## TREATY SIGNED.

## Peace Declared Between Spain and the United States.

## Battleship Massachusetts Meets With Accident Near Governor's Island.

## American War Vessels Being Painted a Peaceful Color.

## PRESIDENT MAY VISIT CUBA.

Paris, Dec. 10.—The treaty of peace was signed at 8.45 this evening. The long session this afternoon and the subsequent recess were due only to the fact that each article of the treaty had to be carefully read and compared in Spanish and English, and to the fact that the signing of the last article in Spanish was incomplete.

## President to Take a Trip.

New York, Dec. 10.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: It is reported that the president intends to visit Cuba and Porto Rico at the first favorable opportunity.

## Peaceful Paint.

New York, Dec. 10.—The work of painting the war vessels in the Brooklyn navy yard, white, the usual color in times of peace, has been begun.

## TRIAL OF QUAY.

Case of Senator Quay to be taken to Philadelphia Supreme Court.

Philadelphia, Dec. 10.—Supreme Court Justices Green and Williams today granted the writ allowing the defendants in the Quay conspiracy case to argue a petition for a writ of certiorari, removing the proceedings from the court of quarter sessions to the supreme court. The writ is returnable January 7. All proceedings are stayed meantime. Senator Quay's friends admit that the object in securing a delay of the trial is to take the case out of the hands of District Attorney Graham, who they say is an enemy of the senator.

## Dead.

Chicago, Dec. 10.—Judge John W. Shawwater, of the United States district court, died today of pneumonia. Judge Shawwater was born in Kentucky in 1844; was graduated at Yale and came to Chicago in 1867. He practiced law in Chicago until February, 1895, when he was appointed to the federal bench by President Cleveland. He was unmarried.

## Text of Insurance.

New York, Dec. 10.—The six-day bicycle race has become a contest of physical endurance between Miller, the last year's champion, and Waller, the "Flying Dutchman" from Boston. Miller has a strong favorite, but at 7 o'clock only nineteen miles separated the leaders. Out of thirty one starters, only twelve remained in the race this morning.

The score at 3 p. m. stood: Miller, 1,068 miles; Waller, 1,026; Pierce, 1,008; Albert, 1,708; Ginn, 1,690; Lawson, 1,720; Armstrong, 1,736; Nawn, 1,692; Forre, 1,648; Stevens, 1,701; Hale, 1,499; Julius, 1,105.

## Accident to a Battleship.

Washington, Dec. 10.—A telegram received at the navy department today from New York says that the battleship Massachusetts soon after leaving the New York navy yard to day for Hampton Roads, struck an obstruction near Governor's Island, and three of her compartment hatches were torn open. She was taken back to the navy yard at once and has been placed in dock. Her commander is Captain Niel Ludlow.

## Death of Prominent Citizen.

New York, Dec. 10.—I. M. Weston, of Grand Rapids, Mich., died here today of Bright's disease. He was formerly chairman of the Michigan state democratic committee, and was proprietor of the Grand Rapids Democrat.

## Sailed for France.

New York, Dec. 10.—President Rafael Iglesias, of Costa Rica, sailed today for France, on the steamship La Gasconne. He said: "I expect to be back in the United States by February."

## Burned.

Kutztown, Pa., Dec. 10.—The main building of the Kutztown Foundry and Machine company burned today. It contained valuable patterns. Loss, \$50,000.

## Found Guilty.

Paula, Kan., Dec. 10.—John Roberts, charged with the murder of his father, was today found guilty of manslaughter.

## Big Tobs Co. Company.

Trenton, N. J., Dec. 10.—Articles of incorporation of the Continental Tobacco company, were filed with the secretary of state today. The capital stock is \$75,000,000, half to be preferred with seven per cent non-cumulative dividends, payable quarterly.

WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT.

New Orleans, Dec. 10.—German-American debenture, another of the concerns promoted by Jasper W. Rice, who left the city just prior to the collapse of the Metropolitan bond and loaning association, is in a bad way. Today was the day for payment of subscribers, but the concern was unable to meet obligations. A large crowd of indignant holders of shares crowded in the office and blocked the Carondelet street sidewalk, clamoring for their money. Chief of Police Givens sent police to prevent trouble.

Railroad Accident.

Memphis, Mich., Dec. 10.—The south bound and north bound passenger trains of the Chicago & Northwestern collided head end at 8 o'clock today, 100 feet from Memphis, near the bridge. The north bound train, which was two hours late, carried seventy-five people. The engines were badly smashed. A number of passengers were slightly hurt. Some of the women fainted. H. Habraham, foreman of the north bound train, and Engineer Nichol Killian, of the south bound train, were badly injured.

Extra Session of Legislature. Topeka, Kan., Dec. 10.—Gov. Leedy has decided to call an extra session of the legislature to convene January 19 to consider railroad legislation.

