INSURGENT CAPITAL HAS FALLEN.

City of Malolos Burned by the
Philippine Rebels.

AQUINALDO AND FOLLOWERS IN THE JUNGLES.

Washington, March 31.—At 1:30 this morning Adjutant-General Corbin received official confirmation of the capture of Malolos by General Otis. The battle of Malolos is believed to have broken the backbone of the revolution and that many of the rebels not captured will lay down their arms. General Corbin does not believe that Aguinaldo and followers who escaped will engage in guerrilla warfare. Other officers say that Aguinaldo will fight to the bitter end, which means extermination. Officials and army officers here say that the war will be pursued until the authority of this government is recognized by the humblest rebel in the archipelago.

OLD GLORY FLOATS.
Manila, March 31.—The American flag was raised over Malolos at 10 o'clock this morning. The Kansas regiment and Montana regiment on entering the city found it deserted. The president of the city and the rebels retreating towards mountains in a state of terror. It is believed that they cannot in future make even faint resistance. The American loss is small.

AMERICAN LOSS.
Washington, March 31.—The following was received this morning:
"Manila, March 31.—Troops resting at Malolos. Considerable portion of city destroyed by fire. Our casualties are one killed and fifteen wounded. Mail has returned with the troops to former position north of Manila. OTIS."

ANOTHER BATTLE.
Manila, March 31.—Gen. Hall's brigade advanced today from Marikina up the Malos river valley, almost to the Alban, driving the enemy to the hills north. The rebels were in considerable force at the junction of the rivers Naga and Angat with the Malos. The American artillery soon scattered them with heavy loss. The American loss was one killed, fourth infantry. General Hall eventually returned to the water works. King advanced from San Pedro Macati, establishing headquarters on the Pasig. It is understood that Macatol, governor of the five northern provinces, is unfriendly to Aguinaldo. If this be true, Aguinaldo's retreat is undoubtedly cut off at the railroad beyond San Fernando.

The Republica Filipina on March 25 published an extra edition containing the statement that when the Americans attacked Pasig many were killed and the majority of the remainder fled. The 180 taken prisoners. A second paragraph asserted that the Americans ravaged 300 of the Philippine's fairest daughters and killed upon the natives to "defeat their honor with their lives."

CAPTURE OF MALOLOS.
It is evident that the rebels for some time past have abandoned all hope of holding their capital, for Americans and there evidence of elaborate preparations of evacuation. On the rail road rails and ties about a mile had been torn up, probably thrown into the river. The only prisoners captured were a few Chinamen. They said Aguinaldo left Malolos on Wednesday. The principal citizens of Malolos with their families and goods were taken into the country over the railroad while others departed on foot, driving their cattle before them. Most of the rebel forces removed yesterday evening to positions east of the railroad leaving only some small bands in strong trenches in front of Malolos.

ADVANCE ON THE CITY.
General MacArthur started for the rebel capital at 7 o'clock this morning with two rapid fire guns, backing the track; two guns of the Utah battery on the right and two guns of the Sixth artillery on the right, firing continuously. Several American Sailors Killed
and Wounded by Natives.

Steamer Stella Sunk at Sea and
Many Passengers Drowned.

ADULTERER ROBBED.
Burglars break a window and steal Revolver from Shop.
When the employees at the Donahoe Hardware company came down to the store this morning, they found that one of the front plate glass windows had been broken during the night. On the sidewalk in front of the window lay the store, a fairly large revolver, which had been the instrument used in doing the damage. Investigation inside revealed that three revolvers, one a 38 Smith & Wesson and two Colt revolvers, 38 and 44 calibre respectively, were lying in the window. The revolver was broken by the robber for some reason known only to himself.

SHIP SUNK.
Ship Stella Sinks and Sixty Persons Are Drowned.
Southampton, March 31.—The passenger steamer Stella, plying between this port and the Channel Islands, crashed upon the dreaded Gaquet rocks, near Asterley, yesterday, in a dense fog, and foundered in ten minutes. Her boiler exploded and she went down. The coasting steamer Lynx, which brought the news of the disaster, picked up four boats and forty persons belonging to the Stella. The captain of the Lynx, Mr. W. F. Blodgett, advised news to show that sixty persons were drowned. Another steamer picked up a boat containing fifty-five persons, including twenty women. The Stella had 210 passengers. It is estimated that nearly 150 persons were drowned by the sinking of the Stella.

DARING NIGHT ROBBERY.
San Francisco, March 31.—A daring robbery was committed yesterday in front of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express office, containing \$25,000 in gold coin being stolen from the rear of the express wagon of Joseph N. H. Waters, while he was engaged in conversation with a bystander. Waters was carrying the coin from the Anglo-California bank to the express office for shipment to a Chinese camp in California.

