DISCUSSING TERMS.

Filipino Commissioners Studying Plan of Government.

Gen. Otis Recommends Promotion for Col. Owen Summers.

Presbyterian Churches Still Divided by the Slavery Question.

ADMIRAL DEWEY IS UNWELL.

Manila, May 23.—The Filipino commissioners spent the day at the residence of the American commissioners. They discussed every point of the scheme of government and peace proclamation details, including information as to what personal rights would be guaranteed them. Col. Charles Dwyer, of the American commission, explained that they would be the same as under the United States constitution. They chiefly objected to the scheme on the ground that it gave them no personal liberty, which they know they would have, but did not give them political liberty. Finally the Filipinos said they were personally pleased with the plan, but could not endorse it officially.

CAME IN AND SURRENDERED.

Manila, May 23.—Rostario, a Filipino congressman and wealthy resident of Mahala, formerly Aguinaldo's commissary general, accompanied by an insurgent captain, called upon Major General Otis today and announced: "We desire to surrender our persons and property into the hands of the Americans." The surrender was arranged by Chaplain Pierce, of the Fourteenth regiment.

According to Rostario, General Luna is absolute dictator and Aguinaldo fears him. Every Filipino leader, it is added, suspects the other of treachery. A recent meeting of the Filipino congress was to secure a new cabinet and the question of peace was not formally considered, as most of the others feared Luna's displeasure.

Major Bell with two companies of the Fourth cavalry has been reconnoitering in the direction of Santa Rita. He found a hundred Filipino and was driving them away when large reinforcements of rebels arrived and he was obliged to withdraw with four men wounded.

A raft carrying soldiers of the Fourteenth regiment has been sunk at Pasig Ferry, and one man drowned. The war season has begun.

Christmas Unsettled Agree.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 23.—So far as official action is concerned the union between the Presbyterian church North and South is as far off as ever. Taking up the proposition for the beginning of negotiations with a view to reconciliation favored by many, the overtures committee on bills reported adversely to the general assembly to-day. It was held inexpedient to take any action this year. On overtures relating to freedom of worship at the Annapolis military academy, the committee reported favorably, and the report was adopted.

ADMIRAL DEWEY IS SICK.

Hong Kong, May 23.—Admiral Dewey, Captain Lamberton, Lieutenant Brumby and United States Consul Wildman were received by the guard of honor of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers when they landed to visit the governor of Hong Kong, Sir Henry A. Blake. The visit was requested by the officials mentioned. Admiral Dewey is in bad health being too ill to attend the queen's birthday dinner. The Olympia is going to dock here and will remain ten days.

Ship From Honolulu.

San Francisco, May 23.—The steamer Australia arrived from Honolulu to-day and brings word that the United States transport Solace arrived at Honolulu, May 15th, from Manila via Hong Kong. She has on board a large number of soldiers and sailors whose time service have expired and many invalided, incapacitated men. Among the passengers is General King.

Attorney A. S. Humphreys has filed information in the supreme court of Hawaii charging Attorney General Cooper with misconduct in office. Cooper has been cited to appear before the supreme court in June.

Grand Stand Collapsed.

Malden, Mass., May 23.—The private viewing stand on the route of the parade in the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the founding of this town, which was occupied by members of the Massachusetts legislature and guests, collapsed to-day and several occupants received severe injuries.

CUBANS REFUSE TO GIVE UP ARMS.

Washington, May 23.—The main feature of the cabinet meeting to-day was the discussion of a delayed report from General Otis regarding military operations in the Philippines. The report is considered satisfactory. Secretary Gage brought up the question of a flag for Cuban shipping. About six million dollars' worth of Cuban shipping is prevented from engaging in international trade because it has no flag to sail under. The owners have repeatedly appealed for relief. The matter was referred to Secretary Gage for solution, if one could be found. Relief was offered so far as coastwise trade is concerned by recognition of the Cuban flag for the purpose.

Stranded Steamer Paris.

Falmouth, England, May 23.—The weather is favorable to the stranded ship Paris, and soundings show that the ship is resting more favorably, owing to the fact that she has been considerably lightened. Should the steamer show signs of sinking when taken in tow it is proposed to run her on a flat sandy bar adjoining the place where she struck.

It is expected that the steamer, now being evenly balanced, will come off the rocks without sustaining further damage.

CURRENCY REFORM.

Republican Congress Will Try to Adopt Gold Standard.

New York, May 23.—A special to the Herald from Washington says that the advocates of currency reform are somewhat disappointed with the results of the deliberations of the republican caucus committee, appointed to formulate a legislative program. It has been hoped that the committee would agree upon a comprehensive scheme of currency and bank reform that would command the support of a majority of each house of congress. The very moderate scheme agreed upon by the committee, however, is generally looked upon as a step in the right direction. It proposes to adopt definitely the gold standard, making all obligations of the country payable in gold on demand; to reduce greenbacks only in exchange for gold; to permit banks to issue notes up to par value of their bonds and permit the establishment of banks with \$25,000 capital and small loans. It is not improbable that even the moderate measure proposed by the committee will fail.

