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## ANDREWS THE WINNER

Political Prognostications for the Several Counties in New Mexico in Tuesday's Election.

## REPUBLICANS AWAY AHEAD

Estimated 15 Counties Sure for Regular Candidate—7 Democratic, 3 Doubtful.

The New Mexican has taken pains to ascertain as correctly and as nearly as possible what the action of the voters will be on Tuesday in this Territory. The results of these inquiries are given below and they are believed to be fairly correct, although subject to the changes, vicissitudes and uncertainty of politics.

There are four candidates for delegate to the Fifty-ninth Congress. They are: W. H. Andrews, of Bernalillo; Republican; George P. Money, of Las Vegas, Democratic; B. S. Rodey, of Albuquerque, Rodey Independent, and W. S. Sandoz, of Albuquerque, Socialist.

Bernalillo County: The vote two years ago was 3,818 for Rodey, Republican; 421 for Ferguson, Democrat; a Republican majority of 3,397. The county is claimed by the regular Republicans by a plurality for Andrews and sure for the entire Republican legislative and county ticket.

Chaves County: Two years ago the vote stood 359 for Rodey; 883 for Ferguson; Democratic majority, 524. The county is conceded to be Democratic with slight hopes by the Republicans for one or two of the legislative and county offices.

Colfax County two years ago stood 1,450 for Rodey, 1,027 for Ferguson; Republican majority 423. The county is claimed by the Republicans on the legislative and county ticket this year, as well as for Andrews, the Republican candidate for delegate, by a fine majority.

Dona Ana: The vote in 1902 stood 1,221 for Rodey, 469 for Ferguson; Republican majority 752. The county is conceded to the Republicans on the delegate, legislative and county ticket, this year by fair majorities.

Eddy County, two years ago the vote was, 194 for Rodey, 456 for Ferguson; Democratic majority 262. The county is conceded to the Democrats on all candidates except probably for the house of representatives of the assembly.

Grant County: In 1902 the vote stood 849 for Rodey, 878 for Ferguson; Democratic majority 29. The county is placed in the Democratic column on the entire ticket, although it is believed that Senator Andrews will run well and several of the Republican candidates for legislative and county offices may receive majorities.

Leonard Wood: This county was organized after the 1902 election and it is impracticable to give the vote of two years ago; however, the county out of which it was taken gave Rodey, Republican, a majority of 182 in 1902. Members of the Republican Central Committee of the county are sanguine that Leonard Wood will give Republican majorities for the entire Republican ticket.

Lincoln: Two years ago gave the following result: 767 for Rodey, 675 for Ferguson. Republican majority, 92. The county is generally close but is claimed by the Republicans on the entire ticket by from 100 to 150 majority.

Luna: In 1902 stood as follows: 261 for Rodey, 243 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 18. The county is conceded to the Democrats on Tuesday next, although some of the Republican candidates on the ticket may be successful.

McKinley did well for the Republicans in 1902 by the following vote: 390 for Rodey, 174 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 216. The Republicans will in all likelihood carry this county next Tuesday by a fair vote for every candidate on their ticket.

Mora is one of the close counties of the Territory and is generally in doubt. Two years ago, the results were 1,281 for Rodey, 997 for Ferguson. Republican majority 284. Republicans there are sanguine of success this year for their entire ticket by small majorities.

Otero County is claimed by the Democrats right along, but two years ago it went for the Republican candidate, B. S. Rodey, by the following vote: 692 for Rodey, 474 for Ferguson. Republican majority, 218. The Republicans this year have strong hopes of gaining a plurality for Senator Andrews and of electing a part of the legislative and county ticket here.

Quay County is one of the three new counties created by the Thirty-fifth legislative assembly and the vote two years ago for the precincts now con-

stituting Quay County, was Democratic. The county is doubtful, and as it is claimed by the Democrats by a small majority, it is placed in the doubtful column.

Rio Arriba County came to the front two years ago with the following vote: 1,752 for Rodey, 899 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 853. It is figured out that the county will give still greater Republican majorities this year on the entire ticket.

Roosevelt County is one of the new counties created by the Thirty-fifth legislative assembly. The registration this year is 852. The county is Democratic and should be put down for the Democratic ticket by several hundred majority.

Sandoval County, which was a part of Bernalillo County two years ago, went solidly Republican, and although there are two Republican county tickets in the field, it can be safely asserted that it will return a grand majority for Senator Andrews and that in the neighborhood of a thousand or more.

San Juan County gave a Democratic majority two years ago, by the following vote: 346 for Rodey, 390 for Ferguson. Democratic majority, 44. The county in all likelihood will give the Democratic ticket between 75 and 100 majority, although Senator Andrews may run ahead and some of the Republican candidates may be elected.

Santa Fe County two years ago was Republican by the following vote: 1,630 for Rodey, 1,116 for Ferguson. Republican majority, 514. The Democratic-Catron-Republicans have combined here and the latter are supporting Delegate Rodey. Nevertheless, the county can be counted upon for a plurality for Senator Andrews.

