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## ROCKY ROAD FOR JOINT STATEHOOD

Democrats Will Oppose It Both in the House and the Senate at Washington.

## LOYAL TO PARTY PLEDGES

A Number of Republicans Will Probably Assist Them According to Advice From National Capital.

The following dispatch from Washington to the Rocky Mountain News, was apparently inspired by United States Senator Thomas M. Patterson, the New Mexican cutting out such parts as reflect upon Delegate B. S. Rodey, as this paper gives Mr. Rodey credit for sincerity in his present course:

Whether Congress will postpone the adjournment of the present session long enough to settle the statehood question is a matter of open conjecture. It can safely be predicted that the bill to be reported from the House territories committee, providing for the joint statehood of New Mexico and Arizona, will be strongly assailed by most of the Democrats and some of the Republicans in both the House and Senate. The Democrats of the Senate had some discussion of the statehood question in conference on Friday last, and the Democrats are endeavoring this week to determine upon a course to pursue.

In the meantime Delegate Rodey of New Mexico, whose name has never failed of mention in any phase of the statehood fight during the last three years, is trying to rally his cohorts for the new cause he has espoused, namely, the jointure of New Mexico and Arizona as a state, the welding of a vast tract of country of about twice the area of Colorado. Rodey has given it out that his change was due to the realization that single statehood could not be effected for a quarter of a century. During his sturdy fight in the last Congress he asserted he would carry on the fight for the separate statehood of his Territory until the end of his career if necessary, and when John D. Wilson became the delegate from Arizona territory he made a compact with him to stand firmly for the separate organization of each territory as a state. At the end of the recent exhaustive hearing before the House committee on territories it became evident that he stood for a consolidated state.

President Roosevelt made his attitude of favoring such a project known. Dispatches were straightway sent to New Mexico telling the people there to abandon hope. A statement of Roosevelt's support of jointure was secured and telegraphed out to bolster up the new platform.

**Oppose Dual Measure.**  
Delegate Wilson remained steadfast. Arizona declined to be swallowed up by New Mexico. Democratic sentiment in Congress is plainly with Arizona, and the stand will be taken that it is not only for the best interests of that territory, but for New Mexico, that they remain separate and distinct localities, as they are today. New Mexico has a population distinctly its own. To merge the two localities would be to weaken the whole and make a state that would be too vast and cumbersome to be efficaciously governed and Arizona and New Mexico would forever lose their identity and would relinquish the advantages they have today.

The Democrats see no objection to the union of Oklahoma and Indian Territory, for these two districts have been together before and they both consist of only 65,000 square miles of country. The proposed new state of Arizona, which the united territories are to be called would have an area of over 200,000 square miles.

Arizona and New Mexico have been promised separate statehood and the Democrats propose to see that promise fulfilled. It is believed there are enough Republicans ready to join them to enforce the proper observance of the rights of the two territories.

**Bill Concerning Mineral Lands.**  
A bill introduced by Senator Teller to amend section 2327 of the revised statutes concerning mineral lands, has passed the Senate. The defect which the bill seeks to remedy is one which seriously affects mining claims, and is one that becomes more potent for harm as time elapses. The Teller bill amends section 2327 of the revised statutes as follows:

"The description of vein or lode claims upon surveyed lands shall designate the locations of claims with reference to lines of public survey, but need not conform therewith, but where patents have been issued for claims upon unsurveyed lands, surveyors general in extending the public survey, shall adjust same to boundaries of said patented claims, so as in no case to interfere, with or change the

## SMITH AGAIN ON THE STAND

Questioned in Regard to Interview With Representative of Associated Press Acknowledged Favoring Smoot's Election.

Washington, March 9.—President Joseph Smith was recalled in Senator Smoot's case today. He was questioned as to his interview with a representative of the Associated Press in 1902, giving statistics in regard to the church and the number of polygamists in Utah. Smith said the entire interview consisted of statistics and that he said nothing for the purpose of supporting Smoot for the Senatorship. Upon the reading of the interview Smith acknowledged that he had been quoted correctly in regard to Smoot and had urged his election. Smith was asked about Benjamin Clough, Jr., president of the Brigham Young Academy and said he is reputed to be a polygamist. He was also asked about Abraham Cannon and if the general charge had not been that he took a plural wife, Lillian Hamlin, since the manifesto of 1890. Smith said that had been a newspaper charge and he paid no attention to it.

## OPPOSE JOINT STATEHOOD

The Republican Territorial Convention of Arizona is Most Emphatic in Its Resolutions.

## ROOSEVELT DELEGATES

Rather a Territory, Indefinitely Than to Be Merged With Its Neighbor New Mexico.

Tucson, March 9.—The Republican territorial convention has elected delegates to the Chicago convention instructed for Roosevelt. A strong resolution was adopted against joint statehood, in any form, declaring for a territorial form of government indefinitely in preference to a merger.

## FLOOD CONDITIONS ALARMING

Susquehanna River Continues to Rise. High Water Mark of 1902 Almost Reached.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., March 9.—The flood situation here is more serious than yesterday. Today the river is 30 feet, six inches above the low water mark. This is within nine inches of the high water mark of the great flood of 1902. The temperature has fallen 20 degrees within five hours and this should bring some relief.

Looking west from River Street nothing can be seen but an expanse of water over the lowlands. Practically the same conditions prevail all along the river to Danville, 50 miles below here and the loss will be greater than sustained in any previous flood.

