## HONOR MCKINLEY.

Massachusetts Pays Tribute to the President.

Trouble Between Imported Negroes and Strikers in Indiana.

M. Bourgeois Declines to Form French Cabinet—Delcasse Nxt.

THE ELKS' PARADE IN ST. LOUIS.

Springfield, Mass., June 21.—The city was gaily decorated to-day in honor of President McKinley's visit. A party came from Holyoke on the steamer Mascot and was accorded a hearty welcome by the thousands who lined the river bank. During the trip the navigation committee of this city, gave the president an object lesson regarding the immense advantage which would accrue to this city and Holyoke were the river opened for navigation. On the arrival at Springfield the presidential party was taken for a drive around the city and later they were driven through the army grounds, where the national salute was fired. Then they were taken to the Nassau club for luncheon. During the drive the children of the various schools massed in front of their buildings, and at each place two little girls advanced and placed a handsome bouquet in the hands of President and Mrs. McKinley. After luncheon, the gentlemen were taken to the city hall, where a large platform had been erected.

At 2:30 the president and party were taken, under escort of the G. A. R., to the station, where they boarded a special train for Adams, Mass., where the president will spend a week with W. B. F. Funnell. The party was given a rousing send-off. Brief receptions were held at Westfield and Pittsfield.

IMPORTED NEGRO MINERS.

Unknown Parties in Evansville, Indiana, Fire on Them.

Kavanaugh, Ind., June 21.—The operators of the Sunnyside mine have imported thirty negro miners from Kentucky and were delivering them at the mine at 1:30 this morning, when unknown parties concealed in the bushes opened fire on the negroes. Some of the non-union men responded with revolvers. Many shots were fired. Six men were badly wounded. James Moore, the bookkeeper of the mine, was shot in the back and is likely to die. Charles Smith and John Phillips, colored, were severely wounded. Ed. Geiger, a driver, Charles Smith and John Hornewater, colored, were slightly wounded. The riot call was sent to police headquarters and the attacking party dispersed.

Idaho Miners' Case.

Wallace, Idaho, June 21.—The attorneys in the miners' case not being ready to-day, the court adjourned until to-morrow. It is rumored here that seventy-five Finn's and Campbell's men from Missouri were turned back at Spokane. The rumor is generally discredited.

M. BOURGEOIS DECLINES.

Will Not Form a Cabinet—Delcasse Will Be Asked Next.

Paris, June 21.—M. Bourgeois arrived here this morning. It is not certain that he will undertake the task of forming a cabinet.

RE DECLINES.

M. Bourgeois declined the task of forming a cabinet. M. Delcasse, minister of foreign affairs in the Dupuy cabinet, will now probably be asked to form a ministry.

Grand Elks' Parade.

St. Louis, June 21.—The principal event of the Elks' reunion to-day was a parade in which 5,000 Elks participated. Almost every building was decorated.

It took the Elks parade one hour to pass a given point and during that time not a car wheel turned in the downtown district and the business on the streets practically suspended. Each lodge had some distinctive dress. Owensboro, Ky., lodge No. 513, the youngest, in the order, calling themselves the babies of the order, they dressed accordingly in long white slips, white bonnets and carrying bottles of milk. The Davenport, Iowa, lodge, No. 205, made a great hit. It appeared as a prospective Manila lodge, the members being blackened up and dressed as Filipinos. It is stated on good authority that Milwaukee will be chosen as the place of meeting in 1900.

Owego, N. Y., Hotel Fire.

Owego, N. Y., June 21.—The Eagle hotel burned this morning. Mrs. Rachel King, an old lady of New Haven, lost her life by suffocation. Eight others were seriously injured. Several persons, including the proprietor and his wife, jumped from windows of the second floor.

The Philadelphia Sighted.

San Francisco, June 21.—The cruiser Philadelphia has been sighted a short distance off the port. The Philadelphia

comes from Samoa via Honolulu and brings the bodies of Lieutenant Lansdale and Ensign Mongahan, who lost their lives in a fight with Samoa.

Colorado Shooters to Start Up. Denver, June 21.—Riley's smelter, of Pueblo, and the Rimetalle, of Leadville, both trust plants, have been ordered to start at once. Other trust plants will resume in a few days. The terms of the settlement of the strike are not yet public.

Railroad President Chosen.

Philadelphia, June 21.—The directors of the Pennsylvania railroad to-day elected A. J. Cassatt, president of the Pennsylvania company, to succeed the late Frank Thompson.

A NERVOUS BURGLAR.

Stimpson's Loan Office Robbed of Money and Jewelry This Afternoon. Undoubtedly the nervous burglar who was ever committed in Albuquerque took place between 1:30 p. m. and 2 p. m. to-day, when a burglar pried open the front door of H. Stimpson's pawn shop, on south Second street, which that gentleman had locked up and gone to dinner. Once inside, the robber found his progress easy, as the outside door of the safe was unlocked.

