WICHITA CONGRESS.

L. Bradford Prince Chosen to Preside.

Governor Murphy, of Arizona, Discusses Irrigation.

Two Frenchmen Charged With Inciting the Army Acquitted.

MURDER IN ARIZONA.

Wichita, Kas., May 31.—All indications point to a successful session of the Trans-Mississippi congress. Delegates from most of the states are present. All hotels are filled to overflowing and private residences are open to visitors. Territorial expansion, trusts and the American merchant marine are subjects of general agitation. There is visible a strong undercurrent supporting the administration's conduct in the Spanish-Philippine wars.

Governor Murphy, of Arizona, says: "Arizona is for statehood and the coast of arid lands. We've drained the rivers and what we must have before we can go on with development is storage water. The national government refused to appropriate the money and now we want lands."

The meeting opened this morning with addresses of welcome by Governor Stanley, of Kansas, and Mayor Ross, of Wichita, to which Judge Smalley, of Minnesota, and Julius Kahn, of California, responded.

Hon. Hugh Craig, of San Francisco, the president of the congress, wired that he cannot attend.

Ex-Governor L. Bradford Prince, of New Mexico, presides.

Mrs. Rosina Ryan, Mrs. Bettie Ryan and Mrs. R. A. Greer, of Houston, Texas, presented each speaker with a bunch of magnolias and also gave hundreds of bunches indiscriminately to the audience. They are seeking to secure the next meeting of the congress. It is predicted that they have won their fight. The Texas delegation proposed three cheers for Governor Stanley. Congressmen-elect Kahn, of California, carried the congress by storm in an extemporaneous speech on the extreme west.

The morning session closed with an address by L. Bradford Prince, of New Mexico.

KILLING IN ARIZONA.

T. B. Lessor, of Safford, slain by an unknown murderer.

Solomonville, Ariz., May 31.—James R. Lessor, of Safford, was murdered last night while standing by his bed preparing to retire. The murderer shot through a window, hitting the victim's breast with buckshot, causing instant death. There is no clue to the criminal.

THE PRICE TOO LOW.

Washington, May 31.—Bids were to have been opened at the navy department today at noon for armored battleships, monitors and armored cruisers authorized by law, but no bids were received within the price fixed by congress. The Carnegie Steel company and the Bethlehem Iron company submitted statements that they are unable to furnish armor of the character required at the price fixed, of \$400 for the seven ships authorized last year, and \$300 for the ships authorized this year.

THE PRIZE TOO LOW.

Louisville, Ky., May 31.—The third annual convention of the Ohio Valley Bi-Metallist league opened at McAuley's hall today. Welcome was extended to the delegates by Mayor Weaver. Judge Samuel Tarvin, of Covington, the president of the league, called the convention to order.

Frenchmen Acquitted.

Paris, May 31.—Mm. De Brouillere and Marcelhabert, who have been on trial before the court of cassation here on the charge of inciting soldiers to insubordination in connection with the election of President Loubet, were acquitted today.

Irishmen Denounce Foreign Alliance.

New York, May 31.—The Ancient Order of Hibernians at the fifth annual convention in this city adopted resolutions denouncing the alliance of the United States with any foreign power, especially England.

Yellow Fever in New Orleans.

New Orleans, La., May 31.—Miss Grillo, age 17, died with evidences of yellow fever. There is no other case in New Orleans in any way suspicious.

Malvern, Iowa, May 31.—A tornado swept over the northwest part of Mills county last night doing considerable damage to farm property. The buildings of John Roberg, a prominent farmer living two miles north of Malvern, were destroyed. His little girl, aged 11, was killed.

STOCK KILLED IN NEBRASKA.

Ponca, Neb., May 31.—Three distinct tornadoes passed through this vicinity late yesterday. Only one house was destroyed. A large amount of property was destroyed, and considerable livestock killed.

HEAVY ELECTRIC STORM.

Kansas City, May 31.—A heavy electric storm struck Kansas City early this morning. Telegraphic communication with all points was interrupted by lightning, disabling the plants which furnished electricity for the dynamo used in the telegraph companies' offices.

FARM BUILDINGS DESTROYED.

Sioux City, Iowa, May 31.—A tornado struck last night near Kingsley. Buildings on the farms of William Adams, W. A. Stevens and B. J. Keeler were destroyed, and considerable livestock killed. No loss of life is reported.

New Spanish Minister Arrives.

New York, May 31.—The most notable passenger on the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, was Duke de Arco, the Spanish minister. He said he expected to go to Washington Monday.

Jamaica Wants Reciprocity.

Kington, Jamaica, May 31.—The legislature has decided to send three delegates to Washington to discuss the reciprocity arrangements.

Albert Pack Dead.

Detroit, Mich., May 31.—Albert Pack, a well-known capitalist and the late republican candidate for United States senator in opposition to Senator Burrows, died today from the effects of a surgical operation for the removal of gall stones.