Sierra County two years ago stood 426 for Rodey, 379 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 47. Sierra County will likely be carried by the Democrats by from 50 to 100 on some of the county offices, while it is believed that Senator Andrews and two or three candidates on the Republican county and legislative ticket will receive majorities.

San Miguel County two years ago was Republican by the following vote: 2,794 for Rodey, 1,984 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 810. The county is placed in the Republican column by a good plurality for Senator Andrews, and for the Republican legislative and county ticket.

Socorro County in 1902 stood: 1,463 for Rodey, 966 for Ferguson. Republican majority, 497. All reports agree that Socorro County will give Senator Andrews a nice majority and that the Republican county and legislative tickets there are safe for the Republican party.

Taos County two years ago stood: 1,159 for Rodey, 786 for Ferguson; Republican majority 373. There is a three-cornered fight on in that county and the Independent Republicans, although they should support Senator Andrews for delegate to congress, are, according to the last report, wabbling. The New Mexican therefore places this county in the doubtful column with the chances in favor of Senator Andrews for a plurality.

Torrance County will go into existence January 1st, 1905, as a county and will cast a separate vote for delegate and legislative and county tickets, November 8th. The county is strongly Republican, although there is an Independent ticket in the field. The candidates on the latter are, however, supporting Senator Andrews and the majority for him will be quite handsome.

Union County, two years ago, stood, 732 for Rodey, 711 for Ferguson. Republican majority, 21. The Republicans have made gains in Union County since the 1902 election and the county is placed in the doubtful column with the chances in favor of the Republicans for a majority for every candidate, including the head of the ticket.

Valencia County, two years ago stood, 1,998 for Rodey, 56 for Ferguson; Republican majority, 1,942. Torrance has been cut from it, but the county is sure for Senator Andrews by from 1,200 up, and the same majority for the legislative and county tickets. Summarizing, the New Mexican believes the political complexion of the counties in the Territory Tuesday next will size up on the delegate as follows: Republican: Bernalillo, Colfax, Dona Ana, Leonard Wood, Lincoln, McKinley, Mora, Otero, Rio Arriba, Sandoval, Santa Fe Socorro, San Miguel, Torrance and Valencia.

Democratic: Chaves, Eddy, Grant, Luna, Roosevelt, San Juan, Sierra.

Doubtful: Quay, Taos, Union. A table giving more definite figures and based upon reports and dispatches, which will be received tomorrow forenoon, will be published in tomorrow's issue of this paper.

**WRECK ON EASTERN ROAD.** Cresson, Pa., Nov. 4.—The Cleveland and Cincinnati express on the Pennsylvania Railroad ran into a light engine at Portage today. Three trainmen were injured and many passengers sustained minor bruises. Dan Hanna, son of the late Senator M. A. Hanna, who was one of the passengers, was slightly hurt.

## RUSSIANS RESISTING WITH DESPERATION

### Doggedly Contest Every Foot Won By Japs—Enormous Losses in Mikado's Ranks—Fleet May Attempt to Escape.

Shanghai, Nov. 4.—Advices say today that the Japanese assault upon Port Arthur continues with unabated vigor and that the Russian defense is dogged and determined. The northern portion of the fortress east of Kekwan mountain has been captured by the Japanese, who hold it under a furious fire. The fort on the inner line of the defenses was destroyed by an explosion of a magazine on November 2d. The casualties of the Japanese are reported to be enormous. The belief prevails that the Russian warships will make another attempt to escape.

**Direct From Port Arthur.** Shanghai, Nov. 4.—The British steamer, Victoria, which has just succeeded in running the Port Arthur blockade with a full cargo of beef, has returned here and confirms the reports that the Japanese have captured all the main northwestern positions of the fortress.

**Losses Have Been Heavy.** Che Foo, Nov. 4.—Chinese who left Port Dally yesterday evening report that batches of wounded Japanese who left Port Arthur last evening were then passing through Dally. They also report that during the recent battle fresh Japanese troops were constantly going to the front. It is widely reported at Dally that the Japanese killed or wounded in front of Port Arthur during the last three months approximate 40,000. Well informed Japanese here are confident that the Russian occupation of Port Arthur is fast approaching an end. The fact that General Nogi allowed the Associated Press dispatches to leave from the front indicates a confident spirit of the besiegers.

**Foreign Minister Denies Charge.** St. Petersburg, Nov. 4.—While no formal reply will be made to the Japanese protest regarding the use of Chinese clothing by the Russian troops, it is understood that Foreign Minister Lamedorf, when the protest was presented, informally denied the truth of the charge that there had been any violation of the Geneva convention. He explained that there might have been some isolated cases, where the Russian soldiers whose winter coats had not arrived, had donned the Chinese overcoats but not for the purpose claimed.

**Are Using Dogs.** St. Petersburg, Nov. 4.—A special from Mukden says the Japanese are using dogs to locate the positions of the Russian sentinels and outposts.

## FERRYBOAT SUNK IN COLLISION

In New York Harbor—All of the 150 Passengers on Board Were Saved.

