## STIRRING UP STRIFE.

## Germans Said to be Giving Insurgents Encouragement.

## Southall, a Big Thief, Sentenced to Ten Years Imprisonment.

## Boston Thief Requested to be Arrested for the Crime in Chicago.

## GENERAL GARCIA AT WASHINGTON.

Manila, Dec. 3.—The Hong Kong newspapers have asserted that the attitude of the Germans are hostile to the insurgents. The Germans at Manila have circulated a statement saying that the Germans are thoroughly friendly towards the Filipinos. This statement is signed by the German consul and German business firms. The natives infer that the Germans are favorable to the independent faction. Advice from Gen. V. Herzig has been received from Gen. V. Herzig that the Spaniards have abandoned that town and that the insurgents with eight cannons advanced upon it November 24. Cádiz is the capital of a province of the same name on the island of Pansy. It is the residence of the Spanish governor, and has a population of over 11,000.

Panama Canal.  
Washington, Dec. 3.—Information has been communicated to the state department by Consul Hart that the house of representatives of Columbia has rejected the petition of the Panama canal company to extend the six years' term for construction of the canal. The company still has six years to carry on the work.

Asked to be Arrested.  
Chicago, Dec. 3.—Thomas Beckwith, of Boston, who was arrested at the Harrison street station and asked to be arrested, he confessed to the commission of \$15,000 from Niles & Co., Boston. His request was promptly complied with.

Beckwith, who had \$230 left of the \$15,000, said that he chose to give himself up rather than commit suicide, which he had first decided upon. Beckwith cried like a child.

## GEN. GARCIA CALLS.

The noted Cuban insurgent calls upon the president.

Washington, Dec. 3.—As a result of Gen. Garcia's call at the White House, the general has called a conference of the Cuban commission, and the Cuban representative, Mr. Quesada, to-day, for the general purpose of considering Cuban affairs in the light of views exchanged during the meeting with the president. Garcia refuses to discuss the call. His associates maintain the same reticence, except to declare that it was of a satirical nature, the idea being conveyed that it is likely to pave the way to an understanding all around.

## Sentenced to Long Imprisonment.

Fergus Falls, Minn., Dec. 3.—Link Thayer, tried on the charge of holding up the Great Northern express train on November 10, was convicted by a jury last night and was sentenced to twenty years in the state prison, the full limit of the law.

## Sentenced to Prison.

St. Paul, Dec. 3.—Charles Southall, whose dealings in fraudulent government time checks were said to have caused losses to the firm of \$100,000, over the country to an amount aggregating \$750,000, was to-day sentenced to ten years in the state prison, the full limit of the law.

## ATTORNEY DISBARRED.

Result of the Proceedings Against a Prominent Ohio Lawyer.

Cleveland, Dec. 3.—The report of the trial committee of the bar association on the disbarment proceedings against Senator Vernon E. Burke was presented at a special meeting this afternoon. The committee makes the following recommendations:

First.—That Vernon E. Burke be expelled from the Cleveland bar association.

Second.—That the secretary be directed to present a copy of these findings to the committee of investigation to be treated as a complaint in writing, authorizing such proceedings against Frank E. Dallenbaugh as they may deem proper.

Third.—That the secretary of the association be directed to present a copy of this report to the circuit court of Cuyahoga county for such action in the premises as the court may deem proper.

## CALL FOR BANK STATEMENTS.

Paris, Dec. 3.—There will be no joint session of the peace commission to-day. The Americans had a three-hour meeting to-day. The report from Berlin that Germany is negotiating for the Caroline Islands is confirmed from several quarters, although Count von Münster-Ledeburg, the German ambassador here, said that he knew nothing about the matter. The American commissioners are inclined to believe the report. It is looked upon as explaining the reluctance of the Spaniards to give the Americans an answer in regard to the Caroline Islands. The latest developments confirm the report that the Spaniards have been instructed not to yield until they made a good bargain.

## RESIST ARREST.

Minnesota Indians Resist Arrest and Trouble Feared by the Authorities.

St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 3.—The game warden at Sioux Rapids met several Indians in the woods and as each was carrying the carcass of a deer he attempted to arrest them for having violated the game laws. In the fight that followed the deputy was severely punished, and his rifle taken from him. The Indians warned him against following them, declaring that they never would be taken alive, and threatened to begin shooting the moment a posse appeared. Game Warden Fullerton has notified the authorities that he will pursue the Indians with a posse. Serious trouble is feared.

## Convicted of Embezzlement.

Pittsburg, Dec. 3.—Ex-Assistant City Attorney House on trial for aiding and abetting Major W. C. Moreland, former city attorney, in embezzling \$30,000, city funds, was to-day found guilty and sentenced to a year and ten months in the county workhouse and a fine of \$1,000. Moreland, who was sentenced to three years, was recently pardoned, after serving eighteen months.

## Diamonds Stolen.

Chicago, Dec. 3.—Jewelry and diamonds valued at \$4,000 were stolen last night from the apartment of Mr. and Mrs. Max Blumenthal, at the Great Northern hotel.

## Bank Stationers.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The comptroller has made a call for the condition of the national banks at the close of business on December 1.

## WISCONSIN VISITORS.

Stop in the City on Their Return from Launching of Battleship Wisconsin.

Probably one of the most elegant trains that ever crossed the continent reached Albuquerque shortly after 9 o'clock this morning. It carried a party of eighty Wisconsin people who were returning home from San Francisco, where they attended the launching of the new battleship Wisconsin. H. A. Campbell, of Chicago, had the party in charge.

They remained for about two hours in this city during which time they made excursions around the town and laid in a stock of Navajo blankets, Indian pottery, Mexican cases and other curios, which they will either keep themselves or give to friends in snow-bound Wisconsin as reminders of sunny New Mexico. M. W. Flannery escorted some of the party to the Commercial club and a considerable number paid a visit to old town where they were greatly impressed by the adobe houses and general Mexican appearance of the place. Quite a few carried cameras with them and took snap shots of the scenes which pleased them most.

## HEAVY SNOW STORM IN KANSAS.

St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 3.—The Atchafalaya and Santa Fe have boycotted the Chicago & Great Western, a circular on the subject setting December 3 as the date of the beginning of the trouble. It charges rate cutting as the reason for the boycott.

Among the most notable of the visitors were ex-Senator Philo T. Sawyer, of Oklahoma, Wis., who is rugged and vigorous at the age of four score years and two and who is one of the wealthiest and most influential citizens of the state as one of the most amiable of men: Senator Mitchell, of Milwaukee, whose term of office will expire on March 4 next; Lieutenant Governor Emil Baensch, of Manitowish, and ex-Congressman Isaac Stephenson, of Marquette, who are both aspirants for Senator Mitchell's seat in the senate; ex-Senator Stephenson, the father of the young lady who christened the battleship, and his brother, ex-Congressman S. M. Stephenson, of Michigan, and J. Koch, ex-mayor of Milwaukee.

Conversation with these gentlemen showed that they took a lively interest in the question of statehood for New Mexico and all seemed to think that their prospects were much brighter since the republican victory last November. Postmaster General had made the acquaintance of several of the gentlemen in Washington and the local postoffice situation was discussed. They offered him their condolences over the fact that his official days were numbered, but the postmaster assured them that he was not shedding any tears as he was going to be succeeded in office by his brother and it would all be in the family anyway.

The entire party expressed themselves as greatly pleased with their journey to the coast and were loud in their praise of the crisp, bracing climate of New Mexico. They also spoke many kind words of Albuquerque, which they characterized as a beautiful and metropolitan looking city.

They left for the north shortly after 11 o'clock and their next stopping place will be Denver.
