THE EDMUNDS LAW.

WITH ORIGINAL IDEAS.

Kansas has not ceased to produce men

of original ideas on all subjects. James

W. Tapp, a rich merchant and leader of

the Salvation Army at Wichita, has been

nominated for mayor at the hands of the

democrats. Some of his ante-election

distributed the same. They dealt with

the climate, mining, agriculture, irriga-

tion, etc., of the territory. As a result of

the work, over 4,000 letters and inquiries

distributed, including a 10,000 illustrated

edition of the New Mexican, which

was furnished without cost to the ter-

ritory. A majority of the old time works

in the territory are now out of print.

Governor Prince's history, Bandler's

work, "New Mexico Illustrated," Frost's

"New Mexico," editions 1892-94, were

good works, but the demand for them

soon exhausted the supply and the calls

for something of the same character are

continually increasing and the new work

must embrace all of the leading features

of progress in mining, agriculture,

education, industrial institutions and

industrial improvements. Judicious

advertising is the greatest inducement to

immigration and will prove of much

more benefit than any other form of per-

suasion. The needs of the bureau are

growing daily, and it is proving one of

the most beneficial of territorial institu-

tions and should meet with the fullest

assistance from the legislature and all

persons who are interested in territorial

development.

Another Cabinet Officer.

pass a law creating a new cabinet port-

folio. This official will probably be

known as secretary of the cabinet.
