It is hoped that the American army in the Philippines will find no more rivers to cross till Aguinaldo is captured.

THE business failures in the United States last week was only 187. Last year it was 224. In 1907 it was 216. In 1906, 240.

COL. FULTON, of Kansas, is the hero of that state in the Philippines. He is always at the front, and has swam rivers to get at the enemy.

MELBOURNE, Australia, with a population of 500,000, owns its own lighting system, and the city made a profit out of it last year of \$750,000.

THE 252nd anniversary of the foundation of Rome was celebrated last Friday. The city was elaborately decorated in honor of the occasion.

THE Denver Republican says there are now few tramps in Colorado. Republican property has done good work for Colorado in spite of the solid opposition of that state.

THE government telegraph cableship Hooker is being loaded at New York with 250 miles of cable, to be transported to Manila. The cable is intended to connect the important islands of the Philippine group.

THE war department has decided to supply the soldiers in the tropics with underclothing of light jeans material. One hundred thousand suits will be shipped to Cuba and the Philippines as soon as possible.

ACCORDING to present plans of the war department, the Twenty-fifth infantry, colored, will be sent to the Philippines about the middle of June. Company F of this regiment is now stationed at Fort Bayard, this territory.

THE wheat crop exported in 1927 was equivalent to 55,262,952 bushels of wheat, and that in 1928 to 69,074,744 bushels. Stated in grain, the combined shipments of wheat and wheat flour would, therefore, amount to 143,124,752 bushels for the former year and to 217,306,036 bushels for the latter.

It is estimated that England's stock of coal will last 200 years longer, and North America's 600 years. It is not likely, however, that these supplies will be needed, as it is probable that before many years have passed, power and heat, more economical and better will be secured in other ways.

This territory is furnishing fertilizers to the Hawaiian Islands. The guano caves in Iona Ana county are being worked and 600 tons of the fertilizer have been shipped to Honolulu. The guano deposit in one place was found to be forty-five feet deep and sixty feet wide. Prof. Goos, of the agricultural college, pronounces them the richest deposits of guano and nitrate known.

In Australia they are utilizing the wire fences to establish telephone communication between stations six or eight miles apart. The instruments are connected to the wire strands, thus insuring a "metallic circuit" at no extra expense, for the fences are agricultural necessities and already in place. There is no difficulty, it is said, in conversing with a station fully eight miles distant through telephone connected as described. Several stations are so joined.

Tax labor department, United Kingdom of Great Britain, has just issued its fifth annual report. It shows that all the principal groups of industries shared more or less in a rise of wages. The result of all the changes recorded was a rise of about \$217,800 per week, of which the greater part is accounted for by the engineering, shipbuilding, mining and building industries. In round numbers the workers have secured \$11,300,000 increase in wages annually through trade union effort.

THE OLD FELLOWS. All over the United States yesterday the Independent Order of Old Fellows celebrated the eighty-first anniversary of its existence in this country. The work of its 800,000 members with high 4,000,000 people dependent upon them, is done without ostentation, and so quietly that the influence is scarcely noticed in the political world. Yet it is an economical and fraternal force exerting as great an influence as any other body of men organized for any purpose. Its work is altogether along the line of well doing, of assisting the sick and needy, of supporting the widow and the orphan, of teaching grand principles to its men.

ALONG THE STEEL RAILS.

Latest Items of Railroad Interest Gathered from our Exchanges.

WHAT THE EMPLOYEES ARE DOING.

Oscar M. Shirley, engine wiper at Las Vegas, has resigned and will go to southern California.

Brakemen Smith and Stucke, of Needles, have resigned and will seek employment in other climes.

Fireman Henry, who has been firing the Waldo branch engine, has reported for duty after a week's illness.

Grading on the Northeastern is completed as far as Three Rivers. Track laying will begin in a few days.

Charles Trollinger, the new storey, recently shot on the Pecos Valley & Northern, is getting along nicely.

Agent W. A. Barnwell, of the Santa Fe Pacific, of Williams, has been spending the week with his wife and family in Los Angeles.

Irvin B. Heydt, machinist's apprentice at the Las Vegas shops, has returned to work after a lay-off of five weeks, caused by an injury to the little finger of his right hand.

