SUCCEEDS BROOKE.

General Wood to Be Appointed Military Governor of Cuba.

Taxes Collected There Prior to December 31, to Be Remitted.

Another Military Expedition Will Sail for the Philippines, February 3.

BLIZZARD IN MISSOURI

New York, Jan. 28.—A special to the Journal Advertiser from Washington says: It is announced on excellent authority that the president has decided to remove General Brooke as military governor of Cuba and appoint General Leonard Wood in his place. The change is to take place on February 1. General Wood is reported to be scheduled in command.

NO MORE TAXES.

General Brooke Will Remit Those C. I. Taxes Prior to December 31.

Havana, Jan. 28.—The Spanish bank will not collect any more taxes. General Brooke will remit all taxes prior to December 31, 1898. General Leonard Wood will proceed to Santiago at the first opportunity next week.

ELEVATOR COMPANY ASSIGNS.

One of the Largest in St. Louis Goes into Hands of a Receiver.

St. Louis, Jan. 28.—Henry William Sebastian, president of the St. Louis Bridge and Iron company, has been appointed receiver of the Farmers' Elevator company, which made an assignment to-day. The elevator is one of the largest in the city and has a capacity of a million and a half bushels. The liabilities and assets are not given. The elevator company has a capital stock of \$250,000, with a bonded indebtedness of \$200,000, and a floating debt of \$75,000. For some time a heavy judgment has been hanging over the company, and this with some other troubles caused the action taken to-day.

THE RAILROAD WINS.

Eastern Terminals of Northern Pacific Declined to Ashland, Wis.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 28.—Judge Lochran, of the United States court, today filed a decision by which the Northern Pacific railroad is given about 100,000 acres of land in northern Minnesota and Wisconsin. The contest was over the eastern terminus of the railway, the United States holding it was Duluth while the company insisted it was Ashland. Judge Lochran decides in favor of the company.

Presidential Appointments

Washington, Jan. 28.—The president today sent these nominations to the senate: William C. Rock, United States district judge for the district of Kansas; Marcus C. Melancon, United States attorney for the eastern district of Texas.

BONAPARTE DEMONSTRATION.

Hoist the Tri-Colored Flag in Theater Performance in Paris.

Paris, Jan. 28.—During the performance of the "King of Rome," at Nouveau theatre last evening, the Bonapartists gloriously approved, hoisted a tri-colored flag, surmounted by an imperial eagle. They also shouted "Vive la République." Great excitement followed and blows were exchanged, but no arrests were made.

Prominent Popular Dead.

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 27.—Evan Jones, one of the most prominent figures in the popular party, died last night. Jones was on the national populist ticket with General Weaver.

TROOPS AT ILOILO.

Some Recalled That the Transport Pennsylvania May Be Required.

Manila, Jan. 28.—General Wood has recalled the Fifty-third Iowa volunteers from Iloilo, in order that the transport Pennsylvania, on which the regiment is, and has been ordered to the Philippines. The regiment is to be replaced by the Eighteenth Infantry and the Sixth Infantry will remain at Iloilo indefinitely.

ANOTHER EXPEDITION.

More Troops Will Leave New York for Philippines February 3.

Chicago, Jan. 28.—General M. V. Sheridan, the commander of the department of the lakes, issued orders to-day for the departure of an expedition for the Philippines. The force will include the Third Infantry, now at Fort Meade, and four companies of the Seventeenth Infantry, stationed at Columbus barracks, Ohio. The troops sail from New York, February 3.

Bank Statement.

New York, Jan. 28.—Weekly bank statement: Surplus reserve, \$6,020,000; specie increased, \$6,411,500; legal tender increased, \$1,267,400; deposits increased, \$12,553,400; circulation decreased, \$730,300. Banks held \$39,282,025 in excess of requirements.

Irrigation Controversy.

Topeka, Kas., Jan. 28.—The house, in committee of the whole, has recommended for passage Representative Babb's bill to give the commissioners of counties along the Arkansas river power to levy a tax for the purpose of contesting the right of Colorado farmers to use all the water of the river for irrigation purposes. Babb explained that formerly when the June river came the entire valley was submerged but now all that is left of the river is a bed of sand.

