## GEN. LAWTON REPORTS

### The Old Indian Fighter Stirs Up Philippine Insurgents.

### In a Month He Fought and Won Twenty-Two Engagements.

### Admiral Dewey Strongly in Favor of Retaining Philippine Islands.

### DEATHS IN ARMY DURING THE YEAR.

New York, May 24.—A dispatch to the Journal-Advertiser from Manila says: General Lawton, with six thousand men, is resting at Candaba, after thirty days' successful campaigning. He said: "It pained me when we got into San Isidro to see on the walls of the prison there the names of the fifteen Americans from the Yorktown. From Col. Ray, a Spanish officer, whom we rescued, I learned that one American prisoner escaped. He was recaptured and stretched on the ground before his fellow prisoners and twenty lashes were given to him. We found a letter near San Isidro written by one of the Yorktown's crew saying they were being kicked, their hair was being pulled out and they were cruelly treated in various other ways, and praying their fellow countrymen to hurry their release. I had during the last month twenty-two engagements. Six of my men have been killed in the field, two died of wounds, and thirty-five wounded. The losses of the insurgents were over 400 killed, while we have taken 1,000 prisoners. The supplies I destroyed would feed an army of 30,000 men six months. I must mention my brave scouts, twenty-five in number. I deeply deplore the loss of Chiefs Young and Harrington, two as brave and fearless men as I ever met. In all the towns through which I passed I established town councils, made up of natives. Ten of the twenty-two engagements fought by us were very severe. My small loss was due to the fact that I flanked the enemy each time and came in on their trenches in the rear."

### FAVORS EXPANSION.

Admiral Dewey says the United States will hold the Philippines. New York, May 24.—A dispatch to the Journal-Advertiser from Hong Kong quotes Admiral Dewey as saying on the Olympia: "The courtesy of visitors I warmly appreciate, but I am too sick to receive them. I am sorry to leave Manila, but I could not stand the care and responsibility much longer. I expect to remain two weeks at Victoria Peak. I will never part with the Philippines I am sure, and in future years the idea that anybody should have seriously suggested it will be one of the earliest of history."

### Will Build the Railroad.

Pekin, May 24.—The Russian minister, M. de Giers, has notified Tsung Li Yamen that Russia is unable to accept the Chinese refusal of a railroad concession, and will send engineers forthwith to survey the line to connect the Russian Manchurian railroad with Pekin.

### Counterfeiters Arrested.

Lancaster, Pa., May 24.—John Burkholder, of Martinsdale, and L. W. Frank Houser, of Terre Hill, have been arrested on the charge of counterfeiting labels of the clear mark international union. It is alleged that they have been engaged extensively in this business for years.

### Damaged by Hail.

Kansas City, May 24.—Hail did much damage in central Kansas last night. In Saline county wheat and other crops for miles were destroyed, and many buildings were damaged and thousands of window lights broken, and some cattle and many chickens killed. At Perry the proportions of a cloud burst were reached and streams overflowed, flooding farm property.

### Deaths in the Army.

Washington, May 24.—Adjutant General Corbin has prepared the statement of the number of deaths in the army since the beginning of the war with Spain: In Cuba, 1,399; Porto Rico, 287; Honolulu, 45; in Philippines, 606; United States, 3,872. Total—6,209.

### Killed and Wounded.

Washington, May 24.—The war department today received a dispatch from Gen. Otis giving the following casualties: Killed—First Idaho, Corporal Geo. Scott; First Colorado, Private Harry L. Hicks. Wounded, eight.

### Congratulates the Queen.

Minneapolis, May 24.—The Presbyterian assembly this morning ordered a message sent to Queen Victoria, congratulating her on her successful reign.

THE United States supreme court has adjourned for the term after disposing of 519 cases.

FELIX GRANT has been appointed postmaster at Tres Piedras, Taos county, vice Frank Holton, resigned.

ONE trust doth upon another tread. The plumbing companies have combined in a trust, with a capital of \$30,000,000.

THE total assessed valuation of railroads in Kansas for this year is \$60,927,280, an increase of \$64,189 over the assessment of 1928, which was \$60,863,091.

THE biggest piece of news this week is the failure of the proposed American steel trust, the most colossal commercial combination ever undertaken in this country.

GEN. LAWTON is keeping up his reputation as a fighter in the Philippines during the last month his command had twenty-two engagements with the enemy and won in every case.

LAST week the payments for gold at the Denver branch mint reached \$37,241.34, compared with \$30,305.55 in the corresponding week last year. The gain equals \$6,935.79, or over 20 per cent.

THERE are sixty-two Christian Knave societies connected with the Episcopal churches of this country, and twenty with the churches in England. The average is said to be higher in Australia and Canada.

THE supreme court of the United States should try to take a trip down the Rio Grande. They would find walking good in the bed of the stream in the vicinity of El Paso, where they imagine that the river is navigable.

THE state of Texas is the creation of American expansion. The Alamo is a glorious example of American valor, and the state of Texas ought to erect in Alamo square, San Antonio, a monument to the heroic defenders of that fortress.

THE industrial commission now engaged in the study of trusts has collected some interesting testimony which shows that trusts tend steadily toward an extortionate increase of prices to meet the dividend charges of watered stock.

It is said that thirteen missionary societies of the United States have arranged to carry on mission work in Cuba, ten in Porto Rico and six in the Philippines. Besides these work will be done by the agents of the Bible and tract societies and by the Salvation Army.

