## THE LOST CAUSE.

Bitter Discussion Relating to  
Confederate Dead.

Russia Wants to Build a Railroad  
to Peking, China.

Four Killed and Twenty Injured by Ex-  
plosion of Chemical Works.

EUROPEAN NATIONS DIVIDE UP AFRICA.

Charleston, S. C., May 12.—Address-  
ing the confederate veterans' reunion to-  
day, Dr. J. L. Curry declared that there  
was no rebellion and no rebels left, but  
that the fight was for principles and right.  
His speech created wild enthusiasm.

The committee on resolutions reported  
a substitute for the resolution on the  
federal care of confederate graves, recom-  
mending that the "united confederate  
veterans' record their sincere appre-  
ciation of the utterance of the president  
of the United States at Atlanta, Decem-  
ber last, concerning the assumption of  
the care of the graves of our confederate  
dead by the national government; that  
"we shall welcome any legislation which  
shall result in the care of the graves of  
our comrades in the northern states by  
our government." In regard to the  
confederate dead in the south, it recom-  
mends that "the care of their final rest-  
ing places be a sacred trust dear to the  
hearts of southern women, and we be-  
lieve we can safely let it remain there."

Rev. Taylor Martin, of Pulaski, Va.,  
spoke against the address of the report.  
He said the veterans had nothing to do  
with any suggestion from the president  
and they never would be placed in the  
attitude of being under obligations to  
the government that slew southern men.  
Theodore H. Buebe, of North Carolina,  
declared that it would be a disgrace to  
the chief of the nation and a disgrace to  
the confederacy if the report were  
adopted. The discussion grew very  
bitter.

"There's too much McKinleyism in it,"  
shouted a veteran. The report was  
finally adopted with cheers.

The United Confederate Veterans elect-  
ed the following officers: Commander,  
in chief, Gen. J. B. Gordon; command-  
er department of northern Virginia,  
Gen. Wade Hampton; commander of the  
Tennessee, Gen. Stephen D. Lee; com-  
mander of department of the Trans-Mississippi,  
Gen. W. L. Cabell; General Com-  
mand, in chief of the Sons of Confederate  
Veterans.

China Not Considered.  
Peking, May 12.—The Chinese govern-  
ment, acknowledging the receipt of a  
communication regarding the Anglo-  
Russian agreement as to the spheres of  
interest in China, expressly declares that  
the acknowledgment in no wise implies  
acquiescence. Immediately after com-  
municating the agreement the Russian  
ambassador demanded the right to build  
a railroad connecting the Manchurian  
system with Peking. This is regarded of  
the utmost importance.

Dividing Up Africa.  
Paris, May 12.—The chamber of de-  
puties today approved the Anglo-French  
Niger-Nile convention. This convention  
divides Great Britain disposes of hun-  
dreds of thousands of square miles of  
African territory, leaves only four  
recognized independent states remain-  
ing out the continent, Morocco, Abyssinia,  
Liberia and the Congo Free State.

FLYING MACHINE.  
Test of a Flying Machine Purchased by  
the United States.

Washington, May 12.—Prof. S. P.  
Langley, secretary of the Smithsonian  
institute, inventor of the aerodrome, who  
was given \$25,000 by the board of or-  
dinance to experiment with his flying  
machine for war purposes, made the first  
test at Quantico, Va., yesterday. The  
machine was launched from the top of a  
house built anchored in the Potomac.  
The experiment was not as suc-  
cessful as the former one. The ma-  
chine soared about 500 feet, but de-  
scended after it had made a revolution  
and a half. The former machine, propelled  
by a steam engine, flew three-quarters  
of a mile, only descending when the  
steam was exhausted. It was under-  
stood that Langley was to overcome the  
limited power capacity of the former  
machine by using a condensing engine.

London, May 12.—A fearful explosion

works, St. Helena, Lancashire, killing  
four persons and seriously injur-  
ing twenty. Fire broke out in the

COLORADO has disagreed itself by legalizing prize fighting.

May 25 is the day set for a conference of the democratic national committee at St. Louis.

EXPORTS of petroleum from Philadelphia for the first three months of this year show a falling off of 22,000,000 gallons.

