ALL of the Fourth of July celebrations in New Mexico will be combined into a grand and glorious one at Las Vegas on June 24.

ABOUT thirty-three thousand immigrants arrived at the port of New York during May this year. In the first four months of this year 77,760 arrived, an increase over 1808 of 11,491.

The eighth annual catalogue of the New Mexico university has been issued. The pamphlet contains 100 pages, and its contents show that the university has made marked progress during the past year.

REPORTS from the Alaskan gold fields are little less than appalling. Starvation, drowning and disease killed more than 300 men while enroute on one trail, and scurvy, deprivation and want menace those still living.

THE collector of internal revenue at New York City estimated that by the ending July 1 next, by which time the war revenue act will have been twelve months in force, the receipts of his office will aggregate nearly \$17,000,000.

THE Denver Republican is doing its whole duty to New Mexico in advertising the Rough Riders' reunion, to be held at Las Vegas on the 24th. That paper is publishing two or three columns of illustrated matter each day about the celebration.

THE necessity for storage reservoirs for water in New Mexico is clearly shown by the fact that the Rio Grande at Las Cruces is now dry. People there estimate the alfalfa crop in the Las Cruces part of the Mesilla valley at a cutting and a half.

PRESIDENT RIPLEY, of the Santa Fe, will arrive in New York City from Italy on tomorrow, June 13. He has been in Europe for the past several weeks on the first vacation he has consented to take since assuming the management of the Santa Fe system affairs.

DURING May 205 companies were incorporated under the laws of New Jersey, the state receiving in filing fees \$12,083.25. This is a slight falling off from the last two months, when the receipts were something over \$10,000 each month. The state has received in filing fees from corporations for the first eight months of the present fiscal year \$528,412.14.

THERE is a decrease in the expenses of the war department during the month of May as compared with those of April. The amount for the month was a little over \$8,000,000, while that of April was considerably over \$10,000,000. The navy expenses, however, show some increase. The net reduction for both departments is over \$2,000,000. The present expenses of the government are not far beyond the proceeds of the new revenue law and difference is likely to be made up by the excess of receipts under previous laws above the requirement of the peace establishment.

FRIENDLY ADVICE

Las Vegas is urged to take up another subscription. We do not know how much you have for preparing the big celebration, but you will regret it if you fall down on things at the last. The celebration is going to be worth thousands of dollars to Las Vegas and the whole territory, and everything possible should be done to please, entertain and instruct the people. There will be hundreds of intending investors from the east, and if they are pleased with the patriotism, liberality and energy shown at this celebration they may become residents of the territory. THE CITIZEN really believes that if this celebration is what it should be, that it will lead to the admission of the territory to statehood next winter. We know that the enterprising people of Las Vegas are doing wonders, but there may be residents of that city who do not yet realize the immense importance of the approaching celebration; and it may be that they do, and that this appeal is entirely unnecessary.

LET US NOT FORGET

While we are going to celebrate the anniversary of the battle of Las Guadalupe in a becoming manner at Las Vegas on the 24th, let us not forget that in 1862, at Gila, in this territory, was fought one of the big battles of the civil war. It was a three days' fight, and was between the cowboys of southern Texas and the mountaineers of Colorado. The site of the battlefield can be seen from a Santa Fe train just beyond Gila station. The building near by is Pigeon's ranch, where the Colorado wounded were taken care of. At this battle the Texans took great surprise. They had marched triumphantly up the Rio Grande valley, and at Valverde had scattered the New Mexico militia, and when they encountered the advancing Colorado volunteers, they thought they had to deal with the same class of troops. The splendid horsemen of the Lone Star State made several brilliant charges, but were met each time with steady volleys, and the death toll was frightful. In the meantime, Majors Wynkoop and Chivington, with a detachment, climbed the rugged mountain and came in on the rear of the Texans and burned their wagon train. This left the Texans without supplies. The retreat was managed superbly. Coming back through Santa Fe and thence down the Rio Grande valley, closely followed by the Union troops, they made a brief stand at this city. In the skirmish here a Union lieutenant was killed and many Texans killed and wounded. Hunting's old mill received several balls from the Union battery, posted on the foothills. The Texans continued their retreat, and at Paria, opposite Los Lunas, another lively skirmish occurred. Here the Texans left the river, going westward into the Ladrones and Socorro mountains, crossing a sec-

tion of country almost impassable at this day. They were not further molested by the Union troops, but starvation and sickness terribly debilitated the heroic band before reaching El Paso.

The reader, to fully appreciate the hardships endured by those Texan troops on that campaign, must bear in mind that in 1862 New Mexico had no railroads nor telegraphs, few ranches, and that the country had been depleted of supplies by Indian raids.