New York, Nov. 4.—The ferryboat, Columbia, of the Wall Street Line, was run into and sunk today by the Norwich Liner, City of Lowell. There was no loss of life. There was a heavy fog on the river at the time of the collision. There were about 150 passengers and 17 teams on the Columbia at the time of the accident. All the passengers were taken off safely, but eight or ten horses were drowned. A thick blanket of fog which settled down over New York and the harbor during the night seriously disarranged traffic on the land as well as on the water. Elevated and surface cars suffered serious delays and thousands of persons were late in reaching the downtown district this morning.

## ONE HUNDRED WERE DROWNED

Two French Steamers Collide Off Algerian Coast and Awful Loss of Life Results.

Bona, Algeria, Nov. 4.—One hundred persons were drowned last night by the sinking of the French steamer Gironde, after having been in a collision with the French steamer A. Schaffino, near Herbillon, 23 miles from Bona. The Gironde left Bona with 110 passengers, of whom 100 were Algerian natives.

## OUTLAWS HAVE ELUDED POSSES

Wyoming Bank Robbers Give Pursuers Slip—Chase Will Be Continued.

Cody, Wyo., Nov. 4.—The Cody Bank robbers have escaped. Part of the posse sent from here has returned, saying that the timber in which the outlaws took refuge has been thoroughly beaten with no trace of the men wanted. The pursuit has not been given up.

## PARTY EMBLEM IN DISPUTE

Sandoval County Republicans Try to Settle Matter in District Court at Albuquerque.

Albuquerque, Nov. 4.—In the District court of Sandoval County, at Albuquerque, yesterday, a case styled "Aljandro Sandoval et al. versus Manuel Baca," came up for consideration. In this matter the plaintiffs allege that the defendants are not the regularly constituted Republican party of Sandoval County, and that they are not authorized to adopt and use the emblem of the same. A demurrer to the complaint to dissolve the temporary injunction that had been granted was heard and the demurrer was overruled. The case will be heard upon its merits when the answer is filed, which will likely be some time today.

The matter has stirred up much excitement in Sandoval. As is known there is an independent organization in the county, and it seems this organization is desirous of existing under the regular Republican emblem. The regular party is strongly opposed to this and being unable to adjust the trouble in any other manner, it had to be aired in the court. Immediate attention is demanded.

## GOOD CITIZEN PASSES AWAY

George W. Gentry Expired Last Night After a Brief Illness of But Six Days.

George W. Gentry, after an illness of but six days, with pneumonia, died at 9:45 o'clock last night at his home on Johnson Street. His death was very sudden, his friends not even knowing that he was seriously ill.

Mr. Gentry was a native of Kentucky, coming to Santa Fe from Owensboro, that state, something over a year ago, for his wife's health. The change of climate did not benefit her health as was expected, and she died shortly after coming here.

The deceased leaves a daughter, Miss Mayme, and one young son, George, who have the sympathy of the community in this their sad hour.

Mr. Gentry was a Mason, an Odd Fellow and a Knights of Pythias.

The funeral will be held from the family residence Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. George F. Sevier, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, officiating. The remains will be laid to rest in Fairview cemetery. The Masons will attend the services. Montezuma Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. Masons will have charge of the arrangements.

## ZUNI INDIANS PROGRESSING

With the Help of the Government Are Making Rapid Strides in Agriculture.

## THE NEW RESERVOIR

When It is Completed the Tribe Will Have Much More Land to Cultivate—Are Good Farmers.

Work is rapidly progressing on the reservoir which the government is building on the Zuni Indian Reservation in the western part of the Territory and when it is completed it will store 18,000 acre feet of water for the irrigation of 6,000 acres of additional farm lands, which will be tilled by the Zuni Indians. W. W. Jones, of San Marcial, who has just returned from there where he surveyed the western boundary of the reservation, which ends with the Territorial line, said in an interview with a New Mexican reporter yesterday that the government is doing much for the Zunis and it is evident that they appreciate it.

"The Zunis," said Mr. Jones, "unlike their neighbors, the Navahos, are not nomadically inclined, but stay on their farms from year to year, always adding to them and bringing them to a higher state of cultivation. They live in modern houses and farm on modern agricultural lines. There are many good sheep and cattle ranches on the reservation and the government extends every aid and encouragement to them."

"The new reservoir which is being built at a cost of about \$200,000, will, when completed, store the waters of the Rio Zuni and will give much more land to the Indians to cultivate. As it is, they are almost self-sustaining. There is a good school at Zuni and a new school building of stone is being erected at Black Rock, six miles from the agency. D. D. Graham, the agent, is well versed in Indian affairs and is very popular with the leading members of the tribe. They are good farmers and are exceptionally well equipped. In a day's trip over the reservation, I saw 63 good farm wagons and their horses and harness were in splendid condition. There is no question but that the Zuni realizes that Uncle Sam is his best friend and that he does his best to use to his advantage what is furnished him both in a material and an educational way."

## SAN MIGUEL REPUBLICANS

They Endorse Otero and Andrews—Strong Legislative and County Ticket Named.