WITH three great nations and two local kings trying to run Samoa the 34,000 inhabitants are having a tough time of it.

POSTAL money orders issued in the last six months of 1928 were \$10,406,400 in excess of the amount issued in the same period a year before.

ALL the American volunteers in the Philippines expect to be home by July 1, and will help celebrate their return on the "glorious fourth."

The district conference of the Methodist Episcopal church south will be held at San Marcel from June 9 to 12 inclusive. Rev. M. Hodgson, of this city, presiding officer.

NIEVES TENNEROS, one of the first settlers of Dona Ana, died last Sunday morning. He was 98 years of age, and in former years was a well-known politician of the Mesilla valley.

EX-KENTON FEPPER, who once drew \$5,000 a year from the United States treasury, is now editing a Kansas populist paper at \$10 a week, and his faith in hard times is still unshaken.

The latest estimate of the cost of the war with Spain, including the \$200,000,000 paid for the Philippines, is \$300,000,000, which is scarcely half the amount generally predicted a year ago.

THE national banks of Chicago, on February 4, held \$103,000,000 deposits of interior banks, and April 5 this amount was \$26,000,000. Money is plentiful at almost all points in the country.

This city will refund its bonded indebtedness at a lower rate of interest. About fifty applications are on file from eastern firms to buy the bonds, which shows the excellent credit of the city.

The aggregate gold holding in the treasury stands at \$279,000,000 in round numbers, an increase of about \$700,000 since April 1, and the free gold aggregates \$245,140,329, an increase of about \$500,000 during the month.

The imports of specie for the week ending May 6th were \$294,215 in gold and \$6,502 silver, a total of \$300,717, against a total of \$44,583 the previous week and \$2,946,059 in the corresponding period of last year.

According to the treasury experts, March gave a marked impetus to the exportation of American coal, the total exceeding by about 50 per cent the coal exports of March, 1928, and the money receipts being increased nearly as much.

FORTY four days from Manila to New York by way of the Suez canal is pretty good time. The cruiser Buffalo made that time, arriving at New York on Sunday. She was actually in motion but thirty-seven days, the remainder of the time being occupied in stops at ports on the way.

The Sultan of Morocco was given twenty-four hours to settle American claims by the commander of the cruiser Chicago, and the big guns of the warship were trained on the city of Tangier. The sultan settled promptly. It is this sort of imperialism that is appreciated by patriotic Americans.

DURING the fiscal year 1928 the total number of passengers that departed from American for foreign ports was 225,411, of which 94,554 were cabin or first class passengers. Of this number 187,218 sailed from the port of New York, the next largest number being 10,814 from San Francisco.

The official figures issued on iron shipments from Alabama and Tennessee for the first three months of the year show the largest volume in the history of the trade in the south, and the highest prices for the past ten years. Pig iron shipments of 336,000 tons show a gain of 4,000 tons, and cast iron pipe shipments equal 39,000 tons, a gain of 7,000 tons. Southern profits in iron are evidently on the increase.

THE Prescott Journal-Miner says: "The first annual reunion of the Rough Riders, according to the disposition of Colonel Brodie, who is at present in Prescott, will be in Las Vegas, N. M. The selection of the above place is due to the fact that as New Mexico furnished forty per cent of the members of that famous regiment, it is only right and proper that our sister territory should be accorded that distinction of honor."

It is said that the continued absence of yellow fever at Havana creates astonishment. The yellow fever, under the old Spanish rule, was not an occasional and intermittent calamity, but a regular visitant. It was expected. Its absence, not its presence, was considered remarkable. The reason the yellow fever has not come to Havana this season, as on all previous seasons, is because an American idea has been introduced in Havana, backed by American force—the idea of sanitary regulation.

RICHES IN THE WORLD.  
A Kansas City Star reporter who has been investigating Senator W. A. Clark's Jerome copper property, estimates that it is worth \$300,000,000. He found that the mine ships about 2,000,000 pounds of copper per month of 60,000,000 per annum, which means an income of \$14,000,000 per annum. Mr. Clark's Jerome property is undoubtedly the greatest copper property yet discovered anywhere.

