VOTE THE STRAIGHT REPUBLICAN TICKET.

NO NOT trade off a single name on the republican ticket.

The democrat will have one lonesome member in the next territorial council.

PEDRO PEREA has contributed several hundred dollars to help hold the territorial fair in this city.

THE CITIZEN has stated nothing but solid facts against the opposition to the republican ticket in this county.

The sorehead opposition to the republican ticket in this county will meet with an overwhelming defeat to-morrow.

The flag of the United States is the emblem of the republican party of New Mexico, and is printed at the head of the official ballot.

The people of Santa Fe county will have an able representative in the next territorial council if they elect Hon. Thos. B. Catron.

H. R. FERGUSON will resume the practice of law after the 4th of next March, and be ready, as in the past, to prosecute all cases against railroad men.

The Democrat has a professional campaign liar engaged as editor. He does the dirty work of that paper each campaign and is then kicked out of the office.

The county of Summit will be created by the legislature this coming winter, and only straight republicans will be appointed to fill the county offices the first two years.

FERGUSON is trying to prevent the collection of the money on the forfeited bond of Pedro Garcia and Fincial is using every legal effort to collect it. That is the difference.

The next congress will be republican by at least 100 majority, and it is highly important that New Mexico should elect a republican delegate to represent the territory in that body.

FERGUSON has been all things to all men, and a few weeks ago went all over this city and secured many pledges of support. At that time the people here thought he was in favor of the ditch.

It will cost Spain \$15,000,000 to evacuate Cuba, but may derive some satisfaction from the thought that it is going to cost Uncle Sam \$500,000 more than that amount to get Havana alone in proper condition.

The republican party has nominated exceptionally strong, clean men as candidates for legislative and county offices. No ticket was ever more worthy of loyal support. It is for the best interest of all good citizens that such men be elected.

The republicans of Old Albuquerque held a rousing republican meeting at the court house last night. Bernard S. Bodey, Nestor Montoya and others made rousing speeches. This is FERGUSON's home precinct and where he will be beaten by a big majority.

VOTERS SHOULD REMEMBER.

One point the voters of New Mexico should remember in the coming campaign, says the Loraburg Liberal, is the importance of supporting the administration in the coming congress. All of Europe is looking with interest at the outcome. If the democrats carry the house the Europeans will say that the people of the United States do not support the administration in its conduct of the Spanish war, while if there is a good republican majority in the next house the world will know that President McKinley has the support of the people of

the country; all the governments there, at least the exception of England, will want to take a hand in settling the Philipine question, and if they do not take a hand there will be more trouble. Of course the democrats of the territory will argue that the delegates from New Mexico have no vote in congress, is not even deemed high in the congressional pack, but that makes no difference. The people on the outside of the country will count him as either for or against the administration. It would be humiliating to have pointed the fact that New Mexico, the political division which sent most of the celebrated Rough Riders to the war; which furnished more soldiers in proportion to its population than any other state or territory, had by the vote of the people elected a delegate who was of the opposite party to that to which the present belongs. No explanation of Mr. Ferguson's loyalty and work for the soldiers could ever be made which would gloss over the fact that the voters of the territory were against the administration.

WILL THE CITIZEN EXPLAIN?

Re-Continued. Hughes, who is a candidate for re-election on the Perea ticket, cannot deny that within three weeks after the legislature, of which he was a member, convened, he went to Governor Thornton and made this proposition: "If you will nominate me for a place on the board of equalization and Fincial for probate judge, I will both vote for the confirmation of all democratic voters to appoint."

The governor bought them both at the price named and a prominent republican in the other house declared they had "disgraced the party by selling too cheap."

Hughes has confessed that he made this proposition to the governor, and that he got his price and delivered the goods.—Democrat.

The above is an absolute falsehood, and the writer of it knew that he was lying when he wrote it. Hughes and Fincial had nothing whatever to do with Governor Thornton during the session of the last legislature. Acting Governor Miller sent in the list of appointive officers which were confirmed by the council, Governor Thornton being in Washington on a poker mission.

CLOSE OF THE CAMPAIGN.

The political campaign just closing has been a bitter contest, and much ill feeling will remain long after the election is over. Early in the campaign the democrats raised the race issue in the American towns to secure votes for Mr. Ferguson. The democratic newspapers also have made a bitter personal campaign against Mr. Perea and the republican nominees for legislative and county offices. They have used everything that their imagination could invent against each and every candidate on the republican ticket in each of the several counties. In this county the democrats have done this by the use of the press, with personal abuse and campaign canards. The people have been nauseated by the mass of flimsy falsehoods circulated by the democratic and fusion opposition to the republican nominee. THE CITIZEN does not believe that the people are deceived by this sort of dirty work.

