## A DUEL IN HIGH LIFE

St. Petersburg, Russia, April 9.—A duel between former premier Count Witte, who represented Russia in the peace negotiations with Japan in the United States and General Kuropatkin, the former commander in chief of the Russian forces in the field, has been averted through an explanation by the former.

General Kuropatkin took offense at a speech in which Count Witte asserted that the modern Russian military commanders were lacking in moral courage and were prone to blame others for their failures.

The general accepted the reference as a personal insult and challenged. Seconds were appointed by both men. Subsequently the Count expressed regret that the general considered his words as referring to himself, as his remarks were intended merely for general application. The general accepted this explanation.

## SKATING RINK IS CONVERTED INTO THEATRE.

Fred C. Hunt, who has been running the Lyric theatre in a Main street east side building all winter, will move next week to the old skating rink building on North Main, which has been converted into a cosy theatre and summer resort. Moving pictures and vaudeville will be put on the stage and the front part of the house will be reserved to serve cool drinks and refreshments. The front of the building will hardly be recognized by those who have not seen the changes going on. Under the artistic touch of Frank Helmick and Guy Snook the place looks like a modern, metropolitan play house. The effect is quite striking as viewed by newcomers from the depot.

## IMPROVED TRAIN SERVICE UNOFFICIALLY REPORTED

Among the railroad men there is a report that the Pecos Valley line of the Santa Fe is to double its passenger service, with two trains a day, each way, beginning Sunday, April 17. According to the same report the morning train will come later and the evening train, earlier, and the trains will run through to Pecos without an all night stop at Carlsbad, as

heretofore. The second train will be a mixed train, taking the place of the local freight between here and Carlsbad, except that it will run both ways every day except Sunday. This report has been semi-officially given to the local depot, but the new time card and official action have not yet arrived.

New York, April 9.—New York fans will witness the first big baseball game of the season at the Polo Grounds this afternoon, when the National League Giants, fresh from their Southern trip will meet the Yale nine. Once only have the Giants succeeded in "showing up" the professionals. That was when Yale's pitcher was "Dutch" Carter. The Giants just couldn't find him, and their proud banner was trailed in the dust by the gloating "rah rah" boys.

Jerusalem, April 9.—Prince Eitel Frederick, second son of Emperor William of Germany today formally opened the Empress Augusta Memorial, a German hospital and charitable institution, on the Mount of Olives. The inaugural was marked by imposing ceremonies in which the Prince and his wife participated.

## NEW CHARGE BROUGHT AGAINST CHROMASTER.

C. J. Chromaster, who was to have been given a hearing in Justice A. J. Welter's court this morning on the charge of interfering with the family of W. W. Green, was dismissed from further answer to that charge and re-arrested on a Federal court warrant from the court of Commissioner A. J. Nisbet, charging him with a violation of the Edmonds act. The territorial charge against Mrs. Green was dismissed by Justice Welter, also. Chromaster is to be given a hearing Wednesday morning before Commissioner Nisbet on the new charge. Meanwhile he is under a bond of \$500. A warrant had been sworn out against Mr. Green for carrying a pistol, but the case was dismissed by Justice Welter, who held that he was justified in arming himself at the time he did so, under the prevailing circumstances.

## HASKELL IN A QUARREL

Guthrie, Okla., April 9.—As the result of a midnight quarrel with Governor Haskell in the latter's apartments, concerning which statements conflict, Adjutant General Canton, of the Oklahoma National Guard, resigned today.

A revolver was taken from General Canton during the row, when mutual friends interfered. Canton declares, however, that he did not draw the weapon and had no intention of trying to injure the governor.

Governor Haskell said he would allow the officer to retire. "Isn't drunkenness enough reason for accepting his resignation?" he asked when pressed for a statement regarding the disagreement.

"I went peacefully to the governor's apartments to talk things over," said Canton today, "and he started a row. He told me to go to a warmer climate. I did not try to draw a revolver, as reported. Far from doing anything to injure the governor, I have saved him several times from being hurt."

Chief of Police Mitchell said today that General Canton would be arrested, charged with disturbing the peace and carrying concealed weapons.

## Poker Playing in Legislature.

Jackson, Miss., April 9.—Five warrants charging poker playing were issued as one of the ramifications of the Bilbo-Dulaney senatorial bribery investigation. The warrants were for state senator Charles F. Engle, representative Charles Doperly, representative Sam Clark, T. G. James, both of the latter prominent planters and "Private" John Allen.