GERMANS IN CHINA.
They Meet With Resistance from the Chinese Soldiers.
Peking, March 31.—Disturbances in the province of Shan Tung, during the whole of the winter, have been causing serious anxiety, and culminated in the imprisonment of a German priest at the town of Tsinan. A German naval patrol consisting of an officer and six men, landed at Tsinan, and advanced a short distance into the matter, but the members of the patrol were met by a detachment of Chinese soldiers who fired upon the Germans. They returned the fire, killing several Chinese, but were obliged to retire. The German admiral is sending a stronger force to restore order.

German Troops in China.
Peking, March 31.—In consequence of the recent attack of the natives upon the German patrol, a small German force landed at Tsinan, a coast town a short distance from Kiao-Chow.

UNCLE SAM is mixing with 'em any-where fighting is on the program. Just now he is engaged in two foreign wars.

Plans for tree planting must not be lost sight of for a moment until thousands of young trees have been set out.

CONVENTION to-night at the Armory, where the republican delegates will nominate the next city officers of Albuquerque.

THE American army yesterday afternoon captured Malolos, the insurgent capital, and the Philippine rebellion is on its last legs.

MATHIAS B. STOCKTON is the republican candidate for mayor of Baton, with Sidney W. Clark for treasurer and David G. Dwyer for clerk.

THE democrats completed their ticket last night nominating O. N. Marron for mayor, C. W. Medler for clerk and Robert Putney for city treasurer.

REMEMBER the great importance of voting next Tuesday. Vote the republican ticket and discharge the duty you owe yourself, your neighbor and your city.

THE amount of gold coin and bullion in the United States treasury at the commencement of business on March 23rd was \$242,142,410, an increase of \$97,717.

AMERICAN officials have counted the Cuban army and found that it consists of 13,219 men, exclusive of commissioned officers, instead of the 42,000 as claimed by some of its commanders.

THE republicans will hold their city convention at the Armory hall this evening, and nominate the candidates that will be elected next Tuesday. Let all the ward delegates attend.

THE repeal of the Arizona military code has, according to the Nogales Oasis, left on hand among the late officers a choice lot of second-hand uniforms, which are now on the bargain counter.

THE republican party has ever been the friend of the working man so it is natural that the wage earners of this city are throwing all their efforts to the election of the republican ticket this spring.

"COIN" HARVEY, the free silver advocate, has retired from the business management of the national democratic committee. He could not get along with Senator Jones, who is almost as cranky as Harvey on most questions.

THE Russian thistle, about which we heard so much a few years ago, and which congress was asked to appropriate \$1,000,000 to exterminate, is now reported to make excellent food for cattle, and to bid fair to become a valuable forage plant in some regions where such a plant was badly needed.

THE trans-Siberian railway is now completed and in operation to Irkutsk, 3,800 miles from St. Petersburg. When completed to Port Arthur it will be 5,620 miles long, and to Vladivostok 5,400 miles long. Seven hundred miles of it has already been constructed on the eastern end, and work is being rapidly pushed.

THE United States Postal Bulletin, under date of March 22, contains an item to the effect that in the future mail matter sent from this country to sailors or soldiers in the service of the government will be carried for domestic postage rates. This includes mail to any of the government's new island possessions.

CLEARANCES through the banks of seventy cities last week aggregated \$1,884,504,791, being approximately equal to the reports of the other weeks in March, and nearly an average of the three months of the current year. Compared with other years the record stands alone, for the week is 73.4 per cent better than even the corresponding week in 1928, which was better than that of any previous year excepting 1922.

GROWING IN WEALTH
The growth of the national wealth during the present decade, it is expected, will break the record. It is estimated by careful statisticians that if the rate of increase of production during the past two years is maintained the total accumulated wealth in 1930 will not be

far from \$110,000,000,000, or more than double the wealth of Great Britain. In 1900 the wealth of the United States was estimated at \$20,000,000,000. A more than five-fold increase in forty years is a record of wealth producing unmatched in ancient or modern times.

THE Santa Fe road will issue on April 1 mileage books covering 1,000 miles, good on all lines in the Santa Fe system, including the Santa Fe Pacific and the Santa Fe and Santa Fe routes. The mileage for these mileage books will be \$75, and accepted miles for mile on all of these lines, except that in Colorado six coupons will be taken up for five miles traveled, and on the Santa Fe, Prescott & Phoenix two will be taken up for each mile traveled.

THE submarine telegraph lines number 1,600, with an aggregate length of 170,000 miles. Their total cost is estimated at \$250,000,000, and the number of messages transmitted annually at 4,000,000. The total length of telegraph lines in the world is 355,000 miles, and the length of their single wires is 3,500,000 miles. The total number of messages sent annually is 365,000,000, or an average of about 1,000,000, each day.

