OUTPOST ATTACKED

Manchurian Brigands Force Russians at Pan Lu Chan To Retreat.

LANDING NOT EFFECTED

Japanese Prevented From Reaching Woosen By Four of the Enemy's Ships Stationed in Possiet Bay.

New Chwang, March 18.—A band of mounted Manchurian brigands swooped down upon a Russian outpost near Pan La Chan town near Port Arthur, for a time the Russians withstood the attack but finally were forced to retreat, leaving two maxims on the field. The casualties are not stated. The Russian flag which has been flying on the public buildings at New Chwang has been hauled down and replaced by the French emblem.

Corea Not a Belligerent State Says Russia.

St. Petersburg, March 18.—A communication from the foreign office is published here to the effect that Russia does not regard Corea as belligerent and will not do so until there is evidence that Corea is actively making common cause with Japan. The communication, after asserting that Russia considers it implicitly a neutral state, acting under pressure by Japan and deprived of power of free action, and Russia cannot therefore regard as valid any treaty to benefit Japan proceeds:

"Should the Russian troops encounter the Korean forces operating against the Russians under the influence of Japanese officers, who are forcing them to act against the wishes of the Korean government, the Russians are instructed not to fight them as though they were troops of a belligerent state, but to confine themselves to placing them under arrest."

Landing at Woosen Delayed.

Seoul, March 18.—The proposed landing of the Japanese at Woosen on the eastern coast, has been further delayed by the threatening attitude of the Vladivostok squadron consisting of four ships now anchored at Possiet Bay, an excellent base for attacking a Japanese transport approaching Woosen.

Russian Cruiser Variag to Be Raised.
Chemulpo, March 18.—The work of raising the Russian cruiser Variag in Chemulpo harbor is proceeding rapidly by means of a complete wrecking outfit brought from Japan. The authorities express the hope that the ship will be placed in commission within a few months.

Admiral Stackelberg Returns to St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, March 18.—Admiral Stackelberg, who on account of illness turned over the command of the Vladivostok squadron to Captain Reitzenstein, has arrived in St. Petersburg. He gives an entirely different version of some of the reports emanating from Japanese sources regarding events before he left. The cruise of the squadron on February 9 to 15, in Japanese waters was for its effect on the inhabitants and population in northern Japan. He denies that they fired on Japanese merchantmen in the Sangar straits. He says the ships were captured and a storm coming up, the crews and passengers were taken off, one steamer sunk and the other, a worthless tramp steamer, was allowed to carry the news to the Japanese. There never was a bombardment of Hakodate, which is heavily fortified. He expressed the opinion that the war would be of long duration as the Japanese had made extensive preparations.

More Friendly Attitude Hoped For.
St. Petersburg, March 18.—The Gazette expresses the hope that the Anglo-French understanding will result in a more friendly attitude on the part of Great Britain towards Russia. A diplomat, representing a small European power, expresses the hope that China will join Japan on the theory that all the white powers, including the United States will then be compelled to form a coalition and stop the war which would ruin the trade of the whole world with China. But he fears Japan realizes the danger and will decline China's aid.

All Quiet at Port Arthur.
Port Arthur, March 18.—Last night and today passed quietly.

Casualties on Both Sides Heavy.
Port Arthur, March 18.—According to information received from the Russians at Shanghai, during the fighting at Port Arthur, on February 10 and 11, the battleship Mikasa was struck by ten projectiles and seriously damaged. Two Japanese battleships and two cruisers have been docked for repairs at Nagasaki and Sasebo, and 2,000 wounded men are said to be in the Japanese hospitals.

All the Russian wounded and sick at Port Arthur are making good progress towards recovery.

TO INTRODUCE THE ELAND.

The Giant African Antelope Into New Mexico—Delegate Rodey Making Efforts in That Direction.

Washington, March 18.—The last number of the Scientific American gives a photograph of the African eland, a giant antelope that grows almost to the size of the elk, and the meat of which is said to surpass the finest beef. The animal is said to be very prolific from a breeding standpoint, and to be peculiarly adapted to dry climates.

Delegate Rodey has requested the secretary of agriculture to try to procure a few of the animals and have a test made of the practicability of raising them in New Mexico. The department is making experiments along similar lines as to animals from different countries adapted to various sections of the United States.

PORTLAND MINERS IN CONFERENCE

Are Advised By President Burns to Withdraw From Western Federation and Form New Union.

Colorado Springs, March 18.—A committee of Portland miners, representing the employees of that property, arrived here this morning and immediately went into a conference with President James F. Burns.

