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DECISION IN MERGER CASE

The Supreme Court of the United States Declares the Northern Securities Company Unlawful.

THE ANTI-TRUST LAW

Applies to Combinations of the Character of That of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific.

Washington, March 14—The opinion of the United States Supreme Court in the case of the Northern Securities Company vs. the United States, involving the merger of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern Companies, was handed down today and was in favor of the government. The opinion of the circuit court of Minnesota was affirmed. The effect is to sustain the contention that the Sherman anti-trust law applied to railroads and combinations of the character in question.

The opinion was read by Justice Harlan who said that in a merger of two roads the stockholders disappeared in the securities company, the two thus becoming practically consolidated in the holding of the company, the principal object being to prevent competition. "No scheme or device could certainly more effectively come within the prohibition of the anti-trust law and it is within the meaning of the act a trust."

News Received By President Hill. New York, March 14—J. J. Hill, president of the Northern Securities Company, has received the news of the decision at the company's office in this city. He declined to discuss the matter, except to say: "There is nothing to be said at this time. The properties of the Northern Securities Company are still there. They are as good as ever."

At the office of J. P. Morgan & Company, no expression regarding the decision could be had. A member of the firm stated, however, that he was not surprised. The stock was not generally affected by the decision.

Some Dissenting Voices. Washington, March 14—The merger decision was concurred in by Justice Brown, Brewer, McKenna and Day, while Chief Justice Fuller and Justices White, Peckham and Holmes dissented.

Roosevelt Satisfied With Decision of Court.

Washington, March 14—President Roosevelt received the news of the Supreme Court's decision in the Northern Securities case from the Associated Press. He expressed satisfaction that the court had sustained the government. Later he will express his personal congratulations to the attorney general.

Governor Van Sant Elated. St. Paul, Minn., March 14—Governor Van Sant when told of the decision in the merger case was highly elated. He said: "I am much gratified with the result of the decision, for in my opinion the decision means more to the people of our country than any event since the great civil war. It will for all time, prevent the formation of illegal trusts and unlawful combinations."

DIED UTTERING CHILDISH PRAYER

Thomas Tobin Electrocuted at Sing Sing for the Murder of Captain J. B. Craft.

Ossining, New York, March 14—Thomas Tobin was put to death today in the electric chair at Sing Sing, for the murder of Captain James B. Craft in New York City. He walked to the chair uttering a prayer which his mother had taught him when a child. Tobin was an ex-convict and was employed in a tenderloin saloon in September 1902, when Captain Craft visited the place. Craft displayed some money and was drugged. His body was thrown into the furnace.

THE EAST SNOW BOUND.

Street Car Lines Paralyzed and Traffic is Badly Impeded in Michigan and Wisconsin.

Detroit, Michigan, March 14—A furious blizzard descended upon Detroit and the lower Michigan during the night. Heavy snow drifting by a high east wind is delaying traffic considerably. Several street car lines are almost completely paralyzed.

Severe Blizzard Raging. Milwaukee, Wis., March 14—A severe blizzard started here about midnight and is still raging. The weather is the worst of the season.

Trains Impeded By Snow. Rock Island, March 14—Snow has been falling continuously for 24 hours and is now a foot deep on a level. All traffic is badly impeded.

BEATEN BY THREE MASKED MEN

Financial Manager of United Mine Workers of America Attacked on Passenger Train.

Trinidad, Colorado, March 14—Chris Evans was beaten by three masked men with six shooters while on board the Colorado & Southern passenger train today bound for Pueblo and was taken off the train at Walsenburg in a critical condition. The masked men boarded the train at the Santa Fe crossing near Trinidad, did quick work and jumped off. Two passengers, who saw the assault can give only a meager description, and there is no clue. Evans is the financial manager of the United Mine Workers of America. He was sent here by John Mitchell and was returning to the headquarters at Pueblo after passing Sunday in consultation with the miners' union officials in Trinidad.

SOCORRO REPUBLICANS

PORT ARTHUR HAS FALLEN

So Says Rumor But Russia Denies the Statement—President Roosevelt's Neutrality Proclamation Produces Great Impression in the Kingdom of the Czar.

St. Petersburg, March 14—Noon.—There is no truth in the rumors that the Russians have abandoned Port Arthur. Admiral Abaza, secretary of the commission of far Eastern affairs, authorizes the Associated Press to deny the story. He says the situation at Port Arthur is unchanged and that nothing of importance has occurred there in the past 24 hours. Wounded Russians in Red Cross Hospital.