Las Vegas, N. M., Nov. 4.—The Republicans of San Miguel County, in convention assembled, at Las Vegas, today nominated the following ticket: For the council, John S. Clark and D. C. Winters; for the house, B. G. Lynch, Pablo Vigil and Nestor Griego; probate clerk, Manuel A. Sanchez; assessor, Epitacio Quintana; probate judge, Gregorio Alcon; county commissioners, Robert C. Rankin and Benigno Martinez; sheriff, Cleofes Romero; treasurer, Eugenio Romero; superintendent of schools, Leandro Lucero. The convention strongly endorsed Governor Otero and the candidacy of Senator W. H. Andrews for Congress. Out of 220 delegates, 219 were present and the convention was one of the best and most enthusiastic ever held in San Miguel County.

## OFFICIAL MATTERS

Post Office Changes.

The name of the postoffice at Highrolls, Otero County, formerly Fresno, has again been changed, the new name being Mountain Park. Edgar F. Cadwallader has been appointed postmaster.

The star route from Conant, Quay County, to Sanchez, San Miguel County, has been increased 3.5 miles in length by making the terminal at Montoya, Union County, in place of Conant.



He is very popular and well known in the southern part of county, where, in addition to his official duties as surgeon of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company, he has an extensive practice. He is a very intelligent, educated and ambitious young man, anxious and desirous of making his way in the world and of being of service to his fellow citizens. His nomination was made at the request of the delegations from the southern part of the county in the Republican county convention and was at the request of the Republicans in that part of the county. He is respected and esteemed at his home at Madrid, in this city, and in southern Santa Fe County. If elected, there is no doubt that he will prove one of the best and most valuable members of the assembly. The people of Santa Fe County will serve their own best interests as well as those of the county by electing him by a handsome majority.

### BERNALILLO COMMITTEE NOMINATES WILKERSON FOR REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE DISTRICT INSTEAD OF CLARK M. CARR, SELECTED BY MCKINLEY COUNTY.

According to the Albuquerque Citizen the Republican committee of Bernalillo County has placed the name of Thomas N. Wilkerson, of Albuquerque, on the Republican ticket as candidate for member of the house of representatives of the Thirty-sixth legislative assembly for the district composed of Bernalillo and McKinley Counties, instead of Clark M. Carr, nominated for that position by the county convention of McKinley County. The Citizen gives the situation in the following:

"At a meeting today of the central committee of the representative district composed of Bernalillo and McKinley Counties, it was resolved to reject the nomination by the Republicans of McKinley County, and instead Thomas N. Wilkerson, of this city, was nominated by the committee for the position.

"The Citizen is informed that this change is made for the following reasons: There are thirty-five hundred Republican voters in Bernalillo County and only about 300 in McKinley County. That county did not send a delegation to the district convention to nominate a candidate for joint representative, and has not affirmed with the Republicans in the selection of the nominee. Mr. Carr is an excellent man and his family resides in this city, but his nomination is not satisfactory to the Republicans of this county, and hence his rejection, which is principally caused by the action of the Republicans of McKinley County ignoring the convention called to nominate a joint candidate for representative. Mr. Wilkerson is one of the ablest attorneys of this city, a radical Republican, a good speaker, and he will make a splendid record in the legislature. He will poll the full Republican vote of this county, and will be elected by a large majority."

### THANK YOU, MR. RODEY!

The editor of the New Mexican is under obligations to Delegate Rodey for a remark he made in a speech in this city on Wednesday evening last. He stated, so this paper is informed by a stenographer who took notes, that "It would pay the Territory of New Mexico to pension the editor of this paper at the rate of \$50,000 per annum in order to give some one else the public printing and to stop the fight of the New Mexican on joint statehood. The New Mexican is glad to hear that Mr. Rodey has such a good opinion of the paper and its editor and assures Mr. Rodey that a complete agreement exists between that gentleman and the editor of the New Mexican on the pension proposition. Indeed, this paper will go farther and will say to Mr. Rodey that it will meet him half way and will take less per annum than he suggested, although there is no doubt that the views of this paper on the joint statehood question will help to defeat the joint statehood project and that in a great degree. Right here it is the duty of this journal to remark that its position on the joint statehood issue is taken because it sincerely and conscientiously believes that the great majority of the people wish only for single statehood within the present Territorial limits and under the present name and that this majority is willing to wait for some time in a Territorial condition rather than accept joint statehood with Arizona during their coming year.

"Santa Fe is the political storm center of this Territory,"—Albuquerque Citizen.

Beg your pardon. It has been very quiet here during the entire campaign and is rather dull at present. To be sure, there has been great activity at Territorial Republican headquarters, where Chairman Bursum, Secretary Safford and a corps of stenographers and clerks have been actively engaged in campaign work; in the city and county there are political campaigns now on, but there are no storms and there are no political disturbances. Each side is trying to win and the candidates on each party ticket are at work, but all in a peaceful and quiet manner. The esteemed Citizen should try again.

