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## MORE VICTORIES OVER INSURGENTS.

### Brilliant Actions of American Troops Near Manila.

#### COUNTRY A SCENE OF DESOLATION.

Manila, March 29.—Information reaches here that indicates that the insurgent capital has been moved from Malolos to San Fernando. The American army has crossed the bridges for supplies to come up. The insurgents burned the bridges. When General MacArthur's forces encamped last night, the third artillery was across the bridge at Malolos. The Nebraska regiment was in the woods on the extreme right. Other troops had not gone across the river.

At 5:30 o'clock the insurgents appeared at the edge of the woods, a mile long and advanced quickly, swinging to the left to drive the third artillery away from the bridge. This was the first time in the present war that the insurgents advanced in military order against our forces. The Kansas volunteers promptly crossed the bridge in column of fours to support the third artillery. They lost two men killed and some wounded. At the same time the first Montana regiment crossed the river on a pontoon bridge and took position on the extreme left, so as to be able to cut in back of the insurgents if the latter came far enough. They lost six men wounded in this movement. The third artillery had two sergeants and one man killed and two wounded.

Struck by the woods, the Nebraska regiment, (volunteers) were not seen by the enemy. They suddenly opened fire on the insurgents' line, and left their trenches with a great shout. At the sight of them the whole insurgent force fled pell mell. The Nebraska men chased them a mile and a half, but finally drawn back by General MacArthur to preserve the line intact.

Manila, March 29.—The American army advanced this morning, sweeping over three miles before 10 o'clock, driving the rebels beyond the line of the Bataan and on the railroad leading to Malolos. Our troops met slight resistance. The Philippine first division yesterday evening for the purpose of drawing the American fire and disclosing the locality of our positions. Two men of the Philippine division were wounded. The Americans remained silent.

The country between Manila and Malolos presents a picture of desolation. Smoke is curling from a hundred fires. The roads are strewn with furniture and clothing, dropped in the flight by the Filipinos. The only persons remaining behind are a few aged persons too infirm to escape. They can be seen from the ruins of their former homes and beg the passers by for assistance. Many are living on the generosity of the soldiers who give them portions as indicating the beginning of the execution of methods for reducing the road's percentage of operating expenses to a reasonable figure. The proportion of operating expenses last month was 68.10 per cent against 75.6 in February of last year. The proposition for the eight months of the fiscal year is still high, however, standing 73 per cent against 71.05 in the same period last year.

An Alleged Thief Called on Broker Simpson With a Gold Coin.

This morning, at 10:30 o'clock, a heavy, stout, vicious-looking individual, with a discolored eye, called on Broker R. Simpson, and in pulling out of his pocket a \$20 gold piece, asked a loan of \$100 on it. Mr. Simpson took possession of the coin, and feeling certain that his customer had come in possession of it through dishonest means, informed the fellow that he would have to first ascertain whether the coin was genuine before making the loan. Mr. Simpson, keeping the coin in his possession, went to the First National bank, where he and Vice President Flournoy concluded that the coin was the same one stolen last year from the residence of John A. Lee. A telephone message was then sent out for an officer, while Mr. Simpson hunted for Mr. Lee. The latter fully identified the coin as belonging to him, and the two gentlemen started together for Mr. Simpson's office where the alleged thief was still seated, waiting for his money. They found that the man had taken "dog bait," and several parties in the neighborhood of Mr. Simpson's office can recollect of a flying man cutting the air almost in two by his rapid strides.

###### RESISTED THE CONSTABLE.

###### August Richter Pulled a Gun on Captain Tyler Last Night.

###### Pitt Ross yesterday afternoon got out an attachment in Justice Riddle's court against the emigrants' wagon of August Richter for an unpaid bill of \$7.50.

###### He learned yesterday that Richter was preparing to leave the country, and he got out attachment papers, which were served on him.

###### He called at Richter's place, south of the shops, at about 8 o'clock last night and asked that gentlemen to pay the bill.

###### When he refused to do so, the officer notified him that he would have to levy on his wagon and started to do so. Richter immediately assumed a belligerent attitude, pulled a revolver from his pocket and pointed it at the constable.

###### He would kill him if he attempted to take away his property. The officer warned him against making a gun play and Richter then handed his revolver to his wife. Capt. Tyler took advantage of this temporary truce and again started for the wagon. Richter then threatened to get another gun and do some more shooting, when Tyler beat a hasty retreat.

###### He went home and armed himself to accompany him on his second visit. When they reached the premises they found that Richter had left and so they took peaceful possession of the wagon.

###### Richter was arrested to day on complaint of Constable Tyler, who charged him with making a gun play and resisting an officer.

###### Richter was brought before Justice Riddle this morning to answer to the charge made against him by Constable Tyler. He informed the court that he desired to have an attorney to represent him. While his brother-in-law was out making arrangements to secure the services of a lawyer, Richter was taken with an epileptic fit in the court room and for a time it was feared that he would die. Dr. Bishop was called in and Richter was finally brought back to his normal condition.
