## END IS NEAR.

Philippine Rebellion is Predicted  
Nearing the Close.

Republic of Mexico Celebrates Ann-  
iversary of French Defeat.

Andrew Carnegie Announces that He  
May Retire from Business.

CRUISER RAILROAD TO BE REPAIRED.

Washington, May 6.—Officials state that the war department is looking for the speedy collapse of the insurrection in the Philippines. The expectation is based on private advice from the Philippine commission as to negotiations with insurgent representatives, and also upon the successful development of Arthur's and Lawton's campaigns. The insurgents have not acknowledged the sovereignty of the United States, but recognized the physical domination of our military forces, and while they talk of independence at the last moment without doubt they will accept readily any proposition looking to a protectorate. The president's instructions are clear on this point. The commission understands that it is to take no action in the way of making promises that will deprive congress of a free hand in disposing of the future of the Philippines.

Mexico Celebrates.  
City of Mexico, May 6.—The national holiday commemorating the defeat of the French at Puebla during the war of intervention, was celebrated yesterday all over the country. In this city several hundred thousand people witnessed the military procession. President Diaz reviewed the troops. The report telegraphed from Nicaragua that Mexico was about to extend southward and take the Central American states under her protection is utterly unfounded.

Inspection of Nations Ordered.  
Washington, May 6.—As a result of the president's consideration of the report of the Wade court of inquiry appointed to investigate the character of the war supplied to the army, especially those during the war with Spain, instructions were to day cable to the military commanders in the Philippines, Cuba and Porto Rico to establish a board of three officers, respectively in the line, medical and subsistence departments, to fully examine into the subject of desired changes in rations for troops.

LETTER FROM ATKINSON.

He Objects to the suppression of His  
Traitorous Tracts.  
Boston, Mass., May 6.—Edward Atkinson has addressed an open letter to the attorney general of the United States on the recent action prohibiting the transmission of certain pamphlets through the mails, in which he denies that the matter was of a seditious nature, and says the pamphlets appeared as public documents in connection with the proceedings of the United States senate. Atkinson also denies that he sent any communication of any nature to any private soldier or regimental officer of the United States in the Philippines. Atkinson says as it had been submitted to him by the parents of the Nebraska volunteers that he had been allowed to communicate with them on duty in the islands. Prompted by indignation, he decided to make a test, and to do so mailed pamphlets to the Philippines and wrote the secretary of war, telling him what he had done.

French to Intercede.  
Madrid, May 6.—In view of Aguinaldo's refusal to negotiate with Spain for the release of the Spanish prisoners, the government of Spain has asked the French government to arrange for fresh negotiations at Washington through the French ambassador for the release of prisoners according to the stipulations of the Paris treaty of peace.

Prominent Mason Committed Suicide.  
Omaha, Neb., May 6.—William R. Brown, the best known Mason in Nebraska, shot and killed himself this morning. Financial troubles were the cause. He has been secretary of the Nebraska grand lodge twenty-six years, also grand secretary of every other Masonic body in the state.

Cruiser Raleigh.  
Washington, May 6.—The cruiser Raleigh, after leaving Portsmouth, N. H., proceeded northward to Portsmouth, N. H., where she will be put out of commission preliminary to extensive repairs. Captain Coghlan will be placed in waiting orders.

Committed Suicide.  
St. Paul, Minn., May 6.—John C. Wagner, who has carried a life insurance policy since the Custer massacre in 1876, committed suicide at Stillwater last night. He was chief of ten Custer's pack train, and was at the massacre on the Little Big Horn.

Dresden, Ontario, May 6.—The local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce was robbed of \$10,000. The front door had been pried open, holes bored in the vault door, and a charge of nitro glycerine exploded.

GOOD WILL.

No More Political Police in New York  
State.

Albany, N. Y., May 6.—Governor Roosevelt has signed the bill, passed by the legislature providing that any person connected with the police force, from the commissioners down to patrolmen, who shall use his official power either for or against any political party shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The bill prohibits promotions for political reasons, contributions to or collection for political funds, and forbids any member of the police force being a member of a political club.

Bank Statement.  
New York, May 6.—Weekly bank statement: Surplus reserve, increased, \$1,125,525; loans, increased, \$1,654,400; specie, decreased, \$729,700; legal tenders, decreased, \$1,435,500; deposits, increased, \$16,000,000; circulation, decreased, \$73,000. Banks now hold \$19,351,950 in excess of requirements.

## REBELS ROUTED.

Gen. Lawton Defeats 2,000  
Philippine Insurgents.

Gunsboat Bennington Damaged  
Running on Shoal.

Gen. Merriam Has Restored Order in  
the Cour d'Alejo Country.

DEATH OF NOTED EDITORIAL WRITER.

Manila, May 6.—General Lawton's column advanced to a position two and a half miles north of Balang to-day. Outside of Maunin, 2,000 rebels, who occupied an entrenched position, were routed in short order. Many corpses of the rebels have been discovered in the river. Scores of rifles and other arms have been recovered from the river into which they were thrown by the retreating troops. MacArthur's division is resting at San Fernando, making meantime extensive reconnaissances.

Gunsboat Bennington Damaged.

Washington, May 6.—The following was received at the navy department: "Manila, May 6.—The Bennington grounded on a shoal, not on the chart, on the north side of Pannay, Philippine Islands. Came off twenty-three hours later. Been examined by divers. Damage not serious, but necessary to dock vessel. I sent to Hong Kong. No blame attached to anyone. "DREWY."

Noted Editorial Writer Dead.

San Francisco, May 6.—John Bonner, one of the best known newspaper writers of America, is dead, aged 70. He was formerly editorial writer of the New York Herald, and Harper's Weekly, for five years represented the Herald in Paris. He made a fortune in Wall Street, but failed. He came west and did editorial work on nearly all the leading papers of the coast.

Claims Against Nicaragua.

Managua, Nicaragua, May 6.—The Bluefields correspondent of El Comercio telegraphs that United States Minister Murray has agreed to a settlement of the claims of United States citizens there against the Nicaraguan government, which is favorable to Nicaragua.

Made Temporary Agreement.

Washington, May 6.—The United States minister to Nicaragua, Merry, has advised the state department from Port Limon of the nature of a temporary arrangement reached with the Nicaraguan government respecting the demand upon the American merchants at Bluefields for another payment of duties upon imports.

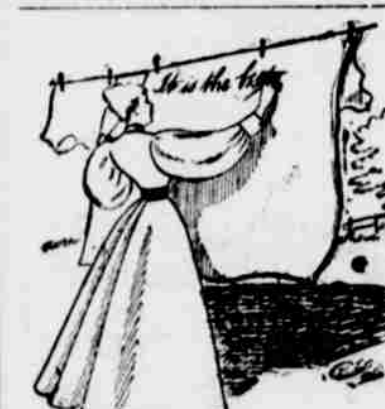

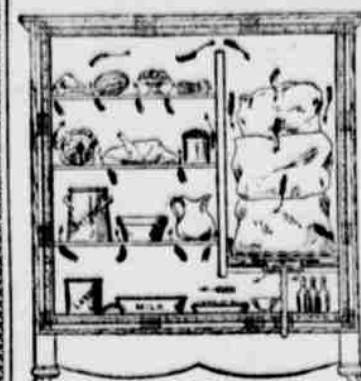
