WORK OF CONGRESS.

Representative Johnson, of Indiana, Creates a Sensation.

Vicious Attack on President and Members of the Cabinet.

Amazes Members by Comparing McKinley to Pecksniff.

SENATE CONSIDERS ARMY BILL.

Washington, Feb. 24.—In the house, Representative Johnson, chairman of the military affairs committee, during the debate on the army appropriation bill, had read, as a part of his remarks, what he said would be a compromise measure for the reorganization of the army. Johnson, a Republican, of Indiana, who made vigorous opposition to the army reorganization bill, delivered a remarkable and sensational speech, attacking the administration in bitter terms for its alleged imperialism. It was read from manuscript, contrary to Johnson's usual custom. He referred, in opening, to the recent banquet in Boston attended by the president and members of the cabinet, and paid his respects to Secretary Alger, who he said had been retained in the cabinet, despite his incompetency, on account of contributions to the campaign fund of 1896. Secretary Long also came in for a share of irony. He had the audacity, Johnson said, to repeat the false charges that those who opposed the ratification of the treaty were responsible for the bloodshed in the Philippines.

As Johnson proceeded his remarks, the utterances fairly amazed the members of the house, who gathered in the aisles to listen. Christianizing with cannon, he declared, was the administration's policy. The president's speech at the Boston banquet, Johnson declared, was the most ingenious that ever fell from the lips of a chief executive, and he declared that the president was creating a false impression of his own character and of the administration's policy.

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WHOLESALE ARRESTS.

Filipinos Suspected of Incendiarism are Imprisoned.

Dewey Asks that the Oregon be Sent to Manila.

One American Killed and Four Wounded in Yesterday's Skirmishes.

REBEL LOSS ABOUT 500.

Manila, Feb. 24.—Owing to the wholesale arrests of all suspected Filipinos yesterday, the clearance of the streets at 7 o'clock last night, the threatened renewal of the scenes of the previous night did not occur. With the exception of a few shots fired in the neighborhood of the penitentiary, the city was as quiet as possible. Outside of Manila the rebels were active. General H. G. Otis had several lively skirmishes with rebels, but at daylight the enemy was driven back with severe loss.

The feeling in this city is much improved to-day. Excellent order is maintained by the police force. United States transport Scandia, with the Twenty-eighth infantry, has arrived from San Francisco. Orders have been issued to enforce the provisional customs tariff at Manila, and officers have been appointed to conduct civil affairs at Iloilo.

REPORT FROM OTIS.
Says the Rebels Lost About 500 Killed and Wounded Yesterday.

Washington, Feb. 24.—General Otis to-day cabled: "Manila, Feb. 24.—The Scandia arrived last night. On the night of the 21st and 22nd and yesterday morning the insurgent troops gained access to the outskirts of the city behind our lines, and about 1,000 entrenched themselves. They were completely routed yesterday, with a loss in killed and wounded of about 500 and 200 prisoners. Our loss was very slight. The city is quiet, confidence is restored and business progressing."

SKIRMISHING CONTINUES.
Rebel Sharpshooters are Active, and One Man is Killed and Four Wounded.

Manila, Feb. 24.—The enemy's sharpshooters have been particularly active about Caloocan all day. Special attention was paid to a three-gun battery near the railroad, and improvements in rebel marksmanship were noticeable. The rebels fired volleys at the battery, the bullets frequently skimming the tops of the sand bags. A lieutenant of the Twentieth Kansas volunteers and three other men were slightly wounded. One man was killed in the trenches to-day. The rebel battery has not been used since a shell from the United States double-barreled mortar demolished the position about Caloocan. The enemy's fire was so hot during the night in the vicinity of the Higgins house that the house was completely destroyed. A church 400 yards inside the line.

A few small fires destroyed several native houses in the outskirts of the city. The Twenty-eighth infantry, however, has been ordered to march on the transport Scandia. The regiment will be encamped on the water front.

DEWEY'S SUGGESTION.
Says the Oregon should be Sent to Manila for Political Reasons.

Washington, Feb. 24.—The following was received at the navy department: "Manila, Feb. 24.—For political reasons the Oregon should be sent here at once. The Yorktown has arrived and the Charleston and Petrel are en route. The Philippine Islands. Affairs are more quiet."

PARIS SENSATION.
Three French Deputies Arrested on the Charge of Conspiracy.

Paris, Feb. 24.—Deputies de Bonville, Albert Herbet, and Millet, arrested last night, were confronted this morning with General Rogot, who declared that de Bonville tried to induce him to lead the French troops to the palace. Friends of de Bonville fear that he will be tried before the senate sitting at a high court. The police made 400 arrests yesterday.

The Battleship Oregon.
Washington, Feb. 24.—The navy department expects the Oregon to arrive at Manila about March 10.

THE LEGISLATURE.

The Duncan Bill, as Amended, Becomes a Law.

Bill Relating to Deaf and Dumb Asylum Passes Both Houses.

General Egan Testifies Before the Board of Inquiry To-day.

SENSATION IN PARIS.