## A BOXING BOUT.

Will Take Place in Philadelphia Between Kid McCoy and John Joseph Placke.

New York, March 9.—Kid McCoy has been matched to fight Henry John Joseph Placke, a Hollander, who has just arrived. The bout will take place in Philadelphia April 1. Placke weighs 250 pounds and is 6 feet, 5-1/2 inches tall.

## CANCELS ALL ENGAGEMENTS

Adelina Patti Will Leave Immediately for New York on Her Way to England.

Hot Springs, March 9.—Adelina Patti announces that she will leave immediately for New York to take steamer for England. She says she has cancelled all her engagements.

true location of such claims as they are officially established upon the ground.

"Where patents have been issued for mineral lands, those lands shall be segregated, and shall be deemed to be patented which are bounded by lines actually marked, defined and established upon the ground by monuments of the official survey upon which the patent land is based, and surveyors general in executing subsequent patent surveys, whether upon surveyed or unsurveyed lands, shall be governed accordingly. The said monuments shall at all times constitute the highest authority as to what land is patented, and errors in patent descriptions shall give way thereto."

## A DECISIVE BATTLE NEAR VLADIVOSTOCK

Japanese Slip Into Harbor While Russian Squadron Is Absent—Engagement Probably Occurred in Possiet Bay.

Tokio, Tuesday, March 8.—(Delayed in transmission)—It is believed here that there has already been a decisive engagement in the vicinity of Vladivostock and tidings of it are anxiously awaited. The Japanese fleet did not, it is said, go to Vladivostock for the purpose of a bombardment, but to locate and attack the Russian fleet stationed there. It is understood that when the Japanese fleet arrived on Sunday it found the Russian fleet absent. If this is true it gives the Japanese fleet the advantage in the way of avoiding a battle close into the shore batteries. It is doubted if the Japanese withdrew the whole squadron unless the location of the enemy was discovered. There is a strong possibility that the Japanese found the Russian ships in the vicinity of Possiet Bay, and gave them battle there.

**The Retzivan Refloated.**  
Port Arthur, March 9.—The hole in the hull of the Russian battleship Retzivan which was made during the first attack by the Japanese has been repaired and the battleship refloated. Other necessary repairs to the ship will be completed shortly.

**Port Arthur Again Attacked.**  
Tokio, March 9.—Japanese warships bombarded the forts at Talien Wan (Port Dalny) on March 8, and then attacked Port Arthur.

**Japanese Sighted Off Vladivostock.**  
Port Arthur, March 9.—It is rumored here that a Japanese squadron has reappeared off Vladivostock.

**Land Engagement in Corea.**  
Seoul, March 9.—A party of nine Russians seized the Korean telegraph station at Yung Won today. It is reported that a fight has occurred between the Russians and Koreans on the Korean side of the Yalu River.

**Must Curtail Operations.**  
Sebastopol, March 9.—The Russian Navigation Company is said to have received government instructions which compel it to curtail ordinary operations, particularly of the Black Sea. It is understood that the instructions provide for a contingency call on their tonnage by the government. The company's convention with the government provides for the government's acquisition of the whole fleet for troop and other military work within the Black Sea only.

**More Russian Losses Come to Light.**  
Tokio, March 9.—It is reliably reported that when the Japanese attempted to block Port Arthur on February 24, a Russian torpedo boat destroyer, while trying to re-enter the harbor struck a mine and sank. Of the thirteen Russian warships inside

the harbor of Port Arthur, it is added that all are disabled except five. Finally, it is asserted, that the Whoang Kishan fort at Port Arthur was half destroyed by Japanese shells and that only three batteries are available.

**Russians Uncommunicative.**  
St. Petersburg, March 9.—The Associated Press is informed on the highest authority that up to 5 o'clock this afternoon, no word of a battle between the Retzstein and Ural squadrons has been received. It is evident, however, that news of such a fight would not surprise the authorities.

They will not say whether the Russian squadron was outside Vladivostock when the Japanese appeared but it is firmly believed that it was outside.

**Japanese Land Forces Appear.**  
Washington, March 9.—The government has received advice by cable from Che Foo opposite Port Arthur to the effect that Japanese land forces have appeared at Fung Wang Chang and at Tashan. No details are furnished.

**United States an Unknown Quantity.**  
St. Petersburg, March 9.—The missing existing in high quarters here regarding the ultimate aims and purposes of the foreign policy of the United States were verified today in a remarkable statement given to the Associated Press: "Were it not for a single unknown quantity the European situation at present would be as perfect as possible. For the avoidance of one thing, every chancellor of Europe has been straining every nerve—namely, to prevent the entanglement of an outside power in this war. That unknown quantity is your state department. The situation following the war of 1901-1902, was exceedingly delicate and surcharged with dangerous possibilities to the peace of the world, and the level headed statesmen of Europe instantly co-operated to avoid a general catastrophe, when almost at its inception, Secretary Hay's circular note for the neutralization of China almost ditched them. But happily he did not press it to a point where differences were sure to have arisen and as it turned out, owing to the length to which the powers gave adhesion to its principal, it really contributed to the trend desired. The note might have proved disastrous did not the moment find all Europe practically in accord as to what should be done. We are at sea as to what to expect from Mr. Hay's American diplomacy, which in these latter days is so aggressive. It is a veritable nightmare to Europe."

## ARMY BILL PASSED.

In the House the Philippine Shipping Measure Was Taken Up for Discussion.