Delegate Rodey, in a speech at the court house, on Wednesday evening, asserted that the plot to undo him was hatched in the office of this paper several weeks before the Albuquerque convention which nominated Senator W. H. Andrews as the candidate of the Republican party for delegate to Congress. There is no use in denying this soft impeachment, but it is well to remark here that of late Mr. Rodey's assertions and statements have been rather erratic and a good many of them were not and are not based upon facts. To be sure, no one blames Mr. Rodey for being disappointed, but he should not allow his disappointment and his chagrin to run away with him.

A recent issue of the Albuquerque Citizen teems with editorial paragraphs advocating the election of Senator W. H. Andrews, the regular Republican nominee for delegate to Congress. Better late than never.

### PARKER IS EITHER GULLIBLE OR UNSCRUPULOUS.

Judge Parker has evidently been goaded by Chairman Tom Taggart and his conferees of the Democratic National Committee into some activity and into making some rather ill-advised and improper speeches. In fact, during the past two weeks, Judge Parker has not at all come up to the expectations of the people, both on his own political side and in the Republican party who thought very well of him until he commenced to make statements and assertions not borne out by facts and until he plunged into accusations against President Roosevelt and Republicans of national reputation, which, to say the least, were based upon heresy and rumor only. This phase of the campaign has been taken up by the leading papers of the country, one of them, the Kansas City Star, very influential in parts of the middle west and independent in party politics, says that Judge Parker was regrettably disingenuous in his Madison Square Garden speech recently. In discussing the relations of Mr. Cortelyou to the administration and the Republican campaign he constantly regarded him as still the Secretary of Labor and Commerce, knowing, of course, that Mr. Cortelyou observed the proper ethics of the situation when he resigned his Cabinet position before he took charge of the canvass.

But that was not Parker's worst offense. He once more demonstrated that he is either the most gullible or the most unscrupulous man ever chosen by a great party for the Presidency. Opinion will incline toward the former theory, for the reason that the Democratic nominee has repeatedly made himself ridiculous by accepting figures and statements from the most reckless advisers. But through over-confidence in those who have his ear, or through an audacity that would be amazing in any man aspiring to the Presidency, he charged Mr. Roosevelt with having selected Mr. Cortelyou for chairman in order that the former Secretary might "hold up" those corporations about which he had gathered information. In other words, he accuses the President of first collecting evidence of unlawful practices on the part of the trusts, and other big concerns, and then giving them assurances of immunity from prosecution in consideration of big campaign contributions.

Thus Judge Parker accepts the absurd representations of his own Wall Street promoters, made to cover their own stupendous scheme to gain control of the government by the generous use of money.

In giving his name and his utterances to such a charge Judge Parker does much more harm to himself than to the President. He cannot make even Democrats believe that President Roosevelt, who has courageously and persistently worked for high political government standards and who has disregarded mere political expediency more than any of his predecessors, would be guilty of making a bargain with the grafters whose special privileges he has crossed in the enforcement of the laws.

That sort of thing will not go down with the American people. Roosevelt has kept himself freer from undesirable obligations than any other man who has run for the Presidency on either the Democratic or the Republican ticket since the Civil War. If elected he will go into office untrammelled. And not even Judge Parker—whether he is himself deceived or whether he is merely doing the bidding of politicians he knows to be unscrupulous—can injure the President by this amazing attack.

The Democratic campaign managers are endeavoring to deceive the voters by disreputable fiction and by untrue and venomous attacks on Republican candidates and on the Republican Territorial administration. The voters should not be deceived by these low tactics and the New Mexican thinks they will not be. The charges made by the Democratic bosses and their allies, Delegate Rodey and some of the so-called Independent Republicans, have either no foundation at all or are misstatements of facts or are garbled extracts from the records, statements and speeches of Republican candidates. It is certainly high time that the voters were no longer caught by such chaff and the New Mexican thinks that they will not be in this case. It certainly looks remarkably well for the Republican legislative and county tickets in a majority of the counties of the Territory, and indeed it seems as if an absolute majority for Mr. Andrews is assured.

Judge Parker is doing some strenuous work for his election these days, in the way of making speeches, addressing delegations and writing letters. He is rather late in the day. He is already distanced and cannot by any possibility make a home stretch in such a manner as to beat President Roosevelt.

Mr. Rodey in his speech boasted of what he did for the people of Santa Fe by giving them Fort Marcy, so that their children might be educated. Well, it's a cinch that he couldn't have given it to Albuquerque, although the chances are that he would have tried to do so if he had had the necessary transportation facilities.

It seems that the so-called Independent Republicans of Bernalillo County have endorsed the regular Republican legislative and county ticket, but have hoisted the name of B. S. Rodey at the head of the ticket as their candidate. This is a peculiar condition of affairs and the only explanation of it will be found in the result of the election in that county Tuesday next. With fair play on the part of the regular Republican organization, which has the distribution of ballots at its disposal, well posted correspondents of the New Mexican believe that Senator Andrews should and will receive a plurality ranging from 1,200 up. A few days will tell the tale. Whatever the result, the Republican campaign managers in the county will do well to remember that the people will not forget.