It is understood that Burns will back the committee, which will recommend all employees of the Portland to withdraw from the Western Federation of Miners, form a new union and ally themselves with the American Federation of Labor.

CLAIMS \$10,000 DAMAGES.

A Colorado Writer Accuses Harper & Brothers of Mutilating His Story Published By Them.

Denver, March 18.—Walter Juan Davis, a writer for newspapers and magazines filed suit in the District Court of Denver today against Harper & Brothers, a publishing company of New York, asking for \$10,000 damages for alleged mutilation of his story, "A Spendthrift," which was published in Harper's Weekly of January this year. The story was published with reductions to about one-half of its original length and in editing the plaintiff claims, his work was denuded of its literary features and otherwise badly mutilated.

WILL ACCEPT OPERATORS' OFFER

Count of Votes of Miners Assembled at Indianapolis Results in Majority Against Strike.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 18.—Tellers today completed the count of the miners of the proposition to accept or reject the operators' offer of a two years' wage scale. The vote for acceptance was 98,514 against 67,373. The majority against the strike was 31,141.

WIFE MURDERER HANGED.

In a Drunken Frenzy Louis H. Mott Committed the Deed in January 1903.

Missoula, Montana, March 18.—Louis H. Mott was hanged this morning for the murder of his wife. Mott had been addicted to the use of drugs and liquor, and in a frenzy killed his wife on January 4, 1903. The case was taken to the Supreme Court and every effort made to save Mott by his uncle, Lemuel Mott, a wealthy miller of Des Moines, who came to Montana and made a personal appeal to the Governor. All his appeals were based on the fact that he wished to escape the stain upon his name for the sake of his children solely.

FIRE FIEND'S WORK

Gray's Opera House and the Herlow Residence on Water Street Destroyed Last Evening.

WAS PARTLY INSURED

Loss \$2,500—Pressure Strong and Plenty of Water—Firemen Did Good Work.

The worst fire that Santa Fe has experienced since August, 1901, when the building on the corner of San Francisco Street and Don Gaspar Avenue occupied by the Santa Fe Mercantile Company, burned, occurred last evening. Gray's Opera House and the residence of T. A. Herlow were totally destroyed. Mr. Herlow discovered about 5:45 p. m., that the frame structure on Water Street known as Gray's Opera House was on fire. He immediately gave the alarm but the fire had taken such hold that within ten minutes the building was an entire mass of seething flames. The fire company responded as promptly as the lack of teams would permit. When the firemen arrived upon the scene the flames were licking against the western wall of the county jail and several of the window frames were smoldering. Sheriff H. C. Kinsell, the jailer and the six prisoners aided materially in preventing the fire from gaining headway in the jail. They used a small hose and checked the flames.

The wind veered shortly afterwards, thus taking the jail out of danger but spreading the fire to the one and a half story brick and adobe dwelling occupied by T. A. Herlow and family. The hard work of the firemen could not save the building, but all the furniture was taken out and carried into the back yard. The firemen worked like Trojans to prevent the fire from spreading to the adjoining three story brick and adobe residence property of John Shaw of Roswell.

Again and again the window frames and the cornice were smoldering, but fortunately there was a good water pressure and the building was saved. The frames of the doors and windows were torn out by the firemen to prevent the spread, despite the intense heat and the shower of sparks to which they were exposed. The stables and warehouses on the north side of Water Street were on fire several times but a bucket brigade and a line of fire hose laid from San Francisco Street kept the conflagration from spreading.

While the Herlow residence was burning a number of cartridges exploded but did no damage. About a thousand people gathered to see the fire which, however, had been roped off.

A dance was to have taken place in Gray's Hall last evening and it was fortunate that the fire occurred so early in the evening. By 7 o'clock the flames were under control, although the blaze had to be watched for several hours afterwards. Considering that the firemen were badly handicapped by having insufficient fire hose, they did good work and certainly prevented the further spread of the fire. Both buildings destroyed were owned by Mrs. Sophia Herlow. The hall was uninsured and its value is placed at about \$1,000. There was about \$500 insurance on the house and its value was about \$2,500.

The electric light fixtures, stoves, sheet music and a number of band instruments, the property of the Capital City Band were destroyed, their loss amounting to about \$200. The fire is supposed to have started from the stove near the stage in which coal oil had been used to start the fire.

The wind was rather high and carried the sparks and burning splinters for a block or more.

