## MATTERS AT MANILA.

## Business Suspended in Many of the Philippine Provinces.

## American Peace Commissioners Arrive at New York City.

## Wife Murderer Lynched by a Mob at Scottsburg, Indiana.

## WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

Manila, Dec. 24.—Private advice from the southern provinces says that business is suspended in all the leading towns and supplies are scarce, and foreigners are only permitted to travel when special permits are issued to them. At Manila, the headquarters of the so-called Philippine government, war here, the native soldiers are leaving on the villages for food. The people are half starved and universal desolation prevails. American volunteers to the number of 600 attended an enthusiastic meeting of the newly formed Philippine development association yesterday evening. Definite action was postponed awaiting decision from General Otis on certain matters.

## Return of Ex-Commissioner.

New York, Dec. 24.—Judge Day, Senators Davis, Gray, Frye and Whitelaw Reid, United States commissioners to arrange a treaty of peace with Spain, reached home today on the steamer St. Louis. They would not talk regarding their work in Paris. They took the first train for Washington, carrying the treaty of peace. Bassett Moore, secretary, and the counsel of the commission, and Arthur W. Ferguson, translator, were with the commissioners. Senator Gray, the only democrat on the commission, was told of Bryan's recently declared attitude on the question of expansion. "Oh," said the senator, "I am not on Colonel Bryan's curves yet. I have no doubt," said he, "there is a sober thoughtful opinion in the commission against expansion; there must be. The treaty gives us control of the situation. We can do as we please. We can keep the Philippines or not, as may be determined in future."

## Bank Statement.

New York, Dec. 24.—Weekly bank statement: Surplus reserve, increased, \$2,450,675; loans increased, \$3,657,300; specie increased, \$4,449,000; legal tender increased, \$13,000; deposits increased, \$8,039,700; circulation decreased, \$100,400. Banks hold \$19,601,070 in excess of requirements.

## EAGAN DENIES.

Wide Difference Between Statements of Miles and the Commission General. Washington, Dec. 24.—General Eagan, commissary of subsistence, gave out the following statement today in reference to his contemplated action on the statements of General Miles concerning commissary supplies furnished the army. Egan has asked Miles whether the statements attributed to him were made by him, and also asked that an investigating commission be called for the purpose of rebutting and refuting the statements alleged to have been made by Miles. Egan is of the opinion that the proper place to discuss the matter is before the investigating commission and the courts, civil and military. He makes a complete denial of the statements alleged to have been made by Miles.

## FATAL GAS EXPLOSION.

San Francisco, Dec. 24.—Lieut. Hobson sailed for the Philippines on the steamer Goedic. He will report to Admiral Dewey upon his arrival and will undertake the work of raising the vessels which suffered severely from the attack of Admiral Dewey's squadron. An immense crowd gathered at the dock to witness the departure. Hobson's carriage had great difficulty in getting through the throngs which simply would not let him pass in quiet. He was upon cheers were given him and he was compelled at several points to say a few words. A public reception was held in Golden Gate park this morning, and Lieut. Hobson addressed the people from the pedestal of the Francis Scott Key monument.

## Favor Increase of Army.

Washington, Dec. 24.—Representative Hull, chairman of the military committee of the house, today filed with the clerk a report on the bill for the increase of the regular army. After detailing amendments adopted by the committee which have been set out in dispatches, the report says: "The committee believe that the organization as provided in this bill will make the most efficient military organization at lowest cost to the government of any organization proposed by any bill before congress."

## French Skirmish with Spaniards.

New York, Dec. 24.—A dispatch to the Herald from Singapore says: A French agent in Luang Prabang province having ordered a Siamese armed force to evacuate twenty-five kilometers of the same in accordance with the treaty of 1893, the Siamese refused and fired on the French agent and party who were unarmed. The latter retired into the jungle.

## Bailed for Spain.

Havana, Dec. 24.—General Arlos, Spanish military governor of Havana, delivered over the command today, and sailed for Spain to-morrow.

## Gas Explosion.

Shamokin, Pa., Dec. 24.—A terrific explosion of gas occurred today in the Luke Plater shaft, by which two persons were fatally injured, several seriously, and it is feared that some more were overcome by black damp.

## Volunteer Soldier Killed.

Dubuque, Iowa, Dec. 24.—A cablegram from Havana states that Henry Becker, a member of Company A, Fortieth Iowa volunteers, fell through a hatch while disembarking and was killed.

## EVACUATION OF CUBA.

Spanish Government Property Seemingly Transferred to Individuals. New York, Dec. 24.—The World publishes the following interview with Rear Admiral Sampson regarding the work of the Cuban evacuation commission: "The work is practically complete. We reached a satisfactory agreement upon all points except one. The commission was carefully instructed by the government to obtain a complete inventory of every piece of crown property upon which a just claim could be laid. When we asked a Spanish representative for an inventory we were told it had been sent to the peace congress at Paris. We demanded a copy, but never received it."

The town of Cagayan, which was defended by one of Aguinaldo's troops, has been taken and looted by the malcontents.