Mr. Stimpson is confident that he had the inside door of the safe locked, although when he returned to his place of business, he found that it had been opened and all the money, watches, diamonds and other valuables, stored in the safe, carried away. There was \$250 in cash in the safe and somewhere between \$1,000 and \$2,000 worth of goods, although Mr. Stimpson has not had time to figure out his total loss.

The robber escaped through the rear door with his stolen wealth, leaving the chisel with which he had forced his entrance behind him. As far as is known no one saw anyone enter the office or while at work inside on the safe. Mr. Stimpson first discovering what had happened when he returned from dinner.

PAUL D. MYERS ROBBED.

The house of Paul D. Myers, the manager for the Automatic Telephone company, at 615 north Eighth street, was entered last night and robbed. The burglar entered through the window of the bed-room, where Mr. and Mrs. Myers were sleeping and without being heard. The robber went into the sitting room and helped himself to Mrs. Myers' pocket-book, containing \$7, and Mr. Myers' pocket-book with \$10. This morning when he awoke, Myers found his clothes lying in a heap on the porch. The robber had knifely left behind the gold watch, which Mr. Myers had covered with a black iron case, evidently thinking that it was of little value.

## PORTO RICANS KICK.

Commissioners Charge Unfair Treatment.

Giant Whiskey Trust Organized With \$125,000,000 Capital.

President Mitchell Requests Union Miners Not to Load Coal for Arkansas.

KIDNAPING GOLD PRODUCTION.

New York, June 21.—The commissioners from Porto Rico to the United States, feel, according to Dr. Julio Henna, one of their number, that they and their adherents in Porto Rico have been treated scandalously by the United States government so they have prepared a protest, which Dr. Henna has given out. The protest says: "Porto Rico finds itself by virtue of a treaty between the United States and Spain an integral part of the territory of the United States of America. Nevertheless, its soil, its ports, its commerce and its inhabitants are not for any practicable purpose considered American. The commerce of Porto Rico is burdened by a tariff heavier and more obnoxious than that in force when Porto Rico was Spanish. No protection is given to any Porto Rican, except upon condition that it be carefully expressed that he is protected as a native Porto Rican but not as an American. Of liberty and self government the Porto Rican people have not had as yet any taste. They are subject in all things to the supreme will of the military ruler."

Michigan G. A. R. Encampment.

Potomac, Mich., June 21.—The presence of Generals Alger, Wheeler and Duffield is the feature of the annual encampment of the Michigan Grand Army of the Republic. The generals will be the speakers at to-night's campfire.

A WHISKY TRUST.

Organized Under Name of Distilling Company of America.

New York, June 21.—A merger of the American Spirits company, says a combination consisting of eighty-five separate concerns—the Kentucky Distilleries & Warehouse company, consisting of fifty-six concerns; the Standard Distilling & Distributing company, consisting of fifteen concerns; the Spirits Distributing company and a number of the most important rye and whiskey concerns into one central company, has been effected by the incorporation of a concern called the Distilling Company of America, with a capital of \$125,000,000 of which \$75,000,000 is 7 per cent cumulative preferred stock and \$50,000,000 common stock.

President Mitchell's Manifesto.

Springfield, Ill., June 21.—President Mitchell, of the United Mine Workers of America, to-day sent a general order to all places in Illinois where coal is being loaded for places in Arkansas and Indian Territory, where the union miners are on a strike, requesting union miners not to load any more coal for those points during the past four weeks over 900 tons of coal passed Alton for points in Arkansas and points in Indian Territory where strikes exist.

Injured in a Fire.

New York, June 21.—The furnished rooming house of Mrs. Mary Caldwell, of Seventeenth street, was badly damaged by fire early this morning. Mrs. Caldwell was severely burned about the arms and legs. James L. Caldwell, her 14-year-old son, was burned all over the body. John Cody, 34 years old, a lodger, was also severely burned and will die.

Wichita Mill and Elevator Burned.

Wichita, Kan., June 21.—Early this morning the Wichita Mill & Elevator company lost its buildings, machinery and 10,000 bushels of wheat by fire. The loss is estimated at \$35,000.

Dawson's Yield of Gold.

San Francisco, June 21.—A letter from Dawson, dated May 29, says that the cleanup of the present season will amount to at least \$18,000,000, more than twice last year's yield.

Railway Strike Settled.

Akron, Ohio, June 21.—A settlement has been reached in the street railway strike. Ten hours are to constitute a day's work.

MURDERED IN THE MOUNTAINS. Dead Body of a Sheep Herder Found Near Jensen.

Sheriff Hubbell received information this morning of the murder of a man named Cruz Apodaca in the mountains about ten miles from the village of Jensen. The body was found by two men and taken to Jensen, where on June 18 an inquest was held, the coroner's jury, after investigating the case, rendering a verdict that Apodaca came to his death by wounds inflicted upon him by Moveto Martinez and Cleto Valdez. Apodaca was a sheep herder in the employ of Martinez, and when the body was found about twenty days after the murder was committed, the throat of the man and even his chest showed that his murderers had used a sharp knife to accomplish the bloody deed. Sheriff Hubbell sent a deputy to-day to Jensen for the men accused of the murder.

