The board of education held its postponed regular meeting last night with President Hopkins, Treasurer Hiegold, Snyder, Hadden and Hadden present.

The building committee reported that it had divided the \$32,500 insurance on the city school buildings as follows:

THE KILLING OF GEORGE WILSON AND THE CAPTURE OF ONE OF THE MURDERERS.

Britton Davis returned yesterday afternoon from San Antonio, where he was on the train with the Mexican officers northward in pursuit of the murderers of Wilson.

Five miles south of Guzman a boy who was standing on the platform looking down between the cars saw a man crouched under a bridge as the train passed.

He notified a guard; the train was stopped and backed up. Britton Davis and the officers alighted and looked under the bridge. They captured a man lying close up to the ties on the trestle work and doing his best to conceal himself.

He was ordered to come out and complied. The man admitted that he was one of the three fugitives but denied that he fired the shot that killed Wilson. He was taken to the station and held.

A careful search of the bridge and vicinity was made for concealed money and weapons. The prisoner gave his name as Jose Soto and claimed to be a Chilian by birth. He answered perfectly the description of the man seen at Sabinal Tuesday morning.

Soto was taken aboard the train and carried north until the south bound train was met. He was then taken aboard that train and taken toward San Pedro, where he will be held for trial.

Further details of the shooting are to the effect that Wilson and Soto were returning from the company store when they were met on the road by the three men, who demanded their money. Smith and Wilson, who were carrying money, were whereupon one of the highwaymen drew a dirk and another a pistol. The one with the pistol is said to have been the one-eyed man captured yesterday. He fired one shot, which passed through Wilson's neck, killing him instantly.

As stated yesterday, the murderers proceeded about \$300 in money.—El Paso Herald.