Complaint was made that there was some pilfering of household goods taken out of the Herlow and adjoining residences. The alarm last evening was the second during the day and the fire emphasized the necessity of keeping the fire apparatus in first class trim and the fire companies well drilled.

INFERNAL MACHINE EXPLODES

Near Residence of Commissioner of Police Laurent—Cavalry Officer and Others Badly Wounded.

Liege, Belgium, March 18.—An infernal machine exploded today outside the residence of Commissioner of Police Laurent, wrecking the house, fatally injuring an artillery officer, Major Papin and seriously wounding half a dozen other persons. When the machine was discovered Major Papin was summoned and was examining the package in which the machine was concealed when the explosion occurred. Thousands of windows in the neighborhood were shattered. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the outrage.

LAND LAW CHANGES

Senator Quarles' Measure for Sale of Government Timber Reported Favorable.

TO BE AUCTIONED OFF

Strong Effort to Increase Appropriation for Agricultural Colleges in States and Territories.

Washington, March 18.—The favorable report today on the Quarles bill, providing for the sale of government timber by auction, is regarded as the end of all efforts to effect a repeal of public land laws at this session. The bill practically repeals the timber act and leaves the stone act, the desert land law and commutation clause of the homestead act still open to dispute as to their proposed repeal. The report of the President's public lands commission, when it comes out, will probably have much to do with the question of a further change in the present law.

Senator Hansbrough offered and had accepted an amendment to the Quarles bill, which applies the proceeds of the sale of timber to the arid land reclamation fund.

No bill introduced in Congress in several years has been pushed with more vigor by its friends. Mr. Quarles, who has been fighting more stubbornly by its enemies than the original bill fathered by Senator Quarles, which provided for the repeal of the timber and stone act, the desert land act and the commutation clause of the homestead law. For two years the committee on public lands has had the measure almost constantly before it, and the heated contests have been so frequent that they threatened many times to break the personal regard in which the members of the committee had been no exception. Last year the committee reported the bill over the head of the chairman, Senator Hansbrough, but he served notice that it could not be passed, and it died with the Congress. This year all the Democratic members of the committee, except Senator Dubois, and three Republican members—Senator Barlow, Nelson and Dietrich—were again against him, making a majority of one in favor of reporting the land bill. Chairman Hansbrough declined to put the motion for reporting the bill without having a chance to be heard in opposition to the measure. He was charged with filibustering, but remained steadfast. That was at the meeting last week, and the committee was compelled to adjourn without taking action. Chairman Hansbrough talked to members of the committee individually, and gave as his view that the bill, if passed, would upset the land laws of the entire country and turn to Canada the great stream of immigration that was now building up the west. He declared the homestead law vital to the interests of the unimproved west, and suggested to the friends of the bill that a measure be introduced for the repeal of the timber and stone act only. He won Senator Nelson to the same view, and the bill was introduced by Senator Quarles and approved by the committee.

The public lands committees of both the House and Senate were in session this morning, the main business of each being the consideration of bills pertaining to timber lands. The Senate committee agreed to report a bill providing that timber upon public lands, after being duly appraised, should be sold at auction to the highest bidder, instead of by the acre at a stipulated price as heretofore. This practically repeals the present timber law.

The House committee reconsidered Mondell's bill affecting lieu lands and reported it back favorably, with the amendment that persons now holding timbered lands within forest reserves would be allowed to select timbered lands in lieu thereof. The bill provides that worthless lands within reserves shall not be exchanged for timbered lands on the public domain.

The agricultural appropriation bill is still hung up by the conference committee appointed to agree on amendments added to the bill by the Senate, among which is the provision of \$50,000 for cattle feeding experiments in the west.

Congressman Brooks expressed his opinion, this morning that an appropriation of \$25,000 would be allowed for this work and the Fort Collins experiment station would get its share, in spite of the belief held by several that all amendments added to the bill by the Senate would eventually fail. The conference will not proceed until the return of Representative Wadsworth from the south next week.

The House committee on agriculture is holding hearings on a bill to provide \$5,000 additional annual appropriation for state agricultural experimental stations and a gradual increase of this amount annually until the present appropriation of \$15,000 is doubled. The station at the state agricultural college at Fort Collins will be affected by this bill.

MEETING OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

Of New Mexico Board of Managers to St. Louis Exposition—Officers Elected—Work Laid Out.

Pursuant to call issued by Mrs. Otero, president of the woman's auxiliary of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition commission for New Mexico, the board met at the executive residence in Santa Fe on Thursday, March 17, 1904, at 2 o'clock, and completed organization by appointing Mrs. William Curtis Bailey of Las Vegas, as manager, and Miss Clara H. Olson of Santa Fe as secretary.