Santa Fe, N. M., Feb. 24.—In the council this morning the house amendment to the Duncan financial bill was considered, and the bill is now a law. In the house a bill was passed to incorporate territorial public buildings. The bill relating to the deaf and dumb asylum passed the council, and is now a law. This gives this institution the 50,000 acres of public land donated by congress.

Hughes introduced a bill in the council making it obligatory on the part of property owners to build sidewalks. Committee in both houses are working this afternoon on important bills.

CUBANS CELEBRATE.
Fourth Anniversary of the Revolution a General Holiday in Havana.

Havana, Feb. 24.—Four years ago to-day the revolution broke out. To-day is a general holiday. Triumphant armies have been erecting bearing patriotic inscriptions, rockets are popping and bands playing. General Lindero, governor of Havana, has given permission to the Cubans to bring 500 troops into the city with General Maximiano Gomez, who has selected this day for a triumphal entry into the Cuban capital. Lindero will receive Gomez with military honors.

Consul Dewey's Dispat.
Washington, Feb. 24.—At to-day's cabinet meeting a dispatch from Admiral Dewey was the only matter under consideration. It is considered likely that a request for further details will be made.

Senatorial Deadline.
Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 24.—The Hayward mail made an effort to force a second ballot for senator to-day but were voted down. There were no changes recorded in the ballot.

HON. EMILIANO L. GUTIERREZ.
Hon. Emiliano L. Gutierrez, who is making a good reputation for himself as one of Bernalillo county's legislative representatives, being a member of the lower house, has received attention through the columns of the New Mexican, the following biographical sketch, with his photo, being published:

"Hon. Emiliano L. Gutierrez, member of the house of representatives of the Thirty-third legislative assembly of New Mexico, from Bernalillo county, was born in Old Albuquerque, July 16, 1861. He received his education in private schools, closing his school days by attending the Jesuit college in Las Vegas from 1877 to 1880, inclusive.

"After leaving college he engaged in stock raising in company with his father. In 1880 the partnership was dissolved and Mr. Gutierrez went into the same business by himself, which he has continued to the present time with much success.

"Politically, Mr. Gutierrez is a staunch republican and he occupies a high position in the party councils in Bernalillo county. In his home precinct, he is held in the highest esteem by his neighbors and friends, and has held several offices to which he has been elected almost without opposition. For three years he was county assessor, discharging the duties of the office impartially and efficiently; he has also held the office of commissioner of assessor, and clerk of the school board in his precinct.

"When the campaign of 1898 opened, the republicans of Bernalillo county, in their search for a candidate as representative in the Thirty-second legislative assembly, who would go his duty to the county fearlessly and honestly, decided that Mr. Gutierrez was just such a man. He was nominated and elected by a large majority, despite the bitter fight made on him by the leaders of the fusion movement, and his services in the present session have justified the choice of the voters who elected him. On the floor of the house Mr. Gutierrez is recognized as one of the leaders. Quick-witted, ready and always on the watch for the interests of the people of the entire territory, he has proved a valued member. As an orator Mr. Gutierrez takes first rank in the house, and when he returns to his home at the close of the legislature, he will carry with him the esteem of his fellow members, and will certainly have earned the good will of his constituents.

"Mr. Gutierrez's principal mission and his chief ambition as a legislator, is to aid in the passage of such laws as will protect the interests of the taxpayers, advance the territory in educational and material ways, and it is largely due to his efforts that the bill known as H. R. No. 21, providing for the construction of bridges, was passed.

"Mr. Gutierrez was married on April 11, 1887, in Colinas, San Miguel county, to Miss Isabel Romero, daughter of Don Benito Romero, and they have four sons."

TERRITORIAL FINANCES.
The report of Territorial Auditor Garcia to the governor, for the term beginning December 1, 1896, and ending December 3, 1900, has been submitted and printed for general information, regarding the finances of the territory, says the New Mexican. The report is replete with statements concerning the receipts and expenditures of the territory, and is filled with a volume of information regarding the standing of the different funds and the debts of New Mexico.

Under the head of "Taxes and Appropriations" the auditor says:
"Under the laws of 1897, making appropriations for the forty-eighth fiscal year appropriations to the amount of \$210,330 were made by the legislature to be paid out from the levy of 6 mills on the dollar for territorial purposes, on the assessed valuation for the year 1900, of \$30,940,902, the product of which is \$2,250,277, of which the sum of \$181,112.29 has been paid into the territorial treasury by the different collectors, making a deficit of 65 per cent of the appropriation, leaving about 35 per cent to be provided for by the present legislature."

"For the forty-ninth fiscal year, the appropriations made by the legislature amount to \$193,080, to be paid out from the levy of 7 mills on the dollar for territorial purposes derived from an assessed valuation for the year 1907, of \$27,478,119, the product of which is \$2,727,920.27 of which amount the sum of \$138,370.17 has been paid into the territorial treasury by the different collectors, leaving a deficit of 92 per cent of the appropriation for the forty-ninth fiscal year, leaving a deficit of 29 per cent to be provided for by the present legislature."