Washington, June 21.—Yellow fever has broken out in Santiago, General Brooke reports that two soldiers died there and two a Puerto Principe of the disease.

REPORTED TO WASHINGTON.

Washington, June 21.—Surgeon General Wyman, of the marine hospital service, to-day received a telegram from Dr. Park, the quarantine officer at Santiago, reporting the existence at that point of fourteen cases of yellow fever and four deaths from that cause.

## MADRID SHOOTING.

Five Men Are Under Arrest for Shooting Holdenhurst.

Fourteen Cases of Yellow Fever Reported in Santiago.

Kentucky Democrats Holding an Interesting State Convention.

CLEVELAND STRIKE SITUATION.

Cerritos, N. M., June 21.—Five men, named Norton, Hicks, McManis, Donnelly and True, have been arrested for the shooting of John Holdenhurst at Madrid, Monday night, and are now in the custody of Sheriff Kissell.

Bond has been placed at \$2,000 each but so far none of the men have been able to furnish the sureties.

They will probably be taken to Santa Fe to-night.

The preliminary examination has been postponed ten days as the prosecuting witness is unable to attend before that time. Holdenhurst rests easily but the danger period will not be passed before Friday.

KENTUCKY DEMOCRATS.

Holding One of the Most Interesting Conventions in the History of the State.

Louisville, Ky., June 21.—The democratic state convention, which meets at Music hall, after a afternoon, promises to be a most interesting gathering, although two of the leading candidates for governor, Captain W. J. Stone and William Goebel, have agreed to combine forces in an attempt to organize the convention, the main issue is yet to be fought out between these gentlemen and Gen. P. Wat Hardin, who controls the largest number of instructed delegates. If the Stone-Goebel combination succeeds in organizing the convention, the disposal of two hundred or more contested seats will probably result in the nomination of Capt. Stone for governor, while Goebel will control the remainder of the ticket and the state central committee.

The district conventions were unfavorable to Hardin, who organized but four of the eleven districts when the convention was called to order by Chairman Johnston. The Stone and Goebel people placed Judge David P. Redwine in nomination for temporary chairman, and W. H. Sweeney, of Marion county, was nominated by the Hardin faction. The ballot resulted: Redwine, 510; Sweeney, 140, but a number of counties passed on account of contents and vote is held up, pending a decision as to how vote of those counties shall be cast.

THE CLEVELAND STRIKE.

Strikers Throw Stones at Cars Injuring Several Passengers.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 21.—A determined effort is being made to-day to settle the street railway strike. The committee on both sides met at 11 o'clock with a committee of the city council, appointed on Tuesday, to devise means to bring the dispute to an end. The meeting is secret. The serious riot on the south side last evening was a prelude to a series of minor disturbances carried on through the night. In every part of the city the switchmen were destroyed, rails torn up and tracks piled high with obstructions.

These were removed by the police to-day. No attempt was made this morning to run cars over the lines, where trouble is anticipated, and both sides are awaiting the result of a conference. At noon, when two cars passed over the Superior viaduct, about five hundred men and boys working in the factories near by assembled and for ten minutes there was a serious riot. Missiles flung the air. Several passengers were struck and the cars were badly damaged. No one was seriously injured. The call whistles of the factories, for the men to return to work, put an end to the riot. A crowd of men and boys congregated on the tracks on Cedar and East Madison streets at noon. The cars were stopped and several passengers bruised.

## GALLUP GLEANINGS.

The Demand for Gallup Brick Has Reached Great Proportions.

### BATCH OF SMALL ITEMS.

**Special Correspondence.**  
Gallup, N. M., June 18.—Dodd & Lemke, of Albuquerque, have established their brick plant near the Crown Point mine, where a spur is being put in for their use. They expect to ship about 50,000 bricks in the next six weeks. Mr. Dinmore has just died a large kila, about a mile south of Dodd & Lemke's. Fred Kornoff has charge of the Albuquerque establishment.

One Mulholland is boring a well on the site of the old Aztec mine for the Crescent Coal company. The abandoned mine is said to contain large quantities of good water. When tapped a tank will be put up for the purpose of shipping water to the Gallup mine.

Ed. Moore is sick with the grip. Val. Scherbaum and Harry Stevens, of the territorial regiment, are working on the repair track. Hugh Quinn, another one of the boys, arrived two days ago, and is stopping at the Gallup mine.

The mines worked on Sunday and have more orders than they can fill. The Crescent coal mine is working on the cars per week from the Mexican Central, and both companies have largely increased orders from the south. Bisbee, Clifton, Silver City, Magdalena, El Paso, Lordsburg and several other places now get their supply of coal from here.

The order from the Santa Fe Pacific railroad last week for 300 cars. The Clark mine turned in coal on last week's order. Coal miners are in demand.

A cutting scrap took place at the Mexican dance on Saturday night. One man was pretty badly injured.

Koginor Norman expects to be out in a week. The railroad ice house will be enlarged to hold twenty-five cars. Sam Ray has the contract for the ice house at Window and Seligman.

Mr. Naley and family will leave shortly for California. Will McVickers and Gus Stromberg are on their return voyage from Peru.