It would appear to be desirable beyond all argument that the United States should build the canal as soon as possible.

A strict quarantine has been established against San Idelfonso and Santa Clara on account of smallpox by C. K. Burton, supervising teacher of Pueblo Indians. A number of natives around San Idelfonso are said to be down with the dreadful disease.

The Santa Fe limited train in April carried west 442 passengers, compared with 191 in the same month in 1928. The regular passenger train on this road took into California 1,791 persons, compared with 1,365 in the same month in 1928.

It is asserted that the Santa Fe railroad, by some means, escapes taxation on its main line and side tracks in this city. The matter is to be investigated.

New Mexico the Best Country for the Raising of Flocks.  
William K. Curtis, in writing to the Chicago Record from New Mexico about one of this territory's greatest resources, says:

The great advantages of New Mexico for sheep as well as goat feeding are the dry air and the difference in temperatures in different parts of the territory. The snow-capped mountains, in which the animals can find cool ranges in the summer, to the low plains, almost on a level with tide water, where they can feed and breed in the coldest winter. ## THE MERRILL MURDER.

Speculation Still Rife as to the Murder and its Cause.

New theories are arising and being advanced in reference to the Merrill murder case. One of the physicians at the post mortem examination is said to have stated that it was possible Merrill was killed with a bullet, for he found a circular opening, with the ragged edge of the skull pointing inward, on the left side of Merrill's head, and another corresponding opening, with the ragged edge apparently turned outward, on the right side of the head.

Owing to the body having been embalmed, and the brain not having been preserved, the defense will claim that no thorough post mortem examination could be made, and so at least throw a doubt on the allegation of the prosecution that Merrill was killed with a hatchet.

Several of those interested in the case say that the hatchet with which Merrill was murdered, has been found, but the officials are not committal on this point or deny it outright.

The theory that there was a woman in the case is growing. Sunday a man with two women, one of them said to have been from Silver City, called at a house on Water street, and asked to rent a room for the night, offering to pay \$1 for it.

It is maintained that a cool, calculating individual like a professional gambler, such as Locke is, would never have butchered a man in that manner, and it looks more like the work of a woman in a jealous frenzy.

If any of these are merely idle speculations, in support of which there is no direct evidence, but they are advanced by a local attorney who has had much experience in criminal cases—New Mexico.

Many of them come out for their health, but they are ordinarily attractive types and are certain to receive a proposal of marriage before they have been three months. For that reason Mr. Harvey's supply of waiters has to be renewed at brief and regular intervals, and successful results of his matrimonial bureau are found in every community. It must not be forgotten that a precedent for Mr. Harvey's enterprise was set by the first English settlers in America. Two cargoes of wives were sent out to the colonies of Jamestown by the Virginia Company in 1607, and were sold to bachelor colonists for 120 pounds of tobacco per wife, while Mr. Harvey does not even charge a commission.

**THE FRASER COPPER MINES.**

The New Owners Will Soon Begin Active Operations.

Dr. William Bradford, of Sing Sing, N. Y., and Joseph H. Morsey, of New York, representing the Rio Hondo Copper Company, R. B. Turner, of Butte, Mont., and J. A. Goble, of Kingston, Ont., arrived yesterday from the Fraser mines, two counties, which were purchased for \$100,000. They were in this city May 2, from where they returned to the New Mexico Territory. They appeared very well pleased with the property, and are prepared to start active operations as soon as a complete and thorough examination can be made by R. B. Turner, the Butte mining and milling expert, and advice received regarding the future development and methods of treating the ore, of which large quantities are in sight.

The property was purchased on the advice of J. M. Gilliam. The average milling ore shows 6 per cent copper, 37 in gold and five ounces in silver. The shipping ore averages 25 per cent copper, 12 in gold and fifteen ounces silver. The veins are very large, going from six to forty feet in width, and as they are all located on high, steep mountains, they are well suited for years by tunneling and quarrying.

The power for milling and reduction purposes will be furnished by the Rio Hondo, which passes through the syndicate ground, and is capable of driving any size plant, as water is abundant. The property consists of 230 acres of mineral and 320 acres of timber land. Dr. Bradford and Mr. Morsey returned for the east this evening.
