## PEACE IN SAMOA.

Maliotua Tannu Abdicates Throne  
and Harmony Prevails.

Dr. Self Assumes Office as President  
of Municipal Council.

Commission Sustains the Decision of Chief  
Justice Chambers.

KINGSHIP IS ABOLISHED.

Berlin, June 22.—An official dispatch from Apia, Samoa, confirms the dispatches of the Associated Press from Apia announcing the Maliotua Tannu abdication in favor of the Samoan commissioners, who appointed the provisional government, composed of three consuls. An interesting point is the German confirmation of the statement that the commission recognized the competence of the chief justice to select a king. The official dispatch received in Berlin says the chief justice and municipal authorities will exercise their functions until further notice, and Dr. Self, the German president of the municipal council of Apia, has assumed office.

PEACE RESTORED IN SAMOA.  
Washington, June 22.—The secretary of state has received a dispatch from Bartlett Trippe, United States commissioner at Apia, saying that peace is restored in the island; the commission sustained the decision of Chief Justice Chambers in the contested election of king; Maliotua Tannu resigned; the kingship is to be abolished and a provisional government established.

SHOT BY THE GUARDS.

J. H. Reynolds Killed at the President's  
White Trying to Pass the Lines.

San Francisco, June 22.—The Examiner prints a story strongly intimating that John H. Reynolds, a wealthy member of a casual detachment at the President, was killed while trying to pass the lines Sunday morning. It is stated that members of the detachment say that Reynolds was shot down by William G. Harris, of the Twenty-fourth Infantry, and Harry Watts, John Tyrrell and Harry Barton, also members of casual companies, were wounded by Trooper William Sheehan, of the Fourth cavalry. Barton is alleged to be in the post hospital with bullet wounds in the left forearm and left side. The men were attempting to reach their quarters after having visited several down-town resorts, when, it is alleged, they were discovered by the guards and fired on.

The German Reichstag.  
Berlin, June 22.—The reichstag today rejected the motion to refer the labor protection bill to a committee. The conservatives, imperialists and a portion of the national liberals voted with the government in the minority. The reichstag passed, at their third reading, the Spanish islands bill. The members gave three cheers for Emperor William, and a session was declared adjourned until November.

Another Child Kidnapped.  
South Framingham, Mass., June 22.—The community is excited over the disappearance of Helen Kames, the 11-year-old daughter of Alfred M. Kames, a wealthy wheel manufacturer. She was last seen leaving her father's office at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It is feared the child has been kidnapped.

Kentucky Democrats.  
Louisville, Ky., June 22.—After a brief morning session, the democratic convention adjourned until evening to allow the committee to work. The Stone-Goebel combination captured the majority organization. The convention is held for silver and Bryan.

Admiral Schley Controversy.  
New York, June 22.—A dispatch to the Herald from Washington says: Should the president decide after consultation with Secretary Long not to direct an investigation of the Schley controversy, the suggestion will be advanced that the admiral be given duty at sea as he desires.

Havisher Burned Alive.  
New York, June 22.—A dispatch to the Herald from Rio Janeiro says: A mob forced the jail at Rio Grande and seized Jean Panare, a Frenchman, accused of assaulting a little 3-year-old girl, and after torturing him the mob burned him alive.

Soldiers Die in Havana.  
Washington, D. C., June 22.—Governor General Brooke, at Havana, under date of June 21, cables the war department that two more soldiers have died.

Damaged by Wind.  
Waterloo, Iowa, June 22.—The tornado last night blew down many barns. No loss of life is reported but much stock was killed.

The Pope's Constancy.  
Rome, June 22.—The pope held a public consistory today to present the late recently made for the cardinals, with the exception of the papal nuncio at Madrid and the archbishop of Gorizia. About 3,000 people were present, including the diplomatic corps, the church dignitaries and the Latin American bishops. The

pope was in good health. He conducted the ceremony with ease, and was loudly acclaimed upon his entry and departure from the hall. He afterwards held a secret consistory with the usual ceremony of opening and shutting the mouths of the new cardinals. The pope announced among the appointments to bishoprics, Father Christie, of Oregon; Father Dennis O'Conner, of Toronto, and Father Clontier, of Three Rivers, Quebec.

