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SERMON FOR STUDENTS.

Religious Exercises at the United States Indian School.

Rev. A. H. Sutherland, of the Methodist Episcopal church at Cerrillos, preached the baccalaureate sermon to the senior class at the government Indian school last evening, says the New Mexican.

Almost one hundred people from the city attended the services. A pleasing musical program was given by the school choir. Mr. Holt and Miss Schormeyer, Mr. Moore, of the Presbyterian church, led in fervent prayer. Mr. Sutherland, in introducing his sermon, said that no educational advantages are perfect unless religious instruction is included in them. In conclusion, he addressed words of advice to the five young men of the graduating class. His sermon was a scholarly effort, and could be classed as a literary effort. Mr. Gay, of the Episcopal church, pronounced the benediction.

ROUGH KIDNEY CURE.

A Few Important Points to Visitors.

From Las Vegas.

An erroneous impression seems to be entertained at some quarters concerning the charges that are to be made during the reunion. It reports have come to the ears of the general committee having the reunion in charge that in the section of country north of here a rumor prevails that nothing will be free. A more libelous rumor could not have been started. All the festivities incident to the reunion are absolutely free. Admission to the tournament ground is free during all the entertainments, including the magnificent exhibition of fireworks. Such generosity as this has probably never before been seen. Pain's exhibition has been secured at an expense of \$2,000, and wherever he appears a general admission charge of 50 or 75 cents is made and the people are glad to see the exhibition at that price. When Pain comes to Las Vegas his exhibition is given free. The only charge of admission at the tournament grounds is that of 50 cents to the grand stand and 25 cents to the bleachers. The buildings have been put up at an expense of nearly \$1,000 and are for the accommodation of those who prefer sitting to standing to witness the events, but the grounds are all open and accessible to all who come, free of cost. The authorized expenditures for the reunion amount to over \$7,000 and \$5,000 in cash has been donated by the public spirited citizens of Las Vegas. The man or men who have started the rumor that there will be nothing free during the Rough Riders' reunion ought to be given a coat of tar and feathers, if caught, by an outraged and indignant public.

Moreover, the charges to the general public for the necessities of life during the reunion will be no higher than are charged the whole year round in Las Vegas. The man who comes here and expects to get a square meal for 10 or 15 cents will be disappointed, for rates as low as this have never prevailed in Las Vegas. A good square meal can be obtained for 25 cents and up, according to the disposition of the person dining. Shaving will be the regular price. Lodging will be obtained for 50 and 75 cents and \$1. The committee on entertainment is receiving many addresses of people who will accommodate lodgers during the reunion, and this is the range of prices. With this plain and unvarnished statement made, people coming here will know exactly what their expenses will be. The Rough Riders and their official guests will be given lodging, board, admission to places where charge is made and their subsistence and entertainment generally free of all cost.