The president then stated the object for which the meeting had been called and placed before the board for discussion the question of securing a suitable exhibit for display in the woman's building at the fair. A thorough discussion followed in regard to the nature of the exhibit the class and quantity of articles to be accumulated for this purpose, and methods of proceeding to secure same.

It was then directed that the president address a communication to all the members of the board asking that they at once take steps toward collecting in their respective counties all articles available and suitable for the exhibit desired, such as hand work of exquisite make or design, valuable shawls, old lace, hand painted china, bead work, old silver, valuable paintings or pieces of sculpture, old jewelry, or extraordinary gems, curios, pressed flowers, fruit, etc., at the same time advising the members that the World's Fair commission for New Mexico agree to pay all transportation charges on such exhibits, place them under insurance and to be responsible for the return of the articles, thus using every possible precaution towards the safe keeping and due return of everything loaned for exhibition.

A communication from the commissioners of New Mexico was then read which asked that the woman's auxiliary aid them in securing pictures and other decorations for the New Mexico building, and Mrs. Bailey was authorized by the board to take entire charge of this matter and make such collection as she might decide upon.

The board then directed its president Mrs. Otero, and its manager, Mrs. Bailey, to attend the next meeting of the New Mexico commission and report to it a body what steps had been taken by the woman's auxiliary and results accomplished, also to confer with them fully in regard to the work in hand.

The question of place and time for holding the next meeting of this auxiliary was then presented, and it was directed that the board meet on March 31, 1904, 2 o'clock p. m., at the residence of Mrs. William Curtis Bailey, the plaza, Las Vegas, New Mexico.

There being no further business, the board thereupon adjourned.

FAILURE OF STOCK MANIPULATOR

Daniel J. Sully's Liabilities Will Probably Mount Up in the Millions. Declines to Talk.

New York, March 18.—The suspension of Daniel J. Sully and Company, the senior member of which is Daniel J. Sully, an operator whose dealings in and manipulation of the cotton market has been the sensation of the speculative world for several years, was announced on the cotton exchange today. This announcement came at the close of a long decline in the prices of future contracts. After the suspension was announced Sully locked himself in his office and declined to give out a statement. There are wild guesses as to his liability but all agree they must be up in the millions.

Tremendous Slump in Cotton Market.
New Orleans, March 18.—The announcement of the failure of Sully created a tremendous sensation in the cotton exchange and a tremendous slump. Shortly after the bulletin came over the wires the market was reported down to \$10 per bale.

STRIKE GROWING IN MAGNITUDE
Improbable That a Settlement Will Be Reached Today and Employers Are Preparing for the Worst.

New York, March 18.—Twenty thousand bricklayers and laborers and about 2,000 iron workers are on a strike and unless a settlement can be reached at the conference today the strike will probably spread till about 100,000 men are involved. The employers, considering it improbable that any settlement will be reached are preparing for the strike which they believe will follow. Members of the unions, who will be out of work because they cannot proceed with building without the bricklayers, are said to be indignant that the bricklayers should tie up the whole building industry.

Twenty-five hundred lithographers have struck rather than be locked out. They quit when they found they must sign an arbitration agreement or be discharged.

THE LIFE OF AN OLD PIONEER

Some Reminiscences From an Autobiographical Sketch of the Late Elias Brevoort.

FRIEND OF KIT CARSON

Stories of the Early Days of the Occupation of New Mexico by the United States.

The late Elias Brevoort who died at Silao, Mexico, a few days ago, had an interesting career. He was an old-timer in New Mexico, possessed of some literary ability and well versed in the history of New Mexico pioneer days. The New Mexican herewith reproduces from a short autobiographical sketch found among his papers, a number of incidents which he relates.

Elias Brevoort was born on September 22, 1822, at Detroit, Michigan, of French parentage. He was an old-timer in New Mexico, possessed of some literary ability and well versed in the history of New Mexico pioneer days. Several of Brevoort's drivers were in the conspiracy with Fox and their places were taken by 20 Shawnee Indians. The caravan arrived on schedule time at Westport, Missouri. A pair of six shooters were ordered from Colt's factory, and presented to Carson. They had a silver plate upon which was engraved an inscription commemorating the occasion. Carson carried these six shooters on many a trip against hostile Indians. In the spring of 1850, Brevoort returned to Santa Fe with C. E. Kearney and a merchandise train. In 1852 he went to California via El Paso, Chihuahua, Durango and Mazatlan. The party consisted of Brevoort, Henry O'Neil, and Vicente St. Vrain, John Frisco and a man named Rohrman.