Washington, March 9.—The Philippine shipping bill was taken up in the House today.

**Senate.**  
Washington, March 9.—In the Senate today Senator Hoar offered a resolution which was adopted, directing the committee on postoffices to consider the report whether any further legislation is needed to secure, either by providing for an appeal to the courts or otherwise, the rights of persons whose correspondence is excluded from the mails. The army bill passed the Senate today.

**Ministers Transferred.**  
Washington, March 9.—The President has directed the transfer of John Barrett, the present minister to Argentina to be minister to Panama. W. W. Russell, at present in charge at Panama is to be minister at Colombia, and Arthur W. Beupre, now minister to Colombia, is to succeed Barrett.

## MOB LAW IN OHIO.

Crowd Lynches a Negro for Killing a Policeman, Then Burns Homes of Colored Population.

Springfield, Ohio, March 9.—Following the lynching of Richard Dixon, the negro, on Monday night for killing Policeman Collins, the mob last night burned the "livery" where the negroes live, and further trouble was anticipated as the negroes threatened revenge, but today everything is quiet with the militia on guard. Mayor Bowler is of the opinion that the trouble is over. The loss from the fire during the night is estimated at between \$15,000 and \$20,000, most of the buildings occupied by the colored people being very small.

## REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION

Met in Wichita, Kansas, This Morning at 10 O'clock—Fight Expected on Local Offices.

Wichita, Kansas, March 9.—A large crowd from all parts of the state is here to attend the Republican state convention which met at 10 o'clock this morning. A fight on railroad commissioner, state treasurer and supreme justice is expected, otherwise the convention promises to be tame.

## SNOW BLOCKADE CONTINUES

Neither Freight Nor Passenger Trains Can Reach Lewistown and Provisions Are Low.

Lewistown, Montana, March 9.—The blockade on the Montana railroads still continues since February 24 when four snow plows managed to shove a mixed train through and neither freight or passenger trains have arrived here. Provisions and fuel are very low here.

## FRENCH STEAMER WRECKED

The Cambodge Encounters a Storm Off Coochin China and a Hundred Persons Perish.

London, March 9.—A special from Paris announces that the French steamer Cambodge which left Rangoon on February 17, for Coochin, China, and European ports, has been wrecked in a storm off Coochin, China. The dispatch adds that it is believed a hundred persons perished in the wreck.

## TORRANCE NEIGHBORHOOD SETTLING UP

Homesteads Being Taken and School Sections Leased From Territory. Water Developed By Wells.

R. B. Willison, surveyor and civil engineer, has just returned from a two months' stay in eastern Valencia and northeastern Lincoln Counties where he has been on professional work. A good many new settlers have come in to that section of New Mexico. During the time he has been away, he has surveyed thirteen school sections, which have been leased from the Territory by people living upon them. He has also surveyed about 25 homestead locations as well as determined many spots for the digging or drilling of wells. The stockmen have been compelled by the present drouth to adopt the plan of either digging or drilling wells to supply water for their sheep and cattle. This has proved successful, as water is found in that vicinity at from 40 to 75 feet in the valley and at 50 to 200 feet on the mesas. The water in the more shallow wells is found by digging and in the wells on the mesas by drilling or driving pipes. There have been very few losses of stock so far and with an increased water supply through the agencies of wells, stockmen are of the opinion that there will be but few losses this spring, especially if some rains should come soon. Mr. Willison says that the settlers are a very good class of people; most of them own sheep and a good many of them in addition to sheep, have a few head of cattle. The dry lake bottoms which are generally filled in the rainy season and of which there are numbers in that section, are mostly taken up by stockmen under land script, and water in such localities, is at a comparatively speaking shallow depth. Mr. Willison expects to leave shortly again for Lincoln County where work of the kind he has just finished awaits him. The section in which he has been operating is within a radius of 25 miles in each direction from Torrance, the junction of the Santa Fe Central Railway and El Paso & Northeastern Railroad about 116 miles southeast of this city.

## THREE FIRES IN ONE WEEK.

Flames Did Damage to the Extent of 5,000 in Roswell.—The Insurance Was Only \$700.

Fire totally destroyed the residence of C. F. Pote at Roswell, last week. The fire was caused by the explosion of a lamp and the building was consumed in a short time. Mrs. Pote and her two little boys barely escaped with their lives. Nothing was saved from the building. Mr. Pote was in Carlsbad at the time. His wife was prostrated by the shock and was removed to the residence of J. R. Hart on the opposite side of the street. The loss of the building and contents is about \$3,000 with only \$700 insurance.

The home of Rice Johnson, a negro, was totally destroyed by fire at Roswell recently. The fire department arrived promptly after the alarm was sounded, but nothing was saved, and the building and contents were totally destroyed. Mr. Rabb, the blacksmith, occupied the building to the south of the Johnson home but his house was saved by a "bucket brigade." Johnson came to Roswell three years ago. The loss on the building was about \$300 and the contents about \$500. There was not a cent of insurance. Mrs. Johnson was at a residence north of the burned house when the fire broke out and the entire building was in flames when she discovered the fire. She declares that the fire was of incendiary origin as there had not been any fire in the house since she cooked dinner. There was \$45 cash in the drawer of the sewing machine, of which \$40 was in greenbacks. The \$5 in silver were recovered but the greenbacks were destroyed. Johnson, who, until a few weeks ago was day porter at the Grand Central Hotel, did not even save his coat, as the day was warm and he was in his shirt sleeves. Another slight fire took place last week at Roswell at the residence of R. F. Ballard, near the Pecos Valley Lumber Company's yard. The fire was caused by a defective flue.