THE EAGAN TRIAL.

Officially Nothing Is Yet Known of the Verdict.

But It Is Reported That He Was Found Guilty as Charged.

Papers in the Case Will Not Come Before the President Until February 5.

TO BE DISMISSED FROM SERVICE.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Colonel Davis, the judge advocate in the Eagan court martial, engaged to-day in going over the record of proceedings in the effort to deliver the papers to the secretary of war before the expiration of the day. Officially nothing is yet known of the verdict. It is rumored, however, that the court martial found Eagan guilty as charged and decided that he should be dismissed from the military service without any recommendation for clemency.

Alcocks, Wyo., Offers Purse of \$10,000 for Their Fight.

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 28.—The Fremont Hot Springs company of Alcoa, Wyo., has forwarded an offer to the managers of Sharkey and Fitzsimmons offering a purse of \$25,000 for a fight in June, July or August. The only condition attached is that the training be done at Alcoa.

AGREEMENT WITH INDIANS.

Work of the Dawes Commission Submitted to the Senate.

Washington, Jan. 28.—The agreement concluded at Muskogee, Indian Territory, January 14, between the Dawes commission and the commission of the Cherokee nation, providing for allotment of land and other questions and the general introduction of Indians into United States citizenship has been sent to the senate.

BLIZZARD RAGING.

Northwest Missouri Visited by Snow and Wind Storm.

St. Joseph, Mo., Jan. 28.—A blizzard is raging all over northwest Missouri to-day. Fine snow began to fall at 9 o'clock and the wind attained a fearful velocity. Communication with neighboring towns is seriously interfered with and the temperature is fast falling.

Holena, Mont., Jan. 28.—To-day's eighteenth session of the Montana legislature resulted in the election of Senator Clark, who received 12 of the 10 votes cast. Twelve of the sixteen republicans voted for Clark.

CONGRESSIONAL.

IN THE HOUSE.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Owing to the small attendance in the house to-day the fact that senators on the Representative Stumpkin, of Massachusetts, were set for 3 o'clock, it was decided not to offer for action to-day the amendment to the army reorganization bill, providing for the reduction of the size of the infantry companies and cavalry troops, of which Hull gave notice yesterday. Todd (Iowa, Mich.) offered an amendment providing for the recall of the forces of the United States from the Philippines whenever the natives should have established a stable independent government. He was ruled out on a point of order. Speaking to a pro forma amendment, Handy (Iowa, Ind.) said he would withdraw our troops from Manila if a hostile shot had been fired against native standing for liberty. He would not like to witness Bunker Hill, in which we would cast the part of invaders of liberty.

IN THE SENATE.

Washington, Jan. 28.—In the senate, Hale, of Maine, called up the diplomatic consular appropriation bill. Bacon, of Georgia, objected as he had given notice that he proposed at this hour to call up his resolution regarding the Philippines and endeavor to get a vote therefor.

THE LEGISLATURE

HOUSE—THURSDAY MORNING, JAN. 26.
House met pursuant to adjournment with the speaker in the chair. Prayer by Rev. Father Gilbert. A quorum being present the house proceeded to business.

Mr. Gallegos, chairman of the committee on territorial affairs made the following report:
"Mr. Speaker: Your committee on territorial affairs to whom was referred H. B. No. 11, have had the same under consideration, and I am directed to report the said bill to the house with the recommendation that it be passed."

Report ordered to lie on the table, to be taken up in the regular order.
Mr. Sanchez introduced H. B. No. 25, "An act to abolish capital punishment in the territory of New Mexico." Referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Jaramila introduced H. B. No. 25, "An act to protect personal property from loss by theft." Referred to the committee on judiciary.

Under order of business on the speaker's table, H. B. No. 11, on third reading was taken up for consideration, and on motion of Mr. Winston, said bill was referred back to the committee on territorial affairs with instructions to prepare a substitute for said bill in accordance with good grammar.

On motion of Mr. Sanchez, the house adjourned until Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES.
Council joint resolutions Nos. 1, 5, 3 and 2 have been signed by the president of the council.