THE CITIZEN has made the best campaign in its power for the republican party, and feels sure of republican success in this county to-morrow. The five democratic papers of the county have kept this paper busy denying the mean falsehoods that they have put in circulation. The Democrat, News and El Mundo, especially, have thrown enough mud to excavate an irrigation ditch. They have made the dirtiest campaign ever witnessed in this county, and have falsified facts in every issue of their sheets the past two weeks. The people are nauseated with such rot and will show their disgust to-morrow by giving the straight republican ticket, with the flag and Pedro Perea at its head, an increased majority.

THOMAS HUGHES never embezzled a cent of postoffice funds, and was honorably acquitted of the charge in October, 1888. He was elected to the territorial council that fall, having over 300 majority in this city. His indictment was annulled by democratic agents. No one contributed a cent to help him defend himself in the courts, and the Democrat is challenged to produce any sort of proof to the contrary.

THE people of this city will give Hughes and Fincial increased majorities at the election to-morrow. The work of Grant's hired men has not injured these gentlemen in the least. The corporation organ is especially bitter against Hughes and Fincial because they have opposed Grant's corporation schemes and for the interest of the people.

FALSE charges, lying, equivocation and dodging are among the prominent features of the democratic campaign in this territory. As soon as one lie is exposed, another is concocted; and it seems to be thought that such practices will impose on the public.

LAST but not least of the offices to be filled in the county this fall is that of county surveyor. The office is an important one, and should be filled by a competent person. Such a man is A. E. Pearson, the republican nominee.

GOOD advice by the St. Louis Globe-Democrat: "Let every republican vote be polled, the president's hands be strengthened and the enemies of the country at home and abroad be beaten."

FINICAL AND THE DEMOCRAT.

Mr. T. A. Finical was seen by a reporter this morning and stated that there was no connection between the houseman of Fincial and any Democrat; that the houseman in each case were entirely different parties. He also said that suit had been begun and is now pending against the men who had gone on Pedro Garcia's bond. The time for the bond of Manuel Garcia to become forfeited has not yet arrived, and even if he should not appear when his case is called for trial, the suit would have to be begun after he fails to appear in Santa Fe to answer to the charge against him. Mr. Finical also stated that several of his friends had come to him and wanted him to begin a suit for libel against A. A. Grant and the Morning Democrat. That every charge which had been published in that paper against him is absolutely groundless and without the slightest foundation in fact. That while he regretted that the Democrat should have seen fit to attack him in such an unbecoming and malicious manner, he did not care to do anything about the matter until after the heat of the campaign had passed. After the election is over he will determine upon the course to pursue, and the outcome of the Democrat's vicious slander will probably be a libel suit for heavy damages. News papers that rely entirely upon falsehoods for their campaign material ought to be taught that private citizens have some rights which they are bound to respect.

THE foolish attacks of the Morning Democrat upon District Attorney Finical are likely to get that paper and its proprietor into trouble. But they have no effect upon any one who knows Mr. Finical, for his friends are not of the kind to be influenced by campaign falsehoods.

THREE or four of the smaller fry among the democratic attorneys are envious of the success of District Attorney Finical and are doing all in their power to induce votes against him. The returns will show that Finical has more and stronger and truer friends than all of them combined.

THE so-called independent republicans of Albuquerque will trade every man on their ticket for a vote for Ferguson, while their gallup tools are trying to swallow the whole ticket.

THIS city needs a \$50,000 government postoffice. If Pedro Perea is elected delegates we can get it. If Ferguson is elected it will be impossible to secure the appropriation.

THE people of Albuquerque would be interested in having Mr. Ferguson explain why he sold the democratic party of this county to M. S. Otero, and how much he got for it.

BOOKS OF ORIGINAL ENTRY.

Cannot Be Used in Evidence Unless Provisions Are Complied With.

In case No. 793, William H. Byers, plaintiff in error, vs. Nancy J. Robinson, administratrix, etc., defendant, in error, to the district court of Socorro county, Chief Justice Mills handed down an opinion, which was concurred in by the other members of the court, reversing the judgment of the lower tribunal and remanding the cause for a new trial. This case grew out of an action brought by the defendant in error to recover a certain sum of money alleged to be due on a promissory note given by the plaintiff in error to the husband of the defendant, and which the plaintiff claimed had been paid in full. In the lower court certain papers and books were offered in proof of payment, which, because of the difference of dates, were excluded, and judgment rendered for the defendant in error. The cause was taken to the supreme court on a writ of error, and in rendering the opinion the higher court held as follows: Books of original entry cannot be used as evidence unless the statutory requirements regarding their admissibility are first complied with. The statutory provisions in this regard are the common law rule. The memorandum of sale was admissible in evidence to show that it included the share stock of the defendant, and the receipt given at the time of the execution and delivery of the note is proper evidence to prove on what account said note was given. Defendant having offered in evidence subsequent to and claimed to be on account of the note given, no other debt being proved, the burden of proof therefore shifted to plaintiff to show that said payments were on some other account than the note aforesaid. Requisition Papers Forwarded.

