DISTRICT COURT NEWS.

Commissioners Make Report on Partition of Black Location No. 1.

Members Powers, Bonnell and Whiting, the three commissioners appointed to report on the feasibility of partitioning Black Location No. 1, which is involved in the case of Fred L. Whitney vs. M. S. Otero et al., filed their report in the district court this morning.

The commissioners report that the partition is not feasible because it cannot be done consistently with the interests of the estate.

The report is exhaustive and shows that the grant contains about 100,000 acres of land, to which there are forty-eight individual interests varying from the lowest of 112 acres to the highest of 34,723 acres, which is owned by M. S. Otero.

The two other principal owners are Joel P. Whitney with 19,316 and Pedro Perez with 8,276 acres. The grant is described as consisting of 20,000 acres of valley land and 80,000 acres of mountainous country.

It is rich in grasses and the bounteous supply of water is remarkable for this arid region. This makes the grant especially valuable for a cattle range and the small owners would therefore be greatly damaged by a partition of the property.

A view of the irregular form of the valley and mountains. The value of the mountainous portions would be materially reduced and the value of the valley lands would not be proportionately increased.

In the case of the Whitney Company vs. Noble Ferguson, judgment by default for \$147.80 has been entered.

In the case of the First National Bank of Albuquerque vs. W. N. McCallan et al., motion for an appeal was overruled.

Pedro Perez, Alejandro Sandoval and J. Sandoval were appointed commissioners in the case of the New Mexico & Southern Pacific Railroad Company vs. Policiano Archibque et al., to appraise the value of the lands to be taken by the railroad for its use and right-of-way in this county.
