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## NEWS FROM MANILA.

**Aguinaldo Has Refused to Release Spanish Prisoners.**

**Rumored That He Has Fled to Escape Assassination.**

**Tagal Insurgents in Possession of Kalibao Since December 11.**

## SEVERAL SPANIARDS SHOT.

Manila, Dec. 27.—It is reported that Aguinaldo has refused to release the Spanish prisoners without the cabinet decided to accede to the request of General Otis for their release. It is rumored that Aguinaldo has fled to an inaccessible region back of Cavite with a few followers, fearing assassination. This report is denied, but his sudden change of base is not explained.

The expedition, commanded by General Miller, which left for Iloilo, consisted of the Eighteenth infantry, the Iowa battalion, the Sixth artillery and a detachment of the cavalry corps.

The troops shipped on the transporters Arizona, Newport and Pennsylvania were conveyed by the United States cruisers Baltimore and Callao.

## TAGAL INSURGENTS.

Lost Stores and Houses and Shout the Spaniards.

Manila, Dec. 27.—A steamer from Samar reports that the Tagal insurgents have been in possession of Kalibao since December 11. Business is entirely suspended. All Spaniards sought refuge in the house of an American named Scott. One Spaniard was shot, another was plucked by Scott, who rode off in a motor car, and the man's release in the face of an armed mob of Tagals, who had been looting the Spaniards' stores and houses, the leaders of the insurgents being unable to control them.

All efforts to induce the Spaniards to join the revolt have been futile. The formation of a new cabinet has been instituted to a Filipino named Madi, a bitter opponent of Aguinaldo, especially on the question of Spanish prisoners.

**Ex-Governor Dead.**  
Wilmington, Del., Dec. 27.—John P. Cochran, ex-governor of Delaware, died today, aged 80. He was elected governor in 1874 on the democratic ticket.

## FIRE IN NEW YORK.

The Pacific Bank Building Destroyed by Flames.

New York, Dec. 27.—Fire broke out on the third floor of the historic Pacific bank building, Broadway, today. The upper floors are occupied by P. G. Mason, manufacturer of spring top uniforms caps. The first floor and basement were occupied by the Pacific bank. The fire spread with great rapidity and cut off all means of exit. Two men were taken out by the hook and ladder company. The water tower somewhat checked the flames, but the third and fourth floors will be gutted.

**Peace Treaty Head.**

Washington, Dec. 27.—The cabinet today listened to reading of the important parts of the peace treaty and then gave their attention to affairs in Cuba. Secretary Taft outlined a plan looking to the forming of a permanent bank of values of the currency money of Cuba.

**Sail for Cuba.**

Savannah, Ga., Dec. 27.—Major General J. Warren Keifer and the headquarters of officers of the First division, Seventh army corps, departed on the United States transport Panama for Havana, where Keifer will establish headquarters. A large crowd at the dock cheered the general.

**Spaniards Steal Goods.**

Nuevitas, Cuba, Dec. 27.—The last of the Spanish forces in the province of Puerto Principe have left. The Fifteenth United States infantry has arrived. Our flag has been raised with much ceremony by two daughters of the alcalde, a Cuban.

**"Ruth Ashmore" Dead.**

New York, Dec. 27.—Mrs. Isabel Mallon, best known by the nom-de-plume of "Ruth" and "Ruth Ashmore," died today.

**A Destructive Fire.**

Litchfield, Ky., Dec. 27.—This town today had a second destructive fire this year, eight stores, three residences, the post office and a school bank were destroyed. The court house and other stores were badly damaged. Loss \$100,000.

**A "Jotai" Blown Up.**

Ahluene, Kas., Dec. 27.—A titans of Woodbine blew up with dynamite a building in which a "jotai" was started a week ago. Everything was destroyed, the timbers being thrown for rods and adjoining

## BIG MINE DEAL.

**Eastern Capitalists Buy Copper Claims in Arizona.**

Property Adjacent to Clark's Great Mine at Jerome.

Moore Gets Nineteen Years in Prison for Working a "Badger Game."

FLAG RAISING IN HAVANA.

New York, Dec. 27.—Fourteen claims adjacent to the great copper mine of W. A. Clark, in Arizona, have passed into the hands of eastern capitalists. Franklin Farrell, of Ansonia, Conn., and L. J. Guellich and W. H. Cox, of this city, are the principal members of the syndicate of purchasers.

G. W. Hall, of Arizona, was the principal owner of the properties sold. He was represented by James Shively, a mining engineer of Prescott, A. T. The property is located in Jerome, Yavapai county, Arizona, and is known as the United Verde extension. Clark's property, the United Verde, is regarded as one of the greatest copper mines in the world.