THE Gila forest reserve includes 101 townships, or 6,536 square miles, and 2,827,040 acres. As no mention is made in the proclamation, which was published in THE CITIZEN yesterday, as to the mining, it is held that mining operations will not be interfered with, only the tract will not be open for entry or settlement or the cutting of timber.

A DISPATCH from Washington states that the bids submitted for the construction of an electric plant at the government Indian school at Santa Fe have been opened. The Mountain Electric company, of Denver, was the lowest bidder, at \$5,350, and will get the contract.

THREE years ago bicycle manufacturers were demonstrating in good scientific language that first-class wheels could never be sold for much less than \$100 apiece. They are now to be had for \$50, and the manufacturers are not going into insolvency either.

LATEST gold output estimates for 1930 indicate \$5,000,000 for Australia on account of great gains in West Australia, \$20,000,000 from the Yukon valley, against \$12,000,000 last year, and gains in all the gold fields of North America and in Russia.

DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION
The democrats of the city met in convention at the Armory hall last night with the delegates and quite a number of republican spectators present. H. C. O'Neil, the secretary of the city committee, called the convention to order. On motion of Summers Burkhardt, A. B. McMillen was elected temporary chairman. A motion was made to have a committee appointed to escort him to the chair, but Mr. McMillen remarked that he was "able to walk up to it that was the proper thing to do." Sam Neustadt was elected temporary secretary.

Credentialed, W. B. McLaughlin, William Kike, P. J. Murphy and George Brown. Permanent organization, Harry Weller, George Hopping, Martin Tierney and K. L. Medler. Resolutions, Mike Mandell, John Beaver, Ed. Medler and J. S. Trimble. A recess of ten minutes was taken to give the committees time to prepare their reports.

When the convention was again called to order, the committee on credentials made a report on the delegates entitled to seats, which was adopted.

The committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent and the report was adopted.

The committee on resolutions handed its report to Secretary Neustadt, who read the following resolutions: We, the democrats of the city of Albuquerque, in convention assembled, do hereby declare our allegiance to the principles of faith as declared in the platform of 1928, the territorial platform as adopted at last year's democratic convention, and the platform as adopted by the democratic county convention of the county of last year.

Second—We respectfully call attention to the fact that every pledge made in the platform of the city democracy last year was faithfully carried out by the democratic majority in the city council this year, and that the record made by the present democratic board of aldermen stands unequalled for honesty and integrity in the history of the city.

Third—We hereby reaffirm the platform as adopted at the last city convention, and pledge our allegiance to a faithful, honest and economical administration of city affairs.

Now Mr. Neustadt is one of the most modest and unassuming of men, and when he reached the fulsome enlogies, which were bestowed upon the democratic members of the council in the resolutions, crimson blushes flitted across his handsome face. The report was adopted.

Chairman McMillen announced that the next thing in order was the nomination of candidates for mayor. Summers Burkhardt was recognized and placed his challenge in the council, O. N. Marron, in nomination. He moved that the rules be suspended and Mr. Marron be nominated by acclamation, which prevailed.

Contrary to the established etiquette of democratic conventions, which requires the nominees to be absorbed in a sense of seven-up for liquid refreshments at some nearby friendly saloon, where he can be cheered by a committee of friends, Mr. Marron was an interested observer of the proceedings in the hall, so that when the delegates called for "Marron—second!" that gentleman stepped forward and accepted the nomination. He expressed himself as pleased at the prospect of learning "who I am" from the two republican papers, and promised to do everything in his power for the welfare of the city if elected.

The chairman announced nominations for city clerk next in order. Horton Moore was recognized and delivered a highly eulogistic speech, in which the golden sunlight, the silver moonlight, the mountain breezes and New Mexico's climate in general, as well as C. W. Medler, received their meed of praise.

The nominations for treasurer being in order, K. L. Medler arose and nominated R. E. Putney. The nomination was made by acclamation and in response to an enthusiastic call for a speech, the nominee in a few words accepted the honor conferred upon him.

First ward: Emil Mann, alderman; Horton Moore, school trustee. Second ward: A. J. Lamb, alderman; E. L. Wilson, school trustee. Third ward: Emil Mann, alderman; Carl Hunning, school trustee. Fourth ward: Frank McKee, alderman; Ed. Dool, school trustee.

The following city committee was appointed: First ward, H. C. O'Neil and Mike Mandell; second ward, John Beaver and William Kike; third ward, Martin Tierney and Sam Neustadt; fourth ward, John S. Trimble and P. F. McManis.

The convention then adjourned.