Bill No. 12, giving fidelity companies the right to sue in the territory, passed the council Thursday morning.

H. B. No. 24, introduced by W. H. Schultz, provides stringent penalties for the carrying of concealed weapons, and should be passed. The present law upon the statutes seems inadequate.

It is understood that Congressman J. M. Valdez has a bill pending in the house out of southern California, with Springer as the county seat, ready and that it will be introduced at an early date, so as soon as the count is ready.

Council bill to create Otero county introduced by Hon. J. A. Anchaeta, was reported favorably by the committee on counties and county lines with the slight amendment and passed the council by vote of 11 to 1. The friends of the measure proposed to push it in the house.

Mineral county, out of portions of Colfax, Mora and Taos, is an immense dream, dreamed of by some of the mining magnates in that section. La Balle, Red River, Huerfano, Kirtland, Rio Grande and other mining camps are to be in Mineral county, when it is created. When that will be no one can tell at this writing.

Hon. T. A. Finlay, of Bernalillo county, has introduced C. B. No. 38, to amend section 2, chapter 91, of the session laws of 1901, to shorten the term of office of a public lands agent from two years to one year, and an additional sum of \$10 for serving venues. Prisoners' board shall be paid for at the rate of 40 cents per day. The bill was referred to the committee on territorial affairs.

AN INTERESTING DOCUMENT.

Whereas the governor of the state of Texas, under the 14th section of an act entitled "An act to provide for the appointment by the governor of certain officers to fill vacancies," and whereas, "An act to incorporate the town of Ysleta," it has become the duty of the governor to appoint nine aldermen to the said town of Ysleta; and whereas, I have nominated the following named persons to act as said board of aldermen, to-wit: Martin Alford, Jose Gonzalez, Juan Garcia, Pedro Candelario, Nicolas Lopez, Apolonia, Frank Meyer, Nicolas Padilla, Pablo Romero; and I hereby certify that I have forwarded such names to the governor to be fully commissioned.

RAILROAD TOPIES AT SANTA FE.
The Denver & Rio Grande has now shown new ahead of each train south of Antonio, so that there are no more delays.
Captain Bunker, of San Juan, says that the Denver & Rio Grande road will not have to build far south from Durango to get into the San Juan coal fields. The veins there are ten, fifteen and twenty feet thick, of excellent bituminous coal, just the thing for railroad use.

"Uncle" John Roper, the well-known Denver & Rio Grande roadmaster, came down the line and registered at the Palace. He returned north Thursday morning. He says the contractors on the La Veta extension are receiving laborers at the rate of 100 per day, so that La Veta was full of them the last time he was there. Mr. Roper believes it is the intention of the railway company to continue the standard gauge straight on down to Santa Fe, and thence on to Albuquerque; also, that the prospects are good for a branch line south from Durango into the San Juan, N. M. coal fields. The company seems to have plenty of money, and is doing a great business.—New Mexican.

ALMOST READY FOR TRAVEL.
The Pecon Valley railroad extension is making commendable progress towards completion, and it is now but a matter of two weeks before through trains can be run between Roly and Howell and Kansas City and Chicago. General Manager Nicholson in a recent interview, said that on Wednesday of last week the track-layers coming south were only fifty miles from Howell. This, with seven miles built north from Howell, left at that time only twenty-three miles to lay, and the steel is going down at the rate of two miles per day. The grading is all done, and by the 28th inst. the rail ends will have been connected up.

The sleeping cars now running between Pecon City and Amarillo. One feature of the new line will be the Colorado travel. Passengers can leave Howell at 2 p. m., reach Amarillo at 9 p. m., and Denver at 5 p. m. the next day, in thirty-six hours less time than by going around via Fort Worth. President J. H. Hagerman of the Pecon Valley road, his wife, and Mr. Hagerman's associate, C. A. O'Neil, will be present at the rail connection, and Mrs. Hagerman will be asked to drive the last spike closing up the gap and completing the road. Messrs. Hagerman and O'Neil came down to the south end of the track the other day, and as they made 151 miles over the new track at the rate of fifty miles an hour, the road must be in very good shape for a new road.
