# W. M. REED SAYS WORK

WILL START ON ENGLE DAM. El Paso, Tex., April 9.—Six weeks after hearing the testimony and the arguments in the condemnation proceedings instituted by the Government of the United States against the Victorio Land and Cattle Company, involving the land to be covered by the waters of the Elephant Butte Dam, the great \$7,000,000 irrigation project in which this section is vitally interested, the opponents yesterday filed tacir final report which was made public today.

The Government offered the Victor to Land and Cattle Company \$65,000 for the 30,600 acres of land, which the waters of the dam will cover The land was assessed at thirty cents on acre for taxes, but the company demanded \$600,000. After the condemnation proceedings were instituted the company demanded \$1,000,000 additional for the strip of land 1,200 by 100 feet in size which would form

the site of the dam. The appraisers assessed the value of the land at \$199,097.25, from which they deducted \$1,380 for land in litigation to be 'aeld in trust and paid to the rightful owners as found by the court. They also award the company the right to water its cattle from the reservoir where it abuts their lands.

Engineer in Charge W. M. Reed. formerly of Roswell announced taat work on the dam would be resumed and pushed to completion as the funds for the work were already av allable, and the matter of the land will now be left to the courts, prowided the company refuses to accept

Dallas, April 10.-Halley's comet is now visible from Texas points a few minutes before sunrise, according to observations by Father John Le Sage, astronomer for Holy Trinity College. At Dallas the comet is visible between 5:25 and 5:30 a. m., Father Le Sage says, and if the weather is very clear the comet is visible with the naked eye. It appears in the eastern borizon, and is so near the sun that the dawning day soon makes it invisible, the period of its visibility being only a few minutes between darkness and dawn.

DROP ANNOUNCED IN TAX

RATE FOR THE TERRITORY Santa Fe, N. M., April S .- At meeting between Governor Mills and Territorial Auditor W. G. Sargent today the territorial tax levy for 1911 was fixed and announced at 11 mills. The levy for territorial purposes for 1910 was 14.45 mills, making a drop of 3.15 mills in a single year.

The decrease in the tax rate was made possible through increased valnations reported from almost every county in the territory, making the production of each mill of assessment much greater than ever before. The 11 mill levy is the lowest New Mexico has had for territorial purposes for many years.

The condition of territorial finance was never so good as now. The county treasurers are keeping close track of collection of taxes and last year the collections were more nearly complete than ever before. Assessments are being more carefully and system atically made and these things, with the large increases in property valuations have made the decrease poss ible. It is not improbable that another considerable decrease may be made in the levy for territorial purposes for 1912.

JEALOUSY CAUSES YOUNG

WOMAN TO KILL HERSELF. May Rushing, aged 22 years, wi came here from Claremont, Kent county, Texas, about three years ago sacks, with big rooks, and sunk to since she came here, committed suicide at 2:30 yesterday afternoon as a result of jealousy, firing a revolver shot into her left shoulder from the shock of which she died at 7.30 last night. The shot was fired at her rooming place, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Will D. Babb, at 110 South Washington street and the woman's death occurred at St. Mary's hospital, where she had been taken for treatment.

> The inquest was held before Justice R. D. Bell this morning. Tae evidence showed that the deceased had neen in her room at the Babb home talking with Sam M. Oldham just before the shooting. Oldham testified that he had been going with the de ceased about two years and that on Sunday he went buggy-riding with another girl, which brought on a quarrel between him and the deceased She threatened to kill herself, he said and he hunted for his revolver, waich was at this place, but could not find it. After he left the room, he and Mr. and Mrs. Babb heard the deceased lift a stove lid, and it is supposed she had the revolver hidden in the stove. The shot was soon heard, resulting in the fatal injury. The Babbs and Drs. C. M. Yater and R. L. Bradley were also on the stand, the doctors telling of the deceased having told them, before aer death, that she shot herself with the object of taking her own

The verdict of the coroner's jury vas to the effect that the deceased died of a gunshot wound, self inflict ed, and was signed by the justice and the following jurymen: W. M. Bevers, Seta Swift, H. T. Dmry, Ed Mun dy, Pearl Wilson and R. M. Tigner

The pistol wound was not necessar ily fatal in itself. The ball entered the shoulder near the armpit and ranged only slightly downward, passing out too high in the back to have reached a highly vital organ. The shock was what killed her, the phy sicians believe.

The deceased leaves a father and mother at Claremont, also other rel atives. She was last employed at the Grand Central hotel as waitress. The body is now at the Henninger under taking rooms' and the funeral will be held at the Henninger parlors, with burial at South Side cemetery. The time will be announced later.
