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PEREA IS ELECTED.



Republicans Carry the Territory by a Big Majority.

Republicans do not Lose a Man in Bernalillo County.

Legislature Republican by Two-Thirds Majority in Both Houses.

GLORIOUS REPUBLICAN NEWS.

Santa Fe, Nov. 9.—Headquarters of the Central Committee.—From official returns received here, Perea, republican, is elected by a majority of 2,300 over Ferguson, democrat, in the first district. The balance of the legislature is republican by two-thirds or more. Ferguson's majority is two years ago was 1,900. This election was on the St. Louis platform.

LATER TELEGRAM.

Santa Fe, Nov. 9.—Perea, republican, is elected delegate to congress by not less than two thousand majority. The secretary of the democratic committee concedes the defeat of Ferguson. The republicans have elected three-fourths of both houses of the legislature. The republicans have elected Catron, Anicheta, Romero, Chavez, Finley, Hughes, Burns and Martinez beyond a doubt and claim the election of Aguilar, Romero and Duane. The election of Richardson, democrat, to the council, is conceded. Returns from San Miguel and Guadalupe counties are meagre, but indicate the election of the republican candidates. The result of the election is regarded as an unequivocal endorsement of the St. Louis platform. This places New Mexico in line for admission as a state at the next session of congress.

STILL LATER TELEGRAM.

Santa Fe, Nov. 9.—The following is the estimate prepared by the republican central committee of the territory at 3 o'clock this afternoon, based upon advices received from the various counties in the territory:

Majorities for Perea—Bernalillo, 400; Dona Ana, 250; Mora, 300; Rio Arriba, 100; Sandoval, 200; Santa Fe, 500; Taos, 300; Lincoln, 100; Valencia, 1,300; San Miguel and Guadalupe, 150. Total, 3,600. Majorities for Ferguson—Colfax, 300; Chavez, 325; Eddy, 300; Grant, 500; Lincoln, 200; Sandoval, 200; Santa Fe, 250; Taos, 200. Total, 1,900, giving a majority for Mr. Perea of 2,700.

The republican central committee also claim the election of the following republicans for the council: P. D. Burns and Malquisa Martinez, from the counties of Taos, Rio Arriba and San Juan; T. B. Catron, from the district of Santa Fe county; Thomas Hughes, from Colfax, from Bernalillo; J. F. Chavez, from Valencia county; H. O. Burns, from Sierra and Socorro; J. A. Anicheta, from Grant and Dona Ana; with chances for a vote of the following republicans: J. S. Duncan, Eugene Romero, from San Miguel and Guadalupe counties; J. R. Aguilar, from Colfax, Mora and Union counties. The committee concedes the election of G. A. Richardson, democrat, for the house of representatives; the election of the following republicans: Venecio Jaramillo, Rio Arriba county; Pedro Sanchez, Taos county; Frank Stajin and A. D. McIntosh, from Lincoln and San Juan counties; Victor Ortega and Wm. Kilpatrick, from Santa Fe county; Max Luna and R. J. Kora, from Valencia county; P. A. Romero, from Mora county; from Bernalillo county, Knillano L. Gutierrez, Marcelino Baca and Pablo Crespi; Frank H. Winston and Pablo Trujillo from Socorro and Sierra counties; W. B. H. Llewellyn from Dona Ana and Grant counties; Marcel Valdez from Dona Ana county; R. P. Barnes from Grant county.

Thanksgiving Proclamation

Executive Office, Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 7, 1908.—Whereas, the president of the United States has designated and set apart by proclamation Thursday, the 24th day of November, A. D. 1908, as a day of national thanksgiving, and has recommended that his fellow citizens on that day come together in their several places of worship, for services of praise and thanks to Almighty God for all blessings of the year; Now, therefore, I, Miguel A. Otero, governor of the territory of New Mexico, do hereby recommend that the people of this territory observe the same.

It is further recommended that the said 24th day of November, A. D. 1908, be treated as a legal holiday in New Mexico.

Let us then refrain from all unnecessary labor, and in our homes and respective places of worship, give thanks and praise to him who holds the souls in the bosom of his hand, and through whose beneficent wisdom, not only in this territory, but the whole nation, has been supremely blessed during the past year.