Peace Conference.

The Hague, May 23.—Chiefs of delegations to the peace conference held a private meeting this morning and afterwards informed their colleagues of the arrangements made for a choice of presidents of the various committees agreed upon last evening. The conference had a plenary sitting, at which the selections were ratified.

Indian Outbreak.

Millie City, Mont., May 23.—There are indications of a Cheyenne uprising, armed Indians having driven M. Loran and children from their home and killed stock belonging to Henry Bailey, a deputy sheriff. He expects to come here about June 30, when he will take charge of his hotel.

ADVERSE DECISION.

Supreme Court Decides Against Damming Rio Grande.

That August Body Thinks the River is Navigable.

Several Negroes Shot and Hung by a Mob in Mexico.

STRIKE AT BUFFALO SETTLED.

Denver, Colo., May 23.—The decision of the supreme court of New Mexico in the case of the Rio Grande dam and irrigation company, favorable to the company, was reversed by the United States supreme court. The case was remanded with instructions to order inquiry into the question whether the intended acts of defendants in the construction of a dam and appropriating the waters of the Rio Grande will substantially diminish the navigability of the stream within the limits of present navigability, and if so enter a decree restraining those acts to the extent that they will so diminish it. The opinion was by Justice Brewer.

STRIKE SETTLED.

Men Go to Work at Buffalo Loading Lanes.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 23.—The grain shoveler's strike was settled this morning when the agreement was signed by Contractor Connors to withdraw all men now employed by him as grain shovelers and submit the names of the old men to a committee, with President Keefe, of the Longshoremen's association, as chairman, who shall decide the eligibility of such members to join the new local society. The agreement was accepted by President Keefe and Rev. Mr. Albertson, representing the striking shovelers. It is expected that the freight handlers and others who struck out of sympathy for the shovelers, will return to work.

Negroes Lynched in Mexico.

Diaz, Mexico, May 23.—There is great excitement at San Diego, two miles from here, over the lynching of seven colored laborers on the Mexican Central railroad. Jose Santo, a Spanish negro, attempted to assault the wife of Senator Dupuy, a ranch owner, and was tracked by bloodhounds, and in company with nine others was captured. The regulators did not attempt to prove the guilt of the negroes, but hung three and shot four who attempted to escape.

See a Meteor.

Last evening, near 9 o'clock, I noticed a meteor of unusual brilliancy shoot across the northeastern sky, passing from southwest to northeast, covering a distance of about one-eighth of the arc of the horizon. This meteor was pale blue in color and appeared to be larger than the extended palm of a large hand. When near the horizon, a point nearly north from my point of view, it seemed to explode, but no sound was heard as the fragments disappeared.

THIS MORNING'S FIRE.

Fear That Mrs. Woodham and Daughter Perished Unfound.

Shortly before 3 o'clock this morning, Officer Harris discovered a bright blaze in the northeast corner of Hill street and turned in an alarm. The fire department turned out promptly, and it was found that the fire was in the adobe building on the corner of Hill street and Tijeras road, which, until last night, was occupied by Mrs. Woodham and her 11-year-old daughter, who came to Albuquerque from Los Angeles about a month ago. Last night they left on the 7:36 train for their home in Minnesota, to visit with Mrs. Woodham's sister for some time, before returning to this city. When the firemen arrived on the scene the roof of the building had fallen in, and not knowing anything of the departure of the occupants, the fire was expressed that they might have been burned to death.

The flames had gained such headway before the arrival of the firemen that with the absence of water it was impossible to check their headway and the house was almost totally destroyed. In view of the fact that the two human beings had lost their lives in the fire, Marshal McMillin put some men to work to examine the premises early this morning. They found some evidence resembling bone but when it was submitted to Dr. Pearce for examination, he was positive that it was not human bone. Furthermore Mrs. Woodham's sister told some of her neighbors yesterday that she would leave for Minnesota last night and had been seen going with her daughter to take the 7:25 train.

The house was the property of Dr. J. A. Henry, and was insured with Major W. A. Rankin, in the British American, for \$250. All of Mrs. Woodham's furniture had been left in the house, for the reason that she expected her brother-in-law and his wife to come from Los Angeles in a week or two to live there. She carried no insurance.

The origin of the fire is unknown, but as it does not seem probable that it could have been caused by the coal of a fire which was burning in the early evening, the opinion is quite general that it was of incendiary origin.

A heavy income tax would help control the trusts.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY has had a pleasant outing in Virginia, and returned to Washington fully rested to health.

GOLD production throughout the world has reached \$100,000,000 a day, and next year's yield is estimated at \$100,000,000.