The party remained at Mazatlan two months waiting for a ship. The evening before the vessel was to leave, the equinoctial storm came near wrecking all the ships in the harbor. He arrived in San Francisco on November 22. It rained for 35 days without the sun appearing once. This discouraged Brevoort and he went down the coast as far as Los Angeles and remained there until the next fall, when Kit Carson and a party of old mountaineers who had driven sheep to California two years before put in their appearance. They were returning to New Mexico loaded with gold slugs (\$50 pieces). They had several mule loads of the stuff which was so heavy that it broke down nearly all the animals. The caravan ran short of provisions and Brevoort gave up the mule he was riding so as to help carry the gold. He walked the entire distance from Yuma, Arizona, carrying an eighteen pound rifle, a pistol, and yet showing no evidence of fatigue. It took two months to make the trip from Los Angeles. At Santa Fe Brevoort entered the employ of Preston Beck, as clerk, but was appointed sutler for the troops in 1856, who were ordered to take possession of the Gadsden Purchase for which \$10,000,000 had been paid Mexico by the United States. At the breaking out of the civil war, Brevoort returned to Santa Fe from Arizona where a report reached him that one of the wagon masters of the quartermaster's department, while advancing supplies south had taken advantage of the situation and had run his train across the boundary into Chihuahua, where he was disposing of the

TAOS COUNTY.

The shaft is 165 feet deep and crosscuts amounting to over 6,000 feet have been made. The ore is free milling and can be easily treated on the ground. The company has been reorganized and is backed by Cleveland capital.

The Cashier property will soon resume work near Red River and is getting ready to patent four of its claims.

SANTA FE COUNTY.
 Says Jo E. Sheridan, United States coal mine inspector for New Mexico in his annual report:
 Santa Fe County ranks fourth among the coal-producing counties of New Mexico, the coal measures of this county merit and have attracted more attention than the coal fields of any other county in New Mexico. This is due not to the extraordinary extent of the coal beds, but to the peculiar geological conditions which there prevail. In the immediate vicinity of the town of Madrid are found strange and anomalous coal beds.

The bituminous and anthracite coals occur in juxtaposition in the same coal seam. The younger coal seams of the series are sometimes highly metamorphosed and anthracitized, while the older veins have not passed the bituminous stage. In some instances a part of a coal vein may be anthracite, while a few hundred yards distant, laterally, the same vein may produce bituminous coal. The geological peculiarities of these coal measures are due to the action of intrusive sheets of porphyry, the near approach of which in places furnished the agency for local metamorphism of the coal measures, thus producing the anthracite coal here found.

The coal produced from the Cerrillos Bituminous (Cook & White) mine has until recently been a noncoking coal, but it was found that at a depth of about 2,600 feet, in the slope, the coal had changed to a very good coking coal. This change would indicate the nearer approach to one of the intrusive sheets, and the possible change from bituminous to anthracite coal as closer approach is made to the intrusion.

The principal mines of the district are the Cerrillos bituminous, formerly known as the Cook & White, and the Cerrillos anthracite, formerly called the Lucas mine.

The mines just named demand and receive constant attention from the mine inspector. This necessity arises from the fact that these are among the few dangerously gaseous mines in the Territory.

New developments in other coal areas of Santa Fe County have attracted much attention during the past year. The Una del Gato, Coyote, and Pinavittos coal field has proved to be an area of great value as well as of considerable extent. The gross product of Santa Fe County for the past fiscal year was 97,359 tons, a decrease of 6,102 tons from the production of the preceding year. The decrease of production was due to the suspension of operation and development upon the lower entries of the Cerrillos bituminous mine, which suspension was caused by the fire in that part of the mine a year ago. The mine has been allowed to fill with water in that section and is now flooded in the locality where the fire burned. It is more than probable that operation and development of these lower areas will soon be resumed and that the increased production from this mine, together with the output from the Una del Gato and adjacent coal mines, will show a large increase in the production of Santa Fe County during the ensuing year.