## WORK ON CUT OFF

To Commence About June 1—One Hundred Men Employed on Railroad Bridge Across Rio Grande at Belen.

## STOCKMEN DIG WELLS

Driest Weather in Many Years in Manzano Mountains—Stock, However, Still Doing Well.

Mountainair, N. M., March 7.—Work will not begin on the cut off until May and possibly not before June. Bridge work in Aba Canon may begin earlier. The work on the Rio Grande bridge will be pushed as fast as possible for fear of high water. There are now about 100 men employed on the bridge which number is about all that can be employed to advantage. When the work along the line is resumed it will be pushed rapidly. This information is reliable.

The present drouth is unprecedented in this section. There has been no snow this winter and but little rain last summer, but in spite of dry weather and short grass, stock never looked better at this time of year. This is due largely to the increase in the number of wells. Stockmen are sinking wells at different points in order to utilize the grass removed from surface water and the results justify the expense.

W. J. Lightfoot, government inspector of U. S. surveys, has finished the inspection of the three townships surveyed by Wendall V. Hall, U. S. deputy surveyor of Santa Fe, last summer. The inspection demonstrated that Mr. Hall did good work.

A. E. Lichty has returned from a business trip to Belen.

W. M. Brown was in Estancia one day last week.

Robert Locke was up from Belen on company business this week.

F. D. Carpenter is enjoying a visit from his father whose home is in South Dakota.

W. R. Green writes from Albuquerque that he expects to begin improving his claim near here in a few days. A change has been made in the star route plans for this section. Under the new arrangement Mountainair will be supplied from Willard and Tajique, Manzano and Eastview from Estancia, the change to take place March 21. The postoffice at Torreón, has been discontinued and Punta de Agua and Gran Quivero have applied for postoffices, both to be supplied from Mountainair.

John W. Corbett will open a real estate and abstract office in the new town of Estancia in the near future. He has offered a cash prize of \$5 for the two best watermelons grown in the new county of Torrance this season. The melons are to be delivered at the Estancia office September 10 and it is expected that enough farmers will become interested to make the event rival melon day at Rockyford, Colorado.

On account of the land in the Estancia Valley being unsurveyed, the new settlers are having all kinds of trouble. Those near Estancia located their claims with the railroad company's lines, which according to the new government survey in the township south and east are not correct. As a result but few of them are on the land they claim and in many instances two are on the same claim. They are doing a wise thing in signing an agreement to submit all questions of dispute relative to their claims to arbitration rather than go to law. The first dispute of the kind has just been settled by arbitration and unless some of them get contrary the tangle may yet come out all right and every one get his quota of land without fighting for it.

## FOOT BRIDGE OVER THE SAN JUAN

Has Been Constructed Below Farmington for the Use of the Public.

The foot bridge across the San Juan River near Farmington which was recently completed is ready for use and is so well constructed as to be perfectly safe. The walk is two feet wide and rests upon cross-ties of two by four pieces, two feet apart, which in turn rest upon two steel cables three-fourth of an inch in diameter, with a capacity of nine tons to each cable. These cables are strengthened by two similar ones which are located about four feet above the base. The space between the two cables is covered by woven wire, which makes it utterly impossible for a child to fall from the bridge. The length of the span is 350 feet. The bridge is located at the site of the old ferry below Farmington. It will be free to the public. This will be a great advantage in the time of high water and will bring many a dollar to Farmington that would otherwise be diverted. N. T. Bowman and Mrs. Samuel Rugh were the architects, and Mr. Bowman superintended the work.

## NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL IN NEW MEXICO.

At times complaints are made by citizens in the larger towns in the Territory of insufficient and unsatisfactory water supply. This is generally the case in very dry weather. This has the effect in this arid country of reducing the available amount of water for domestic and irrigation purposes. Nevertheless, people are much better off in arid New Mexico than they are in many of the eastern towns where the water supply is abundant, and quite often entirely too much so. There they have to fight against contamination and impurity of the water supply which are greater evils than is a scarcity of water.

The New York Times, in commenting upon some of these instances which have lately come to light, says that authoritative information from Cleveland shows that city to be fighting a typhoid epidemic, already serious and daily gaining headway. It had attained the importance of 68 cases in one day on the first of the present month, and the official returns for February show 465 cases reported and 45 deaths. The water of Lake Erie is polluted. The Philadelphia Ledger reports Health Officer Abbott as announcing that in that city a sweeping typhoid epidemic is threatened, having reached the stage of 30 cases a day. In 1903 there were 8,000 cases of typhoid reported in the city. The Schuylkill is polluted.

In probably 20 cities and towns the conditions which menace Cleveland and Philadelphia are now being dealt with in the crude way customary when the limited machinery of the local sanitary administration is taxed to the breaking point. Why is it that experience teaches communities so little in matters so intimately affecting the public health as drainage and water supply? The Public Ledger says of the conditions tributary to the present situation in Philadelphia:

"At the Shawmont pumping station great difficulty is being experienced in getting water, owing to the serious break at Flat Rock Dam. Centrifugal emergency pumps have been installed on the towpath, and dirty, slimy water is being pumped directly into the pool. At noon yesterday the water above the dam was 17 inches below the breast. Owing to the rain, the water rose five inches in the afternoon. As long as this break is unclosed, there will be little opportunity for the water to settle before being pumped from the river."

