NICARAGUA CANAL.

Congress to Provide For the Construction of Big Ditch.

More Testimony Before the War Investigating Commission.

Banker Marsh Sentenced to Twelve Years in the Penitentiary.

SEN. BROOKE TO BE GOVERNOR OF CUBA.

Washington, Dec. 13.—At the senate opening, Berry gave notice of an amendment to the Nicaragua canal bill, providing for a direct appropriation for the construction of the canal and limiting the cost to \$15,000,000. The amendment provides for the construction of the canal by the Maritime Canal company, and gives the government a lien upon the property to be foreclosed under circumstances fully enumerated. Berry stated that one object of the amendment was to eliminate the bond feature of the bill. Another was to deprive the Maritime Canal company of any share of stock in the present bill, leaving the United States, Nicaragua and Costa Rica the only stockholders.

Rawlins also gave notice of an amendment to the Nicaragua bill providing that the act should not go into effect until the United States should secure by treaty the right to fortify and garrison the canal, send armed vessels through it in time of war and close it against any other nation with whom the United States may be at war.

Morrill addressed the senate on the bill authorizing the purchase of a site east of the capitol grounds for a building for the supreme court. The bill passed.

BANKER SENTENCED.

Ex-President of a Philadelphia Bank Sentenced to the Penitentiary. Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—Gideon W. Marsh, former president of the wrecked Keystone National bank, was today sentenced by Judge Butler, of the United States district court, to imprisonment for twelve years and three months and a fine of \$500. Marsh was charged with conspiracy in making false entries in the books and issuing false reports to the comptroller. It was thought probable that Marsh might make a statement implicating others with the crime, but he merely informed the court that his predecessor in the presidency of the bank had left a defalcation of over a million dollars, and that he, Marsh, had never profited a dollar through the bank's losses.

Killed by a Freight Train.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 13.—Seven Italian snow-broilers were killed and several injured on the New York Central railroad near Clifton today. They were struck by a freight train.

SWINDLED THE ROAD.

Received of a Railroad Road for Freight in Its Name. Toledo, Ohio, Dec. 13.—The Merchants National Bank of Baltimore has commenced a replevin suit in the United States court against the Ann Arbor railroad and Wellington R. Hurt. The bank alleges that while Hurt was receiver of the road, through fraud and gross deceit he received order of an order of foreclosure and sale and formed a syndicate to buy in the property, valued at \$100,000, for \$2,000,000. The petition avers that Hurt formed a syndicate to buy the bonds and then sold them at a big advance. It asks the court to vacate the order of foreclosure and sale.

MINE EXPLOSION.

Fatal Accident in a Coal Mine in Indian Territory.

Many Wild Rumors in Spain Regarding the Peace Treaty.

Five Deaths at Butte, Montana Caused From Smelter Arsenic Fumes.

INCREASE OF THE REGULAR ARMY.

Potomac, I. T., Dec. 13.—At 9 o'clock last night in mine No. 2 of the Indian and Hathway Coal company, three miles from this place, a terrible explosion took place. Five men are known to have lost their lives from the immediate effects of the explosion and about twenty three more are buried in the mine. The explosion was caused by ignition of the coal dust by a light. The timber work of the mine was blown far into the air, and the shattered remains immediately caught fire. Over one hundred men were in the mine at the time of the explosion. Only half have been accounted for. Those who escaped were employed in another part of the mine. There seems little hope of rescuing the entombed miners, as the explosion literally rent the subways asunder and there are hundreds of tons of earth to be taken away before they can be reached. A hundred men are working valiantly to rescue the comrades. They are driven away at times because of the intense heat. It is impossible to ascertain the names of those who have been killed and are buried in the mine.

ONLY TWO MEN KILLED.

St. Louis, Dec. 13.—A special from Fort Smith says that only two men were killed in the Wittville coal mines near Potosi, I. T., last night. It is believed they were the only men in the mine. They were shot down, breaking coal for the next day's work. The mine of the mine is blocked by the fall of rock loosened by the explosion.

Death From Arsenic Fumes.

Butte, Mont., Dec. 13.—Five deaths have occurred at Butte, which it is claimed have been caused by the dreadful sulphur arsenic fumes from the smelters. Many people are leaving. A mass meeting is called for to-night to take steps against the deadly nuisance. It is feared that violence may result.

THE ARMY.

The Contemplated Strength to be One Hundred Thousand Men. Washington, Dec. 13.—The adjutant general's office of the war department was well represented today at a hearing before the house committee on military affairs relative to the increase of the army. General Schwan detailed the organization of the army under the plan proposed in the bill which has the endorsement of the secretary of war. The total strength of the officers would be 4,721; enlisted men 96,797. Grand total 101,518.