THE CITIZEN wishes all its friends and patrons a Merry Christmas.

The democratic flag furthers are in a hopeless minority in the United States.

In Brazil there are said to be 300 languages and dialects spoken by the Indians.

ANDREW CARNEGIE has joined the Bryan party and hereafter the democratic papers will speak in complimentary terms of him.

Local tradesmen are having all they can do to handle the Christmas trade, and the grocersmen especially are finding business lively.

The outlook is good for two canals uniting the Atlantic and Pacific. The Panama company has secured a new lease of life from the Colombian government.

The war bonds are now quoted at \$1.07 in the market and it may be confidently asserted that the nation's credit has not yet suffered from territorial expansion.

The magnitude of the Ecuador, the great Spanish palace, may be inferred from the fact that it would take four days to go through all the rooms and apartments, the length of the way being reckoned at about 120 miles.

The Deming health authorities have decided that all the Minnie valley below Dryer is free from small pox, but that north of Dryer there is too much of the disease to make the residents of that section very enjoyable acquaintances, and so they have quarantined all the country north of Dryer, and forbidden all people from the quarantined district coming into Deming.

**GROWING GREAT.**  
When it was announced some time ago that the United States was likely to become a creditor nation much incredulity was expressed. It was not deemed possible that the United States for many years could approach England in financial importance. Yet statistics prove that for the last eleven months Great Britain's imports, compared with the corresponding period of the previous year, decreased 3.79 per cent, and her exports of home products decreased 1.22, while American imports decreased 17 per cent and exports increased 15 per cent.

The exports for the calendar year 1908 will exceed those of any other year in our history, it being estimated that they will reach the enormous sum of \$1,250,000,000. The November exports were \$129,783,512, the largest in any month in the history of our commerce.

Of breadstuffs, the exports for the eleven months ending with November, 1908, are the largest in our history, being \$377,135,341 against \$233,311,617 in the great exporting year of 1907; provisions are for the eleven months \$118,417,850, against \$125,297,007 in the eleven months of 1907. Cotton for the eleven months amounts to \$192,333,391, a figure slightly below that of 1906, though the total number of pounds exported by far exceeds that of the corresponding months of any previous year, being for the eleven months 3,436,092,504, or measured in bales, 6,722,293, a larger total in bales or pounds than that of any full calendar year preceding.

But this is not the only indication of our commercial greatness. The statement is made that Russia and Japan are endeavoring to negotiate large loans in the United States. It is said that Russia is looking for \$300,000,000 and that Japan will try to obtain a sum nearly as large. The United States is growing in all directions.

**STATE CONSTITUTION.**  
The bill introduced in the senate by Senator Elkins, enabling New Mexico for statehood, provides that delegates shall be elected from the several counties to a state constitutional convention; such convention shall consist of eighty-one delegates, based upon a population of 1,900 for each delegate, according to the last census in New Mexico made by the United States, apportioned among the several counties within the limits of the proposed state, as follows: Bernalillo county, 11 delegates; Chavez county, 1 delegate; Colfax county, 4 delegates; Dona Ana county, 5 delegates; Eddy county, 1 delegate; Grant county, 5 delegates; Lincoln county, 2 delegates; Mora county, 5 delegates; Guadalupe county, 3 delegates; Rio Arriba county, 6 delegates; San Juan county, 1 delegate; Union county, 2 delegates; Santa Fe county, 7 delegates; Bernalillo county, 2 delegates; Socorro county, 5 delegates; Taos county, 5 delegates, and Valencia county, 7 delegates. And the governor of said territory shall by proclamation, order an election of the delegates aforesaid in said territory, to be held on the eighth Tuesday after the passage of this act, which proclamation shall be issued within ten days after the passage of this act.

Delegates shall meet in convention in the territorial capital on the fifth Tuesday after their election and shall organize the convention by the selection of a president and secretary from among the duly elected members of the convention, the oath to support the constitution of the United States.

All persons resident in said proposed state who are qualified voters of said ter-

ritory as herein provided shall be entitled to vote upon the ratification of the constitution, under such rules and regulations as said convention may prescribe in not in conflict with this act.

"The constitution shall be republican in form, and make no distinction in civil or political rights on account of race or color, except as to Indians not taxed, and not be repugnant to the constitution of the United States and the principles of the Declaration of the Independence."

"That perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and that no inhabitant of the state shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her mode of religious worship."

"Provisions shall be made for the establishment and maintenance of a system of public schools, which shall be open to all children of the state and free from all sectarianism."

Section 4 provided that in case a constitution and state government is formed in compliance with the provisions of the act, submitting the constitution to a vote of the people of the territory for ratification or rejection at a date not earlier than the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1909. The sum of \$100,000 is asked of congress as an appropriation to foot the cost of this constitution.

Mr. Ferguson introduced a statehood bill in the house on the 15th of December. The bill provides for a constitutional convention of seventy-eight members.

The Las Vegas grant has been decided favorably to the people of that city. The grant comprises 500,000 acres of land covering and immediately surrounding the city, and is estimated to be worth several millions of dollars.