Let us thank him for the bounteous harvest, for the timely rains and the glowing sun, which have given us more than ordinary prosperity in our crops, flocks and herds; for the victories that have crowned our arms on land and sea, in the cause of humanity; for the safe return of so many of our sons who went out to battle for the right, and for those who did not return, but have gone to the reward prepared by him for all who fall at the call of duty; let us remember that "He doeth all things well." To the afflicted families let us give comfort, consolation and deepest sympathy, and on that day, which is peculiarly American by long established custom, let our people renew their devotion to country, flag and home.

Let us put aside all committee that may have arisen in the past, and approach the new year with pure hearts, with "malice toward none and charity for all."

God of our fathers, known of old; Lord of our far-flung battle line, Whom heaven's own soldiers guard and guard, Dominion over palm and pine, Lord of hosts, be with us yet, Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us, Last we forget, last we forget—

Done at the executive office in the city of Santa Fe, this 7th day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

Witness my hand and the great seal of the territory of New Mexico on the day and date first above written.

IT will take two or three days to get the correct vote of New Mexico, but it is almost certain that Pedro Perea is elected by at least 1,500 majority.

IT takes longer to conquer the Spaniards at diplomacy than it took to conquer them at war, but the victory is bound to come finally, nevertheless.

THE EXPORT of coffee from Mexico to the United States during the year 1907 amounted to \$4,240,031 pounds, which realized to the planters the sum of \$3,084,724.

STYLES in men's hair this season threaten, it is said, to introduce the curling iron and curl paper for the sex. The curled-hair fashion for men has been in vogue in France for a year now. This is going to be faithfully tough on the fraternity of bald heads.

FINAL returns to the American Agriculturist on the estimated yield of corn by counties make the product of the year somewhat smaller than the average of a recent series of years. The average rate of yield is reported at 33.5 bushels to the acre, which with area devoted to the crop makes a total production of 1,938,000,000 bushels.

SUBSIDIARY silver coins appear to be going into circulation in a satisfactory way. The gradual increase in the circulation of these coins has drawn down the treasury holdings of them from \$29,000,000 to \$9,000,000 in the last fifteen years and, according to the treasurer's opinion, it will soon be necessary to prepare a further supply of this class of currency.

REVISED statistics of government revenue and expenditures for the last fiscal year are given in the annual report of the treasurer of the United States, submitted to the secretary of the treasury this week. It appears from the figures

given that the net ordinary revenue amounted to \$305,821,323, an increase of \$57,597,630 over those of the preceding year, while the net ordinary expenditures amounted to \$443,395,583, an increase of \$77,594,438. The deficit for the year amounted to \$137,574,260, which was over \$18,000,000 in excess of that for the year preceding.

The cable brings the information from London that "no such triumphal greeting has been accorded a military leader in the world's history of recent years as that given General Kitchener upon his return to London." Just wait until Dewey gets back home and Uncle Sam and his people will give our English brother a few pointers in spectacular effects and popular enthusiasm.

The freight rush on the Santa Fe both in this and Arizona territories is unprecedented. Every piece of rolling stock in New Mexico is on the move, and twice the present amount within reach could be utilized. The manufacturers have been sent rush orders on the thirty new locomotives and extra freight cars are being sought for everywhere with a fine-toothed comb.

The decision of the army investigation commission to go to Santiago is a wise one. It is essential that the investigation into the conduct of the war should be thorough and it can hardly be so without a visit to the scene of operations. It may be, too, that some of the commissioners desire to visit General Wood's sanitarium for the benefit of their health.

SOME of the Nicaragua canal commissioners are said to be convinced that the construction of the big waterway must be undertaken by the government in order to be successful. The past history of the enterprise will go far toward bearing them out in their view.

THE object of the assaults on the conduct of the war by the republican administration is purely political. The investigations show that there is absolutely no foundation for the charges of mismanagement made by the democratic press.

Now one of the newspaper scoundrels has a scheme to transmit electricity power through the air, any distance, without wires. Doubtless this scheme will be put in practical use about the same time as its prototype, the scheme to send telegraphic messages without wires.

ACCORDING to the Texas railway commission the net earnings of the railroads in Texas for the year ending June 30, 1908, were \$10,585,290, an increase of \$2,586,102 over 1907; for the last two years the net increase has been more than \$4,325,000.

CONSEL GENERAL HALLWAY, of St. Petersburg, sends a report on freight tariffs on Russian railroads. On January 1, 1908, there were 26,838 miles of railroad in the Russian empire, of which the government owned 16,773 miles.

SILVER CITY.