Bank Statement.

New York, Dec. 10.—Weekly bank statement: Deposits received, decreased, \$304,650; loans increased, \$4,561,000; specie increased, \$2,004,200; legal tender decreased, \$1,143,300; deposits increased, \$2,882,300; circulation decreased, \$28,000. Banks hold \$10,743,300 in excess of requirements.

Denver is afflicted with organized bands of sneak thieves.

W. J. Eaton, of the Hazon Gazette, has filed suit in assumpsit against Union county.

For the quarter ending September 30, the exports from Manila to the United States aggregated \$62,960.27 in value.

Philadelphia contributes her share to the evidence of prosperity by advancing the salaries of her school teachers \$200 a year.

Free coinage of silver is a dead issue in the United States. This has been brought about without the aid or consent of any other nation.

The open season for the killing of antelope and deer came to an end on Wednesday, November 30. Sportsmen should "lock a leadie out."

The streets of Havana are being cleaned with military thoroughness and dispatch under American auspices. The refuse is towed to sea ten miles from land.

The senate in executive session ratified the treaty for the extension for the completion of the Mexican boundary for one year. There was no opposition and no debate.

The Peruvian government is studying the project of a new treaty with the United States, the principal novelty of which provides for an arbitration on all questions that may arise.

The report submitted to congress by the commissioner of fish and fisheries shows an expenditure of \$157,800 for the propagation of food fisheries during the fiscal year ended June 30.

GOVERNOR ATKINSON, of West Virginia, says the republicans have a majority of seven or eight on joint ballot in the legislature and that they will elect the next United States senator from that state.

The men who said the negroes would never be worth anything were not true prophets. There are between 75,000 and 80,000 negroes living at the national capital at Washington and their wealth is now very large.

RATON is sure to become a manufacturing town. Excellent coal, mined within eighty rods of the city, is delivered in the consumer's bin at \$2 a ton. There can be no scarcity, as the mountains are full of coal.

It is learned from Spanish sources that Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender, has succeeded in procuring two large loans aggregating in the neighborhood of 150,000,000 francs, or about \$30,000,000, in London and Paris.

The imports of specie for the week ending December 3 were \$150,524 in gold and \$29,404 in silver, a total of \$179,928, against a total of \$317,325 for the previous week and \$101,025 in the corresponding period of last year.

There will be no more bull fighting in the Santiago district of Cuba. Gen. Wood has given official notice that he will impose a fine of \$1,000 upon any person who promotes the first, and \$500 upon each promoter or spectator of the second.

The shocking discovery is made that there are many children that commit suicide in Germany. "Das Echo" of Berlin, in an article drawing attention to the statistics of German schools for the ten years from 1927 to 1936, shows that 477 school children committed suicide.

This entire end of Cuba west of Batabana and San Felipe is now clear of Spanish troops. The repatriation of the Spanish soldiers is going forward as rapidly as facilities permit, as General Blanco is no longer there to hinder, and his successor, General Castellanos, has no motive for delaying evacuation.

It is said that there is a big deficit from the Omaha exposition, created by the New Mexico commissioners, and that it is expected that the territory will foot the bill. The commissioners who attended the Omaha show knew exactly what they could spend, and it is not probable that the territorial legislature will make another appropriation.

In these days when so much of wilderness territory and desert waste is being reclaimed to cultivation in our own country it is interesting to note that the same process is going on abroad. The claim is made that no less than 15,000,000 acres of the Sahara desert have been made available for crop production through irrigation, secured by the aid of artesian wells.

THE EL PASO Graphic says that the question of storage reservoirs along the Rio Grande valley promises to attract much attention during the coming year. Not only has the attention of the government been drawn to the great import-

ance of encouraging irrigation enterprises, but vast sums of capital is entering the field for investment. The majority of western irrigation enterprises are successful, and the state of California has been made by them.

THE recent sale in Boston of the estate of Jernegan—who organized the company and engineered the scheme for extracting gold from sea water—showed that he was not only thrifty, but "imposing" in a parlay way than city. It is said that a parlay set, apparently of inland residence, was but imagination, and that hardly any of the Jernegan furniture proved to be what it purported to be.

AFTER repeated announcements, from Spanish sources, of the intention of the Philippines to fight, light and exterminate as there were any Americans in the Pacific to work on, it transpires that the insurgents have sent two commissioners to the United States for the express purpose of expressing their desire for peace under almost any condition.

THE latest scheme for feeding the poor of New York is to organize a corps of men to visit the 50,000 comfortable households, 19,000 boarding houses, and 5,000 hotels and restaurants in the city daily and collect the food which is left over from the abundant tables and which is ordinarily dumped into the garbage barrels.

THE present snow storm is extended as far south as Chihuahua, Mexico. Four inches of snow fell at El Paso yesterday.

