## EMBALMED BEEF.

### Testimony Regarding Rotten Beef Furnished the Army.

### Experiment With Chemicals Made by the Quartermaster.

### A Fatal Railroad Accident Near Akron, Ohio.

### ARAB RAID IN AFRICA.

Chicago, March 22.—The court of inquiry investigating the army beef examined to-day Lieut. J. D. L. Hartman, of the First Cavalry, the acting quartermaster while the regiment was stationed at Lakeland, Fla. He testified that the refrigerator boat from Armore & Co., was brought to Lakeland in cars. At first it was very good but in a few days it began to get poorer in quality. In two instances the board of survey rejected the beef. The witness rejected one whole carload. The beef was obnoxious, therefore the car was condemned. Decomposition had set in. He had no reason to suspect the beef prepared with preservatives or chemicals.

David A. Fleischman testified that he was employed as bell boy at the Hotel Morrison, in Chicago, during June, 1898. "One day," he said, "a guest asked me to go to the stockyards with him. I went and had to carry two boxes. We went to a car where there were three or four rows of meat in each box and there were four smaller packages containing a gray-colored substance. He put this into perforated trays, set fire to it and placed it under the meat. I asked him what that was and he said it was done as an experiment to preserve the meat. The next day I went back to get the cans. I put my tongue on the meat and tasted it. It burned my tongue. The car was at Armore's packing house. I asked the man who he was and he told me he was the quartermaster, or quartermaster general or something like that. He wore no uniform."

Dr. E. K. Murdoch, the analytical chemist, testified that he examined samples of both canned and refrigerated beef and found the canned beef of very low grade, containing very little nutriment. He found some refrigerated beef coated with salicylate and boric acid, which was detrimental to digestion. Some samples purporting to be beef were horse meat.

Refused Italian Demand.  
Rome, March 22.—It is understood that the Chinese minister has informed the Italian government that China has absolutely refused the demand of the Italian government for the concession of San Man bay.

### JUMPED THE TRACK.

Engineer on Erie Limited Killed—Engine and Cars Demolished.

Akron, Ohio, March 22.—The Erie limited, running sixty miles an hour, jumped the track. Engineer Logan was killed and fireman Ward dangerously injured. Five coaches, including two sleepers, were thrown into a ditch and the engine and three cars demolished. The following passengers were injured: Frank C. Wilson, Cincinnati, leg broken and badly bruised; H. Little, internally injured.

Disorder in Havana.  
Washington, March 22.—The war department has no information concerning disturbances in Havana. The troubles are regarded simply as disorders that might occur anywhere.

Ship Saved.  
Racine, Wis., March 22.—The Goodrich steamer Atlanta, which went ashore yesterday, was released this morning.

Arab Raid.  
Algiers, March 22.—The telegraph Algiers announced that a number of Arabs arrived at Ghardaia yesterday and were raiding the country. Ghardaia is about three hundred miles south of Algiers. It is further announced that a party of Touaregs recently attacked a European expedition on its way to the Sahara.

## ARMY IS ACTIVE.

### The American Forces at Manila Ready for the Insurgents.

### Victims of the Big Fire at Omaha, Nebraska.

### American Commission in the Philippines Issues an Address.

### PRESIDENTIAL PARTY IN GEORGIA.

Manila, March 22.—While apparently inactive since Sunday, the really operative has been the case with the American forces. Reorganization entailing many changes has been in progress since the abandonment of the flying column. General Wheaton and Hale's brigades have not been assigned, but the O'Connell regiment has been concentrated at a camp on the Luneta at the water front, in readiness for immediate transportation when the plans of the military leaders have been formulated. Our troops are entrenched and the situation is practically unchanged. The enemy have refrained from making any attacks recently. It would appear that the rebels are saving ammunition for a decisive movement.

According to a prisoner captured by our troops, Aguinaldo has announced that he personally would conduct the rebels in Malolos and march into Manila within twenty days and the Americans withdrew in the meantime. The concentration of the rebel forces in the vicinity of Malolos gives color to the statement of the prisoner.

The United States transport Sherman, from New York, has arrived here. One child, two sailors and two privates died on the voyage. One man was drowned in the Mediterranean.

OMAHA FIRE.  
Most of the injured in the disaster will recover.  
Omaha, Neb., March 22.—Most of the injured in yesterday's fire in the Patterson block are progressing favorably. Mrs. Charles T. Williams, injured internally by jumping from a window, is still unconscious. No hopes are entertained of her recovery. Mrs. Sullivan is the only other one whose condition is considered dangerous. The coroner will hold an inquest to-morrow on the remains of the victims, Mrs. Thomas Taylor and Mrs. Anna Shammel. The building was a fire trap, and an effort will be made to locate the responsibility for allowing it to be constructed in such a manner. There is also a suspicion that the fire was of incendiary origin. Two men were seen to hurriedly emerge from the basement near the foot of the elevator shaft a few moments before the fire.

The President in Georgia.  
Washington, March 22.—Mr. Porter, secretary to the president, received a message from Brunswick, Ga., stating that the presidential party this afternoon will go to Thomsville. Whether the party will go to Tallahassee, Fla., is not yet decided, but it is expected the start for Washington will be made early next week.

The company is operating a ten-stamp mill with a twenty-ton cyanide plant in connection.

Manila, March 22.—Reports of fighting on the island of Negros without any particulars have reached Manila. The transport Indiana is leaving for Negros with one battalion of the First California regiment under Colonel Dulles.

