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COCHITI MINING NEWS.

Information Regarding Operations in the Cochiti Canon.

From El Paso Herald.

Preparations are being made for extensive work all over the district this spring, and every claim showing mineral will be opened up and its value ascertained.

John Evans is steadily pushing development work on his claims in Cochiti canon. He has some very fine ore in sight and expects to open up a fine group of claims as early as the district.

Another clean up was made at the Blum mill, and the bullion taken out was the largest amount so far produced by this mill at any one cleanup. This shows that the ore now being mined in the Lone Star is the richest ever taken from that side.

T. B. Ward, with a small force of men, is opening up three fine looking properties on Gold Hill. Several Santa Fe parties are interested with Mr. Ward in these claims and it is the intention of Mr. Ward and his associates to continue development work throughout the coming summer.

A large body of ore has been opened up on the Harrison No. 2 in Peralta canon. Tommy Shields, one of the owners of this property, continues steady development work. It is hoped that a custom mill will be erected in Peralta canon some time during this summer and Mr. Shields is preparing to furnish a large amount of milling ore.

C. F. Howe, a Chicago capitalist, came in on Wednesday and spent a couple of days looking over some of the big properties near El Paso. Mr. Howe, who represents large capital was highly pleased with the camp and will make an effort to purchase mining property in the district. He was shown through the Washington mine by Superintendent Donahue.

The Ivanhoe, situated in Peralta canon and owned by Major Edward Beaumont and others, has turned out to be an immense property. The major, who for two months past has been steadily pushing development work, last week completed a cross cut to ascertain the width of the lead, which proves to be forty feet between walls. The entire body being well mineralized, the Ivanhoe is now the biggest bonanza in Peralta canon.

Never before in the history of the Cochiti mining district has the outlook for the camp been as bright as at the present time. This has no doubt been brought about by the fact that the ores of the district are being successfully treated in the camp. But regardless of the cause it is nevertheless a fact that good mining property in the Cochiti was never before in such demand.

It is an advantage of this state of affairs to be taken, a bright future for the camp is assured. It has been said that the only correct business principle is to buy when others sell and to sell when others buy, so if the mine owners in the Cochiti district will act on this principle and their property, sales will be made, mills will be built, hundreds of men will be given employment and the Cochiti mining district will take its rightful position among the great mining camps of the world.

THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Petition to Build a Bridge Between Puna Blanca and Bland. The board of county commissioners met at the court house this morning. In the absence of chairman Miera, Ignacio Gutierrez presided.

The petition, signed by over 500 taxpayers and electors of Bernalillo county, asking that a bridge be constructed over the Rio Grande between Puna Blanca and Bland, under the law passed by the legislature, entitled "An act to provide for the construction of bridges in counties of the first class," approved February 14, 1898, and that the bridge be called the Baca bridge, in honor of Hon. Marcelino Baca, the father of the bill in the legislature, was presented and approved by the board.

No further action, however, was taken, for the reason that the certified copy of the law could not be produced until 10 o'clock to-morrow morning, to which hour the board adjourned without transacting any further business.

A large delegation from Bland and Puna Blanca were present at the meeting of the board.

Major H. R. Whiting deserves credit for the diligence which he exercised in getting the additional names of taxpayers and voters to the petition, which were necessary before the petition could be considered.

Police Court News.

Justice Crawford was greeted with a full house in the police court this morning.

A man giving his name as Charles Smith, who was arrested for stealing a coat from the Highland hotel a few days ago was fined \$10 and costs which he paid.

Minnie Heckman and James Smith, arrested last Saturday night for being drunk and disorderly were found guilty and fined \$10 a piece. The woman paid but the male companion accepted the alternative of going to jail.

A couple of the women of the area, arrested for being drunk, were given five and three days respectively in the county jail.

Thomas Fye and Will Keker, the two boys who were arrested last Saturday night for disturbing the Salvation Army meeting, had their hearings adjourned until 7 o'clock this evening.

The plain drunks were given five days and three days respectively in the county jail.

CRUELY ASSAULTED.

Deputy Sheriff at Thornton Daily Handled by Three Russians.

On last Friday night, three natives, working on the Santa Fe railway at Thornton, entered the restaurant of Deputy Sheriff Julie Gardino and soon thereafter became very boisterous and abusive. Mr. Gardino requested them to leave, which they did and went to Jim Sing's restaurant, where they threatened the

Chinese man's life. The deputy sheriff was then informed and he started out to arrest the three disturbers. They resisted arrest, and administered to the officer a most cruel beating. They knocked him down with a rock, and, while prostrate on the ground, took his pistol from him and beat him unmercifully over the head and face, breaking the jaw bones, cutting big gashes over his eyes and splitting his cheeks open in two or three places. After finishing their bloody work, the deputy sheriff soon revived, and crawled back to his house, while his assailants left in the direction of Santa Fe. It is reported here that they have been arrested, and a deputy sheriff from this city will go up to Thornton this evening to bring the men here.

This office enjoyed a visit this morning from A. A. De Mueles, who arrived here three or four days ago from Minneapolis, Minn. He is a piano and organ tuner, and has just completed a job of work at the Congregational church, and expects to tune the organ at the Presbyterian church to-morrow. He is a brother of A. J.