THE pope has expressed his approval of the anti-expansion speech of Bishop Spaulding, says a press dispatch from Rome. It will be remembered that the pope also expressed his approval of Spain about a year ago. The pope doesn't cut any figure in the politics or policies of this country.

THE dispatches say that Admiral Dewey "proposes to go to his old home in Vermont and live there." This will be a hard blow to the papers that have insisted that they must pass the hat for him so that he might pass the remainder of his days in a \$100,000 residence in the city of Washington.

THE United States will hold the Philippines; Cuba will be annexed; Porto Rico will be a territory, and in a few years all the islands of the Caribbean ocean will float the Stars and Stripes. In the meantime we hope New Mexico will not be forgotten, and will be allowed statehood and self-government.

THE report of the United States Geological Survey on the production of stone in this country in 1928 shows a total valuation of \$38,270,354, an increase of more than \$2,000,000 over that of 1927. There was an increase in the value of every stone except marble, which fell slightly below the 1927 production.

AN evidence of the great volume of business our country is doing with Europe exists in the fact that not a dollar of the twenty millions in gold paid to Spain for her islands left our shores. The gold was sent away by way of exchange accounts and yet there remains a huge balance to the credit of the United States in Europe.

EL PASO—ALL RIGHT. A few correspondents at El Paso have greatly injured the city by the fact that rapidly growing city by holding a meeting and demanding that the American flag should be lowered in the Philippines. This disloyal demonstration has aroused the patriotic people of the Paso City, and they will hold a monster mass meeting this evening to denounce the enemies of this country and to express their faith in American institutions and love for the flag of the United States. The call for the meeting includes the names of the leading citizens of El Paso, and comprises Democrats and Republicans. El Paso is all right, and will make the traitors in that locality hunt dark holes on the side of Mount Franklin.

LIQUID AIR. It would seem that certain uses may be found for liquid air in which considerations of cost are not so important as is the ability to obtain the effect in view. In warfare, for example, the possession of highly concentrated energy stores under control is very important. Professor Keith Thompson, in The Engineering Magazine for this month, says liquid air can be rapidly converted into compressed air at six tons per square inch. This would probably be useful in the projection of high explosives. Compressed air is now used for propelling mobile torpedoes, or fish torpedoes, as they are called. Drifted torpedoes either depend for power upon compressed air or the electric energy of a storage battery. Compressed air requires high pressure

and very strong and heavy containing vessels. Liquid air can be stored without pressure or at low pressure, and can be evaporated at any desired pressure, while its bulk represents that of air under 800 atmospheres. A storage battery would probably be from five to ten times as heavy as liquid air in a receptacle, for equal available energy. But no storage battery could be discharged at an equivalent rate.

COL. R. T. TWITCHELL of Las Vegas, is doing valuable work for the Rough Riders reunion. He is at the head of the committee, and will make the reunion known to the utmost bounds of the United States. It is men like TwitcheLL who help to keep towns from growing dull, stale and unprofitable.

The Defense Has the Floor and Tells of Smuggling at the Prison.

Monday afternoon Detective Cook completed his testimony in the conspiracy case, which the New Mexican has been following in its issue.

Bernard Spears, former penitentiary yardmaster, was put upon the stand. He told how every few weeks he gave him a small package of strychnine, and said he had found it in the garden, where a guard named Burns had dropped it.

At one time, when a whole bottle of strychnine was handed to Spears, Garner said a small quantity had been taken out and tried on a dog. When the last package was received, Garner said: "This is the last. The gang say that they have done their part, and they will be raising the devil with me for not doing mine."

Mr. Spears testified that several times he, Colonel Bergmann and O. L. Merrill held meetings to discuss the Garner case and the source whence came the poison. There was hardly a week during the eight years, under the four superintendents he served at the penitentiary, that something was not smuggled in by convicts. Acids, knives, files, paper, lead pencils and other articles were constantly found, and there was always mystery as to the methods.

The witness, Colonel Bergmann, O. L. Merrill and a guard named Kelly constantly watched Burns and Garner. Burns' conduct was above suspicion. For four weeks Garner was sick, and one week he was entirely out of his head. For two months he had been working at the capitol, and it might have been comparatively easy for him to smuggle in the poison, hide it, for instance, in the hollow iron of the bedsteads, or in the ventilators.

Colonel Bergmann and the prison officials also the same food that was prepared for the convicts. Orders were given not to allow Garner in the kitchen. The prison officials never believed that Garner said of alleged plotters. Garner was not placed in a dark cell or punished for infraction of the rules, because in that manner prison authorities never succeed in getting a true statement out of a convict.

When the Borregos were in the penitentiary three bottles of acid, files, two saws and other matter were smuggled in, and it was never discovered how they were taken in. The Borregos were punished by never being allowed outside, and after they sawed their door, by being kept in a blind cell.

William Cole, ex-night cell house keeper, caused much laughter by his quaint and naive answers. He caught Francisco Borrego after the prisoner out his way out of the cell door. The witness found an ax smuggled into a dark cell.

Spears was recalled and said that any prisoner was at liberty to complain to the warden. Garner had said to Spears: "I do not want any three months for good behavior, as I would rather stay at the penitentiary. The gang will murder me when I get out."

Henry Bergmann, son of Colonel Bergmann, was the last person on the stand, but produced no material new evidence. He contradicted himself in an obvious manner several times.