No doubt the average citizen reading this will shrug his shoulders and think how regrettable it is that such an accident should happen with consequences so serious. That he will do more than this is scarcely to be expected. One would suppose that the effect of such an announcement would be comparable to that of ringing a general fire alarm; but it is not, never was, and perhaps never will be. To create and sustain an intelligent public interest in matters affecting the public health is one of the most difficult of human undertakings.

The indications are that the delegations from the counties composing the first judicial district, namely, Santa Fe, Taos, Rio Arriba and San Juan will support W. G. Sargent as their choice for delegate to the Chicago Convention. These delegations will poll thirty-three votes and it is now believed they will unite upon Mr. Sargent. The district is entitled to the nomination of a delegate and the desires of the Republicans in it should be respected and heeded by the Las Vegas Convention. The plan of electing one delegate at large and one from each judicial district is being approved by Republicans all over New Mexico and should be followed by the Territorial Convention.

The boast that the Russian railway authorities will be able to pour troops into Manchuria on railroad trains at the rate of 3,000 in every ten minutes is not materializing to any great extent. In fact the Russians are having a hard time in keeping their lines of railroad communication in Eastern Siberia and in Manchuria open at all.

## RATHER WELL PUT.

A correspondent of the Raton Range places the condition of affairs as now existing and the opinion of five-sixths of the people of New Mexico as to joint statehood in the proper light, and in very good language in a recent letter to that paper, wherein he says: "Why do we divide our territory into counties? Why not have one great big county of the territory? There is no fair-minded man but will admit that the dividing up of the large counties into smaller and more compact counties makes for economy in administration and convenience for the citizens. They meet the argument against the great size of the proposed state by pointing to Texas. Why, gentlemen, when Texas was admitted to the Union the whole western part was a terra incognita—uninhabited, unsettled and with almost no boundaries. It simply came in with the rest of Texas because it couldn't be gotten rid of any other way. And now they are in, state pride will prevent them from cutting it up into the five separate states that under their Rubbing act they are privileged to set up any time they see fit. Yet today the Pan Handle section for one and the far western section for another would be far better off to be cut off to themselves as separate states. Further, there is no comparison in the two countries. One hundred years of civilization will not make a homogeneous whole of Arizona and New Mexico cut up by mountain ranges and vast desert stretches that by no act of man can ever be more than they now are, the two states can never be settled up so as to knit closely all parts together. It does seem to me that in their mad haste for statehood these 'joinists' are like unto the old maid, who praying in the wood for a husband, heard the owl above her cry 'Who? Who?' and replies, 'Anybody. Oh Lord, just so it's a man!' Like her they cry 'Anything. Oh noble senators, so it's statehood.' Will the people of New Mexico accept such a case of recognition? Here's one who says they won't."

## AS TO THE COMING CITY ELECTION.

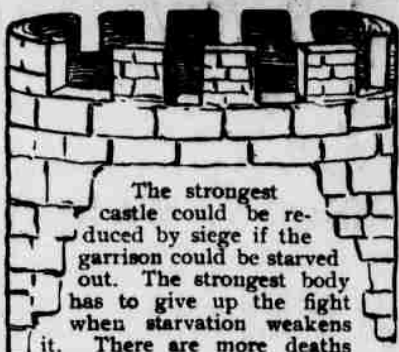
Much of the future progress and advancement of this city will depend upon the city officials to be elected next month. Four of the members of the city council and four of the members of the city board of education will be elected for terms of two years, and four members of each of these bodies for a term of four years. These two boards, with a mayor, will constitute the actual government of this town for these years; therefore, it is of the greatest importance, especially to the taxpayers and property owners, that energetic, honest and capable men be selected for these places. The burning question of the proper disposition of the lands within the Fort Marcy reservation not necessary for school purposes, must and will be settled by the board of education, which will be voted for next month. Many improvements are becoming necessary for the proper convenience, comfort and health of the citizens of Santa Fe, and these must be made under the direction of the new mayor and city council. The importance, therefore, of electing the right kind of city officials cannot and ought not be underestimated by the citizens of the capital, especially by its property owners and taxpayers.

## HELP THE WOMAN'S BOARD OF TRADE.

The Woman's Board of Trade of this city, an organization which has been of great benefit in the past and will do much good in the future, contemplates the erection of a building to be used as a library, opera house and assembly hall, as well as for a club home for its own use. The project is a very worthy and commendable one and the business men of Santa Fe and of course the property owners and real estate holders should aid the board in every possible manner towards carrying out this plan. A meeting of the business men of the city for the purpose of discussing the project with the members of the Woman's Board of Trade is called for Thursday evening next at the court house. Every citizen having the welfare, advancement and growth of the town at heart should attend. One of the questions to be discussed will be the advisability of the purchase by the Woman's Board of Trade of the lot now occupied by the board, corner of Palace and Lincoln Avenues, for the purpose of erecting the proposed structure thereon. This location is a very fine one and if used for the purpose named would insure good rentals as well as many conveniences for the city. Again the New Mexican on behalf of the Woman's Board of Trade urges the business men to attend the meeting Thursday evening for the full discussion and consideration of this very important subject.

