PEACE PROPOSITIONS.

Filipino Commissioners Return to Manila.

Col. Funston Made a Brigadier General of Volunteers.

Gen. Otis Reports Twenty-Five Deaths From Wounds Since April 24.

TELEGRAM FROM ADMIRAL DEWEY.

Manila, May 2.—The insurgent commissioners who left Manila on Saturday have returned from the insurgent army's headquarters with new propositions for a cessation of hostilities.

AGUINALDO ANXIOUS.
New York, May 2.—A Manila dispatch to the Journal says that Col. Manuel Arguiesol of the envoys sent to the American lines presented a proposition directly from Aguinaldo, the same as that heretofore made, namely, that an armistice be called until the Filipino congress decides whether the Filipino army shall surrender. General Otis, the dispatch says, told Col. Arguiesol that it was useless for the Filipinos to return unless prepared to accede to the American demands.

DISPATCH FROM DEWEY.
Washington, May 2.—The following cablegram was received from Admiral Dewey:

"I cannot get further information now concerning Gilmore party. As soon as the information is obtained I will telegraph. Information received me to-day from Guam, dated March 20. Inhabitants are quiet, contented, under United States flag."

HARD FIGHTING IN PROGRESS.

Manila, May 2.—Major Manuel Arguiesol and Lieut. Jose Bernal, of the staff of Gen. Antonio Luna, returned here to-day to renew the request of Luna for a cessation of hostilities. They desired time to summon congress. They represent that Aguinaldo is without power to surrender the army. The envoys will see Otis again to-morrow.

Whether or not Luna is sincere in his overtures, the negotiations are giving the insurgents the needed opportunity to rehabilitate their demoralized forces. Refugees report that the Filipinos are deserting San Fernando and moving at St. Thomas. Strong entrenchments are being constructed.

General Lawton lost one killed and five wounded yesterday near San Rafael, where he strongly entrenched himself. To-day Lawton is marching on Baling, where a large body of rebels has congregated. There has been hard fighting to-day.

General Hale started at daybreak with the Iowa and North Dakota regiments, a squad of cavalry and two guns of the Utah battery from Calumpit in a northeasterly direction to co-operate with the Macabebes, who have asked the Americans to arm them in order that they might fight the Tagals.

DEATHS FROM WOUNDS.
Washington, May 2.—General Otis reports the deaths of twenty-five soldiers since April 24 from wounds in action.

Resigned.
Washington, May 2.—Senator Kyle, of South Dakota, has tendered his resignation as chairman of the industrial commission on account of ill health. He will continue to serve, however, as a member of the commission.

Strike Situation.
Boise, Idaho, May 2.—General Merriam arrived here at 3 o'clock this morning and immediately left for Boise. He is accompanied by a general cavalry, stationed here, to proceed to Wardner at once. There are no new developments in the situation.

HOUSING DIFFICULTY.
Differences between Hayti and San Domingo.

Washington, May 2.—The following memorandum was given out for publication at the state department to-day: "The strained relations existing between the republics of Hayti and Santo Domingo, caused by a dispute over the boundary line between these two countries, is in a fair way of settlement. The whole question with others involved is to be referred to the Holy See, Pope Leo XIII, to adjust. That other country was massing troops on the frontier is untrue."

To Be Retired.
Washington, May 2.—Paymaster General Stewart, of the United States navy, has been informed by Assistant Secretary Allen, of the intention of the navy department to retire him May 5 for age.

New Mexico Postoffice.
Washington, May 2.—A postoffice has been established at Fortale, Chavez county, New Mexico, with Seth A. Morrison, as postmaster.

At the Capital.
Washington, May 2.—President McKinley arrived this morning.

Murder and Suicide.
Stockton, Cal., May 2.—Mrs. William Hickman and Mrs. H. A. Hassall, eloped in a loving embrace, both dead, were found in a lodging house. Mrs. Hassall

has been morbidly infatuated with Mrs. Hickman. Last night she begged Mrs. Hickman to spend the night with her. Mrs. Hickman consented. Mrs. Hassall shot Mrs. Hickman, then herself. Mrs. Hassall came from London, England, and called herself a duchess, claiming that her husband is a duke. Hassall is chief ranger of the Order of Foresters, of this city.

Deserved Promotion.
Washington, May 2.—The president has appointed Col. Frederick Funston, of the Twentieth Kansas, brigadier general of volunteers.

