MORE VICTORIES NEAR MANILA.

Severe Fighting Every Day With the
Insurgents.

IDAHO REGIMENT MAKES GALLANT CHARGE.

Manila, March 28.—The gunboat Lagoon has been attacked by the insurgents at Bulacan. Three Americans were wounded. MacArthur's division crossed the Marikina river and is advancing northward. The insurgents attacked the Americans last evening at Marikina, but were repulsed with severe loss. Our loss was killed, fourteen wounded. Later, Garcia, a native general, came from Baguio by train with a thousand riflemen and 4,000 Balabans and took position at Marikina. The river was between the Americans and the insurgents. The South Dakota volunteers and Third artillery, acting as infantry, were thrown forward. The South Dakotas charged brilliantly across the open space on the east of the railway to the edge of the woods. They lost ten killed and eleven wounded, including three lieutenants. The Third artillery, on the right of the railroad, charged and lost nine wounded, two mortally. On the left, the insurgents, in a trench east of the river, made a stubborn resistance. Lieutenant Ritchie, with two guns of the Utah battery, and Lieutenant Davis, with a navy Colt gun, forced thirty insurgents in a trench on the opposite side of the river to surrender at the close of the day's fighting. The rest of the insurgents got out with severe loss. Ninety dead insurgents were counted.

SEVERE FIGHTING.
Washington, March 28.—The following was received from Gen. Otis:
Manila, March 28.—Severe fighting yesterday afternoon beyond Marikina, and a brilliant charge by the South Dakota regiment, led by Gen. MacArthur, defeated the troops that Aguinaldo brought from Malabon. Repulsed the enemy with considerable loss. Adjutant General Adams and Major and four enlisted men of the regiment were killed. Lieut. McClelland and twenty-two enlisted men were wounded. The loss yesterday was mostly confined to this regiment. Partial destruction of the railroad, which is being rapidly repaired, impedes MacArthur's progress. Supplies taken have now reached Marikina and MacArthur is pushing on. Our small gunboats are in the Bulacan river, where great excitement was done yesterday. They will have the pleasure of MacArthur's front material. The troops are in excellent condition and spirits. A proclamation signed by Luna, general-in-chief of the insurgent forces, directs that all towns abandoned by the enemy be burned. In consequence thereof much of the country north is in flames.

CAPTURED MARILLO.
New York, March 28.—A dispatch from Manila to the Journal to-day reports that General MacArthur's division, after a short rest, captured the city of Marikina, took up the advance toward Malabon, and this morning. The immediate objective point was the town of Bulacan, five miles north of Marikina. The Filipino prisoners taken yesterday, according to the Journal, dispirited the Americans that Aguinaldo would make his last stand south of Malabon, and if defeated would make no further resistance.

MANITUP ADVANCES.
Manila, March 28.—General MacArthur's division advanced nearly two miles without encountering opposition this morning. On approaching Bulacan, a town of 25,000 people, he halted, preparing to attack it.

NOT TIME AT MANILA.
Manila, March 28.—The heat being so great on the coast and inland, the army has been ordered to move to the interior, it being the duty of the army to suffer a great deal. In spite of the heat, however, every man was eager to proceed towards the enemy. The detachment of ninety-six Filipino prisoners was escorted into Manila to-day. Their appearance aroused great interest as they were marched from the railroad depot to the city. The rebels unloaded about 600 mules from a train half a mile in front of General MacArthur's forces with the object of reinforcing the Filipino part of the army. The Filipino garrison on either side of the railroad leading to Malabon. The fact that the railroad is in operation from here to our front indicates the transportation of supplies to the troops. Before the break in the road was repaired the transportation of supplies was very uncertain. All is quiet in the front lines of General Overton and Hale. The battalion of the California regiment, which has been landed at the island of Negros, was received with every manifestation of joy on the part of the natives.

NEW MEXICO ROUGH RIDERS.

Gov. Roosevelt's article in the April
number of Scribner's on the Rough
Riders possesses unusual interest for its
readers in this territory, for the reason
that there are numerous references to
the heroes of New Mexico's troops.

In referring to the controversy as to
which troops were first on the summit of
San Juan hill, Gov. Roosevelt says:
"The first garrison planted there were those of
the three New Mexican troops, G. K. and
P. of my regiment, under their captains,
Llewellyn, Miller and Luna, but on the
extreme right, near the hill, at the opposite
end from where we struck, Capt. Taylor
and McMillan and their men of the Ninth
were first up. Each of the five captains
was firm in the belief that his troops
were first up. As for the individual men,
of whom I have thought he was first
in the summit, their names are legion."
Special mention is made in the article
of Capt. Llewellyn, Lieut. Coleman,
Keyes and Dunn.

A SAD DEATH.
The Caving-in of a Well Causes the Death
of J. W. McCain.

J. W. McCain was killed last Saturday
evening at 6 o'clock while cleaning a
well in the Sierra Nevada mountains,
about 125 miles southeast of this city.
The deceased was 26 years of age, and
was a brother-in-law of J. A. Stinson,
of this city. He was widely known and
had many acquaintances while in Al-
buquerque.

He was caved in on Mr. McCain at 6
o'clock in the evening and several men
went to work in the hope of rescuing the
unfortunate man alive. After working
eighteen hours the body was recovered
and from all indications death must have
been instantaneous. On Sunday after-
noon at 2:30 o'clock Mr. Stinson started
with the remains for this city, driving
all day and night through a very heavy
snow storm, and did not reach here until
1 o'clock this afternoon. The body was
taken to the Monfort undertaking rooms,
where it was prepared for burial.

Mr. McCain has been a member of Mr.
Stinson's family for the past six years,
and being so well and favorably known
in the community in which he has
lived, his death comes as a serious shock
to his relatives and friends.

He was born and reared in Fort Worth,
Texas, and since coming to this territory
he has held the foremanship of Mr.
Stinson's sheep ranches.

The funeral will be held on Wednes-
day afternoon at 2 o'clock at the High-
land Methodist church.