From Washington comes the report that the south is soon to have an additional member of the cabinet. Why this is to happen is not explained. To westerners, it looks as if another western member of the cabinet would be preferable. Why not give the Rocky Mountain and Pacific coast states a member of that body? They are certainly doing more for the country and the Republican party than are the people of the southern states. The representatives of the latter in Congress mostly oppose everything that means progress and advancement and that is for the good name of the country at large, even if the south is especially to be benefitted by it.

The Russian railroads across the ice in Lake Balka have not proved a success. This was to be expected. Railroads built on water in any form cannot last any length of time.

## MINES AND MILLS.

**GRANT COUNTY.**  
B. B. Thayer, formerly manager of the Santa Rita Copper Company, has been appointed manager of the interests of the Amalgamated Copper Company in Montana. He will succeed William Scallan.

Last week a force of 40 men began the work of grading for the foundation of the concentrator for the Burro Mountain Copper Company, composed of Theodore Carter and the Leopolds of Chicago. The mill will be located just beyond the Sampson mine and about midway between that property and the St. Louis, both of which mines are under the control of the new company. The daily capacity of the concentrator will be 150 tons; although for the present it will not run to its full limit. The machinery for the plant was purchased from the Hearst estate and has been moved from Pinos Altos to the Burros. The plant originally cost \$110,000 and is one of the most complete in the southwest. The purchase price included the building, a fine Corliss engine and other machinery and the cage hoist of the Gillette mine with 26 steel cages. It is the intention of the company to have the mill completed next month. A new shaft is to be sunk on the Sampson, near the end line of the St. Louis. The Burro Mountain smelter or Johnson's smelter, is to be blown in on March 15. Coke is being hauled from Silver City to the smelter seven cars having been ordered from Colorado and Louisiana. The boiler is in position and the electric light plant is in readiness. About 100 men will be employed on the Virginia mine and smelter. Louis Osmer and E. J. Prest are employing a force of men on their group of claims at Gold Gulch. They are down 75 feet on the Myrtle and will crosscut at a depth of 100 feet. A new pumping plant will be installed at once to handle the water which is giving some difficulty.

**TAOS COUNTY.**  
J. L. Cummins last week moved from Red River to his mining property, the Gold Coin, above the Jayhawk. He will do considerable development work this year.

**THE METAL MARKET.**  
The metal markets have not been especially active during the past week except in the case of spelter. In copper, consumers are not taking very much interest in the market and business continues to be on a moderate scale, with prices again slightly lower. It is again reported that large quantities are being offered on the outside at a low figure. Tin shows some fluctuations and it is upon the whole somewhat higher. Consumption is on but a fair scale. Lead shows about the usual demand, and the price has advanced \$2 per ton. There has been some delay in deliveries, owing to the condition of the western railroads. Spelter is stronger and shows a very good demand, especially from galvanizers. The Joplin ore market also shows some advance, and competition among buyers is beginning to have effect. Silver is rather quiet, but prices are steady. Buying for private account in India continues on a good scale. The iron markets continue generally quiet, although there are indications of a revival of buying in certain finished products; for instance, rails, plates and bars. As regards pig iron, there is less change, but the general situation has been greatly strengthened by the reported purchase of 100,000 to 130,000 tons of Besemer pig by the United States Steel Corporation. The price mentioned is \$13 valley furnace, the Besemer Furnace Association to get one-half of the order and the independent furnaces the other half. In foundry irons the market is no stronger, owing to the activity of southern furnaces in taking orders at the recent 50 cent reduction in prices. Lake Superior ore producers held another meeting to reach an understanding on prices for the coming season, but adjourned without date for another call. The differences between the leading interests and the small producers were radical. The western coal trade shows a decidedly stronger tone. The joint conference of miners and operators in convention at Indianapolis did not agree on a mining scale, leaving the matter to a vote of the local unions. It is even said that some operators might desire a strike of a few weeks' duration in order to dispose of stocks of coal now on hand. In Chicago territory, Indiana and Illinois coal is especially wanted; at Pittsburgh prices are firm and at Cleveland prices have advanced an average of five cents per ton. In the seaboard bituminous trade, the conditions of poor car supply and slow transportation affected the market. The anthracite trade all over the country is better than at any time this winter.

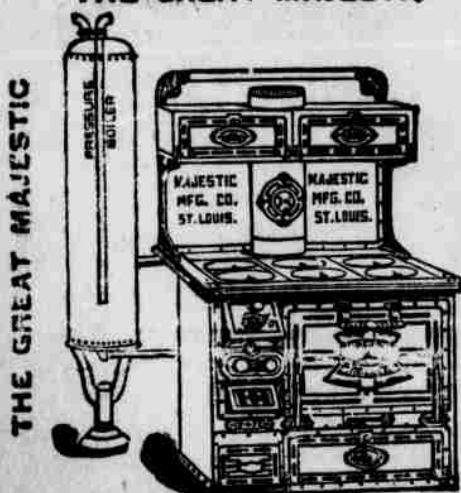

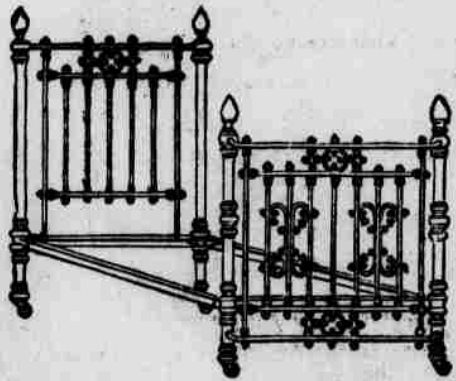

S. Edminston has resumed his duties as brakeman on the Denver & Rio Grande after a short vacation spent at Chama.

The Doran system of arc lights at J. E. Lacombe's Oxford Club is proving a success in every way. Mr. Lacombe has ordered a system to be placed in another establishment in the city.