Quarantine Commissioner Dead.

New York, May 31.—Jacob M. Patterson, president of the state board of quarantine commissioners, was found dead today at his home in Fordham.

Police Court News.

John Parks and James Fleming, who are employed at Trimble's stables, became involved in a fist fight yesterday morning and succeeded in becoming entangled in the strong hands of Officer Martinez. They appeared before Justice Crawford this morning and were fined \$5 apiece for disturbing the peace.

NEW YORK will decorate itself with 25,000,000 yards of bunting when Dewey arrives. And all over the country the news of his arrival will be greeted with responsive cheers from 10,000,000 hearts.

MARK TWAIN is writing a book which he says is not to be published for a hundred years after he is dead. Probably it will be as fresh as some of his other jokes born away back in the days of Caligula and rescued from a long rest by Mark.

A special meeting of the Commercial club has been called for Thursday night to take some action with regard to extending an invitation to Governor Roosevelt to visit Albuquerque during his attendance at the Rough Riders' reunion to be held at Las Vegas next month.

In commenting on the city directory, just published by THE CITIZEN, the Journal-Democrat says: "The city directory, issued from THE CITIZEN office, is out. It is well gotten up, containing besides a complete census of both the new and old towns, much useful information regarding the history, industries and resources of the city."

AMERICAN sailors have been demonstrating that they are a shockingly careless lot of fellows in their speech, and they seem to pay no attention to who may be listening. Admiral Schley stood right in the Mormon tabernacle the other day and deliberately intimated his belief that woman is a creature intended for the highest in this republic.

The big and progressive daily newspapers of St. Louis and Denver are being imposed upon by their Santa Fe correspondent, who telegraphs news two and three weeks old, and this "progressive" correspondent takes in the southwest, even goes to the City of Mexico for a tragedy that occurred there, and palms off the stale news under Santa Fe date.

TALK about higher education being useless! Why, even the pugilists have taken up anatomy and pathology, and the champion, Fitzsimmons, discourses learnedly on pneumogastric nerves and ophthalmic ganglia, and plans a knock-out blow as scientifically as a surgeon plans an operation. Who knows but even our cooks, some day, may understand the chemistry of cooking and the physiology of digestion?

THE insurance companies of Arizona are coming forward without demur and are paying their 2 per cent territorial income tax and the costs of doing with the territorial secretary and treasurer their articles of incorporation. About fifty companies are expected to qualify for business. Last year the companies collected in Arizona \$548,740 in premiums, a business which, if maintained, will give the general fund of that territory \$11,000 in 1930.

THE CITIZEN suggests that the people of Albuquerque agree among themselves, with an appropriate proclamation from the mayor, that June 21, the anniversary of the battle of Las Alamos, be made a general holiday in this city this year. This would enable the people of the metropolis—always generous to neighboring towns—to visit Las Vegas in "train loads," and, besides seeing Col. Roosevelt, help the Las Vegas people to make the Rough Riders' reunion a most glorious success. Charter a train, say of eight or ten cars, load the coaches with Albuquerque excursionists, and pull out for Las Vegas on Saturday morning, June 21. Spend Saturday and even the next day—Sunday—there, returning that evening. Las Vegas needs our assistance, and let's help them out by sending up a rousing crowd to the reunion.

SANTA FE EARNINGS. April earnings of the Santa Fe show that the company is keeping up the record which it has now maintained for some months. While gross earnings for the month show only a slight increase over the same month last year, the saving in operating expenses gives the net earnings a very substantial increase over last year's figures.

For the ten months ending April 30 the company shows a larger gain in net earnings than in gross, in consequence of the decrease in operating expenses. For the month of April the gross earnings amounted to \$1,235,200, an increase of \$22,211. Operating expenses, however, decreased \$234,937. Net earnings were \$1,145,262, an increase of \$347,145. Taxes and rentals decreased \$10,029 and the income from operation increased \$962,177. For the ten months ending April 30 the gross earnings of the road were \$3,872,738, an increase of \$84,959 over the same period of the last fiscal year. Operating expenses were reduced \$235,487, and net earnings, which amounted to \$1,043,130, showed an increase of \$1,201,641.

After deducting taxes and rentals the road earned from operation \$9,029,281, an increase of \$1,225,880 over last year.

EXTRA FROM SANTA FE. Numerous extracts from letters alleged to have been written by American soldiers in the Philippines have been printed by the newspapers that represent the anti, to prove that there is discontent among the troops there. Some of those letters never were written at any place in the Philippines; some of them

were written by two young and sensitive boys, to whom it had become heartbreaking to be away from home and mother so long. But there are other letters that come from the Philippines, in which there is no evidence of wavering on the part of the writers, or of a desire to come home while there is yet work to do for soldiers in those islands. For instance, the following is taken from a letter written by a sergeant from Wyoming, who was formerly a member of the Missouri legislature:

"The American troops cannot be held back. * * * Every soldier in the Eighth army corps understands that the responsibility of the blood of our boys rests upon the heads of those who command. I am grieved and disappointed beyond expression to read in some of the American papers that they are still harping on imperialism and attempting to prolong this miserable war. * * * I don't like to call these fanatics by the ugly name of traitors, but when I think of the four brave boys of my company whose lives have been lost by this disloyalty in the United States, it is hard indeed to be charitable to those men for their mistakes, if they are mistakes. The soldiers call them traitors."