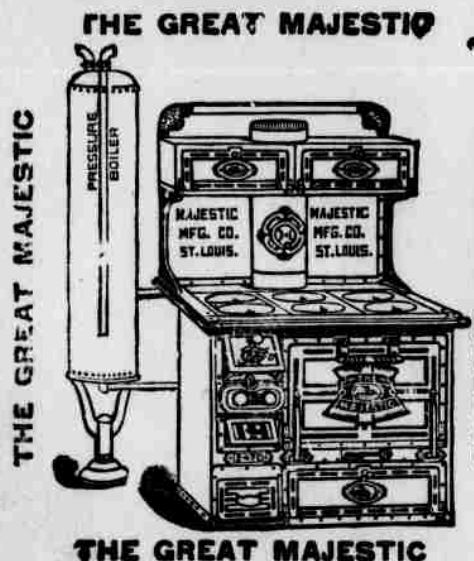

dispatch dated yesterday confirms a previous report that about 5,000 Japanese pioneers are engaged in building a field railroad from Seoul northward, and says the railroad from Fusan to Seoul will not be completed before October. A correspondent also confirms the report that the Russian horse artillery has withdrawn to the north bank of the Yalu and says a part of the cavalry has also been withdrawn, leaving only a weak post at Syon Chyon, south of Wiju.

Loss of the Skori Unconfirmed.

St. Petersburg, March 18.—The admiralty has no confirmation of reported loss of the torpedo boat destroyer Skori off Port Arthur.

Report of Japanese Defeat Unconfirmed.

Paris, March 18.—There are no reports at the foreign office or elsewhere confirming the Bourse rumor of a great Japanese defeat which probably grew out of the unconfirmed Shanghai report of the defeat of 200 Japanese by a Russian force of 300.

Decided to Fly the Country.

Seoul, March 18.—The U. S. cruiser took to Che Foo, Corea, General Yihak Kyumen and Chamberlain Hak Sang, both advocates of the declaration of the neutrality of Corea submitted to the powers in January, the effect of which would have been favorable to Russia. When the Japanese were victorious at Chemulpo, Hak Sang decided to fly the country and asked Minister Allen to allow him to go on the Cincinnati.

Allen declined unless the Japanese minister, Hayashi, had no objections. The latter offered to take him away on a Japanese boat but Hak Sang was afraid to accept and renewed his request to Minister Allen, to which Minister Hayashi consented.

OLD PIONEER**

Continued from Page One.

outfit. Brevoort, Thomas Massie and a lieutenant went to Chihuahua to recover the government property. While on Mexican soil, a party of Confederates from Texas took the trio prisoners and turned them over to the commanding officer at Fort Bliss, Texas. Massie and Brevoort were permitted to walk about inside of the fort and after a few hours were informed that they were at liberty to go wherever they pleased. Brevoort made his way to Mesilla and subsequently to Chihuahua on a mission for Don Juan Zubiran, formerly consul at Juarez and at El Paso, to see the Governor of Chihuahua regarding his furnishing 150 Mexican soldiers to accompany Zubiran and Brevoort into the heart of the Yaqui Indian country to discover and take possession of a ledge of pure silver from which the Apaches cut chunks and beat the same into shape. Unfortunately, a revolution broke out and the Governor, Terrazas, declined to send the 150 soldiers as an escort. Brevoort returned to El Paso and had no sooner arrived when he was informed that he was to be hanged as a spy upon his return to Santa Fe. He made inquiries but could not get at the bottom of the report and finally wrote to General West commanding the Federal troops at Mesilla, that he was desirous to return to Santa Fe but was prevented by failure to obtain a pass and the report that he was to be hanged as a spy. After some explanations and considerable correspondence, Brevoort obtained permission to go to Santa Fe but as a prisoner. He declined the humiliation and crossed the line into Mexico, again went to Matamoros, where he was in business until after the surrender of General Lee, returning to Santa Fe in 1865. Several years afterwards, Amado Chaves showed Brevoort a letter signed by a Federal officer dated at Tucson, which accused him of being a spy. There was an order issued upon this to hang Brevoort, who was innocent of the charge and naturally very indignant. The letter is in the possession today of ex-Governor L. B. Prince. Upon his return to Santa Fe, Mr. Brevoort was appointed forage agent to forage for Colonel E. H. Bergman and his troops en route to Tierra Amarilla. Subsequently he went prospecting with his old friend, Lucien Stewart and finally established a real estate agency at Santa Fe in 1872, which he maintained until he left a few weeks ago for Mexico to recuperate his health which had become seriously impaired on account of an affection of the kidneys.

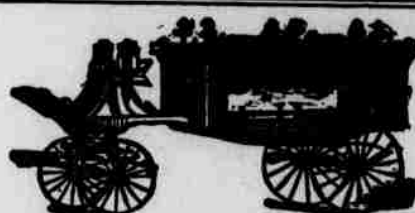