The Colorado volunteers who met them so gloriously had been gathered together at the little town of Denver. They were not much used to soldier life, but were accustomed to the rigor of marching for days with little to eat and with the earth for a bed.

The Union dead of this bloody campaign rest in the government cemetery at Santa Fe. It is said that about two hundred of the Texan dead lie in a deserted corral in Old Albuquerque. God rest their souls! They put up the best fight they could and died bravely.

ROUGH RIDERS' REUNION.

A Batch of Interesting Notes About the Big Celebration.

GRAND TIME AT LAS VEGAS.

From the Optic.

The Las Vegas base ball nine will have to put on their very best ball playing clothes if the Albuquerque Browns come up here to compete for the reunion prize. Word from the Albuquerque band has been received to the effect that they will be here in full force and all they ask is that they are not allowed to go hungry. They can just put their won't let them bleed all their teeth out before they get here.

There was a rumor on the streets to the effect that the barbers of the city intended to raise the price of shaving during the three days of the reunion. This is an injustice to the barbers of the city, who announce that their price for the three days will be 15 cents a shave as now.

The fireworks to be used by the Pain company fill an entire baggage car. The Santa Fe company did the generous thing by giving a rate of 10 cents a mile for hauling the car. This rate comes as near being an entire donation as anything that has been done on behalf of the reunion.

R. E. Twitchell had another letter of commendation from the Sunday's issue of the Denver Republican. Mr. Twitchell furnished a most interesting letter of two columns to the Republican last Sunday a week, and a column article to the Kansas City Journal last Tuesday morning. The Journal article occupied a prominent position on the front page.

Citizens of Las Vegas are requested to decorate their respective business houses and residences for the reunion. It is particularly desired to have every building situated on the line of parade decorated as tastefully as possible. The proper colors will be those of the national flag, and cavalry yellow may be used in relief. Decorations should be in place on the 23d.

General Manager Frey has written a letter to R. E. Twitchell, warmly commending the manner in which the advertising matter for the reunion has been circulated. The hangers—thousands of them, in fact—have been sent to the many local agents of the Santa Fe, who have received positive instructions to the effect that they must be distributed judiciously and effectively.

J. V. Conway, manager of Santa Fe base ball team, has written a letter to the committee on sports for the reunion, announcing that he and his aggregation of players will be here to contest the prize of \$100. Mr. Conway desires to secure accommodations in advance for his club. The club will be here for the entire three days of the reunion. There will be from twelve to fifteen in the team.

The committee on decorations and badges met in W. B. Bunker's office, with C. C. Giese as chairman, and adopted the various badges to be used. The various committees will be furnished with a special badge that will act as an "Open Sesame." The souvenir badge will consist of a medalion slightly larger than a "two-bit piece," suspended by a small ring from a neat pin. On the obverse side of the medalion is the inscription "Rough Riders' Reunion," and on the reverse side a picture in relief of Col. Roosevelt. In the matter of decorations generally the committee will urge upon business men and property owners the duty of decorating business houses, and wherever possible, private dwellings. This is to be a matter of personal competition.

Friday night, in the west's own hours, Chairman Twitchell, of the committee of advertising, sat in the press room of the Optic, watching the cylinder of the round press go round and round and round, grinding out the full sheet posters, advertising the Rough Riders' reunion. Influenced, no doubt, by the rhythmic motion of the machinery, his mind began revolving on the number of people who would probably attend the reunion. So, taking a pencil and paper, he figured out a total attendance of 6,450, distributed as follows: El Paso, Las Cruces, Silver City and Deming, 600; Rincon to Albuquerque, 350; Albuquerque, 1,000; Madrid, Cerrillos and Golden, 350; Santa Fe, 500; San Mi-

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guel and Mora counties, 2,000; Las Vegas to Springer, 300; Raton, 450; Trinidad and Starville, 350; all other Colorado points, 200. These figures, it will be observed, make no allowance for attendance from Arizona, Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas points, which will not be inconsiderable.

Chairman Hofmeister, of the committee on music, is succeeding admirably in his duty of securing bands for the reunion. He has received a letter of acceptance from W. E. Koch, instructor of the normal cadet band at Silver City, in which he is also notified that the band will bring its own tents and bedding. The band will number eighteen pieces. Rev. Kallings, who has just returned from a trip to Santa Fe, informs Mr. Hofmeister that the Italian school band from that place, numbering twenty five pieces, is willing to come if given transportation and living expenses, as the school has no fund to draw on for this purpose. B. Ruppe, of Albuquerque, informs the chairman that the First regiment band of that place will come here if given transportation and living expenses. Mr. Ruppe also stated that the band boys had complained a great deal of the poor character of the food supplied them on a trip to Denver. Chairman Hofmeister has guaranteed them that they will be given good food and comfortable lodgings.