Governor Otero has honored requisition papers issued by the governor of Texas, and issued a mandate for the arrest of Gerónimo Parra, wanted in Texas for murder. Parra is serving a term of imprisonment in the New Mexico and had been released from his term, would have expired November 9, but it will be some time now before he will be released.

Captain John R. Hughes, of Troop D, Texas state rangers, is named in the papers as the agent for the state of Texas to make the arrest and take the prisoner back for trial.

Two Very Good Appointments.

Judge John R. McElie has appointed Messrs. Smith Simpson and Squire Hart, Jr., to the board of teachers' examiners of Taos county. These two appointees are well-known and life-long citizens of the county, thoroughly acquainted with the school system and will perform the duty of the office properly and with a due regard to the best interests of the school system of Taos county—New Mexican.

Convict Recaptured.

Parlito Trujillo, the "trust" convict who escaped from the penitentiary about a month ago and took refuge among friends near Santa Cruz, was caught in Las Vegas, Wednesday, by Sheriff Hilario Romero and returned to the penitentiary Friday night. At the time of his escape Trujillo had but seven weeks to serve of his term, but by reason of his misbehavior will remain in the institution for seven months longer.

Killed in El Paso.

Ed. Richter, deputy sheriff in Taos county eighteen years ago, came in last night over the Santa Fe and continued north this morning over the narrow gauge, says the New Mexican. Mr. Richter is now mining, and has gone to Denver on business. He says he came down through this country while an officer after one Frank Edwards, wanted in Colorado for killing a locomotive fireman at Omeles. Edwards was traced down through Albuquerque to El Paso, where he got in with a gang of thieves and was arrested. While attempting to break jail at El Paso he was shot and killed by the local officers.

Capit. Max Luna.

Capt. Max Luna was in El Paso Saturday and addressed the voters of that city on the political issues of the day Saturday evening. He will be at Los Lunas to-day, where he will spend election day. It is very likely that within the next few months the young captain may be named for an important position on the military staff of Brigadier General Wood, now commanding the military district at Santiago de Cuba. Mrs. Max Luna, who, by the way, is a very charming and victorious young lady, is now with her husband's grandmother at Santa Fe.

KILLING AT MAGDALENA.

Particulars of the Shooting and Killing of Isaac F. Baker.

A few days ago THE CITIZEN contained a brief notice of the killing of Isaac F. Baker at Magdalena by W. H. Sanders. The particulars are found in the following article clipped from the Socorro Chieftain: Isaac F. Baker was shot and killed at Magdalena at about 1 o'clock last Wednesday morning by W. H. Sanders. The facts, as near as we can learn, are as follows: A dance was in progress and Baker, who was very drunk, came in and indulged in so much profanity and bad talk that Dwight Craig was appointed to take him out. This he did, taking him to a nearby saloon. Baker then attempted to shoot Craig, but was prevented by Sanders who was standing there present. It seems that Baker's little boy had been waiting outside for some hours to take his father home and the little child suffering from the cold, Sanders urged Baker to go home at once, when the latter turned upon him with a torrent of abuse and struck him at the same time pulling his pistol. Sanders was too quick for Baker and fired, hitting Baker through the breast inflicting a mortal wound from which he died some two hours later.

There being no justice of the peace at Magdalena, Sanders was taken before Clark at Kelly for his preliminary examination, and after a number of witnesses had testified he was discharged on the ground of self-defense.

Both parties to the fracas are well-known stock men, and resided in this county for a number of years.

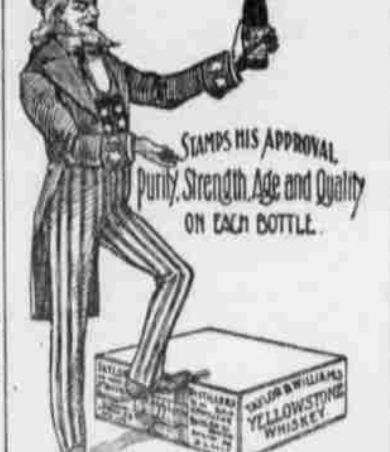
