RECORDING MARRIAGES.

Hon. R. Herrera has sprung a bill on

the house which provides a new form for

recording marriages, says the New Mexi-

can. The applicants for license must

give their names, age, where residing

and for what length of time, where pre-

viously married, if either parties to the

former marriage are dead or divorced, if

related and if any legal impediment to

the marriage is known to exist. Per-

sons who are authorized to celebrate

marriage ceremonies shall be guilty of

extortion if they accept more than \$5 for

committing the deed. The bill does not

provide any change for the old form of

marrying. That is evidently good enough

and perhaps a little too stringent already

for some people.

SALOON AND GAMBLING LICENSES.

Councilman G. A. Richardson has in-

troduced a council bill which seeks to

raise the liquor and gambling licenses of

the territory. The bill is a decided de-

parture from those heretofore intro-

duced, inasmuch as it provides that the

license of saloons and gambling houses

must give a bond of \$10,000 to keep order

places. The license to do business is

fixed as follows: In any precinct where

there is an incorporated town or post

office, \$100; in any town or city not hav-

ing more than 500 inhabitants, \$200; not

more than 1,000, \$300; more than 1,000,

\$400; all other cities, \$500. The license

is made payable annually in advance.

For gambling the license is fixed at \$200

for twelve months, \$175 for nine months,

\$150 for six months, \$100 for three

months, said license to be payable in

advance for each table or gambling de-

vice. The money for all licenses may be

used only by the community where the

licenses are taken out.

EQUAL SUFFRAGE QUESTION.

By reference to the council proceed-

ings, published elsewhere in this day's

CITIZEN, it will be seen that Mrs. Carrie

Chapman and Miss Mary G. Hayes ad-

ressed that body on the woman's suf-

frage question. The New Mexican, in

commenting on the matter, says:

A letter was read in the council, re-

questing that Mrs. Carrie Chapman and

Miss Mary G. Hayes be given an oppor-

tunity to address the council on the

equal suffrage question. It is stated

that while the time is not ripe for a

decision on this question, it would be

a good idea to educate the legislature on

the subject first. The married men did

not object to being instructed because

they had doubtless pledged themselves

to consider to womanhood before they

were in the minority. Hon. T. A. Kin-

caid, in whom the plea is especially ap-

plied, introduced a resolution granting the

privilege of addressing the legisla-

ture some day outside of office hours.

Some practical jokes were played on

the resolution in the house to enforce a

full attendance of the council members.

THE WAR PRESIDENTS.

Since the last previous anniversary of

the birth of Abraham Lincoln, another

chief executive of this nation has been

made a war president, and he has been

subjected to the same treatment, from

the same sources, to which his prede-

cessor of nearly forty years ago was

subjected. Censure was heaped upon

Lincoln because he had insisted that

the Union must be preserved and the

war had been the result. But he pre-

pared in the course that he knew was

another as well as the general state it

would seem unlikely that any serious

consequences will follow the change in

presidents and the election of the cham-

ber of the Union will be called upon to make

of the recent presidents of the republic

C. J. B. No. 7, appropriating \$4,000

C. B. No. 9, "An act to provide for the

printing of bills, documents, etc., of the

territory; approved January 25.

C. B. No. 10, "An act to amend sections

3230 and 3341 of the compiled laws of

1897; approved January 19.

C. B. No. 11, "An act to create the

council of officers; approved January 30.

C. B. No. 12, "An act to amend section

1491, laws of 1897, relating to the

jurisdiction of the territorial court; ap-

proved February 8.

This is the bill providing for the

jurisdiction of the territorial court; ap-

C. B. No. 13, to provide the necessary

funds to complete and furnish the cap-

itol at Santa Fe; approved February 8.

ation or not. In the case of a bank, the

amount of money on hand out of which

dividends are paid is the taxable prop-

erty. The undivided profits of a bank, it

is held, are not taxable, but the profits

made by the bank in the ordinary course

of business are taxable. The law has

been so construed by the supreme court

of the United States.