Allen was recently before a grand jury which was investigating some phases of the bribery charges. He was asked if he knew of any gambling at Jackson during the legislative session. He said he played poker in representative Doperly's room. Poker playing for money is unlawful under the Mississippi code of 1880.

## RUMOR THAT THE HEAD OF MORMONS WILL RESIGN.

Kansas City, Mo., April 9.—Rumors that Joseph Smith, President and prophet of the reorganized church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, will abdicate in favor of his son, Frederick M. Smith, are current here where the annual conference of the church is in session. President Smith is now 78 years old and a convention recently celebrated his fiftieth anniversary of his ordination as the president.

## FIRST CLASS ENTERTAINS SECOND AT INSTITUTE.

The First classmen of the Military Institute gave their annual party to the Second class at the Institute gymnasium last night. The members of the two classes, the alumni and their lady friends composed the party. ## GOAL FOR MANY YEARS

Washington, April 9.—Alfred H. Brooks, mineral expert in the Geological Survey, continued his testimony today before the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee.

He said the United States controlled from sixty to seventy per cent of the world's visible supply of coal and at the present rate of consumption it would require 4,913 years to exhaust the supply in the United States.

These figures are arbitrary, the witness said. Figured in the basis of the increased use of coal in the future at the same rate of increase as in the last two or three years, Mr. Brooks said it had been estimated that the supply of coal in the United States would be exhausted in from one hundred to one hundred and fifty years. Somewhere between the estimates of one hundred and fifty to five thousand years, he declared, the truth is to be found.

Mr. Brooks said there has been too much alarm as to the exhaustion of the coal supply. Other factors of power are coming into general use, and this, in time, will decrease the use of coal.

Stanley took his lady friend home, then went and got his gun and hunted up the "bad hombre." Finding the Mexican, Stanley fired a couple of shots into the air for effect, punched the Mexican in the ribs with the end of the revolver and took him to headquarters and turned him over to Night Policeman Tobe Stewart. The Mexican was given a light fine yesterday for peace disturbance.

## ELEVEN THOUSAND LOSS ON ALFALFA MEAL MILL.

Ed E. Wells, the fire insurance adjuster from Denver who has been here several days settling up the insurance on the alfalfa meal mill of the Roswell Wool & Hide Company, which was partly destroyed by fire two weeks ago tonight, today completed his task on this loss and it was announced this afternoon that the amount of insurance to be paid is \$11,000, which is one thousand dollars more than the original amount estimated by the owners of the plant. Mr. Wells is still working on the loss at the Roswell Steam laundry.

Control of both houses of congress by large majorities and with a Republican president in the White House it is certainly playing the baby act to assert that the Democrats may be responsible for the defeat of the statehood bill.

The action of Milwaukee in going over to the Socialists has aroused the Republican leaders in congress, and they see that Milwaukee's example may be followed by that of other cities. If the gang in control of the affairs of this country keeps up the present gait there is no telling what action people may be driven to.

In another column the same paper announced that work would soon be commenced on a seven story building in Roswell. ### NOTES FROM THE PAPERS OF THE PECOS VALLEY.

The Knowles News states that in the section of Eddy county which would go to make up the Plains country there are now 5,000 or 6,000 people residing. We are indeed pleased to hear this, for it denotes the growth of as great a dry farming country as man ever laid eyes on. If this is a good argument for the Plains country it should certainly be appropriate for Artesia to also get up population statistics to use in our next county fight. ## TO INSPECT INSTITUTE MONDAY AND TUESDAY.

Captain Michael J. Lenihan, General Staff, U. S. Army, will arrive in Roswell tomorrow night to inspect the New Mexico Military Institute. It is his plan to remain over Monday and Tuesday in order to give a thorough inspection.

The program for the Military exercises will not be definitely known until after the arrival of Captain Lenihan. It is supposed, however, that he will review the battalion about nine o'clock Monday morning.

Dr. Robert Smart, Surgeon General, New Mexico National Guard, has arranged to be in Roswell Monday, April 18th, to deliver a lecture on Camp Sanitation and Military Hygiene.

Dr. Smart had several years' experience as an Army Surgeon and stands at the top of his profession. His lecture will, no doubt, be one of the most interesting ever delivered in Roswell. It is a matter which interests all of our citizens, as well as those connected with the military organizations.