General Otis cabled yesterday: "McArthur strongly recommends Col. Funston for his signal skill and gallantry in crossing the Rio Grande, and most gallant services since the commencement of the war. I urge the appointment. Funston is able as a leader of men and has earned recognition."

He was a resident of this city some years ago, and while here made many friends, who join with Mrs. Rosenwald in extending congratulations on his forthcoming marriage. The consummation of this happy betrothal will occur in the near future, the date of which will be announced in due time.

Word From the Boat Crew of the Gunboat Yorktown.

Boston Man Trying to Create Mutiny in the American Army.

Regular Troops Ordered to Quell Disturbance in State of Idaho.

FUNERAL OF SOLDIERS AT ARLINGTON.

Manila, May 2.—The first authentic information regarding Lieut. J. C. Gilmore and party of fourteen men from the United States gunboat Yorktown, who were captured by the Filipinos on April 12, was received to-day at the hands of Major Arguiesol, of the staff of Gen. Luna. It is in the form of a list of missing men, signed by Lieut. Gilmore. The lieutenant reports that he and party have been brought across the mountains from Balser, where captured. This information was brought in response to a note that Major General Arthur sent Luna by Major Shields and Lieut. Hayne, which those officers, bearing a flag of truce, carried across Luna's line yesterday evening. The note, after asking for information regarding the American prisoners in Luna's hands, concluded with a message that the "Major Arthur" would be pleased to meet Luna Shields and Hayne found a span of the railroad bridge a mile from St. Thomas broken.

J. B. Mayo Stages the Prisoner of the J. B. Mayo came in from Golden yesterday afternoon, bringing with him sixty-four ounces of gold from his last mill run of ore from the mill at Golden. He is operating his mine on the Grays mountain, two miles from Golden, where he has large bodies of free milling ore.

Mr. Mayo reports the camp improving. The Mouse United company are spending a good deal of money on their large plant, with every prospect of rich returns, as they are now operating on very rich gravel, under the management of Mr. Wood.

The Industrial Placer company, in the Tufts, is preparing to bore for water and expect to start in a few days. A very rich vein of ore has just been struck on the San Francisco mine, owned by Mr. Sugar and others.

The San Lazrus company, near San Pedro, is boring for water, with every prospect of successful issue. In fact, the whole camp appears to be in a better condition than for many years past.

District Court News.
This morning the court heard argument on the motion of plaintiff in the case of Spiegelberg Bros. vs. Meyers, for an appeal from the decision of the court quashing a writ of execution issued and carried out of some \$1,700 of defendant's money in the First National bank thereunder. The court refused to grant an appeal to the supreme court, and held that the defendant are to remain in form of revival in seven years from the date of their rendition.

In the matter of the guardianship of Josefa Gallegos, appeal from the probate court the case was dismissed at appellant's costs.

The case of Annie Zirhut vs. P. M. Sazette & Co. was continued on defendant's motion until next term of court.

The case of Ellen L. Lockhart vs. Mrs. Scott was continued on the 2nd term of court on plaintiff's motion, for the reason that the principal witness in the case is out of the city.

SAMOAN SITUATION.

Mistaken Clemency of the American and English Authorities.

Widow of Louis Stevenson Criticizes Bombardment of Samoa Coast.

United States Demands Removal of Gen. Torres at Bluefields.

SANTOS'S SQUADRON AT NEW YORK.

Wellington, N. Z., May 2.—Advice from Samoa indicates that the instructions issued from powers to cease hostilities will make the situation of the islands serious, as the rebels hold the main food supply, and are again active in the municipality of Apia. The correspondent says that the while people in the majority of the city are at the mercy of the rebels. The American vice consul's store at Faleia was looted last week while the German store adjoining was left untouched.

JUST LIKE A WOMAN.
Mrs. Stevenson Doesn't Like the Way War is Conducted.

London, May 2.—Robert Louis Stevenson's widow has written a letter to the Westminster Gazette from Funchal, Madeira, on the bombardment of the Samoan villages by British and German warships. Mrs. Stevenson says: "President McKinley allowed no firing on Cuban towns unless they gave active cause of offense, and Commodore Watson was ordered not to attack undefended Spanish cities. Does the president keep his word? or does he allow his country to be the aggressor?"

"The war is to be based on the warships and 'taking to the bush.' Under such conditions, she says, delicate women can hardly exist while children like this die. 'Who is to be held accountable for these deeds, that disgrace both England and America?'"