Dewey in Ceylon.  
Columbo, Island of Ceylon, June 22.—The United States cruiser Olympia, with Admiral Dewey on board, arrived here this morning, saluted and the fort replied. Dewey landed and proceeded by train to Kandy. He will remain in Ceylon about a week. The admiral says he had a good voyage from Singapore and his health is fairly good.

THE ELKS' REUNION.

New Officers Will Be Elected This Afternoon—One Contest.

St. Louis, June 22.—The principal events of the Elks' reunion today were the prize drill and the meeting of the grand lodge. It is expected the election of officers will take place late this afternoon. Judge H. M. Allen, of Birmingham, Ala., will succeed Walter John Gault, of Cincinnati, who declined re-election. He is the only candidate. The only contest for grand secretary, George A. Reynolds, secretary for the past five years, and Earl W. Lyon, of St. Louis, are candidates.

In the drill contest there were only two contestants, the Toledo Elks and the Elks, commanded by Capt. W. H. Cook, and the Louisville lodge team, commanded by Capt. John H. Leathers.

The Khalifa Defeated.  
Cairo, Egypt, June 22.—It is announced that the Khalifa has been defeated with heavy loss by natives, friendly to the British. It is added that he fled to the woods with a few followers, and his capture is imminent.

The President's Party.  
North Adams, Mass., June 22.—President McKinley, with Mrs. McKinley and friends, who reached here yesterday, and who will be the guests of W. B. Plunkett for a week, had a restful day. No regular program has been mapped out for the next few days.

French Cabinet Crisis.  
Paris, June 22.—Senator Waldeck Rousseau has requested today by President Loubet to form a cabinet immediately.

CONVICTED OF TREASON.

Arguelles, Filipino Commissioner, Gets Twelve Years' Imprisonment.

Manila, June 22, 7:30 p. m.—Details of the sentencing of Col. Arguelles, the Filipino commissioner, to twelve years' imprisonment, have just been obtained here. It was first reported that his condemnation by the Filipinos was due to the friendship displayed towards Americans, but the information just received shows that the accusation against him is not based on his peace policy. The charge against him is that he conspired with the insurgents against the government. The charge against the colonel was that in conversation with Philippine officers, he suggested that disorders within the insurrection territory would be settled by a truce, and therefore he said he considered autonomy under the Americans preferable to independence. The Filipino congress tried him on the charge of treason. Finally he was sentenced to death but it was commuted to twelve years' imprisonment. Col. Arguelles is one of the most conservative and respected men, identified with the insurrection.

The Cleveland Strike.  
Cleveland, June 22.—The committee, representing both sides of the street railway strike, have unanimously agreed on terms of settlement. The conditions are: The strikers will be permitted to meet at a meeting of the men this evening for ratification. No doubt of their acceptance is expressed by the strike committee.

## ROOSEVELT COMING.

Is Now in Chicago on His Way  
to Las Vegas.

Mexico Agrees to Pay Expenses of  
Chihuahua Band.

Albuquerque Will Probably Send a Delegation  
of 1,000 People.

GOOD TRAIN ACCOMMODATIONS.

Chicago, June 22.—Governor Theodore Roosevelt, of New York, arrived in Chicago late this afternoon on his way to Las Vegas, New Mexico, to attend the reunion of the Rough Riders, which takes place on June 24, the anniversary of the fight at Las Guasimas. A large crowd assembled at the depot to welcome Governor Roosevelt, and as he stepped off the train he was greeted with hearty cheering. The governor was escorted to the Auditorium hotel, accompanied by several members of his staff. He will leave here at 10 p. m. over the Santa Fe for Las Vegas.

CHIHUAHUA BAND COMING.

Las Vegas, N. M., June 22.—L. H. Hofmeister, of the committee on music for the Rough Riders' reunion, has received information that the Mexican government will bear the expenses of the Chihuahua band and from El Paso, on Mexican territory.

Col. A. O. Bredie has arrived from Arizona. He and Capt. W. H. H. Lewis are the officers who have so far arrived. Mr. Adams, of Colorado, is here as the guest of the Normal University. Governor Murphy, of Arizona, will arrive Friday.

ATTENDANCE FROM ALBUQUERQUE.

Many Will Leave to-morrow Evening—Saturday's Special.

Only a day and a night remain until the first annual reunion of the Rough Riders will be held in Las Vegas, and the people of this city are already arranging to go in large numbers. Nearly every business place in town will be closed in order to enable the clerks and employees to attend the reunion. The railroad shops do not run on Saturdays anyway, so all the employees from there will be able to spend Saturday and Sunday in Las Vegas without losing any time.