THE queen of England will be 80 years old tomorrow. Victoria has occupied the throne of Great Britain nearly sixty-two years.

THE two highest mountains on the American continent are Mount McKinley, 29,065 feet, and Mount St. Elias, 18,024 feet.

THIS city will attend the Rough Riders' Reunion at Las Vegas in force. Arrangements should be made to run a special train from this city to Las Vegas on that occasion.

AFTER being on the firing line since February 4, participating in twenty-seven engagements and losing 225 men, the Nebraska regiment has returned to Manila for a rest.

JOHN C. TWOMBLY has been appointed postmaster of Denver. The people of that city most generally favored Mrs. H. A. W. Tabor, wife of the postmaster whose death occurred a short time ago.

INASMUCH as the rainy season is about to begin in the Philippines, Agulnido should hasten to make peace, else it will be said of him that he does not even know enough to come in out of the rain.

EFFORTS are being made to secure a rate from the railroads of one cent a mile to the Las Vegas Rough Riders Reunion. The Santa Fe company should give this rate, at least from all points in the territory.

THE supreme court has decided adversely to the building of the Elephant Butte dam and reservoir, fearing that the work would interfere with the navigation of the Rio Grande at El Paso.

THE election of United States senators by direct vote of the people is now being advocated by the best and leading minds of the country, and the matter is in debate in nearly if not quite all of the states.

"HAVE you any Edward Atkinson in Colorado?" asks an eastern correspondent of the Denver Post. "Plenty of them," the Post replies, "but out here they speak around in the sandhills and are known as coyotes."

UNDER the auspices of the German government an expedition will attempt to reach the South Pole. It will start in 1931. It will go as far as possible in a wooden ship, and then go farther by means of dog sleds and a balloon.

IN Massachusetts the doings of Christian scientists have aroused public sentiment against them to such an extent that a case to decide their status before the law will be brought in the courts at the first opportunity that may present itself.

INDICATIONS point to a very successful meeting of the Trans-Mississippi congress to be held at Wichita, Kansas, at the end of this month. The congress has held nine sessions and it claims to have influenced the national congress to a greater degree than all other bodies in the United States combined.

THE population of Cuba in 1924 was 1,631,696 and the estimated population of Porto Rico is 2,123,937, the Philippine Islands, 5,000,000, and Hawaii, 117,281. The area of these islands is as follows: Cuba, 45,752 square miles, Porto Rico, 3,695 square miles, the Philippines, 115,300 square miles, and Hawaii, 6,446 square miles.

ONE band will not be enough at the Las Vegas Rough Riders Reunion. The First Regiment band of this city and the Santa Fe band should be secured in addition to the excellent band at Las Vegas. The eagle is expected to scream and Old Glory is expected to float on that occasion, and a mile of music will be absolutely necessary.

"THERE is," says the Atlanta Constitution, "more of humbuggery in the so-called philanthropy of this world than in any other element in it. Charity for those who are too far distant to give trouble by, and busybody fraternity, which means nothing but talk, form the stock in trade of a great many people."

THE payment of a dividend of one-fifth of 1 percent to the creditors of the Iron Hall winds up a failure which involved 63,000 members, scattered through more than twenty states. When a receiver was appointed it was found that the liabilities of the order were \$5,100,000. Altogether \$2,000,000 has been collected and paid to creditors, leaving a permanent deficit of \$3,100,000.

THE TERRITORY IS GROWING. Gradually but surely New Mexico is growing in population, and the growth is of the right kind of people, says the Las Vegas Optic. The end of each year finds more prospectors in the territory than the year before, and the land in the mountains and valleys is being taken up by thrifty people and these frequently are not in considerable numbers. Only a few weeks ago forty families arrived in Colfax county. The irrigation systems of

Colfax, San Juan, Chaves and Eddy counties are constantly growing and adding perceptibly to the population. A gentleman of this city, who has just returned from the opening of the Rio Grande reservation, says that notwithstanding the hundreds of people who availed themselves of the opportunities there offered, that there is land and water enough for twenty times as many. Miners are in demand in most of the mining camps, especially in Grant county, and carpenters, stone masons, mechanics and day laborers to most of the towns and cities of the territory are kept busy.

A SAVAGE. The anti-expansionists of this country are extolling Agulnido as a patriot, and exult when he issues his bombastic proclamations extolling the American army. On February 15, 1929, Agulnido issued the following proclamation, which shows his brutal character most clearly:

"Philippine families only will be respected; they should not be molested, but all other individuals, of what race they may be, will be exterminated without any compromise or compassion after the extermination of the army of occupation."

WOMEN are expensive, for instance, that woman who overturned a lamp in a fight with another woman at Dawson, causing a fire which almost wiped out the town.

ADMIRAL DUBOIS before leaving Manila announced to the war department that the Filipino insurgents were vanquished.