Tokio, March 14—The salvers working on the Variag at Chemulpo found the bodies of two Russian sailors. They were taken ashore and buried today. Eight of the 23 wounded Russians who were taken to Matsuyama Red Cross Hospital are in a serious condition. One Russian has 165 wounds from steel splinters scattered over his body. The Japanese surgeon located them with the Rotengen rays and extracted them.

Russia Pleased With Proclamation. St. Petersburg, March 14—President Roosevelt's recent proclamation regarding the observation of neutrality by all officials in either speech or action that might cause irritation, has produced a great impression here, and newspapers all print prominent articles commending it.

Japanese Rescue Crews of Enemy's Ships.

Tokio, March 14—A supplementary report from Vice Admiral Togo concerning the effort made by the crews of the Japanese torpedo boat destroyers in the action off Port Arthur on the 10th instant to rescue the crews of disabled Russian torpedo boat destroyers, reached here today. Captain Shojiro Asai commanding the flotilla of torpedo boat destroyers, states that the Japanese would have been able to rescue many more of the enemy but for the deadly fire from the shore batteries and the close approach of the Russian cruiser Novik. As it was, only four were rescued.

IRRIGATION PROSPECTS.

Water in the Rio Grande Low in Some Places But Abundant Around Albuquerque.

Between El Paso and Las Cruces there is not enough water in the bed of the Rio Grande River to be of any use for irrigation, and for a considerable distance there is no water at all. From Las Cruces northward the whole aspect of the valley gradually changes until Albuquerque is reached, where there seems to be plenty of water for present demands.

Water at Berino Dona Ana County is scarce, but the connection which the ditches have with the Las Cruces system has so far given the farmers of the lower Mesilla Valley water enough to plant an unusually large acreage of wheat and alfalfa. In view of the reported shortage of snow in the mountains, G. W. Freeman is installing a pumping plant and the Ho-Ra Company is putting in three twelve horse power engines for the same purpose. In direct contrast to the above is the combine neighborhood action in cutting across the two large bends in the river between Earlham and Anthony. The first cut is nearly completed, while the other is to be commenced soon.

These cut offs will shorten the present river channel nearly six miles and it is the belief of all concerned that the flood of 1903 will not be repeated in the memory of the present inhabitants. The river bed will be deepened ten or twelve feet. The project is the direct result of the untiring efforts of D. J. Jones and W. S. Gilliam, though the community as a unit has worked nobly.

TOOK CARBOLIC ACID.

Mrs. Fred Horn of San Marcial Attempts Suicide on Account of Domestic Troubles.

Last week Mrs. Fred Horn of San Marcial, attempted suicide by taking two ounces of carbolic acid. Physicians were sent for and they worked with her during the night. Hopes are entertained for her recovery. The attempt to commit the deed of self destruction was caused by family quarrels. Mrs. Horn is the wife of the Santa Fe Railway station engineer at San Marcial.

OTERO AND DAME AS DELEGATES

So Say the Republicans of Bernalillo County in Convention Assembled at Albuquerque Saturday.

The Bernalillo Republican county convention held on Saturday last in the court house at Albuquerque, was presided over by E. W. Dobson, Frank Ackerman acting as secretary.

Many residents were awakened and the seismograph at the School of Mines showed an oscillation of three inches in the pendulum. President Keyes says that the recent earthquakes have been caused by slides in the Magdalena Mountains.

MINES AND MILLS.

A party of eastern capitalists and mining men from Massachusetts in company with the officers of the Dividend Mining and Milling Company, of Estey City, Socorro County, made a visit to the mines last week. The party consisted of James Austin, president of the company, from Fitchburg, Massachusetts, and formerly of the Austin Furniture Company; Benjamin F. Coburn, secretary and treasurer of the company, of Newton, Massachusetts, formerly governor and lieutenant governor of the state of Massachusetts, for six years, and ex-member of Congress from the same state; J. M. Bryson, general manager of the company, from Estey City; C. A. Dean, mining editor of the Boston Herald, who came with the party in the interests of his paper; O. E. Litchfield, a quarryman from Fitchburg, who owns one of the finest quarries in that state; William H. Hull, a brewery manufacturer and mining man of many years experience, of New Haven, Connecticut; H. E. Parkhurst, a capitalist and real estate man from Fitchburg, who came in the interests of a large number of capitalists from his section; L. W. Fuller, a real estate dealer of Fitchburg; George W. McIntosh, a real estate dealer of New Haven, Connecticut, who came in the interest of a large number of capitalists of his section.

"Our company owns 93 claims in the Estey City camp, carrying, I believe on an average for the entire camp, eight per cent copper," said Secretary Coburn upon his return from the west. "All the assays we have had made so far, except one, ran over 12 per cent and that one ran 5 per cent. This 5 per cent ore can be treated by a leaching process at two cents per pound. The rest of the ore is a carbonate and sulphide and can be economically treated by a smelting process."

