WRECK OF A BRITISH STEAMER.

Wardner, Idaho, May 9.—At a conference between Bartlett, Sinclair, General Merriam, Sheriff France and Judge Lindley, the following proclamation was issued:

"To Mine Owners, Shoshone County. Certain organizations or combinations existing in Shoshone county have shown themselves criminal in purpose, procuring property to be destroyed and murder to be committed, by reason whereof it has been twice necessary to declare martial law in Shoshone county. You are, therefore, notified that the employment of men belonging to said or other criminal organizations during the continuance of martial law must cease in case this declaration is not obeyed. Your mines will be closed. Therefore, in order to carry into effect the spirit of the foregoing notice and restore the industry of the district as far as possible, it becomes necessary to establish a system by which a miner may obtain work, and the following is promulgated for the guidance of all applicants and employees in the affected district: All parties applying for underground work in any mine, will be required to obtain from the sheriff of Shoshone county a permit authorizing said parties to apply to seek for and obtain employment. Mine owners must refuse employment to all applicants who do not possess a permit authorizing them to do so. Parties seeking employment of a duly signed certificate authorizing the same. All parties now under employment by the mine owners named herein, will be required to procure within ten days from this date certificates above referred to as a condition of their remaining in the service of their respective companies. By order of the governor and commander-in-chief.

INDIAN MURDERED.

Pueblo Indian of Laguna Killed by His Wife and Her Paramour.

Laguna, May 7.—This morning the horribly mangled body of an Indian man was found on railroad bridge No. 81, one-fourth of a mile west of Laguna pueblo. Under cover of an accident no doubt lies the story of a gruesome murder. A few nights ago the murdered man, returning home from herding sheep, found a man in the room with his wife. That was the last ever seen of the dead man during his life, but the blood scattered over the floor of his house, a bloody trail from his house to the railroad bridge and other evidences in the strange conduct of his wife and her paramour, suspected of illicit relations with her, all point to one of the most cold-blooded murders on record. The coroner's jury is being impeached and further details will be forthcoming in a short time. The suspected parties are being held.

Cruiser Aground.

Charleston, S. C., May 9.—The cruiser Raleigh, bound in, to be present at the Confederate reunion, went aground this morning about 200 feet outside of the south jetty. She probably will be floated by high tide this evening. It is not believed that she sustained any damage. Captain Coghlan declined assistance from all tugs.

Savannah, Ga., May 9.—Col. Bellinger, department quartermaster, has received the following from Havana: "But one regiment of volunteers now remains in Cuba—one of the immune commands at Santiago. That regiment will soon embark on the transport Logan for New York."

Steamer Wreck.

Adelaide, South Australia, May 9.—The British ship Loch Sloy, Captain Nicol, from Clyde for Adelaide and Melbourne, was wrecked near Kangaroo Island, April 21. Five passengers and twenty-five of the crew were drowned. Four persons escaped from the wreck, but three are still wandering in the bush.

Failed to Indict.

New York, May 9.—The grand jury which heard the evidence in the case against Island R. Moltenox, accused of the murder of Mrs. Kate Adams by poison sent through the mails, finished the investigation without indicting Moltenox.

The Battleship.

New York, May 9.—The battleship Texas went into dry dock today. The cruises New York and Brooklyn will follow, after the battleship is cleaned. Admiral Sampson said the ship will be ready for sea within thirty days.

Mutinous Strikers.

New York, May 9.—Twelve hundred Italian laborers on the Jerome Park reservoir work, who struck yesterday, stayed in the immediate vicinity of the reservoir all night, threatening if any man worked they would kill him.

Trouble With Indians.

Denver, Colo., May 9.—A special to the Times from Durango says: Weesleskin and other Indians have beaten a number of Mexican herders near the Animas river, and killed their horses and a large lot of sheep. The Indians threaten extreme measures if the whites do not keep away, not seeming to understand that this part of the former reservation is white men's property. Sheriff Thompson with a posse has gone to arrest the Indians, and may experience trouble.