The property transferred here is about of the same extent, and is said to carry copper ore of equal value. It is the intention of the purchasers to convert the ore into crude copper at the mine and ship the product to copper refining establishments at Bridgeport and Ansonia, Conn.

**RIOTS IN HAVANA.**

The Occasion the Raising of Cuban and American Flags.

Havana, Dec. 27.—The citizens of Havana read in the morning papers an order from Captain General Castellanos permitting the display of Cuban and American flags inside the lines of the Spanish jurisdiction. The only buildings exempted in the order are the government offices. Fear of the Spaniards' disapproval with the appearance of this order for our thousands of flags erected by women or children, purchased from adventurous peddlers. Fourteen persons were wounded by people who fired weapons in the streets.

New York, Dec. 27.—W. A. R. Moore, convicted of robbing Martin Mahon, hotel keeper, of the "badger game," was today sentenced to nineteen years in prison.

**General Brooks Arrives.**

Havana, Dec. 27.—Major General John B. Brooks, military governor of Cuba, arrived here from the United States today.

**Steamboat Burned.**

New Orleans, La., Dec. 27.—The steamboat Teche, plying in the La Fourche trade city miles above the city, was burned today. No lives lost.

**Dry Goods Store Robbed.**

Baltimore, Dec. 27.—The dry goods store of Henry Wessel was robbed last night of \$6,000. The money was in the safe, the door of which was blown off by dynamite.

**Planning a Coup d'Etat.**

London, Dec. 27.—Special dispatches from Paris say in view of the daily preparations for a coup d'etat, the revolutionary socialists have organized a vigilance committee in each district charged with the detection of the anti-republican movement. A counter preparation is

also being made. Officers in the higher ranks in the army are said to have been sounded on the subject of a coup d'etat, but results are disheartening.

**Sam Martin Dead.**

Levi Clark, department commander of the Grand Army, received a letter this morning announcing the death of Sam Martin, which occurred the other day at the Santa Monica, Cal., Soldiers' home. When Fred Formist was marshal of Albuquerque, about four years ago, he put Martin on the train and saw him safely on his way to the Soldiers' home. He came here from Philadelphia years ago and for a short time followed his trade of carpentering, but he soon grew tired of the bench and became a character around the saloons, until the Grand Army veterans took an interest in him, and he soon thereafter became an inmate of the Soldiers' home.

The letter received by Mr. Clark gave the information that Martin met with an accident, that of having his foot and leg crushed under an electric street car. He was carried to the home, where his death occurred.

Washington, Dec. 27.—Senator Morrill, of Vermont, is seriously ill with grip, complicated with lung and heart trouble. His death, it is said, is but a matter of a short time. The senator is 83 years old, and owing to weakness cannot shake off the grip. He has been for years the patriarch of the senate.

At 2 p. m. Dr. Van Rensselaer said Senator Morrill was sinking slowly and would not live until morning.

**A Kansas Failure.**

Ahluene, Kas., Dec. 27.—Word reached Ahluene that Catlin Bros., bankers and extensive stock feeders of Miltonville, have failed, with liabilities from \$300,000 to \$500,000. Their bank was closed last Saturday.

Catlin Bros. have been feeding 2,500 head of cattle, and are said to have lost heavily. The impossibility of securing extension matured cattle paper to sold to them is responsible for the failure. It is said the failure will cause heavy loss to several commission houses of Kansas City through whom they floated much paper.

**CHINESE IMMIGRATION.**

Chief Justice Judd Decides That Chinese May Land in Honolulu.

Honolulu, Dec. 19.—Chief Justice Judd has decided that Chinese who secured permits before annexation may land at this port. The question was brought up on a writ of habeas corpus. Petitioners were recently refused landing by Special Agent Brown, of the treasury department. Special Agent Brown said: "My instructions are imperative. Whether they may be modified when the decision is made known at Washington, I cannot tell, but until they are I shall follow them I have."

**CRITICISE GENERAL MILLS.**

The Swift Packing Company Takes Exception to His Testimony.

Washington, Dec. 27.—The Swift Packing company, of Chicago, has forwarded the war investigation committee a communication taking exception to the testimony made by General Mills in the character of beef furnished the expeditionary forces in the war. The exception also taken to this feature of Mills' testimony by Congressional general Kagen will be brought up by the committee at its next full session. This question of the character of the beef supply may possibly open up a rather prolonged inquiry. Unless something unexpected should develop, however, the committee expects to close its regular session before the middle of January and probably finish up their work entirely by February 1st.