W. J. McPherson today prepared his books, funds and papers, as city treasurer and treasurer of the board of education, so as to be able to make the transfer to his successor, W. E. Griffin, tomorrow.

The Denver & Rio Grande and the Santa Fe Central Railway Companies have completed arrangements for establishing stock yards in this city. C. P. Jones, the sheep dealer here, has leased the same.

John V. Conway today received the first souvenir dollar of the St. Louis World's fair. The souvenir dollar is neatly mounted on a stick pin and presents a very handsome appearance. The price of the pin is \$3.50.

J. B. Davis, formerly agent of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad in this city, and who several months ago accepted the agency for the same company at Chama, Rio Arriba County, has been transferred to Lumberton in the same county.

The public should not forget the entertainment to be given by the "Wailace Club" for the Woman's Board of Trade on March 17, that date should be reserved from engagements by all, as the program being now prepared will certainly be a treat both musical and artistic.

A trunk was received at Gold's Old Curiosity Shop yesterday, which came to New Mexico from Mexico in the seventeenth century. It has been handed down as an heirloom in one of the oldest families in Rio Arriba County. The late Abe Gold tried for ten years to purchase the property, and Mrs. Gold finally succeeded in securing it.

For the Republican territorial convention at Las Vegas, New Mexico, March 19th, the Santa Fe Railway will make an open rate of one full fare and one-fifth for the round trip from all points in New Mexico, from El Paso, Texas, and Trinidad, Colorado. The same basis of rates will apply for the Democratic territorial convention at Silver City, April 13th and 14th.

The following directors of the New Mexico Town Company and the Rio Grande Land Company, auxiliary to the Santa Fe Railway Company, met this morning at the office of the First National Bank: R. J. Palen, H. L. Waldo, R. E. Twitchell, J. H. Vaughn, R. C. Gortner and F. A. Manzanares. After declaring a 2 per cent dividend on the New Mexico Town Company stock and 1-1-2 per cent on the Rio Grande Land Company stock the meeting adjourned.

Yesterday was a beautiful spring day, quite a contrast to the blustering windy weather of today. The maximum temperature was 63 degrees at 3:30 p. m., minimum 36 degrees at 5 a. m., mean 50 degrees. Relative humidity 27 per cent, precipitation a trace of rain. Temperature at 6 a. m. today was 43 degrees. The weather bureau predicts generally fair tonight and Thursday except clearer in north portion tonight and much colder weather.

Tomorrow evening at the court house the members of the Woman's Board of Trade will hold a public meeting for the purpose of discussing the proposition of erecting a building to be used as an opera house, club home, assembly room and public library, with the business men and citizens of the town. Every resident and property owner who has the best interests of the city at stake is urgently requested by the Woman's Board of Trade to be present and aid in the solution of the problem.

It having been reported that some water consumers are in the habit of irrigating lawns and garden spots during the night, the management of the Santa Fe Water and Light Company desires to announce that it is imperative that such practice should cease at once, as the present supply of water in the reservoirs is comparatively small and weak for this time of the year and as the greatest care and economy in the use of water for domestic purposes must be observed until the water in the reservoirs accumulate and the reservoirs are filled to their fullest capacity. Under the rules of

the company, irrigation from 5:30 to 8:30 a. m. and from 5:30 to 9 p. m., is permitted, but it is against the regulations to use water during the night for that purpose. The management hopes that water consumers will heed this notice and not compel the company to take severe measures in this respect.

A freight wreck occurred at Sands siding north of Fulton station between Fulton and Las Vegas last evening which delayed trains Nos. 1 and 7, seven hours. Seven freight cars were derailed and considerable damage was done but no bodily injury to any one occurred. Nos. 1 and 7 did not reach the city until 1 o'clock this morning.

The United States District Court for the first judicial district convened at 10 o'clock this morning. Judge John R. McFie presiding, court officers present as on yesterday. The case of the United States versus Benito Griego for transgressing the Edmund's law occupied the attention of the court today.

Mrs. Mary Calahan has been appointed administratrix of the estate of Phillip Callahan.

Mrs. David Marcus, well known in Las Vegas, died at Anton Chico, during the past week. She was the niece of the Silver Brothers.

Word has been received in the Meadow City that LeRoy St. John who spent the greater part of the past winter in Las Vegas, died at his home in Barborton, Ohio, recently.

The report comes from Santa Rosa, that Dr. Desmarais, who, it was thought, attempted suicide by cutting his throat with a pen knife, is getting along very nicely and hopes are entertained for his recovery. It is now thought that the doctor did not attempt his own life but was attacked by some one who attempted to murder him. He is known to have several personal enemies and always sleeps with his door open. No possible reason for suicide can be imagined.

## TERRITORIAL TOPICS.

### SOCORRO COUNTY.

Some people claim that the water from the spring at the foot of Socorro Mountain is warmer than it was before the recent earthquakes shook the foundations of the earth in that locality.

### COLFAX COUNTY.

A young man who came to Maxwell City about a month ago from Canada hoping to regain his health as he had done once before, died at the Chico Sanitarium of consumption last week and his remains were shipped home.