NATIVE THREE REVOLTS.  
Hilo, March 22.—A score of sixty Spanish refugee parties have arrived at Hilo, who state that a native tribe 20,000 strong, living in the Montecito river, twenty miles south of Hilo, threaten to destroy the haciendas and crops. They have few firearms but are mostly equipped with spears and bows. The Spaniards have requested arms from General Miller.

Sherman is Not Dead.  
Washington, March 22.—The latest news regarding John Sherman is that he received yesterday afternoon that he was dead was proved unfounded. At 8:30 last night by Associated Press a dispatch was received from Santiago saying that the steamer Paris arrived there last evening and that Sherman was better. He will be transferred to Santiago to the United States cruiser Chicago.

Sherman Improving.  
Washington, March 22.—Mrs. McKim, the daughter of John Sherman, received a telegram to-day from Mr. Wiberg, who is accompanying the former secretary of state on a tour of the West Indies, announcing Sherman's continued improvement.

How the Revolt Originated.  
Santiago, Cuba, March 22.—Signal officers at Guantanamo received the alleged news of Sherman's death from the French cable company and supporting it correct sent official confirmation. A bulletin issued by Sherman's physician said the patient was regaining strength.

Boiler Explosion.  
Seattle, Wash., March 22.—Five pedestrians were seriously injured by the explosion of a boiler under a sidewalk last night. D. W. Jacobs, of Chicago, and Alfred Sallie, of New York, commercial travelers, received injuries.

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**SALARIES OF COUNTY OFFICERS.**

**New Law Regulating and Fixing Compensation of Officers.**

The new law regarding the salaries of probate judges, assessors, school superintendents and county commissioners, enacted by the thirty-third legislative assembly and approved by Governor Otero on March 1, reads as follows:

Section 1.—That section 1 of chapter 40 of the session acts of 1907, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: The probate judges of the several counties of this territory shall receive the following compensation: In counties of the first class, \$400 per annum; in counties of the second class, \$300 per annum; in counties of the third class, \$200 per annum; in counties of the fourth class, \$100 per annum.

Sec. 2.—That section 8 of chapter 13, session laws of 1907, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: The county assessors of the several counties of this territory shall be allowed for their services a fee of one percent upon all moneys collected, upon assessments made by them, and no more under any circumstances whatever to be paid out of moneys collected on their assessments.

Sec. 3.—That section 10 of chapter 13, session laws of 1907, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: The county commissioners of the several counties of this territory shall receive the following compensation: In counties of the first class, \$400 per annum; in counties of the second class, \$300 per annum; in counties of the third class, \$200 per annum; in counties of the fourth class, \$100 per annum.

Sec. 4.—That section 11 of chapter 13, session laws of 1907, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: The county school superintendents of the several counties of this territory shall receive the following compensation: In counties of the first class, \$400 per annum; in counties of the second class, \$300 per annum; in counties of the third class, \$200 per annum; in counties of the fourth class, \$100 per annum.

**DEATH OF ROMAN A. BACA.**

The Veteran Soldier and Legislator Expired at Santa Fe Tuesday.

Hon. Roman Antonio Baca, lately a member of the legislature from Valencia county, died Tuesday morning at the residence in this city of his son, Roman Antonio Baca, the present mayor of Santa Fe, from diabetes, says the New Mexican.

Mr. Baca was born in Colorado 60 years ago. He was a son of one of the most distinguished families of New Mexico, and his ancestors on both his father's and mother's side were prominent among the early conquerors of this country. His father was Don Jose Antonio Baca, and his mother was Dona Maria de la Luz Garcia de Nariaga.

In early life he came to live in Santa Fe with his half brother, the late Colonel Manuel Chavez, and here he was educated by a private tutor, an old officer of the Mexican army. Forty-seven years ago he was married to Doña Ramona Labrador, and he leaves one son, Hon. Roman Antonio Baca, and two daughters, Amalia, married to Dr. Isidoro Davila Valdez, of Saltillo, Mex., and Luz, who is single. Rosita, the oldest daughter, died when she was only a few months old.

Mr. Baca was one of the bravest men New Mexico has produced. His life was a most romantic one and full of adventures. From his early youth he distinguished himself as an Indian fighter, taking part in campaigns against the savages from the time he was a mere boy. In 1855 Mr. Baca was a captain of volunteers in the war against the Utes, and was accompanied in this campaign by the then lieutenant and since Major General A. M. Cook. He served with distinction as captain of volunteers in the Second regiment of New Mexico volunteers, and at the end of the war went to San Mateo, his late home, accompanied by 100 infantry companies. After many hard fought battles Captain Baca drove off the numerous Navajos he found there, and established one of the most progressive settlements in New Mexico. Mr. Baca has served as a member of the legislature many times. In 1870 he was speaker of the house of representatives, and has held many positions of honor and trust in his country, such as probate judge, county commissioner, etc., in all of which he acquitted himself with honor. Mr. Baca was a life-long republican, and in the part of the county where he lived he was looked up to and respected by all as a father.

The remains will be taken Wednesday morning to the cathedral, and then be sent home for burial in his private chapel at San Mateo. Mrs. Baca and children will accompany the remains.

The military history of the deceased, according to the record of Carleton post, shows that he joined the post October 4, 1867. Prior to the war of the rebellion he was engaged in several campaigns against the Navajos and other Indian tribes. He was commissioned as captain in the Second New Mexico volunteers July 27, 1861, and was mustered out May 31, 1862, on account of the consolidation of several New Mexico regiments.