From Mr. Rodey's tale of woe as told in this city on Wednesday evening last, it is fair to presume that he is very guileless and innocent when it comes to political affairs in New Mexico. Indeed, he may be called verdant and green, if he really believes this statement, that as late as thirty-six hours before the Albuquerque convention on September 12th, he was sure of the re-nomination as candidate of the Republican party for delegate to the Fifty-ninth Congress. In another part of his speech, he said that the nefarious and wicked treachery in his case was hatched in the office of the New Mexican six weeks before that time. If he believes this latter, his verdancy and freshness are still more remarkable.

After hearing the speeches of Delegate Rodey and Mr. Catron on Wednesday evening, one of the listeners said they reminded him of a time when he was caught out in a storm. It was a fearfully dark night and the thunder was terrific, but there was very little lightning, so he thought he would pray, and he did so by saying: "O Lord, if it makes no difference to you, I would like to have more lightning and not quite so much thunder."

Every good citizen, regardless of party, should vote for Teleforo Rivera for assessor on Tuesday next. He is a reliable, honest and respectable citizen, a property owner and head of a family. He has served the people for two terms in that office some years ago and gave satisfaction by the fair and impartial manner in which he performed his duties. Give him your vote on election day and you will have no cause to regret it.

Benito Lujan, Republican candidate for probate judge is a clean and honorable man, courageous and intelligent. With him in the office of probate judge, estates of deceased persons will be closely and carefully looked after and he will see to it that administrators do their duty honestly and efficiently.

E. C. Abbott, Republican candidate for member of the council from this district, is making a gallant fight for election, and if elected will make the same kind of a fight for the best interests of the county, in the coming legislative assembly.

Very encouraging news comes from Socorro County, and it looks as if the Republicans there would give Senator Andrews and their legislative and county ticket a very satisfactory majority. The people of the county will serve their own best interests by doing so.

Another indication that the Roosevelt-Fairbanks ticket will be successful next Tuesday: Dr. Mary Walker is strongly supporting the Parker-Davis candidacy.

## THE HAGAN COAL FIELD

Opened By the New Mexico Fuel & Iron Company and Tapped By Santa Fe Central.

IS VERY GOOD FUEL

Outclasses the Colorado Mineral and These Deposits Promise to Excel Any in the Southwest.

President W. R. Keyes, of the New Mexico School of Mines at Socorro, in a recent issue of the Engineering and Mining Journal, published in New York, contributes a very well written and interesting treatise on the Hagan Coal Field in Sandoval County. The article gives much valuable information and is herewith re-published for the benefit of the readers of the New Mexican:

"The newly-opened coal-field at Hagan, in Sandoval County, half way between Santa Fe and Albuquerque, New

Mexico, shows some instructive features of the Cretaceous coals of the Southwest. The coal deposits lie near the middle of a broad synclinal valley, about 25 miles wide, between the Santa and Ortiz mountains. They have been opened chiefly by the New Mexico Fuel & Iron Company, and are tapped by the recently constructed Santa Fe Central Railway, that is to form the connecting link of a new short line between Denver & El Paso. Terminals of the railroad are situated also at Torrance, on the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific; at Santa Fe, on the Denver & Rio Grande; at Kennedy, and soon will be at Albuquerque; on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe.

"The coal and its associated beds outcrop chiefly along the canon formed by the San Pedro arroyo. The main exposures are practically continuous for eight miles. There are now three principal camps: Una de Gato, the Coyote and the Pinavittos.

"The coal measures are chiefly massive yellow sandstones and sandy shales, with some clayey shales, the latter usually inclosing the coals. The coal-bearing sandstone formation rests upon the 'red beds,' and these in turn upon the Carboniferous blue limestones, which attain a great thickness. The coal measures are of Cretaceous age.

"The general structure of the coal measures about Hagan is as follows:

"From this it will be seen that there are at least four massive sandstone formations alternating with shales. In two at least of the latter there are coal deposits. These formations are quite persistent throughout the entire coal field.

"The coal beds and associated sandstones and shales are inclined about 15 per cent. At the southern end of the Hagan field, at the Una de Gato, the dip is nearly north, while eight miles north, in the Pinavittos field, the dip is eastward. At first sight the country appears to be faulted more or less, the similarity of the heavy sandstones crowning the different ridges seeming to substantiate this view. More careful examination, however, clearly demonstrates that the capping of each ridge is a distinct sandstone. Good, continuous rock exposures for over a mile back of the Hagan slope show that there are no faults of any consequence within this distance, and the coals must be very favorably situated for advantageous mining.

"The sandstone formations above the 'Red Beds' are in the aggregate probably over 6,000 feet thick, and there is ground for believing that in this great thickness there is more than one group of coal beds.

"The coals at Hagan may be grouped as follows, with the distances between them indicated:

"The district known as the Coyote coal field lies about four miles north of the Hagan slope. The main arroyo is the one that passes by Hagan and runs northwesterly to the Rio Grande. The coal exposures are in a side arroyo. The character and sequence of the rocks are essentially the same as at Hagan, the two fields being continuous.

"At the main slope opened in the Coyote field the following section is shown:

"The only important fault observed in the Hagan district is a few feet north of the Coyote slope. It strikes about north 70 degrees east. Owing to this fault the coal mined in the Coyote drift (south mine) and that mined in the middle and north drifts, while in the same narrow gulch, are in horizons several hundred feet apart.