The statement of the deficiencies in the appropriations for the forty-sixth, forty-seventh, forty-eighth and forty-ninth fiscal years shows the sum to be \$88,268.68.

The special tax fund, created by the law of 1897 to pay deficiencies in various appropriations to the amount of about \$70,000, has so far realized the sum of \$24,849.82, or about 35 per cent of the appropriation. The auditor estimates that by the time the taxes for 1908 are collected, if collected in the proportion as for 1897, there will be a deficiency in the fund of about 30 per cent to January 1, 1909.

For the past two years there has been paid to the several territorial institutions the sum of \$128,470.60. The institutions which have received the money are: University of New Mexico, Agricultural college, Insane asylum, School of Mines, military institute, Silver City normal school and the Las Vegas normal school.

On the subject of assessment of taxes, tax collections and county commissioners, Auditor Garcia says:
"Only the tax rolls from Bernalillo, Chaves, Colfax, El Paso, Grant, Guadalupe, Santa Fe, San Miguel, San Juan, Sierra and Union counties, for the year 1898, show any description of property returned for taxes; the other counties do not show any description at all and in making comparisons for tax rolls I take into consideration the fact that where there is no description of property

shown in the tax rolls no collection of taxes can be enforced, hence my estimating to compensate certain tax rolls. The assessment of the different counties should be required under penalty of law not to accept any tax return, unless a plain description of the property is given, and the county commissioners should be required not to approve any tax rolls unless they are properly filled out in accordance with law with the description of property assessed."

"The books of this office show that some of the accounts of the collectors are not closed or brought to a balance and that is due to the failure of the boards of county commissioners thereof in complying with the law, in making final settlement with the county collectors at the expiration of their term of office and in sending a copy of said final settlement, so far as the territorial revenue is concerned, to this office. For that reason it is impossible for the auditor to find out what collectors are in arrears or indebted to the territory in order to report them to the proper prosecuting officers. A penalty should be attached to the law and compel the county commissioners to comply with such duty."

The effect of the law requiring insurance companies to make a deposit of \$10,000 each for the privilege of doing business in the territory, is set forth in a few words. It is shown that out of the forty-two companies writing policies in New Mexico before the law went into effect in March, 1897, twenty-two complied with its provisions, while twenty abandoned their New Mexico agencies.

The entire receipts of the territory for the period covered by the report, were \$671,488.69. But in that amount are included the proceeds of the sale of the capital rebuilding bonds, the income from bonds and money borrowed for the purpose of paying interest on outstanding indebtedness. The indebtedness of the territory on December 31, 1898, was as follows: Bonded indebtedness, \$1,056,900; outstanding warrants, approximately, \$15,000.

TO BE SURVEYED AND SOLD.
The Fort Marcy reservation, at Santa Fe, has been ordered surveyed into town lots and sold, per instructions received by Collector of Internal Revenue Morrison from C. N. Bliss secretary of the interior. An extract of the letter of instruction, authorizing the sale, is as follows:

"By letter of the 8th instant, you were directed, in accordance with the recommendations in your letter of December 27, 1898, to cause the lands in the Fort Marcy abandoned military reservation, New Mexico, to be surveyed in the field into town lots, with the view to the immediate disposal of the lands as well as the buildings on the reservation, under the act of July 5, 1884, Stat. 163."

The Woman's Board of Trade of Santa Fe, now temporarily occupying certain buildings on the reservation, was granted permission to retain their present quarters until further orders.

NEW PENITENTIARY LAW.
Superintendent Made a Territorial Officer of Two Years' Tenure of Office.
C. B. No. 32, introduced by Hon. T. B. Catron, relating to the reorganization of the territorial penitentiary board, is now a law. It reads as follows:
"Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the territory of New Mexico: Section 1. That section 3491 of the compiled laws of New Mexico, compiled in the year 1897, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Sec. 3491. That general government and management of the territorial penitentiary shall be vested in five commissioners, who shall be called the board of penitentiary commissioners. Said commissioners shall be appointed by the governor by and with the advice of the legislative council, for the term of two years and until their successors shall be appointed and qualified. They shall all be appointed simultaneously, during the present session of the Thirty-third legislative assembly, and their terms of office shall commence as soon as their commission shall be received from the governor. Hereafter during each session of the legislative assembly, the governor by and with the consent of the legislative council, shall appoint the successors of said commissioners, whose terms of office shall expire on the first day of March, during each session, each of whom shall hold office for two years and until his successor is appointed and qualified, but the governor shall have power at any time to remove any of said commissioners and appoint their successors who shall hold for the unexpired term as herein provided. A majority of said board shall constitute a quorum."

"Sec. 2. The superintendent for the penitentiary shall be an officer of the territory of New Mexico, instead of an employee as now provided by law, and he shall be appointed by the governor, and with the advice of the legislative council, and the said superintendent shall have and perform the same duties as required by law, but the governor shall have power at any time to remove the superintendent and appoint his successor. The term of office of the superintendent shall be for the period of two years from the date of his appointment and qualification, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified."

"Sec. 3. All acts and parts of acts in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage."

The act was approved by Governor Otero February 13.

Wilson was a young man of powerful physique.