Santos's Squadron.
New York, May 2.—Admiral Santos's squadron of evolution, returning from its cruise in the West Indies, was sighted off the Highlands at 11:10 a. m., bound in Brooklyn, Indiana, Massachusetts and Texas, is expected to anchor off Tompkinsville. Several vessels will go to the navy yard to be docked and cleaned. The squadron is to remain in the harbor till the end of the month, when it is to go to Newport, R. I., and from there begin the summer cruise.

His Removal.
New York, May 2.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: As a result of the oppressive conduct of General Torro toward American merchants trading at Bluefields, Nicaragua, this government has determined to require the Nicaraguan government to relieve him from duty there. It is the understanding of officials that the demand has already been submitted for the punishment of Torro. No doubt exists that the Zelaya government, to show friendship to the United States, will take proper action.

THE ROUGH RIDERS' REUNION.

Suggestions in Favor of Holding It in This City Fair Week.

SILVER CITY FAVORS ALBUQUERQUE.

The Rough Riders in and about Silver City held a meeting in that city last week to consider the question of holding a Rough Riders' reunion and also to decide on the proper place to hold it.

Captain George Curry, of troop I, presided at the meeting. After some discussion the assembly voted unanimously in favor of holding the reunion in Albuquerque. As the great majority of the Rough Riders from the southern part of the territory were either present in person or were represented by others at that meeting, the decision there in favor of Albuquerque should settle all question as to the place of holding a reunion of the regiment, if one is held in New Mexico this year.

Furthermore it seems to be generally conceded that the reunion should be held in New Mexico as will be seen in the following dispatch from Phoenix, published in the Los Angeles Times:

There has been a deal of discussion lately concerning the place to be chosen for holding the first annual reunion of the Society of Rough Riders. Among the many places seeking the honor have been Kansas City, Omaha, St. Louis, Antonio, El Paso, Denning, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Las Vegas and Prescott. While the Arizona naturally would prefer the reunion to be held at Phoenix, where was formed the first squadron of the famous regiment, there is a sentiment that fairness would award to New Mexico the privilege of naming the point. New Mexico furnished four troops of the regiment, Arizona three, Indian Territory two and Oklahoma one.

The composite, though mainly from the extreme west, Col. Roosevelt has been incorrectly quoted as having expressed himself in favor of Phoenix. In a letter received this morning in Phoenix by a former officer of his command, Col. Roosevelt writes: "I entirely agree that the meeting place should be in New Mexico this year, Arizona the next time, and then Oklahoma or Indian Territory." He refers to the fact that the reunion of the Rough Riders is a national affair, and adds: "I do not believe they can make that thing work, and a meeting in Chicago would hardly seem to be the same thing as a meeting in the south, where the regiment was raised." The colonel has given assurances that he will attend the reunion wherever it may be held.

It is understood that Lieut. W. E. Dame, of Cerrillos, is in receipt of a letter from Col. Roosevelt, wherein the famous leader of the "Rough Riders" insists that the reunion take place in Albuquerque.

Now the only question remaining to be decided, is the proper time to hold the reunion. When THE CITIZEN first advocated the holding of the reunion a couple of months ago, it suggested June 24, the first anniversary of the battle of Las Guasimas, as the proper time. Owing to the fact that the Rough Riders in this territory had no organization, the matter was permitted to drag along without any action being taken until now June 24 is so near at hand that it will be practically impossible to make all the arrangements necessary, to assure the success of the reunion, in so short a time. For this reason THE CITIZEN would recommend that the Rough Riders get together and agree among themselves to postpone the proposed reunion until fair week next September. From present indications the fair association will give the best fair in the history of the territory at that time. The specialties in the way of attractions, that they are planning for, are such as will be typical of the west and for that reason of peculiar interest to visitors from the east, who would undoubtedly come here to attend a Rough Riders reunion. In June, on the other hand, there would be virtually nothing going on to interest visitors from abroad.

Then, too, in the matter of railroad rates better terms could undoubtedly be secured during fair time than at present and this is a feature that should be taken into account.

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PETROLEUM OIL AND GASOLINE.

Sale, Inspection, Report and Fee of Inspection of Lead Oil.