In view of all these things the attendance from Albuquerque ought to be at least 1,000, and if it is any less it will be due to the fact that employees at the railroad shops, who have been working so few hours a week lately, feel that they cannot afford to spare the money. With the certainty, however, that the shops will run full time and probably overtime after July 1, they need not hesitate to spend the money required as they act draw on the promise of the future to pay outstanding bills in this city.

The people of Las Vegas have spared no pains to gloriously entertain and care for the visitors, including the Rough Riders. They will keep open house and good accommodations are provided for everyone.

There will be a crowd of probably 150 or 200 people going from here to-morrow evening. If necessary the 7:25 train will go up in two sections to accommodate the traffic. There will also be an additional sleeper attached to the 10:15 train, which will be left in Las Vegas in order to enable the passengers to get a good night's rest.

The Rough Riders, the First Regiment from Albuquerque, probably the Albuquerque guards and a large number of plain citizens will go to Las Vegas to-morrow evening to see the band guard of the train which leaves on the special train from here at 5 o'clock Saturday morning.

## NEW FRENCH CABINET.

Is Formed by Waldeck Rousseau  
in Paris To-day.

Col. Arguelles, a Filipino Commissioner, Convicted of Treason.

Troops will be Withdrawn From Panama, Ill., and Firearms Returned.

LABOR STRIKES IN OTHER PLACES.

Paris, June 22.—This afternoon the announcement was made that the new French cabinet had been formed. The formation of the cabinet, as follows: Senator Waldeck Rousseau, president of the council; minister of the interior, M. Delcasse, foreign affairs; Gen. Marquis De Galliflet, war; M. De Lanesme, marine; M. Moris, justice; M. Caillaux, finance; M. de Mun, agriculture; M. Leger, public instruction; M. de Craze, colonies; M. Jean Dupuy, agriculture; M. Daudin, public works.

SITUATION AT PANAMA, ILL.

Troops will be Withdrawn Monday—More From Kansas.

Panama, Ill., June 22.—Major Canabie, in command of Companies D and H, Fifth Illinois Infantry, received orders from Governor Tanner to send the men home Monday morning and notify all citizens that upon presentation of receipts, the arms taken from them by the military will be returned. The recall of the troops was received by a majority of the citizens with pleasure and the general opinion is there will be no further conflict between the opposing factions. Many imported weapons have already left and the remainder will leave shortly. The operators, however, claim that they are engaging 200 negroes to take the places of those who have gone and expect them to arrive Saturday. Military officers believe that riots will follow the removal of the troops. Major Canabie, chief of police of Kaskia, and Sheriff Lowrey say there will be no trouble but in case of an outbreak, they will be able to restore order. The mine owners say it will be impossible for civil officers to prevent trouble. They will send a committee with a petition to Governor Tanner, urgently requesting that the troops remain here.

REPLIES TO HAYMEYER.

A. T. Oxnard Denies His Statements on the Tenth Question.

San Francisco, June 22.—Henry T. Oxnard, the president of the American Beet Sugar Producers' Association, prepared a reply to H. D. Havemeyer's recent argument before the industrial commission at Washington. He flatly denies many of Havemeyer's statements, accusing him of seeking to destroy the American beet sugar industry in order to foster the refineries, that handle foreign raw material, besides attempting to divert public attention from the sugar trust by attacking the tariff.

Striking in Chicago, Too.

Chicago, June 22.—Sixty men employed by Swift & Co. to-day joined 400 strikers, who yesterday quit the employ of the various stock yards firms. Thirty colored men, who went to the yards to-day expecting to be employed, were frightened away by angry strikers and the men quit work. Butchers and planters now demand \$1.75 instead of \$1.50. The Chicago Packing and Provision company to-day agreed and the strikers from the house resumed work. It was reported that Armour & Co. would also grant an increase.

The Strike in Kansas.

Pittsburg, Kan., June 22.—Seventy-four more colored coal miners from the south arrived at Fleming to-day and were put inside the company's stockade. Satisfaction prevails over the amicable settlement made yesterday between the smelter operators and the executive boards of the United Mine Workers' association. The executive board is now planning to begin upon the big operators (railroads) it is believed they will concede the board's demands.
