## GEN. LUNA SURRENDERS

### Aguinaldo's Rebel Forces Are Whipped to a Finish.

#### AacArthur's Division of Volunteers Perform Prodigies of Valor.

#### Col. Funston, of Kansas, Covers His Regiment With Glory.

#### REBELS SUING FOR PEACE.

New York, April 28.—The Journal prints the following under date of Manila, to-day, no hour of filing being given: "The forces of General Luna surrendered to General Otis, commanding the American forces."

#### AGUINALDO HAS ENOUGH.

Manila, April 28.—Col. Manuel Arguilla and Lieut. Jose Bernal, who came into General MacArthur's lines under a flag of truce, told the general that they were representatives of General Luna, who had been requested by Aguinaldo to ask Otis for a cessation of hostilities to allow time for the summoning of the Philippine congress, which body would decide whether the people wanted peace. Otis replied that he did not recognize the existence of the Philippine government. There will be another conference to-morrow.

This morning the chief of staff from the commanding general of the insurgent forces entered our lines to express admiration at the wonderful feat of the American army in forcing their passage of the river, which was thought impossible. The staff officer reported that the insurgent commanding general had received from the insurgent government direction to suspend hostilities pending negotiation for the termination of the war.

#### FUNSTON A HERO.

Washington, April 28.—The following was received from General Otis: Manila, April 28.—After taking Calumpit, MacArthur's division crossed the Rio Grande in the face of great obstacles, driving the concentrated forces of the enemy back of the railroad two miles. General MacArthur reports the passage of the river a remarkable military achievement, the success of which is due to the daring skill and determination of Col. Funston, under the discriminating control of Gen. Whistler. Casualties light, number not yet ascertained.

#### SKIRMISH WITH INSURGENTS.

Manila, April 28.—The Washington regiment holding Laguni, with three companies of the Twelfth regulars, engaged a large force of insurgents in a fight in the jungle. The Americans lost two killed and ten wounded.

#### FUNSTON TO BE PROMOTED.

Washington, April 28.—It is stated at the war department that Colonel Funston would receive a brigadier general's commission as a reward for his services in the various engagements, culminating in his heroic feat yesterday. Colonel Funston and two men who crossed the river under fire of the enemy will receive medals of honor. High praise is given to all the volunteers.

#### ENEMY THIED TO STAND.

Manila, April 28.—At Calumpit yesterday for the first time a large body of Filipinos attempted to face the Americans in open ground. General Luna, mounted on a black horse, galloped frantically along the line, exhorting his followers to make a stand, but when the American bullets showed thickly among them, they bolted for their train. The Montana regiment made a rush to capture the train, but the engine backed off hastily. Fifty Americans were overcome by heat. Colonel Funston dropped utterly exhausted after the battle. The Kansas regiment cheered him crazily when he went among them.

#### SURRENDER DENIED.

New York, April 28.—A special to the Evening World from Manila says: "The Filipinos have not surrendered. There is no cessation of hostilities."

#### Business Block Burned.

Pittsburgh, April 28.—J. J. Walden's seven-story grocery and novelty candy works were destroyed by fire this morning and a number of adjoining buildings were scorched, among them Kunkin's dry goods store. The losses aggregate \$210,000. The fire is believed to have been caused by an explosion of gas.

#### Death of a Millionaire.

New York, April 28.—Robert Goetz, whose death at Naples on the yacht Nahma was announced last night, was born in this city in 1841. His estate is variously estimated at from \$25,000,000 to \$40,000,000.

#### Troops for Philippines.

San Francisco, April 28.—The United States transport steamer Senator and Ohio sailed to-day for the Philippines. The vessels bear the Thirtieth United States Infantry and several hundred recruits for service in the Philippines.

## TERRIBLE TORNADO.

### Missouri Visited by a Devastating Cyclone Last Night.

#### Forty-nine Persons Killed in the Town of Kirksville.

#### Twenty Killed by the Storm in the Town of Newlin.

#### TERRIBLE SCENES OF DEVASTATION.

Kirksville, Mo., April 28.—It is known that at least forty-nine persons were killed in the tornado last night. The identified dead are: Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, A. C. Beal, Ed. The tornado struck the town at 6:30 last evening, when most people were at supper. The entire east side was wiped clean, and over 200 buildings, homes and stores, were leveled. A heavy rain followed. The debris took fire in several places, lighting the way for the rescuers. Mayor Noonan thinks the death list may reach 100.

The cyclone approached Kirksville from the south, somewhat west, and missed the heart of the city by two or three blocks. Reports from the country districts state that many farmers suffered severely. Several lives have been lost outside of Kirksville. Henry Lowe and three children, living in the north of town, were crushed to death beneath their demolished home.

At noon it was estimated that the death list was about fifty and between 400 and 500 people are injured.

#### ANOTHER DEADLY TORNADO.

Chillicothe, Mo., April 28.—The latest reports from Newton, Sullivan county, which was visited by last night's tornado, are that twenty persons are thought to have been killed, and thirty injured, some fatally. The known dead are S. Bedford, wife and five children; L. Evans and two daughters; William Hay, wife and seven children. The entire eastern half of the town was destroyed. The path of the storm was about 500 or 600 feet wide.

#### ANOTHER TOWN TORNADO TOWN.

Trenton, Mo., April 28.—Lancaster, Schuyler county, was badly torn up by last night's storm. Many persons are reported killed and injured. Wires are down and no accurate reports have been received.

## PAYMENT TO SPAIN.

### The Twenty Millions to Be Paid to French Ambassador.

#### Mrs. George Acquitted of the Crime of Murder.

#### President McKinley Congratulates the Army on its Recent Victory.

#### INDIAN TERRITORY TOWN BURNED.

Washington, April 28.—Secretary Hay was notified this afternoon by the French ambassador that Spain would accept, through him, the \$20,000,000 to be paid under the treaty of peace for the Philippines. The payment will be made to the ambassador as soon as the president returns.

