiscal year just ended with that of 1894 makes an interesting contrast. In 1894 the deficit was \$9,803,599 and the bonds issued during that year amounted to \$94,125,000. Yet that was a year of peace, when the expenses of the government were merely nominal. In this recent year, with the attendant extraordinary expenses, the bond issue was really \$108,600,000, and the deficit is only about \$20,