"The Pinavittos field lies three miles north and a little west of the Coyote field, and is similar to that field in all essential respects, except that there are no indications of marked faults. There are at least three seams of good coal, each about four feet thick, with a dozen other thinner seams. The exposures are over a mile long, and practically continuous. The coal-doubtless extends unbroken north and south of the outcrops. The beds reach the Coyote field, as is shown by drill-holes in the intervening mesa.

"The coal in the Hagan district is an exceptionally good steam coal, as is shown by the following analysis, made at various laboratories, and by comparisons with coals from other regions:

## NEWS NOTES OF THE RAILWAYS

What the Santa Fe is Doing and the Outlook for Next Year—The El Paso Union Station.

Indications are that the Santa Fe Railway will do a large freight business from California this year. California, it is said, will produce 27,000 cars of oranges and lemons this year, of which, it is said, the Santa Fe will haul more than 16,000. The road will also haul out of California 1,000 cars of celery, 1,000 cars of walnuts and 2,000 cars of beans. Not less than 80 per cent of this large amount of freight will be carried the full length of the system, from California to Chicago. It is predicted by the officials of the road that the freight traffic this year will break all previous records.

Notwithstanding the fact that the floods in New Mexico and vicinity played such havoc with the Santa Fe Railway system, plans for the expenditure of thousands of dollars the coming year are now being made, and it is probable that the amount invested in improving the system will exceed that of the year just closing.

General Manager M. U. Mudge is a busy man, but he finds time to make regular trips to Denver. He spent yesterday here in his official capacity, arriving from his home in Topeka in the morning and leaving again last night. "The year has been unusually disastrous for the Santa Fe," said Mr. Mudge recently, "but the road has practically recovered from the most recent trouble, the floods in the south-west, and the trains in that vicinity are again running practically on schedule time."

"What those washouts will cost the road in money I am unable to state at present. In all about 600 miles of road was affected, and in the worst places temporary tracks have been built. The chief engineer is now making surveys, and it is probable that numerous changes will be made when the system is permanently repaired. It is therefore almost impossible to say what it will cost to repair the damage."

"During the coming year the road will probably spend a good deal of money in general improvements, and work on the budget to be presented to the president the first of January is now under way. Of course, the recommendations made may not be carried out, but I understand it is the idea to put a good deal of money into the system."

"During the year just closing much work has been done, especially along the line of ballasting, bridge work and the laying of heavy rails. And we will not have to put any money into motive power the coming year, quite an item in itself, as we have but recently purchased 129 of the finest locomotives that can be bought."

"Work of laying the double track between Kansas City and Newton, Kansas, is going ahead as rapidly as can be expected, and it may be completed during the coming year. The distance to be covered is 184 miles, and already 112 miles of the road have been equipped, leaving but 72 miles."

"I understand that the foundation of the new union station at El Paso is now in progress of construction, and I think the contract calls for the completion of the building within a year. The structure will cost \$275,000, and will be utilized by the Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Texas & Pacific, El Paso & Southwestern, El Paso and North-western and Mexican Central."

The stockholders of the New Mexico Town Company and the Rio Grande Land Company, auxiliary companies of the Atchafalaya Topoka & Santa Fe Railway met here yesterday forenoon at the First National Bank and re-elected the boards of directors and the officers who served last year.

The receipts of the local postoffice for October were 18 per cent higher than the receipts for the corresponding month last year, the total, outside of

the money order fees and receipts, amounting to \$1,409.62. There were sold during the month 10,806 one-cent stamps, 39,533 two-cent stamps, 1,094 stamps of higher denomination and 15,416 stamped envelopes.

El Nuevo Mexicano, the Spanish paper printed by the New Mexican Printing Company, was this week printed a day ahead of time in order to reach the towns in the various counties of the Territory before election day. The issue was printed and mailed today and ran away into the thousands.

A Republican campaigning party consisting of several candidates started yesterday for the northern part of the Territory on a speechmaking tour. The party will return to this city tomorrow afternoon to attend the ratification meeting to be held at the court house tomorrow night.

Fair weather tonight and tomorrow is the forecast of the local weather bureau today. Yesterday the thermometer registered as follows: Maximum temperature at 1:05 p. m., 50 degrees; minimum temperature at 6 a. m., 31 degrees; mean temperature for the 24 hours 40 degrees; relative humidity 58 per cent. The temperature at 6 a. m. today was 31 degrees.

A party of Santa Clara Indians arrived in the city last night from St. Louis, where its members have been at the Exposition since its opening. Among them were Chief Pedro Cajete, the governor of the Santa Clara's, his daughter and Aniceto Suez and his wife. They brought back many trophies from the Pike, including some of the work of other Indians tribes at the fair, with whom they traded.

A New Mexican correspondent at Embudo writes that Delegate Rodey and Chairman J. H. Crist of the Democratic Territorial Central Committee were expected there on the arrival of the Denver & Rio Grande train in order to go to Taos, where a meeting was to have been held this evening by them. The correspondent says that Messrs. Rodey and Crist failed to arrive and that the crowd which had assembled to escort them to Taos went away disappointed and chagrined.