#### CONGRATULATES THE ARMY.

President McKinley Sends a Message to the Soldiers in the Philippines. Philadelphia, April 28.—President McKinley and party this morning visited the cruiser Raleigh at anchor in the Delaware river. This afternoon the president will go to New York for a few days rest. The president will visit the following message to General Law: "Your message announcing the achievements of MacArthur's division and the proposal by the insurgent of a suspension of hostilities is most gratifying. Convey to the officers and men heartfelt congratulations of gratitude for their signal gallantry and triumphs."

As the president stepped aboard the Raleigh the gunners began firing the national salute. On the lower deck the sailors lined up for inspection. With a bare head, McKinley made a brief speech, concluding: "I assure you I am only speaking the heart's welcome of 75,000,000 American citizens, who honor you all for your splendid services to our country. This feeling not only extends to your great admiral, whom we all love and honor, but to the humblest member of the crew who was in that great fleet in Manila bay." Secretary Long also addressed the sailors. The sailors gave three cheers for the president and three for the secretary of the navy, followed by the ship's yell.

SEE TO IT THAT YOUR TAX ASSESSMENT IS FILED WITH THE COUNTY ASSESSOR.

The United States treasury has nearly \$300,000,000 in gold in its vaults.

NEW MEXICO is deeply interested in the election of a western man for speaker of the house.

Naval officers should be informed that only prize fighters are allowed to talk in this country.

LAS CRUCES is being scourged with smallpox and is in need of assistance to subdue the disease.

GEN. GRANT'S fame grows with the passing years, and his birthday is celebrated all over the country.

The democrats in the vicinity of Kansas City are protesting against the expansion of the Missouri river.

LAS VEGAS has organized a national building and loan association and it will be ready for business on May 5.

Tax statements must be made by tomorrow, after which time the assessor is compelled by law to add a heavy penalty.

The United States now follows closely after Great Britain as a possessor of naval stations in various parts of the world.

SINCE January first of this year 41,000 boxes of Mexican oranges, valued at \$121,888 American gold, have been received at Kansas City.

The street trees in the Highlands are dying from lack of water. The city is paying \$5,000 a year for water, and why it is not used needs investigation.

THE GOVERNMENT has a means of suppressing trusts ready at hand when it comes to exercise it. It can tax them out of existence, as it did the state banks of issue.

THERE are about 2,750,000 cattle in Kansas. Of these about 700,000 are milch cows, a similar number are working oxen, and the remainder, about 1,300,000, are being fattened for food.

THE WOMAN'S Christian Temperance Union is holding a well attended territorial convention in this city. The good women who have this reform work in charge are much encouraged with the progress being made in New Mexico.

THE Philippine war is nearing its close. The American army has added additional lustre to the flag and carried to the orient a healthy respect for the boys in blue. The surrender of Gen. Luna is indicative of the fall of Aguinaldo.

FOUR hundred and fifty thousand cigars have been seized all the way from Pennsylvania to Texas bearing counterfeit revenue stamps, and prominent attorneys and other people in the east have been arrested in connection with their issuance.

IT is said that the proposed peanut trust is very likely to become a fact. Most of the factories are bonded conditionally, the options to hold good to May 15. The growers of North Carolina and Virginia are going into the combination very freely.

BRITISH COLOMBIA is said to possess the largest compact timber resources of the world and only the fringe of it has been cut. Russia ranks next to Canada with 498,200,000 acres of timber area, and the United States is classed as third, with 450,000,000 acres.

THE tallest woman in the United States, and probably in the world, is Miss Ella Krueger, of Fort. Meade, a little town not far east of Kansas City, on the Santa Fe road. This "high-born lady" is 26 years old, according to the family Bible, and measures 8 feet 4 inches in her every-day shoes.

THE Medical News brings out the fact that 10 per cent of the canaries and other song birds that die in captivity succumb to tuberculosis; that tuberculosis lesions are often found in dogs, cats and other domestic animals, and that cats have frequently been carriers of diphtheria and other infectious diseases.

THE net earnings of the Santa Fe road for the month of March were \$1,104,869, an increase of \$144,433 over the same month in 1938. For the nine months of the fiscal year ending March 31, the net earnings of the road had been \$9,282,948, an increase of \$556,949 over the corresponding period of the preceding fiscal year.

THE business of the world is drifting more and more into the hands of corporations. As a consequence, of those who have money to invest many are practically forced to put stock in corporations if they are to invest at all. This fact affords to schemers great opportunities in organizing and controlling corporations in their own interest, in which large numbers of outsiders are asked to invest.

REV. P. A. SIMPSON, in his address at the Temperance convention last evening, made an erroneous assertion in regard to licensing fallen women. He stated that these outcasts were licensed and that the money thus wrung from shame was used in the education of the children of the territory. Such is not the case. There is no license tax on immorality in New Mexico. In the incorporated towns fallen women are fined as vagrants, and the money collected goes into the treasury of the towns.

Benahan, who transferred it to William L. Hawthorne and Charles Newhall. The note is for \$70.75, and is dated September 2, 1938. The plaintiffs sue for the face of the note, interest at 12 per cent and cost of suit. The case will be tried at the district court in Taos county.

Since the New Mexican published the article on manzanita a number of old residents have called attention to the fact that the manzanita grows in New Mexico, especially to the north of Santa Fe, and in Taos county. Kilian Brevett, of this city, says that hundreds of acres north of Santa Fe are covered with the manzanita, and that the fruit of the berries and dried them for use as a tea. The bushes get to be eight or ten feet high and are very rank in growth.