Charles Dane, of Los Angeles, California, died at the home of his brother, M. E. Dane at Maxwell City recently. Mr. Dane spent last summer with his brother's family at Pagosa Springs. His health was very poor and he had grown steadily worse till the end came. He had stomach trouble. His remains were shipped to Los Angeles. Mr. Dane was 54 years old and leaves a wife and three sons.

### EDDY COUNTY.

Hezekiah Miles and Mrs. Alma Wales were married by Rev. E. F. Goodson at the Methodist parsonage at Carlsbad on March 2d.

Tootle, Wheeler and Motter were given judgment against W. E. Clark and James Clark of Carlsbad in the District Court for \$239.68 and costs, on suit for debt.

Work was finished last week on the new sewer line to Hagerman heights. The line is a little over 4,000 feet long and has no equal in the Pecos Valley. The work was done by the Carlsbad Hardware and Repair Company.

Alma Carter of Carlsbad has been granted a divorce from Dallas Carter, the decree being granted by Judge Pope last Wednesday. The plaintiff was given custody of the minor child.

The seven months old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Beckett, of Carlsbad, died last Wednesday. A short service was held at the residence, by Rev. D. B. Titus, on Thursday afternoon, followed by interment at the city cemetery.

The Ramsay-Brady Company was given judgment against Y. M. Millman for \$293.92, last week in the District Court. Millman is no longer a resident of the county, but \$100 which he had on deposit at the national bank of Carlsbad was ordered paid to the plaintiff on March 2d.

### CHAVES COUNTY.

Mrs. J. A. Hughes of Kansas City, who came to Roswell several months ago for the benefit of her health, died of consumption last week. She came to Roswell with two children and was later joined by her husband and a son eighteen years of age.

The remains of Mrs. A. D. McLean were shipped to her old home from Roswell last week for burial, and were accompanied by the husband. Mrs. McLean came to Roswell with her husband about the first of the year from Memphis in the hopes that the climate would prove beneficial, but she was in the last stages of consumption and grew steadily worse until the end.

Charley Johnson, a negro of Roswell, was bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Peacock on the charge of stealing fourteen chickens from a man named Causey. Johnson claims he bought the chickens from some men at midnight and paid \$1.50 for them. The bond was fixed at \$250 which was furnished and Johnson was released pending the action of the grand jury.

V. A. Hills and O. Chappell of Hutchinson, Kansas, arrived in Roswell several days ago with the intention of locating. They are engaged in the furniture business at Hutchinson and will likely open a furniture store in one of the new towns south of Roswell. Mr. Chappell says, if he does not engage in the furniture business he will purchase land, buy a tent and start to bore a well.

C. W. Wakeman, of Belding, Michigan, arrived at Greensfield to investigate the property he purchased there one year ago when he was in that place prospecting. He is a retired Michigan farmer, and he will likely locate in Greensfield with his family. He was very enthusiastic in his praise of the Pecos Valley. He says that after his return to Michigan last year he could talk about nothing but the Pecos Valley, and was constantly praising it to his friends.

Tallmadge and Tallmadge arrived in Roswell recently with two more cars of immigrants who come there with a view of purchasing land and locating with their families. There are about 50 men and one woman in the party. All of them are from Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois. When the party left Chicago last Tuesday there were three cars and about 75 prospectors, but several purchased land in Texas and fifteen or twenty returned to their homes before coming to the Pecos Valley. The two cars left the following morning for points south of Roswell and were driven around to inspect farms and ranches in one of the valleys.

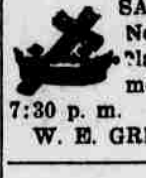

## MINERAL ON LAND GRANTS.

The Department Does Not Favor the Bill of Delegate B. S. Rodey.

From Denver Republican.

Delegate Rodey of New Mexico, has been trying to secure the passage of a bill providing for prospecting and the development of mineral claims within the limits of Spanish and Mexican land grants that have been confirmed by decision of the court of private land claims.

Accompanying nearly all these grants there was a reservation of the mineral by the government or grantor. An act of Congress passed in 1891 establishing the land grant court reaffirmed this reservation.

Since the surface of such grants belongs to the persons in whom they have been confirmed, no other private individual has a right to enter upon them for the purpose of extracting mineral. Hence Delegate Rodey seeks by his bill to authorize prospecting within the limits of a grant, notwithstanding the surface rights of the owners, and providing compensation to the latter for the use of whatever part of the surface may be needed in developing mineral claims.

This bill, has, however, been adversely reported upon by the interior department and for a reason which seems to be directly in conflict with the spirit of the grants. The report says that the reservation of mineral applied only to that known to exist at the time the act of 1891 became a law.

It is said that Mr. Rodey will try to change his bill to meet this objection, but it is not clear how he can do so and retain much of value to the mineral development of the grants except by the owners of the surface.

It certainly was the intention of the Spanish and Mexican governments to retain all the minerals named in the grants as reserved, without regard to whether it was known at the time to exist or not. It was certainly also the intention of the act of Congress to perpetuate the reservation originally made.

When these grants were made it was impracticable for the governments making them to possess much knowledge of the location of mineral or whether any at all existed. The same condition existed to a large extent at the time the act of Congress in question was passed. To hold that none but known mineral bodies were reserved by that act is to declare that the exclusive right to discoveries subsequently made or that may in the future be made belongs to the owners of the surface.