The act regulating the sale, inspection, etc., of petroleum, gasoline and other oil in this territory, reads as follows:

Section 1. That section 2040 of the company laws of 1907 be amended so as to read as follows:

[Section] 2040. Any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, or any agent of any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, who shall transport or bring into this territory for sale or use, or who shall sell for sale or use, or who shall sell or offer for sale or use, any mineral or petroleum oil, or any oil fluid or substance which is a product of petroleum, or which is found as a constituent element, either as whole sale or retail, that is less than what is known as 120 degrees test or which has a specific gravity of less than forty-three, and any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, who shall transport or bring into this territory for sale or use or who shall sell or offer for sale or use any gasoline, or of whatever nature it may be, which is not a product of any mineral or petroleum oil or any oil fluid or substance which is a product of petroleum or into which petroleum or any product of petroleum is found as a constituent element, either as whole sale or retail, which is less than what is known as 120 degrees test, or which has a specific gravity of less than forty-three, and any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, who shall sell or offer for sale or use any gasoline, or of whatever nature it may be, which is not a product of any mineral or petroleum oil or any oil fluid or substance which is a product of petroleum or into which petroleum or any product of petroleum is found as a constituent element, either as whole sale or retail, shall be deemed to be in violation of this act, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or imprisoned in the county jail for not less than sixty days nor more than six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court trying said case.

Sec. 2. That section 2041 of the company laws of 1907 be amended so as to read as follows:

[Section] 2041. Any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, or any agent of any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, who shall transport or bring into this territory for sale or use, or who shall sell or offer for sale or use any gasoline, or of whatever nature it may be, which is not a product of any mineral or petroleum oil or any oil fluid or substance which is a product of petroleum or into which petroleum or any product of petroleum is found as a constituent element, either as whole sale or retail, which is less than what is known as 120 degrees test, or which has a specific gravity of less than forty-three, and any person or persons, firm, company or corporation, who shall sell or offer for sale or use any gasoline, or of whatever nature it may be, which is not a product of any mineral or petroleum oil or any oil fluid or substance which is a product of petroleum or into which petroleum or any product of petroleum is found as a constituent element, either as whole sale or retail, shall be deemed to be in violation of this act, and upon conviction thereof, be subject to the same fines and penalties imposed by section 2040.

Sec. 3. That section 2044 of the company laws of 1907 be amended so as to read as follows:

[Section] 2044. The inspector or deputy inspector is entitled to demand and receive from the owner of any oil or fluids inspected one cent for each gallon so inspected, to be paid in advance to the inspector of all oils mentioned in section 2040 and 2041 as amended by this act, that may be transported or brought into this territory for sale or use, or which may be kept for sale or offered for sale or use for illuminating purposes, and keep an accurate record of such oils tested and branded by him, and record shall state the date of inspection, the number of packages, barrels, casks or tanks inspected, the number approved, the manufacturer's brand, the name of the person for whom inspected, and the sum of money received for inspection, and such record shall be open to all persons interested in the same.

W. W. Strong's petition praying that the city engineer be instructed to give the sidewalk grade at the corner of Fifth street and Railroad avenue was denied.

The report of the street committee, with reference to trimming trees when necessary for the convenience of the telephone and telegraph companies, was referred to the city attorney with instructions to draw an ordinance on the subject and fix the height of the wires.

Marshall McMillan, city engineer, reported on his management of the office of the city engineer from July 8, 1908, to April 17, 1909, inclusive.

Paid to city treasurer, \$3,853.70.

The petition of the Mutual Automatic Telephone company, praying that the city engineer be instructed to give the sidewalk grade at the corner of Fifth street and Railroad avenue and Fourth street, was denied.

The fire committee reported the following officers elected by the fire department:

A. G. Stockert, chief; Frank Strong, assistant chief; J. K. Tierney, secretary; R. K. Gentry, treasurer.

The officers were ratified by the council.

The fire committee made the following report, which was adopted and the recommendations ordered carried out:

We have examined house houses and find the same in good order.

We have at present 1,930 feet of hose in good order.

We would recommend that two nozzles be purchased, one shut-off and one straight nozzle.

We also find that the following members are entitled to exempt badges:

No. 3—George Shotten and J. J. Donohue, Charles Schelle.

Hose Co. No. 2—John Leighton, H. McCue, Sam Johnston, Sam Akers, Roy Powell, John Frazer, George Giegold.

The fire committee was instructed to place the building recently occupied by the Ferguson book and ladder company in as good a condition as when first occupied.

Ordinance No. 100, prohibiting connection with the city sewer for the drainage of roof water was adopted.

City Attorney Horton Moore gave a variation opinion with reference to the ownership of the city building, holding that the title at present was in the name of Dr. Henry. The matter was referred to the building, light and fire committee and the fire committee to investigate further.

J. W. Palmer's bid, to furnish the city with two two-horse teams and a driver for \$95.00, being the lowest, he was awarded the contract.

The Democrat Publishing Company was awarded the city printing.

The council then adjourned.