Brakeman A. Haslinger, of San Marcial, has quit railroading and found employment at the Rosedale mine. Soon there will be quite a colony of ex-railroaders there.

Mark Elliott, a Las Vegas machinist, accidentally split the thumb of his right hand on Saturday while handling a lot of castings. The injury is a severe one and will lay him up for some time.

George Sandusky, an employee of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe at Elston, is very sick at the Las Vegas hospital. Dr. J. J. Shuler arrived from Elston on Tuesday afternoon, and he and Dr. Smith and Armstrong will consult on this case.

The Kddy Argus says: The Pecos Valley & Northeastern will probably erect stockyards and loading pens south of town, about one-half mile below Phoenix. The cattlemen have agreed to furnish the ground and the railway company will build the yards. Titles to land are now being secured, and when they are secured, work will commence.

Abel Gold, of Santa Fe, Wednesday morning sent thirty men to La Vega pass to work on improvements of the Rio Grande railroad. The men were placed in charge of Charles L. Broder. There would have been almost forty to go but several backed out after reading that snailpox exists at La Vega. At Kapanola twenty joined the gang.

The great question that has been asked among the Galveston & Houston shippers ever since the death of O. D. Young, "Who will be master mechanic?" seems to have been answered at last. R. L. Herbert is the man appointed and he has arrived from San Antonio, master mechanic at that point—El Paso Times.

The San Bernardino Sun says: The following Santa Fe officials were in the city to hold a consultation concerning business of their various departments: I. L. Hibbard, division superintendent at Winslow, Arizona; John Denair, holding the same position at Needles; G. W. Smith, superintendent of machinery at Albuquerque; W. S. Hancock, master mechanic at Needles.

General Manager Nichols and Samuel Atkinson went down to Pecos, Tuesday, by special train to look over the ground there and arrange for the enlargement of terminal facilities for the Pecos Valley & Northeastern at that point. The rapidly increasing business on the road makes this necessary, and work on plans now being drawn will soon be commenced, says the Kddy Argus.

The Williams News says: C. E. B. Scher, of the land department of the Santa Fe Pacific, was a business visitor in Williams Thursday. One of the railroad officials that owned property in Williams when the division point was here and who, with the leaving of that important branch of business, because they thought that Williams was a "goner," now wish they had kept a parcel of the soil.

The Silver City Independent says: The Santa Fe bridge gang is putting in a new bridge across the arroyo immediately north of the city. The new structure will be of steel with stone and cement foundations and abutments and will be altogether substantial. The present bridge will be taken down upon the completion of the new one and put up on the Silver City & Northern branch.

The Optic says: "Engineer Ed. Keen, who was in a railroad accident several years ago and inhaled steam, is fatally ill at his home on south hilly avenue, and his friends will be sorry to learn, is not expected to live. He has been unable to work for several weeks past, his strength seeming to gradually leave him and growing weaker day by day. It is thought that his condition is the result of the accident mentioned."

Fireman Lee Wright, of Las Vegas, was disappointed Monday in not taking out the California "flyer." The worst of it was that his disappointment was caused by a painful accident that will incapacitate him from duty for several weeks. While engaged in dampening down the coal on the tender before leaving the yards, the hot water scalded his right hand and arm nearly to the elbow. Loss in consequence is now carrying his arm in a sling.

In the case of the Al Cattle company against the Santa Fe Pacific railroad company for damages, for encroachment on the company's land, taken from what is known as the Cider Pit, between Williams and Bellemont, and refused payment for the same, the attorneys for

the cattle company, Messrs. Clark and Doe, secured judgment in the district court against the railroad company for the sum of \$7,000. The contest is a good natured one in all respects. The railroad company refused to pay the amount unless compelled to, and the cattle company did not want the money unless the railroad company had it to pay.—Williams News.

Cyrus Hamd, brakeman on the Yeta train, was pinched last Wednesday morning while coupling the engine to the train on the first car caught his chest between the end of the tie and the engine tender, squeezing him severely but breaking no bones. He was quickly taken home and Dr. Orr summoned. His injuries are probably not dangerous.

Fireman Burk was taken sick at Albuquerque on Sunday with severe cramps of the stomach and has returned to his home in Las Vegas pending his recovery.—Optic.