"Our Mocking Bird claim so far shows up the best of any that we have. This vein is a true fissure with the walls well defined. On the east end of this vein we have plenty of silica, iron and lime for fluxing purposes."

"The development work that has been carried on so far has been on the Home, Mocking Bird, Maud, Eugene, Colorado No. 1 and No. 2. Considerable work has been done on these properties, but practically all the work that has been done on the other properties was simply the necessary assessment work. So far only a small amount of ore has been shipped from the Mocking Bird property and was shipped before we took charge of it."

"We now have a 50-ton smelter and a 100-ton leaching plant at the camp and ample ore on hand to run the plant for a number of years."

"Our camp is located about twelve miles from Oscura station on the El Paso & Northeastern, to which we haul our bullion and from which we receive our supplies. From the station to the camp we have a good wagon road."

"The company was first organized a little over two years ago and since that time we have been able to spend nearly \$300,000 in buying mines, continuing development work, erecting plants, building the wagon road and making other necessary improvements."

"One thing of very great importance to us is the discovery of coal beds close to the mining properties and we have purchased 160 acres of these coal lands. At a depth of 150 feet on the lands we have developed an 18-inch vein of good coking coal and are now putting down the shaft to strike a lower bed, which we hope will be larger and better than the first vein. I had samples of the coal sent to a chemist in Boston and his report was that it is an admirable coking coal and that it carries about 44 per cent pure carbon. This vein we will have developed and put in our own coking ovens. I was also informed while at Estey City that the El Paso & Northeastern Railroad had made a proposition to our company to put in a branch line from its present main line to the coal fields as soon as they are developed, that the road might get a supply of coal from them."

"We are going at the development of our interests in that section slowly, but with the aim to eventually make Estey City one of the largest camps in the southwest."

REPRESENTATION IN CON- STITUTIONAL CONVENTION

It is Proposed to Give New Mexico 113
and Arizona 66 Delegates.

A dispatch from Washington says
that the Republicans have agreed up-
on the apportionment of the delegates
to the constitutional convention in the
New Mexico-Arizona bill. Under its
provisions New Mexico will have 113
delegates in the convention to make
the state constitution and Arizona 66.

The proposed section providing for
the constitutional convention reads as
follows: "That all qualified electors
of said territories, respectively, as de-
scribed in the act, are hereby author-
ized to vote for and choose delegates
to form a convention for said terri-
tories; such delegates shall possess the
qualifications of such electors. The
aforesaid convention shall consist of
one hundred and seventy-nine dele-
gates, based on a population of one
thousand nine hundred and fifty, or
fraction of four hundred or over, for
each delegate, according to the last
census in New Mexico and Arizona
made by the United States, apportion-
ed among the several counties within
the limits of the proposed state as fol-
lows: From the counties of New Mex-
ico, namely Bernalillo County, nine
delegates; Chaves County, three dele-
gates; Colfax County, six delegates;
Dona Ana County, six delegates; Eddy
County, two delegates; Grant County,
six delegates; Leonard Wood County,
six delegates; Luna County, two dele-
gates; Lincoln County, four delegates;
McKinley County, two delegates; Mora
County, six delegates; Otero County,
three delegates; Quay County, two de-
legates; Roosevelt County, one dele-
gate; Rio Arriba County, seven dele-
gates; Sandoval County, four dele-
gates; San Juan County, three dele-
gates; San Miguel County, twelve de-
legates; Santa Fe County, eight dele-
gates; Sierra County, two delegates;
Socorro County seven delegates; Taos
County, six delegates; Union County,
three delegates, and Valencia County,
seven delegates, and from the counties
of the territory of Arizona, namely,
Apache County, five delegates; Co-
chise County, five delegates; Gila

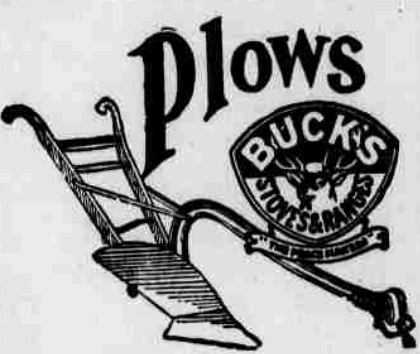

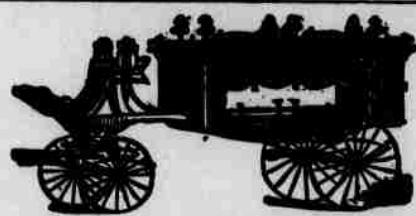