This is the kind of a letter one does not find printed in the anti-imperialist papers, but which makes a deeper impression on the American people than all the stories of discontent with the United States government's policy, which have been attributed to soldiers.

RATES ON WOOL. From one point of view a low rate on western raw materials to the east is exceedingly desirable, every reduction of a cent in transportation enabling eastern manufacturers to buy and use that much more of western American wool in competition with the imported article from Australia and Argentina. It is therefore of local interest to know that this week a special rate of 40 cents per 100 pounds for carload shipments of wool, with a minimum of 20,000 pounds, Chicago to New York, will become effective on the lines of the Central Freight association from all points in the territory to the western terminal of lines in the trunk line association.

SANTA RITA MINES SOLD.

Biggest Mining Deal Ever Made in the Territory of New Mexico.

PURCHASE PRICE, \$1,200,000.

From the Silver City Independent.

The biggest mining deal ever consummated in Grant county, or, in fact, the territory of New Mexico, became public last Saturday evening at 9:10 o'clock, when the different conveyances were filed in the office of the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder of Grant county.

The deal involved practically the whole of the Santa Rita mining camp, about sixteen miles northeast of Silver City, the control of the immense copper mines there located passing into the hands of a powerful syndicate of eastern capitalists, understood to be the Amalgamated Copper company, or more generally known as the Copper combine of trust.

For weeks there have been numerous rumors of such a sale, but nothing definite could be learned until the papers were placed on record last Saturday night, under telegraphic instructions. The matter has in reality been pending since June 30, 1928, on which date the local managers of the estate of the late Senator George Hearst, of California, secured an option from J. Parker Whitney, the Boston capitalist, and the companies controlled and operated by him and known as the Santa Rita Copper and Iron company and the Bonanza Development company, for forty-six patented claims, and thirty-three unpatented claims, comprising what is more commonly known as the Santa Rita Mining camp, Grant county, New Mexico, the consideration being the sum of \$1,200,000, and the term of the option being for three years.

Eastern capitalists, looking for profitable investment, soon learned of the opportunity and opened negotiations for the purchase of the option, with the result that Mr. Whitney and his companies have received the figures named for their properties and the Hearst estate the handsome sum of \$200,000 for its option.

The conveyances were made to Richard D. Willard, of Boston, as trustee. It is understood that the purchasing syndicate includes such men as Clark, the Montana millionaire; Rockefeller, the Standard Oil magnate, and even the Rothschilds. The local representative of the syndicate is W. H. Burrage, an expert mining man and a most affable gentleman, who arrived last week from the east.

Mr. Burrage returned to Santa Rita immediately after the filing of the papers, and there is every reason to believe that the lease will be at once given the sixty days' notice provided by the agreement. Formal transfer of the properties will be made during the present week.

The future plans of the new owners necessarily a matter of conjecture, but one fact can be stated positively, and that is that the benefit resulting to Grant county will be enormous. Until the present lease is disposed of it is not believed that any great amount of work will be done, but that the first that will be undertaken will be upon several development shafts, so that the possibilities of the property may be thoroughly understood. It will then be only the question of a short time until work is begun upon the construction of immense smelting, leaching and concentrating plants, and the development of the mines upon an extensive scale, resulting in the employment of probably 2,000 men and the expenditure of close to a million of dollars. This will in all likelihood be inaugurated within a year from date of purchase.

OVER ITS OWN TRACK.

The Santa Fe Cannot Enter San Francisco Until November.

E. D. Kenna, first vice president and general solicitor of the Santa Fe, who was in Topeka on Thursday afternoon, stated that the Santa Fe would not be able to enter San Francisco over its own tracks before the middle of November, says the Topeka State Journal. This is a much later date than at first expected, and later than any estimates made heretofore.

"We will be running trains into Stockton by July 1," said Mr. Kenna, "but it will be as late as the middle of November before we will be able to run trains over our own line into San Francisco. There is a monster bill between Stockton and San Francisco that will have to be tunneled, and this will take considerable time. Just what changes will be made in our schedules has not been decided, but it is probable that the rearrangement of train service will not be made until through connections are established from Chicago to the coast."

Mr. Kenna stated that a commodious and modernly equipped steamboat for the transportation of passengers across the bay into San Francisco is now in the course of building for the company. When the Santa Fe formally takes possession of the new line to the coast, it is probable that many changes will be made in its management. These changes may result in changes in the personnel of the other Santa Fe system lines.