THERE is already a great fall of snow on the high mountains, and next season's water supply is well assured.

SANTA FE.

From the New Mexican.

D. S. Lowitzki has the contract for supplying the legislature with fifteen desks and necessary tables, and the repairing of thirty-six desks and other furniture as may need it.

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## ALONG THE STEEL RAILS

Latest Items of Railroad Interest Gathered from our Exchanges.

### WHAT THE EMPLOYEES ARE DOING.

A number of engineers, firemen and shop employees are sick at Las Vegas from vaccination.

Four engineers and four firemen arrived in Raton from Topeka Sunday and were put to work at once.

The Santa Fe Railway company has purchased the Clark hotel at Newton and \$10,000 will be spent in remodeling it.

The new Player engine, numbers 935 and 937, have arrived at Newton from the Topeka shops for service on that division.

J. L. Lomenger has resigned his position as night operator at Raton and is succeeded by Frank Williams, of That-cher.

On December 1st, passenger engines were taken out of the pool, and since then each engine has had its own engineer.

The Santa Fe Railroad company is going to construct 100 furniture cars at their shops in Topeka. The cars will cost \$70,000.

The Santa Fe road claims to be hauling coal as fast as it is turned over to them by the Colorado Fuel and Iron company.

Master Mechanic Taylor is picking out three Baldwin engines to transfer to the Santa Fe Pacific road, says the Raton Reporter.

Engineer John Beeler, oldest in age and in service, who is employed on the Santa Fe Lamy branch, is sick and Webb Bissett is temporarily supplying his place.

The Optic says: The present passenger depot will be removed to a position just north of the freight depot, and will be converted into offices for several of the different departments.

A large double-headed planer is expected to arrive at Raton for the railroad shops in a few days. The foundation is ready to receive it and when in place it will be the largest machine in those shops.

The Santa Fe railway will shortly place a sixty-foot turn table in the yards at Trinidad. The one now in use is not large enough for the immense engines recently put into service on the mountain.

The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe has just landed a train load of heavy Kansas City, a distance of 1200 miles. They were taken through at once to the City of Mexico.

The Las Vegas Optic says: C. M. Taylor, master mechanic for the division of New Mexico; C. Winchell, general foreman at Albuquerque; and Alfred Parritt, boiler maker foreman, Albuquerque, were in the city yesterday, examining a number of engines which are to be sent to the Santa Fe Pacific.

The Optic says: Will. Prager, a well-known citizen of Roswell, was in the city on official business. He said that while good progress had been made on the construction of the new railway line from Amarillo to Roswell, the expectation now is that through trains will not be running before January 15.

The freight leading up to the tipple at the El Moro coke oven, gave way Friday with four loaded coal cars, and the whole business went down a distance of twenty feet. The freight and the cars were totally wrecked. A force of carpenters will at once rebuild the tipple. Business will be suspended several days. Fortunately no one was injured.

It is given out officially at El Paso that on the first day of January, the El Paso & Northern (the White Oaks) road will begin building at both ends from La Luz, N. M., to the Salado coal fields, a distance of about sixty-five miles. At the same time 4000 miners will be put to work in the coal mines owned by the railroad. The line will be completed to the coal fields by spring.

Railroad men will watch with interest the trial to be made this month by the Washburn to run a special train 480 miles in 480 hours. George Gould will be on the train, and it will start on its record-breaking tour at Detroit, with western destination at St. Louis. If the distance be covered within the time limit, it will be the best record ever made on an American railroad.

It is reported that several of the largest railroad companies in the United States are planning to move for a reduction in sleeping car rates. It is proposed to have all the roads in the country using Pullman cars unite in an appeal to this company to make a reasonable reduction in the rates charged for upper and lower berths in sleeping cars, and in rates for seats in the cars.

The security of coal in this city is worse than vexatious, says the Optic. The dealers are not able to fill half their orders, and everyone is kept on the rack for fear that when one load has been consumed they will not be able to get another. The railroad authorities, if possible, should make this condition of affairs to cease. No doubt the great rush of business on the road has much to do with it.

The Roswell Register says: H. C. Phillips, inspecting engineer for the Santa Fe company, came in Tuesday from a trip along the line of work. He says there is a good force at work on the other end and they are making rapid progress. It takes five dining cars, two kitchen cars, one office car, one commissary car and quite a number of sleeping cars to carry on the work. The table here is so good that everybody wants to work on the track-laying gang.

The Optic says: W. L. Alden has at the Las Vegas foundry an engine built by himself, some years ago. It is of the passenger class and has the following dimensions in inches: Track width 74, drive diameter 54, cylinders 14 by 24, top of stack from rail 17, boiler length 20. It is built to a scale of 1/2 of standard measurements, and is fired by gasoline. The Harvey eating house system once had it at a banquet in California, to have it taken down and the table.