Wild Rumors at Madrid.

Madrid, Dec. 13.—It is asserted that Premier Sagasta will obtain a royal decree dissolving the chambers before ratification of the peace treaty. It is further asserted that owing to opposition to the treaty in the United States the senate will not confirm it.

SOLDIERS FOR GARRISONS.

What Towns in Cuba, Porto Rico and Philippines Need Troops. Washington, Dec. 13.—When the house met today the previous question was ordered on the passage of a bill to amend the laws relating to shipping seamen. The bill passed.

On motion of Hay (Dem., Va.) a resolution was adopted calling upon the secretary of war for information as to what towns in Porto Rico, Cuba and the Philippines are required to be garrisoned, how many troops are necessary and how many soldiers are needed for the United States proper.

Santa Fe Company to Abandon Unprofitable Branch Lines.

Solemn Funeral Services Over the Remains of Gen. Garcia.

The American Federation of Labor Discussing Numerous Resolutions.

SECRETARY BLISS MAY RESIGN.

Topoka, Kan., Dec. 13.—At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Santa Fe railway the purchase of all branch lines operated by the company with the exception of those incorporated under the title of the "Chicago, Kansas and Western railroad," was approved. New information that President Biglow has decided to abandon every mile of unprofitable track. Some of the Chicago, Kansas and Western lines will be abandoned altogether and the mileage of others will be curtailed. The Chicago, Kansas and Western railroad includes 912 miles of track, and comprises twelve or fifteen branch lines built during the boom in Kansas.

Funeral of Gen. Garcia.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Solemn high mass of the Catholic church was performed over the remains of Gen. Calixto Garcia, at St. Patrick's church today before the body of the distinguished Cuban leader was committed to a vault in the national cemetery at Arlington. The service was notable in the distinguished gathering present. The honorary pallbearers were Generals Miles, Lawton, Wheeler and Shafter; Senators Thurston, Proctor, Mason and Munnery. The sermon was by Rev. John Ireland.

FEDERATION OF LABOR.

National Convention Discussing Many Important Labor Questions. Kansas City, Dec. 13.—At the session of the American Federation of Labor today a flood of resolutions were introduced. One resolution of particular interest was that offered by Delegate Samuel Butler, general treasurer of the National Garment Workers Union. It called upon the United States government to give the clothing to union shops for manufacture instead of to sweat shops. A telegram was sent at once to Washington making the demand set forth. James O'Connell, grand master of the Machinists Union offered a resolution giving the machinists jurisdiction over all men employed mechanically in the care of linotype machines.

Secretary Bliss May Resign.

Washington, Dec. 13.—It is probable that Secretary Bliss will tender his resignation within a short time. He has had the step under consideration some time, feeling it necessary that he devote his time to his large business interests.

There is a Rumor in circulation of a

rightful passenger train wreck on the Santa Fe Pacific, between Gallup and Winslow, where, Engineer Brocklett was seriously injured, if not killed. The news reached Mr. Brocklett's family residing here, this morning, and the Citizens queried Gallup for particulars. An answer was received at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon that no wreck had occurred, as far as could be learned at Gallup.

TRAVELING public libraries are now established in twenty-five states. At a recent library convention in one county in Wisconsin city librarians and promoters of the work were present.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY followed the fashion set in Europe regarding the czar's disarmament proposal. He endorsed unqualifiedly and then recommended an increase of the army and the navy.

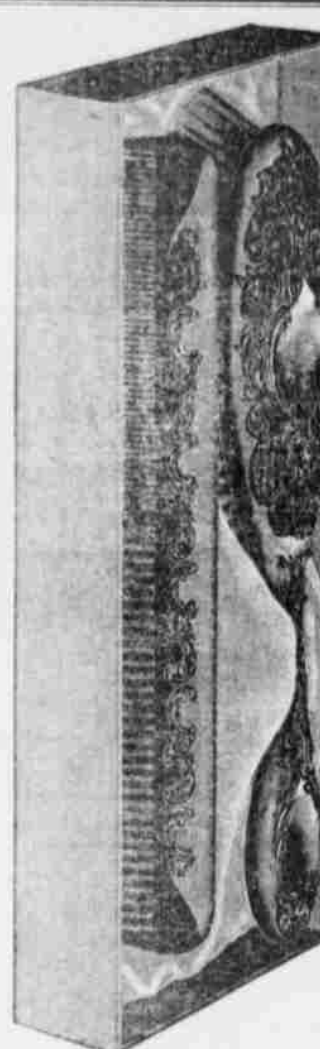