In the mandamus proceedings in the Tres Piedras precinct, in which Frank Bolten et al endeavored to secure a mandamus compelling the board of registration of the precinct to register them as legal voters and which were heard this morning, before Judge John R. McFie, a dismissal of the petition was the result and the temporary mandamus heretofore granted in the case was dissolved. The petitioners claimed that they were legal voters in the precinct and that the board of registration would not register them. After hearing argument by counsel, the case was thrown out of court, no cause for the issue of the mandamus being established, petitioners presenting no testimony.

News has been received in this city that R. W. Webb, for about eight years a resident of this territory and of the southern part of this county, died in Los Angeles, California, on Tuesday last. He was editor and proprietor of a weekly in this city during the years 1878-79-80, and thereafter published a small weekly at Golden. Chief Justice W. A. Vincent appointed Webb clerk of the first judicial district court in 1885 and it is understood that this appointment led to Judge Vincent's removal by President Cleveland. The deceased was also one of the main factors in the litigation which involved the title to the extensive copper mines in San Pedro held by the Santa Fe Gold & Copper Company, which litigation resulted in the closing down of the extensive mining operations in these mines in the early '80's. These mining properties were situated on the Canon del Agua land grant, which as a result of the litigation was declared invalid and the lands contained therein were returned to the public domain.





### ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

Sandoval, N. M., Oct. 27, 1904.

A delegate to the congress of the United States.

One member of the Territorial legislative council, by the counties of Sandoval, Bernalillo and McKinley.

One member of the legislative house of representatives.

One County Commissioner, First district, for the term of two years.

One County Commissioner for the Second district, for the term of two years.

One County Commissioner, Third district, for the term of four years.

One Probate Judge.

One Clerk of the Probate Court.

One School Superintendent.

One Sheriff.

One Assessor.

One Treasurer and Ex-Officio Collector.

One County Surveyor.

Five River Commissioners.




**CARRY THEIR LIVES IN THEIR HANDS**

Undoubtedly the most thrilling sight of the Free Street Fair and Carnival, which commences November 14 and continues six days and nights, will be Diavolo looping the loop.

There are two men with the Nat Reiss Southern Carnival Company which aggregation will furnish the shows for the carnival, who undergo, twice daily, the most novel and thrilling of sensations, and whose lives hang by a thread in their dangerous calling.

They face death without a tremor, and each time when they have finished

starts from the top of the steep incline on the heavy bicycle he has plenty to think of. His main effort is to keep the wheel true to the narrow black stripe painted down the incline and around the inside of the loop, for it is the pathway of peril that he must truly traverse or else meet serious injury or death. The slightest deviation from it may mean his instant destruction, and he is so busy keeping the wheel true to its course that he often forgets his danger altogether. Diavolo declares that the rush through the air is terrific, and the sensation of



their dangerous duties and have come through the "death trap loop," they feel somewhat like the doomed who are reprieved within the shadow of the noose. The courageous mortals are Diavolo and his understudy, Mons. Magri.

It required months to learn to master their gravity-defying act with success, and when Diavolo shoots down the incline and flies around the circle like a shot from a cannon, being a half second head downward at the top of the loop, he combats gravitation with centrifugal force, and presents a most novel suggestion of extreme peril. His manager declares that he is loath to describe just what it feels like to loop the loop, but he does say that in the few brief seconds from the time he

suddenly turning upside down and then right-side up in a second is peculiar, to say the least. He is fully conscious every second of his flight. He keenly realizes the danger, but it does not trouble him in the least, and he never worries or thinks about it until it comes. It is safe to say that two men with a more dangerous calling have never been in Santa Fe, and there is not a life or accident insurance company in the country that will give them a dollar's worth of insurance. Yet, face to face with death, they live on, manifestly happy and indifferent, with nerves apparently undisturbed and with less anxiety than the spell-bound audiences who watch their perilous flights.

**PUBLIC SCHOOL NOTES**

The total enrollment at the Santa Fe public schools for the month of October just passed exceeded the enrollment of the same month last year by 50. The number of cases of tardiness for the month just closed was less than one-third as great as it was during the month of October of the last school term.

Miss Amelia Gutterman, of the Second Ward, had an average daily attendance of 65 pupils, and not one case of tardiness during the month. Mrs. Hall had a total enrollment of 59 pupils and her per cent of attendance was 95.2, while Miss Simpson was a close second with a per cent of 95.1, and Professor W. R. Twining next with a per cent of 95.

Hon. T. B. Catron, president of the Board of Education, visited the schools last week and made several instructive talks to the pupils, which were much appreciated.

The excavation for the new Central High School building is 15 feet deep and is now ready for Contractor Winsor to begin work.

The Board of Education has succeeded in selling all its school bonds and the money has been paid. Everything is now clear for the prosecution of the work upon the new school and it will be pushed rapidly to completion. The bonds were purchased by Fuller, Parsons & Snyder, of Cleveland, Ohio, and sold at par.
